The *Gazette* estimates by the vote at the late election that there are 36,000 residents in Muskoka and Parry Sound.

A butter factory has been established at Zimmerman, in Halton County. This is the first factory of the kind in that county.

The Imperial Government has consented to the appointment of a Royal Commission to enquire into the cause of the agricultural depression in England.

The Great Eastern is to be used for the direct transportation of cattle between London and Texas. It is calculated that the vessel will take in one voyage 2,200 head of cattle and 36,000 sheep.

The crop prospects in Prince Albert, Northwest Territory, are splendid. The *Free Press* says that the crop reports from the different parts of Manitoba are encouraging though considerable loss has been sustained by heavy rain in certain localities.

A farmer in Holden, Me., states that being much annoyed with crows, pulling up his corn, he placed a large umbrella in his field in order to frighten them away. Imagine his surprise one wet day in finding a good flock seeking shelter under it from the rain. The umbrella is now used for another purpose.
