SYNOPSIS OF CANADIAN NOBTES WEST LAND REGULATIONS.

The sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Applicant must appear in person at the Dominion Lands Agency or Sub-Agency for the District. Entry by proxy may be made at any Dominion Lands Agency (but not Sub-Agency), on certain conditions.

Duties—Six months residence upon the conditions of the land in each of three years. A homesteader may live within aine miles of his homestead on a farm of at least 80 acres, on certain conditions.

emption patent may be obtained as homestead patent, on certain conditions.

A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months in each of three years, cultivate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scrubby or stony land. Live stock may be substituted feas cultivation under certain conditions.

Outside Matheson in one roothouse there were sixteen people suffocated to death as they stood. Fromm's farm, which is sandy and well cleared, survivors say twenty-five people took refuge. In an ordin-ary fire this farm would have escap-ed, but the wall of flames did not spare them, and they lie in heaps.

Prospector Hero's Vivid Story Bill Fairburn, a stalwart prospe tor, who undoubtedly saved many lives on that awful Saturday, gives a most vivid description of the fire.
"It came," he said, "sped by howling tornado, a living wave flame, travelling at sixty miles an hour, and nothing lived in its wake Matheson was in flames in a few minutes. I rushed all the women and children I could find to a freight train on a siding, and sent them out

and, unaccustomed as they were, milked them to keep the babies alive. milked them to keep the babies alive.

One of the search parties just outside Matheson, found brave little Ettie McCallum, only nine years of age, still guarding two babies she had saved out of the fire. She was badly burned around the legs, but did not complain. She was brought down to New Liskeard hospital and will probably recover. Half a dozen men, badly burned and almost blind, are now in New Liskeard hospital.

Duncan Graham is seriously burned about hands and face. He is the man who placed his wife and child in a trench, covered them with blankets and kept the blankets wet till the fierce sweep of the fire had passed. His clothes were almost burnt from his body. One arm is badly burned to the elbow, and the other hand is almost charred to the bone as far as the wrist. His face is severely destroyed. It has right to prevent its own subjects from doing it through these intermediaries, if it can, and that is what it is attempting."







THE sole head of a family, or any male over 18 years old, may homestead a quarter-section of available Dominion land in Manitoba, Saskatchewan or Alberta. Application of the control of the con

emption patent may be obtained as a homestead patent, on certain conditions. A settler who has exhausted his homestead right may take a purchased homestead in certain districts. Price \$3.00 per acre. Duties—Must reside six months is each of three years, enlitvate 50 acres and erect a house worth \$300.

The area of cultivation is subject to reduction in case of rough, scruby or steay land. Live stock may be substituted for cultivation under certain conditions.
