# CONSTITUTION.

1. This Convention shall be known as the Baptist Convention of Nova Scotia, New Brunswick, and Prince Edward Island.

2. The object of the Convention shall be to maintain Acadia College, and other Educational interests of the body; as also its Foreign Missionary operations; and to advance the general interests of the denomination.

advance the general interests of the denomination.

3. The Convention shall be composed as follows:—1st. Each of the Baptist Associations, within the limits of the Convention, shall be entitled to send to any meeting of the Convention, five offits own members as delegates to represent it therein. 2nd. Every Church connected with either of the above-named Associations, and contributing toward the objects of the Convention, shall be entitled to send one of its members to represent it at any meeting of the Convention, and an additional delegate for every twenty dollars so contributed; provided, that no Church be at liberty to send more than five delegates. 3rd. Every ordained Baptist minister connected with one of the above Churches, shall be a member. 4th. Any member of one of these Churches, who shall contribute five dollars annually, or fifty dollars at one time, towards the objects of the Convention, shall be a member.

4. The officers of the Convention shall be chosen annually from its members, and shall consist of a President, two or more Vice-Presidents, a Treasurer, a Secretary, residing in the Province in which the Convention is at the time in session, and an Assistant Secretary, chosen from one of the other Provinces.

5. The Convention shall meet on the first Saturday after the 19th of August, annually, at such place as shall be agreed on by the body, when, in addition to the election of officers and the transaction of such other business as may be brought before the body, in accordance with Art. 2 of this Constitution, a Board of Foreign Missions shall be chosen, consisting of fifteen members of the Convention; five members shall constitute a quorum; also, a Ministerial Education Board, or Boards, of seven members each; three of whom shall constitute a quorum. The Convention shall also fill any vacancies that may have occurred in the Board of Governors of Acadia College, and shall, once in three years, appoint six new members in place of six who will then go out in rotation, in accordance with the Resolution passed by the Convention in September 1859 and in accordance with the Act 14 Vict., of the Legislature of Nova Scotia, cap. 37.

6. This Constitution may be altered or amended at any meeting of the Convention. by a vote of two-thirds of the members present.

### RULES OF ORDER.

1. Every sitting shall be opened and closed with prayer.

2. Persons invited to a seat, may speak on all subjects under debate, but vote on

3. No person shall speak oftener than twice on any motion, unless by permission of the body

4. Motions made and lost, shall not be recorded in the Minutes, except so ordered at the time.

5. Immediately after the opening of the Convention these rules shall be distinctly read from the Chair.

The following resolution was presented by Dr. Cramp, and passed unanimously by a rising vote:

Whereas, At the last meeting of this Convention, held at St. Stephens, N. B., the following resolution was passed, viz.: "That the establishment of a non-sectarian system of Common School Education in New Brunswick is regarded by this Convention with great satisfaction, as the only system adapted to the wants of a mixed population, and in harmony with the principles of religious freedom; and that it is earnestly to be hoped that a similar system will be introduced and maintained in every Province of the Dominion:

Therefore resolved, That the said resolution be now re-affirmed; and that, in the judgment of this Convention, it is in the highest degree important that the maintenance of the Free school system in its integrity should be secured against all opposition, direct or indirect, and especially against any interference with the independence of the Legislatures of these Provinces in this matter, by dictation of the Dominion Parliament or otherwise.

2. # Appendix.

# ANNUAL REPORT OF THE FOREIGN MISSIONARY BOARD.

Mr. President and Brethren of the Convention.

This Annual Report of your Foreign Missionary Board must be chiefly a record of the laying of foundations; a more arduous and perplexing work frequently than the subsequent building. Whether they have been well and wisely laid the future will prove.

While our missionaries elect have been completing their course of study at Newton, the Board has been carefully surveying various fields, to ascertain, if possible, the right place for our mission, and making arrangements for its early establishment. They have also sought to promote the home work of Foreign Missions, endeavoring to make prominent the idea of permanence in the work upon which we are entering, that it is not for a few years, but for "the ages to come."

### SECRETARY.

A serious loss was sustained in November last, by the removal, to another sphere of labor, of Rev. W. S. McKenzie, who had so zealously and efficiently discharged the duties of Secretary of this Board since its reorganization in 1871. Rev. W. B. Boggs, pastor of the Church at Portland, N. B., was appointed to the vacant position. Rev. Dr. Cramp has continued his very efficient and invaluable aid in this department.

