


ARCHBISHOP BRUCHESI FORBID HIM TO SPEAK

His Grace Could Not Sanction Appearance of French Advocate at a Festival Under Catholic Auspices—Reasons are Given.

[Canadian Press Despatch] MONTREAL, June 25.—After the organizers of the St. Jean Baptiste Association soiree, which concluded the tag day for money to carry on the campaign in favor of the bilingual schools in Ontario, and which was given last evening in Convocation Hall, had secured Gonsalves Desaulniers, K.C., one of the best-known French-Canadian advocates and literateurs in the province, as an attraction, they were compelled late yesterday to ask him to cancel the engagement because of objections raised by Archbishop Bruchesi of the Roman Catholic Church.

Mr. Desaulniers was to have recited a patriotic piece of his own composition entitled "In the Gulf." His Grace warned the soiree that Mr. Desaulniers was permitted to recite, use of the university hall would be forbidden. The position taken by Mr. Bruchesi is said to be as follows: Mr. Gonsalves Desaulniers not being in good standing with the Catholic church, His Grace does not consider that it would be proper for that gentleman to appear at an entertainment given in a Catholic University, although it is stated that His Grace has never questioned any one's right to entertain any religious views he may see fit. The incident created a great deal of talk at the concert, and especially among professional men. Mr. Desaulniers is said to have been a directing spirit in Godfrey Langlier's paper, Le Pais, which paper has been threatened with an ecclesiastical ban by the Archbishop. It is also affirmed that Mr. Desaulniers was at one time a member of the famous Emancipation lodge which was affiliated with the Grand Orient of France, and disbanded some time ago. The statement has also been made that Sir Wilfrid Laurier proffered him a judgeship a couple of years ago, and that pressure from certain quarters caused the then leader of the government to then make the nomination in question. Mr. Desaulniers, while gracefully retiring, stated to the organizers that he reserved his right to register a protest with His Grace in the form of a letter, and likewise to inform the provincial government of the occurrence, as the Quebec government subsidizes Laval.

A splendid reception was accorded in New York to Dr. Lauro Muller, Brazilian Minister of Foreign Affairs, who is in this country as the special ambassador of the South American Republic to repay the visit made to that country in 1906 by Ellhu Root, then Secretary of State. On behalf of the President, Dudley Field Malone, Third Assistant Secretary of State, paid a high tribute to the personal qualities of Dr. Muller, and emphasized the hope of the administration that the envoy's tour of the country will be productive of closer bonds between the two republics.

While in New York Dr. Muller was presented with a large gold loving cup by members of the American Manufacturers' Export Association. During the envoy's stay in New York the battle ship Minas Gerases, greatest of the Brazilian dreadnaught fleet, came into port. The ill-fated vessel experienced very rough weather during her passage. Mute evidence of her stormy passage was observed in the mangled mass of iron work which hung from her starboard side. The platform to which torpedo netting equipment is affixed had been ripped and torn, but otherwise the immense fighting craft is shipshape.

T. L. WOOD, PRESIDENT LOCAL OPTION COMMITTEE

Officers Finally Picked Out For the Coming Campaign in This City—Executive Charged With the Task of Completing Organization.

The local option meeting held in the Y.M.C.A. last night at which the nominating committee appointed at the meeting one week ago brought in a report, was pronounced to be one of the most enthusiastic and largely attended during the present campaign. The meeting last night was really the first meeting, the supporters say, during the campaign, the other gatherings held being preliminary meetings. Last night about forty were present. The nominating committee brought in a report recommending the following as members of the executive: President—T. L. Wood. First Vice-President—J. F. Schultz. Second Vice-President—P. E. Verity. Third Vice-President—George A. Ward. Recording Secretary—A. E. Day. Treasurer—Fred Mann. Chairman of committees—Finance, J. H. Ham; Voters' Lists, Joseph Ruddy; Platform, Rev. G. A. Wood.

