Magenta or Rosine, M-gala Pink, Crimson Scarlet, Purple, Blue, Violet, Light and deep Yellow, Green, and Neutral Scales. Green requires pure blue in order to succeed, part caution should be taken. Most of them dissolve freely in hot water, others will be first dissolved in a little spirit, and then in the boiling water.

Directions go with each packet. They are very directly used, all required is "to dissolve the dye in boiling water, and put in the goods. Iron vessels should not be used, a milk dish well heated previous to the operation is best. Some of these dyes make good ink: Purple, Vi. Red, Blue; Orange, Red, Yellow, and other colors.