## MISSION ROOM.

Last autumn the Board obtained a permanent place for its meetings, through the generosity of Messrs. C. & E. Everett, of Saint John, who placed at their service the use of a very suitable and convenient room in their premises on King Street. Here the Board has met regularly every month, besides on special occasions.

### MISS DEWOLFE.

Miss M. B. DeWolfe, who arrived in Burmah in May, 1868, and has since been laboring earnestly and successfully among the Karens at different stations in that country, has been compelled during the past year, on account of failing health, to leave her loved work and return to her native land. In her physician's view this was absolutely necessary in order to save her life. It gives us great pleasure, however, to report that her health is improving, and that there is ground for hope that it will soon be fully restored. She says, in a recent communication: "I am thankful to tell you God's blessing has attended the means used for my recovery, and I am decidedly improved. The doctor says that by care and resting now there is but little doubt that I may be strong, if not quite well, before very long. And when my health is establised I hope to resume the

work I had so suddenly and reluctantly to lay down. My labor for the past year has been very much interrupted by sickness. The dengue fever left me weak and ill-prepared for the rainy season school work just upon us, but strength was granted day by day to attend to almost every duty till within a week or two of closing school, when exhaustion demanded rest. This fever was the cause of our having a much smaller number of pupils than usual, but gave us time to be very thorough with those few. graciously smiled upon our efforts, and made manifest his strength in the time of our weakness, blessing our feeble efforts to the conversion of many of our scholars, and permitting me to close my many walks in Henthada by a visit to the water's side to witness some of our little ones put on Christ by baptism. It is impossible for me to say how long it will be necessary for me to remain in this country. While I am here, if it is thought best, it will be a pleasure to do what I can among the sisters of our denomination in giving them a better acquaintance with the work for which they are so nobly laboring. I hope my labor for souls will not cease while I have strength to repeat the loving story of the cross, should it please my Lord to keep me here or allow me to return."

### MISS NORRIS.

At the beginning of the Convention year Miss Norris was at Bassein assisting in the school at that station, where her services were very acceptable. But, being deeply impressed with the importance of putting forth some effort for the Karens of Siam, and with the approval of several missionary brethren she left Bassein, and after going to Tavoy, made a tour across the mountains into Siam accompanied by some Karen preachers. Accounts of this tour have been given in our periodicals. Returning to Tavoy she took up the school work at that station, the American missionaries having returned to the United States in quest of health. She is still in charge of the schools there. In her last letter, dated May 7th, she says: "We have a Burman school of thirty, and an increasing Karen school of twenty-five. Last Sabbath over seventy at church, and quite a large Burmese Sabbath School. \* \* \* My hands are very full of work." She is doubtless prepared to enter upon the work in our own mission field as soon as our other missionaries are ready to accompany her.

## THE FIELD.

The principal question which has occurpied the attention of the Board during the year has been the very difficult one, where shall our mission be established? Several localities have been under consideration. Strong appeals have reached us, setting forth the respective claims of different fields. Information has been sought from various sources. Advice has been asked of those well qualified to give wise counsel. After weighing well the comparative claims, and advantages, and prospects of the different fields proposed, with prayer for Divine guidance, and endeavouring to use their best

judgement, your Board arrived at the decision, which has since been confirmed, that we ought to go to the Karens, Laos, and other tribes in the Kingdom of Siam.

Some of the reasons which led your Board to this decision may

Rev. C. H. Carpenter of the American Baptist Missionary Union, who, early in 1872, made a tour of exploration through a portion of Siam, and whose attendants explored it still farther, strongly recommends the establishment of a mission in that country, and unhesitatingly encourages us to enter upon the work. He is understood to be extremely anxious to see the Baptists of these Provinces establish a mission there. Though the Karens in Siam may not be a very numerous people, yet their evangelization is likely to be speedy and successful, and Bro. Carpenter represents them as well fitted to become, when evangelized, a missionary people, and likely to exert a powerful influence over the other tribes of South Eastern Asia. But besides the Karens, there are the Laos and other large tribes, not to speak of the Siamese. The Laos are especially worthy of notice, as being very numerous. One of the Karen preachers who accompanied Mr. Carpenter to Bangkok, returned to Maulmain by an extended northerly journey through Siam. He represents the villages of the Laos as "countless," and gives the names of fourteen of their more important cities. He then makes a strong appeal to Christian teachers to go to the Laos and Siamese with the tidings of salvation by Christ. But little effort has been put forth thus far for the evangelization to the Siamese. Two or three Presbyterian missionaries are at present laboring among them. So that it is not necessary to confine our thoughts now, or our efforts in the future to the Karens, but we may embrace Siam with its ten millions in our plans. It would, perhaps, be better for work to commence among the Karens, but to have other departments established as soon as

Again, our missionary sisters, Miss DeWolfe and Miss Norris, have both acquired the Karen language, and have been laboring among Karens ever since they went to Burmah, and are, therefore, prepared to enter upon the Karen department of a mission in Siam.

