## hirty-Five Canadian V.C.'s Living.

Thirty-Five Canadian V.C.'s Living. Canadian recipients of the Victoria Cross during the great war of 1914 are given as numbering 56 by the Canadian Almanac of 1920, which has just been issued. Of this number 21 were either killed in action or died of wounds, leaving only 35 liv-ing ex-members of the Canadian ex-peditionary forces who hold the cov-eted distinction. Companions of the Distinguished Service Order, who were thus rewarded for individual in-stances of meritorious or distinguish-ed services in the great war number 557. This naval and military order of distinction was instituted by Queen Victoria, September 6, 1886, and only those who hold at the time of their nomingion a commission in the navy, in land forces, or marines, or in the Indian or colonial naval or military forces are eligible for the honor.





To-day a Toronto housekeeper pays 82.20 for a chick-en; in 1896 she used to buy two for 55 cents-mot as good chickens as those bought now, but deemed good at that time. Nearly everything is three or four times the price of 1897. No matter how wages may so up, it seems to be comparatively easy for prices to over-top them.