The report was unanimously accepted, and the workers were well-pleased with the appointments. The committee will meet soon to mark out the work of the campaign. Several enthusiastic addresses were made and everyone present signified their intention of going right into the fight until the last vote was cast. The point emphasized particularly by the advocates of the measure last night was that the local option movement was not a movement against any hotel or hotels but against the traffic which in its very nature was the enemy of everything that is good. An adjournment was made until such time as the executive complete the work of organization. This was considered to be some job, as numerous workers who participated in the last fight are indifferent about the matter this year. As yet no paid organizer has been secured.

MEDICAL MEN DISCUSS MILK SUPPLY

Convention at London of Canadian Doctors is Proving Profitable.

LONDON, June 25.—At the convention of medical men here, Dr. G. G. Nasmith of Toronto, led off the discussion in the public health section with a paper on "The Control of Municipal Milk Supply," in which he drew many lessons from Toronto's experiences. "By doing away with the selling of milk in bulk Toronto has reduced the danger element from 1200 places which sell milk," he said. "Milk is the only uncooked animal food we eat, and because it is an ideal culture medium for germs, sometimes despite all our care, it is consumed in an unhealthy condition. The only way to make milk perfectly safe is by pasteurization. Last year in Toronto forty-five per cent of the milk was pasteurized; this year 75 per cent is so treated, and by the end of the year I believe 90 per cent will be pasteurized." Dealing with tuberculosis in cattle, Dr. Nasmith claimed that the whole problem was one of sanitation and with earnest, conscientious effort, the disease could be eliminated from dairy herds. "Of all the potential and active sources of disease, milk is perhaps the most dangerous, and from even a commercial aspect milk inspection pays well," he said. Dr. T. M. Whitelaw, medical health officer of Edmonton, said this was to get clean milk and then sterilize it. "Our dairymen are getting rich," he said. "Our Alberta grasses produce much more nutritious than those of Ontario and the cows there give more milk and richer."

GERMAN PAPER ATTACKS WILSON

U. S. President is Regarded as the New Danger on Political Horizon.

[Canadian Press Despatch] NEW YORK, June 25.—A Berlin cable says President Wilson is violently attacked in an editorial in the National Zeitung. Under the caption "The New Danger" his address to Congress is characterized as "Disturbing the hopes for tranquility in the time of a crisis more dangerous to Europe than the Balkan dispute." Mr. Wilson is described as "a lecturing Socialist who is convinced that he must reform the world." The newspaper adds: "God help anyone who still doubts that President Wilson is one of the most dangerous agitators of modern times in one of the highest offices in the world."

HYDRO ELECTRIC FOR GRANDVIEW

Progressive Suburb Will Keep up in Race With the Others.

Hydro Electric for Grandview is the movement underway in that progressive suburb of this city. The movement in Grandview is but a portion of the general movement in the suburban districts to secure Hydro-Electric service. At a meeting of the residents of the district held Monday night, arrangements were made for a mass meeting in St. James church school room tomorrow (Thursday) night at 8 o'clock. It is expected that ex-Ald. W. N. Andrews will be present and will speak. An engineer is expected to be present from the commission at Toronto to give the necessary information. There is a widespread interest in the movement among the residents. Everybody is invited.

Hydro Off Again.

LONDON, Ont., June 25.—Hydro electric power was once more off, it being out of commission for fifty-five minutes yesterday. The London and Lake Erie Traction Company was again held up by the system being completely tied up. During the month of June hydro has been off thirteen times, a total of 28 hours.

KILLED HIS SQUAW DURING PROGRESS OF BIG INDIAN FESTIVAL

[Canadian Press Despatch] VERNAL, Utah, June 25.—Crazed with jealousy, while the sun danced, the greatest of the Ute Indian festivals, was in progress last night, Tim Buchwitch, shot and killed his squaw and then fired a bullet into his own head. As the braves were dancing, Buchwitch's squaw approached the pole around which they were holding their festivities, and placed a bundle of sweets at its foot. A young brave bent over, as if to take some of the sweets, greatly enraging Buchwitch. The squaw noticed his anger and ran away. Buchwitch followed and shot her dead. The Indian picked up his dead squaw, carried her to his tepee and then killed himself. Several white persons witnessed the deed, became alarmed at the tragedy, and hurriedly left the reservation, fearing that the Indians would rise against them.