Then again, our three brethren, Armstrong, Sanford, and Churchill, after calmly surveying the fields, and having the claims of other places pressed upon them, earnestly and unanimously desire to be sent to Siam.

Putting together all these circumstances, your Board feel that they can heartily recommend to the Convention the adoption of the course above indicated.

## MISSIONARIES.

Since the last meeting of the Convention our missionary company has been increased by the addition of Mr. Geo. Churchill, of Yarmouth, who, with our other brethren, graduated at Newton Theological Institution in June last. Bro. Churchill had been accepted by the American Baptist Missionary Union, and designated

to Tavoy, but having a desire to go out under the auspices of his brethren in these Provinces, he sought and obtained a release from his engagement with the Missionary Union, and on making application to your Board was unanimously and heartily accepted.

Two ladies also, Miss Maria Armstrong, of Wolfville, and Miss Flora Eaton, of Cornwallis, to be sustained by the Women's Missionary Aid Societies, have been appointed. So that our missionary force stands as follows:

In this country—Miss M. B. DeWolfe. In the Foreign Field—Miss H. M. Norris.

Under appointment—Rev. W. F. Armstrong, Rev. Rufus Sanford and wife, Rev. George Churchill and wife, Miss Maria Armstrong, and Miss Flora Eaton.

It seemed desirable that as large a company as we were well able to sustain should be sent at the outset in order that they might have the mutual support and counsel so necessary in a new field, and that there be no discouragement or dissatisfaction arising from lack of laborers.

It is expected that these brethren will sail from Saint John about the last of September for England, where they will re-embark direct for Burmah via the Suez Canal. Having arrived in Burmah they will probably remain for a time at Tavoy, while they acquire some knowledge of the language or languages they will need, and also some insight into mission work. But just as soon as practicable they will enter the territory where their labors are to be put forth, and proceed to locate the mission, and fix their head-quarters.

In reviewing the past year, there is one thing upon which your Board can look with pleasure, as an evidence that their efforts have not been in vain. That encouraging feature is an increased and increasing missionary spirit manifesting itself in enlarged liberality. The Board, while endeavouring to draw forth the contributions of the people to meet the large outlay demanded at the commencement of the mission, have sought chiefly to bring about in the churches the adoption of permanent measures for the diffusion of missionary intelligence, and an increasing supply of funds from year to year. The visit of our missionary brethren to our Associations, and to so many of the churches has, we believe, been productive of much good in this direction. The results will appear from the very gratifying report which will be presented by the Treasurer.

### SUGGESTIONS.

In venturing to offer a few suggestions, we would express our growing conviction that the time is not far distant, if indeed it has not already come, when a Secretary must be employed who can devote his whole time to the work. The rapidly increasing duties of this department render such a step very desirable. A pastor cannot, without serious interference with his ministerial duties, devote that time and thought to the work which it demands. Part of the time of the brother thus employed could be devoted to visiting the churches, holding missionary meetings, seeking to introduce missionary

literature, and to lead all into the ways of organized, systematic effort. The treasury would, without doubt, gain by such an arrangement.

We would also suggest the desireableness of having a distinct department in our existing denominational papers devoted to the subject of Foreign Missions, containing intelligence and correspondence from our own mission, and selections from the broad field of missionary literature.

We would remind the brethren of the Convention that the Board has been working thus far without any authorized rules or bye-laws for the regulation of its affairs. It is highly desirable that such a code be prepared and placed in the hands of the Board.

Mission Aid Societies. The subjoined Reports of the Womens' Mission Aid Societies speak for themselves, and show that the interest hitherto manifested in this department is by no means diminishing.

# REPORT OF THE NOVA SCOTIA CENTRAL BOARD.

The Central Board of the Womens' Mission Aid Societies for Nova Scotia and P. E. Island beg leave to report that during the year ending the 30th of June 1873, the sum of \$1672.26 was sent in by the various Societies; and it is hoped that with the greater need for funds this year, a still larger spirit of liberality will prevail with the sisters of our churches.

