

RIMINAL CAREER OF A FRENCH CONVICT



Revelations of a white slave club in New York, the importation of girls from France, and of ramantic facts of some of the prisoners have been made public by Albert C. Fach, District Attorney of Richmond county, as the Grand Jury continued its investigation into the robbery of Mr. and Mrs. Jacques Dier and the buirning of their home on Staten Island. Albert Pleuchot, the leader of this white slave hand, who is accused of setting fire to the Dies hame. eader of this white slave band, who is accused of setting fire to the Dier home,

has had an interesting career.

According to Pleuchot's tale, his repeated crimes in France led to his deportation to French Guiana at the age of thirty-three. Soon after his arrival he and eleven others went by night to a creek in the forest and built a boat. For six days the guards sought them in vain. Then they dropped down the river at night and drifted out to sea. For six days they drifted, with only scraps of foot and almost no water. Then the boat collapsed in a storm.

In the third boat they escaped to British Guiana, where the Governor assisted them to get away. Pleuchot has now lived for six years in this country.