At Calgary. CALGARY, Alta., June 25.—Sir Ian Hamilton and Hon. Sam Hughes, Minister of Militia, arrived here yesterday morning. They will visit the encampment of the 13th Military District.

REVENGE TAKEN ON OUR GOLFERS

After Stormy Passage to Galt Brantford Lost by Four Points.

Yesterday afternoon a party of Brantford golfers motored over to Galt to play mixed foursomes with the ladies and gentlemen of that progressive city. After a more or less stormy passage, all but one vessel arrived safely in port, or in other words reached the hospitable club house in fairly good order and condition. The one car unfortunately failed to reach port and drop anchor, till long after the match was completed and refreshment for the entertainment of the players had almost reached the limit of resource. Never was vessel more tempest tossed and storm strained than this staunchly-built car. It contracted every ailment to which the average automobile is heir to and got it bad. Commencing with a mild attack of pneumonia, it feverish attempt to blow itself into eternity. The Doctor in attendance with his energetic assistant, did all that lay in their power to ward off the ravages of conflicting influences, working like blackblights in the tropical heat of the afternoon sun. The lady passengers exhibited heroic endurance and cheered the perspiring workers by cute little questions as to the working of pumps and the fixing of tires.

In the note two young women in the city are named as the cause of the tragedy, and the request is made that the dead woman's jewelry and clothing be sent to a sister whose address is given as Miss Josephine Hurbert, Norwalk, Ohio.

HANGED WITH THE ASSASSINS

Sultan's Son-in-Law Meets Same Fate as Ten Other Assassins.

[Canadian Press Despatch] NEW YORK, June 25.—A cable from Constantinople says: The impossible has happened. The Sultan's son-in-law, Salih Damad Pasha, shared the ignominious fate of eleven common assassins executed yesterday in Bayazid square for the murder of Mahmoud Shekret Pasha, the grand vizier. Huge crowds saw the body swinging beside those of the other murderers.

RUSSIAN BEAR WILL HAVE A GREAT AIR DREADNOUGHT CORPS

[Canadian Press Despatch] ST. PETERSBURG, June 25.—The development of the aerial armament of Russia is making immense progress, according to the chief of the army staff, who to-day during a debate in the Duma, related some interesting details of what had been done in this direction. He said the Russian Ministry of War would not rest until a flying squad had been established in every army corps. The Government, he continued, had doubled the number of dirigibles recently. It had acquired airships known as aerial dreadnaughts which were provided with machine guns, bomb throwers and wireless telegraphy. It was true, he continued, that the German army possessed eleven dirigibles, but only eight of those came up to the standard of the six Russian army dirigibles.

[Canadian Press Despatch] TORONTO, Ont., June 25.—A little over a mile from the mouth of the Humber, on the bank of that little stream, workmen excavating for the foundation of a house, yesterday unearthed the skeletons of two Indians. The vicinity, known as Baby's Point (it was years ago the farm of Col. Baby) has been recognized as an ancient Indian burying ground. These skeletons, according to F. Holm Smith whose workmen came across them this year, are estimated at from 100 to 125 years old. They have been sent to the Provincial Museum. Not more than 1,000 feet from this spot, right opposite the Lambton Golf Club's field, there was recently unearthed the skeleton of an elk and a mastodon's tooth "three times the size of a man's head."

Friedman Cure

LONDON, Ont., June 25.—When Prof. Adams of Montreal presents to the Canadian Medical Association at one of to-day's sessions the report of the committee of Montreal physicians which has been investigating the merits or demerits of the Friedman tuberculosis "cure," it is expected that the exercise of the utmost caution in the use of the Friedman serum will be urged. It is expected that the report will get out that nothing has occurred as yet to establish the discoverer's claims for it.

Immigrants Arrive

QUEBEC, June 25.—Eighteen hundred immigrants from Ontario and the West, were among the passengers carried by the C.N.R. steamer Royal George and the Allan line Corinthian, which arrived here this morning.