Miss DeWolfe's sickness has been a cause of disappointment and sorrow. We are thankful, however, that since her return to her native country she is regaining strength; and we trust, with God's blessing on the means used, she may soon be permitted to resume the work to which she has consecrated her life, and for which her acquired knowledge and experience have so well prepared her.

We have had the privilege of recommending to the Foreign Mission Board two young sisters who have decided to give themselves and their talents to the Lord's cause in a foreign field. We bespeak for them the prayers and sympathies of the Societies and friends of missions in these provinces, trusting that God's blessing will rest upon this small effort to promote the extension of his kingdom, and that strength of body and mind may be given to these dear friends, as well as to all who labor for the Master in the fields which are "ripe for the harvest."

Three new Societies have been formed during the year, making twenty in all, and the amount of \$666.91\$ has been paid to the Treasurer of the Foreign Mission Board. This amount would be considerably increased had our Treasurer received all the collections for the last quarter, but several are late coming in.

This, we feel, is but a small proportion of what New Brunswick might do were our sisters more generally interested in the work, and we trust in the coming year many will become workers with us, as there is need of increased effort to meet the demand which the extension of our missionary work will bring upon us; and every christian woman should feel it a privilege to be a sharer in it.

We sympathize deeply with our dear sister DeWolf who has been compelled to leave the work she loved, when laborers were so much needed. But He who sees the end from the beginning, and works and none can hinder, doeth all things wisely, and we would hope that she may soon be restored to health, and be permitted to return, and spend many years in telling the story of Jesus and His love to those benighted ones.

We rejoice in our beloved Missionary, Miss Norris, whose abundant seed-sowing must bring forth a rich harvest of immortal souls, for it hath been said "My word shall not return unto me void." We rejoice also that the Lord hath put it in the hearts of our Sisters Miss Eaton and Miss Armstrong to offer themselves for labor in the foreign field, and that they have been accepted by our Central Boards. We would follow them with our sympathies and prayers that they may be faithful laborers in the Master's vineyard, while we at home would desire to become more consecrated to His service.

We would earnestly solicit the influence of the Pastors, where societies have not been formed, as without their co-operation but little can be done, while many of our sisters would feel it a privilege to share in the work if it were brought before them. Such could not fail to receive a blessing in their own hearts, while seeking to benefit those of our own sex who have not the privileges of our christian land.

### PRESENTATION.

The Exercises were closed by the presentation to Rev. E. A. Crawley, D.D., of an Address, read by the Rev. Geo. Armstrong, A. M., from the friends of Dr. Crawley, accompanied by the gift of a property, consisting of a house and three acres of land in Wolfville, the value of which is estimated at three thousand dollars.

### INTERNAL AFFAIRS OF THE COLLEGE.

The studies of the year have, as far as possible, been conducted in accordance with the published Curriculum.

Owing to the chair of Natural Sciences being vacant, some modifications of the usual course had necessarily to be made. At the request of the Faculty, A. DeW. Barss, M. D., carried through a short course of Lectures on Physiology, which was received with marked satisfaction by the students.

Forty students have been in attendance during the year. The College, both in its intellectual and moral aspects, appears to be in a healthy condition. The young men are actuated by a commendable love of learning and desire for improvement.

It should be mentioned that a large number of the students have sustained, at their own expense, a class for the study of French.

The President and Professors are discharging their duties with faithfulness and energy; aiming to impart such instruction and inculcate such principles as will prepare the young men under their charge for the widest extent of usefulness, as will appear by the following extract from the President's report:

"The principles on which we are organized as a College prevent us from making sectarian differences prominent in our work, and we are pleased to observe that young men of different religious persuasions find their associations here as students harmonious and advantageous. It is our constant purpose, however, to have all

In addition to the daily exercises of worship, the students hold a large number of religious meetings, and, during the past year, (besides the number who have been engaged in the Sabbath School in the village, or on similar service elsewhere), many of the students have met voluntarily on that day in the College Chapel to listen to religious instruction, imparted in such circumstances, as free the teacher from the restraints of the ordinary College Lecture."

### CHAIR OF NATURAL SCIENCES.

During the past year your Board have been making enquiries and devising plans by which the vacancy in this Department might be supplied. Owing to the severe financial pressure on the College funds, it was not deemed expedient to appoint a professor. Arrangements, however, have been effected to secure the services of a gentleman well qualified to give instruction in this department for the year to come.

### FINANCIAL AFFAIRS.

The Annual Appeal was sent out early in the current year, but the response, though larger than in some former years, was not so gratifying as might have been expected.

In the matter of Endowment good progress has been made. In the early part of the Financial year Rev. I. E. Bill conducted an Agency in Annapol's County, Rev. J. Kempton in Queens, Rev. D. Freeman in Kings, Rev. D. W. C. Dimock in Colchester, and Rev. J. McDonald in Prince Edward Island. These resulted in an addition of twenty-seven thousand dollars in notes and cash to this fund. This, however, is but an instalment of what we need, need pressingly, absolutely, in order to carry on the College work. The successful appeals already made should stimulate to fresh exertion. If we are to have a College at all, an Institution really worthy of the name, we must keep up with the times. Your Board cannot, in justice to themselves and the interests committed to their charge. reduce one item of the present expenditure, yet this, if kept up with the present narrow income, will bring the College into debt. It is time that the Churches should fully know and understand their obligations, on this behalt. Your Board then would ask from this Convention, the earnest, cordial co-operation of every member in College work. Not only here, where it is comparatively easy to move resolutions, and make speeches, but in our Churches, at our firesides, wherever we find an opening, let us advocate the College, love the College, think of the College, pray for the College, give to the College, that it may be a still greater power in the land; "That our sons may be as plants grown up in their youth, that our daughters may be as corner stones, polished after the similitude of a palace. Happy is that people that is in such a case, yea happy is that people whose God is the Lord."

According to these returns there is a nett increase of 380, which would be equal to  $1\frac{1}{3}$  per cent. But an analysis of the Reports greatly modifies that estimate, showing that there is apparently no increase in New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island, and that the increase in Nova Scotia is very little more than half per cent.

In 113 of the churches there were altogether 766 baptisms, being an average of  $6\frac{3}{4}$  to each of those Churches. But in the remaining 205 churches no accessions by baptism during the last Associational year are reported. The Committee call the attention of the assembled brethren to this fact, as deserving very serious consideration. The churches referred to have "wrought no deliverance." The gospel has been preached among them, and the members of those churches are professedly witnesses for God and truth; but the testimony has been delivered, as far as appears, without effect. Ought not a review so saddening to produce "great searchings of heart," not only in the churches themselves, but also throughout the Convention? Should we not immediately institure inquiry into the causes of this lamentable state of things, and be prepared to admit any conclusions that may result from such inquiry, however unfavourable they may be to ourselves?

It is believed, however, that many of these unfruitful churches are small and feeble, destitute of pastors (upwards of a hundred are so reported), or situated in districts which might be advantageously placed under home missionary supervision; and it behoves the Baptists of these Provinces to consider the propriety of establishing general agencies, whereby the condition of such Churches might be accurately ascertained, and some provision made for the supply of their spiritual wants. The addition of a judicious plan of colportage may be also suggested; the persons employed in that department of labour, if carefully selected, would not only circulate useful literature, adapted to Baptist families, but would hold meetings for prayer and exhortation, andthus become instrumental in reviving drooping energies and directing languid zeal into channels of usefulness. There

is a large amount of unemployed talent in our Churches, which might by this means be brought into profitable action. The teachings of the New Testament in regard to the use of the gifts which the Lord bestows on his people appear to have fallen into neglect in

The Committee cannot but congratulate the Convention on the financial prosperity of the Foreign Mission cause among us. The contributions of the year now ending will be found far in advance of any previous year. Thegeneral average of contributions among all the Churches of the Convention, for the year 1872, was 191 cents per member; but taking the Provinces separately, the averages are different, being, for Nova Scotia, 221 cents-for New Brunswick, 132-and for Prince Edward Island, 218. In Quebec and Ontario, the average is almost 13. The general average for the United States, including North and South, is 201 cents; but for the New England States it is 53 cents. In these last-mentioned States an attempt is to be made this year to raise the average to a dollar. A contribution of fifty cents per member for the churches of this Convention would furnish an income, according to our present numbers, of 14,678 dollars. May it not be hoped that this result will be reached?