LORD MAYOR GIVES LUNCHEON

A Blaze of Color for President Poincaré of France in London.

[Canadian Press Despatch] LONDON, June 25.—President Raymond Poincaré of France was the guest at luncheon to-day of the Lord Mayor and corporation of the city of London, and "The Square Mile" composing the city proper, was in gala array for the occasion, while the ancient Guild Hall was a blaze of color. The French President's progress through streets lined with troops from York House, placed at his disposal by King George, to the city, was a popular triumph. It was marked by enthusiastic welcoming cheers from thousands of sightseers, who took the occasion in this way to express their approval of the friendly agreement between Great Britain and France. The scene during the luncheon was brilliant. The hall was crowded with members of the Royal family, cabinet ministers, naval and military officers and high state and civic dignitaries, their uniforms glittering with decorations.

JOE GILLIES IS AT HOME AGAIN

He Left Last Night to Complete Thirty Year Term in Prison.

Last night the famous Joe Gillies who was sentenced in the police court recently to six months in Central Prison for housebreaking and stealing, left in charge of Provincial Bailiff Ryan on the 8:19 P.M. train for the central. Turnkey Hogan marched the famous Joe to the station. Gillies has served 29 years in Kingston penitentiary at different intervals and when he has completed the six months he is now serving will have served one year and a half in central.

Hyland Goes West

MONTREAL, Que., June 25.—Harry Hyland, who was recently sold by the Toronto lacrosse club to Con. Jones of Vancouver, left last night for the West, where he will finish out the season with the Vancouver club. Hyland played hockey last winter with the Wanderers and was well up on the list of goal scorers. He will return to Montreal for hockey. He still remains the property of the Wanderers and will figure on their line-up again next winter.

Sad Accident

EDMONTON, Alta., June 25.—Arthur Young, aged 35, demonstrator for the J. I. Case Company at Calgary, was killed at Baugh. He tripped immediately in front of a five thousand pound tractor which passed over his body. He was married two months ago.

They would not accept an offer of this nature.

ACCIDENTS IN AMBITIOUS CITY

Young Man Was Instantly Killed This Morning—Other Fatalities.

HAMILTON, June 25.—Ross Lusby, 110 Clinton street, Toronto, died at the City Hospital shortly before noon as the result of injuries received when he fell beneath a moving train at the Grand Trunk station this morning. Lusby ran out of the waiting room and attempted to grab the hand rail of the second coach. He missed and plunged beneath the wheels. One arm was ground off and his body terribly mutilated. 
Killed at Toronto

Mason, of Toronto, show the total amounts to \$588,444 and succession duties of \$27,550 have been paid to Solicitor McLeod of the succession duties of the Provincial Treasurer's Department. The late Mr. Mason died on December 9, 1911.

The estate of the late Rev. Elmore Harris of Toronto, who died on December 19, 1911, while on his wedding trip in India, of smallpox, has been valued at \$627,990. The amount of duties paid on this estate aggregated \$24,397. Rev. Dr. Harris was one of the best known of the Baptist ministers in Canada and was formerly stationed at London. SENIOR RECITAL



Government Control, According to the Medical Men in Assembly at London, is the Only Solution of the Problem of Public Health—Apathy is Still Evident in Many Places Says Dr. Stewart.

LONDON, June 25.—A resolution urging the establishment of a federal department of public health was one of the most important steps taken at the meeting of the public health section of the Canadian Medical Association's convention, which opened in the Masonic Hall yesterday morning. During the discussion of the question of public health in general medical inspection in the schools, perhaps one of the most difficult problems in connection with this section, was dealt with at length.

The paper dealing with this subject was prepared by Dr. J. Stewart of Halifax, but was read by Dr. Edgar of the London Institute of Public Health. It was explained that Dr. Stewart had gone to Scotland to receive the degree of LL.D. from Edinburgh University.

Dr. Stewart, after reviewing the work being done in all the provinces and especially remarking on the sympathetic interest taken in the work by Hon. Dr. Pym in Ontario, stated that he was forced to conclude that the work was yet in its elementary stage. While there had been progress in the cities, owing to efforts of the few, there was still apathy shown in the smaller places and would be until some definite system was worked out that would constitute a national standard. For this reason, therefore, there was need for a national public health service that could deal with such questions as immigration, sanitation of factories, control of diseases, adulteration of food and inspection of schools.