The Committee have observed with pleasure the increased liberality of the Baptists of these Provinces in the matter of Education. The endowment of Acadia College is steadily advancing. Were the contributions of the other Provinces equal in proportionate amount to the sum raised by the churches of Prince Edward Island, where it averages two dollars per member, the prospect would be still more encouraging. desirous of making ample provision for instruction in all the branches of modern education; in doing so, they reasonably expect to be sustained by the denomination at large; but if that expectation should be disappointed, the denomination would soon sink below its proper level—a catastrophe to be most earnestly deprecated.

When the slow progress of evangelical truth is contemplated, as shown by the small number of conversions to God, in other denominations as well as our own; and when, besides, we think of the alarming spread of scepticism and infidelity, and the Romanzing tendencies among large numbers of the Angelican clergy, the inquiry will naturally be made, "Is there not a cause?"-and since it is conceded on all hands that Christian success is to be ascribed to truth and power-gospel truth, and the power of the Holy Spirit-it is surely incumbent on ministers and churches, in the first place, to be very watchful lest the exhibition of truth be faint, or dim, or partial—for no blessing may be expected, if " all the counsel of God" be not declared :- and, in the second place, to institute anxious inquiry respecting the manner in which the doctrine of the Spirit's influence is held and treated. It is confessed by our Churches that the conversion of sinners is accomplished "by the power of the Holy Ghost," and that growth in piety is the fruit of the bestowment of the same blessing. The actual enjoyment of the blessing is dependent in prayer, and the success of prayer is dependent on faith. Do we pray believingly? Do we expect gracious answers to our prayers? Do we feel the truth which we profess to believe, and reckon on results as certainties? Do we not only acknowledge our dependence on Divine power, but look for the practical issues of Divine faithfulness? In a word, have we forgotten that harvest follows seed-time, and that God has said, "The Lord's hand is not shortened that it cannot save?"

The Committee commend these thoughts to the consideration of the brethren, and clo-e by the usual recommendation, that the churches be requested to set apart a day for special prayer to "the Lord of the harvest."

### IN MEMORIAM.

REV. ROBERT WALKER died in Upper Aylesford, Sept. 21, 1872, in the 78th year of his age. Brother Walker was ordained as an evangelist June 3, 1856, and preached the Gospel in various parts of the province almost till the end of his life. Latterly, in deed, as Dr. Tupper remarked (in the Christian Messenger) "his power of utterance was impaired, but he continued steadfast in the faith, and delivered sound truth to the last." His wife died a month before him.

Rev. William L. Hopkins, who died Oct. 21, 1872, was a native of Ireland. He came to New Brunswick in 1843, and settled at Pennfield, Co. Charlotte. He was then a Methodist, but adopted Baptist principles soon after his arrival, and joined the Baptist church in Pennfield. He was ordained in November, 1845. He preached seven years in St. James, and then returned to Pennfield, and laboured there successfully as pastor of the Baptist church for twenty years. His last illness was short. He preached twice on Lord's day, Oct. 13, and died, as stated above, on the 21st, in the 73rd year of his age. "In life, as a christian and a pastor, he was beloved by all who knew him. In death he was deeply lamented."

REV. ABRAHAM STRONACH died July 20th last. He was ordained Oct. 6, 1836, and became pastor of the third Cornwallis church, where he laboured about seventeen years, when he retired to Lower Aylesford, where he rendered valuable assistance to Dr. Tupper, by preaching in the large district then under Dr. T's charge.

Brother Stronach kept himself in the background, seldom taking part in the public assemblies of the denomination. His modest and retiring disposition led him to remain much at home, where no doubt he served God and enjoyed his presence, although his quiet mode of life prevented him, in some degree, from experiencing the pleasure derived from the communion of saints.

As a minister of Christ his labours were duly appreciated by the people. He was a sound, solid preacher. Several revivals took place under his ministry in Cornwallis, during which upwards of two hundred members were added to the church.

To the above may be added the name of the Rev. David Nutter, who died at his residence in the State of Maine, of which State he was a native, on the 15th of January last. He was ordained at St John, N. B. on the 24th of June, 1819, during the session of the Nova Scotia and New Brunswick Association in that city. From 1819 to 1823 he was pastor of the church at Windsor, then in the infancy of its existence. He itinerated considerably in those years, and became advantageously known in many of our churches, which welcomed his occasional visits to this country in after years with great delight. He was pastor of the church in Portland, St. John, in 1855 and 1856.

Brother Nutter was a very interesting preacher. He was so plain that it was scarcely possible to misunderstand him. His sermons were intensely evangelical. His style savoured of quaintness. The attention of his congregations was always well sustained. His hearers were neither sleepy nor weary.