Those who took part in the discussion were Dr. Whitelaw of Edmonton, Dr. Park of Edmonton, Dr. J. A. Hutchison of Westmount, and Prof. Adams of Montreal, the latter emphasizing the importance of earnest co-operation between the school boards and the boards of health.

PRINCESS TO WED?

London Paper Claims To Have Information of H.R.H. Betrothal.

LONDON, June 25.—The Evening Standard's Berlin correspondent says: "According to advices from a very reliable source at Mecklenburg-Stralitz there is reason to believe that an engagement will shortly be announced between the Princess Patricia of Connaught and Prince Adolf Friedrich, heir to the Duchy of Mecklenburg-Stralitz." Final arrangements between the two families are said to have been made when King George and Queen Mary paid their flying visit to the aged Dowager, Mecklenburg-Stralitz during their recent sojourn in Berlin.

EQUAL SUFFRAGE FOR DENMARK.

COPENHAGEN, June 25.—At an extraordinary session of the Rigsdag, yesterday, the Premier, M. Zahle, said that a new Cabinet had been formed in order to secure such amendments to the constitution as would make effective the popular demand shown in the recent elections. He said that elections for both Chambers would be held on an equal universal suffrage basis, and that Parliament would open a month earlier than usual so that the measure could be carried through the coming session. Erik De Savenius has been appointed Minister of Foreign Affairs.

The sharply pointed crown, covered smoothly with brown satin ribbon bow, and the brim of shirred velvet is partially covered with a fluffy band of white and brown marabout.

A SPLENDID DINNER FOR HEARTY EATERS

- Short ribs of beef, brown gravy
- Plain boiled potato
- Sweet dill pickles
- Apple pie
- Cheese
- Coffee

Put the ribs to boil in just enough water to cover them. Salt, add two pepper pods, one slice of onion and one laurel leaf. Boil slowly until tender. Take up, wipe dry, lay in a baking pan, sift little flour over them and brown in oven. There will be enough fat in the pan for the gravy. Heat it stir in one heaping tablespoon of flour and stir well until lumpy disappear. Turn into this flour and fat one and one-half cups of cold water and allow to boil five minutes. Place the ribs on a platter, peel the potatoes which have been boiled with their jackets on, place them around the ribs and send the gravy to the table in a gravy boat. This dinner will be eaten with a relish by every one in the family.

KITCHEN HELPS

Permanganate of potash will cleanse dirty filters of all impurities. A solution should be passed through the filter until it comes out as pink as when it was poured in.

Tar may be removed from the hands by rubbing with the outside of fresh orange or lemon peel and drying immediately. The volatile oils dissolve tar so that it can be rubbed off.

Cayenne pepper is excellent to rid cupboards of mice. The floor should be gone over carefully, and each hole stopped up with a piece of rag dipped in water and then in cayenne pepper.

When a tin lid is very hard to remove instead of struggling to loosen it with a knife just hold the tin up sideways and give a few taps with a hammer, and it will loosen immediately.

Very frequently when separating the whites from the yolks of eggs the yolk becomes broken and falls into the white. Dip a cloth in warm water, wring it dry, and touch the yolk with a corner of it. The yolk will adhere to the cloth, and may be easily removed.

If great care is not taken flat irons easily become rusted. The following is a good way to clean them when this occurs. Tie a lump of beeswax in a piece of rag, and when the irons are hot rub them with this. Then rub them well with salt on a cloth, and they will be quite smooth and clean.

Stomach gas is frequently caused by fermentation of foods not properly digested. Intestinal fermentation causes intestinal gases. Sour milk and cheese diet diminishes it. Over-eating, hurried eating and too long waits between meals are all common aids to the formation of stomach gas. If what seem to be "mere colds" were less commonly neglected tuberculosis would more often be caught in its incipient stage and pneumonia and diphtheria would frequently be prevented.


