

STORGE OF HAY.

In Number 5 of this publication, issued in July, 1916, it shown that the weight of scientific evidence is all in favour of cutting grasses for hay at, or shortly after, the flowering period, at all events before the seed is fully ripe.

We now direct attention to the employment of suitable hay making methods, subsequent, to cutting, in order that the cured hay may possess, in the greatest possible degree, palatability and high nutritive value.

Careless and rough handling of the hay will result in the partial destruction of this protective coating and, consequently, in wet weather water is liable to soak in and remove, in solution, some of the most valuable nutritive constituents from the hay. Both in this and in another way, clover and alfalfa are even more susceptible to careless curing methods. Under these conditions, the hay—especially if it contains a large proportion of clover—is liable to undergo fermentation, a process which may eventually lead to spontaneous combustion.

Spontaneous Conbustion—The spontaneous Conbustion—The spontaneous fires which heak out in barns or, more particularly, in mows where hay or sheaf grain is stored, are due primarily to fermitation which, themically considered, is a form or process of oxidation. Fermentatin is duen to the growth and rapid multiplication obacteria, plants always present in the air. They feed upon the organic matter of the hay etc. and rapidly develop when moisture is present and the material and the enclosed air are not too cold. If the process takes place slowly (conditions of moisture air and temperature hot being favourable to rapid development of the bacteria) "slowe ombustion" results and there is no flame or fire. Such is the causes the blackned and charfed masses occasionally found

by rough and too frequent manulations.

In so far as weather conditions may permit, the curing of hay should be gradual and thorough and yet sufficiently rapid to enable the cured material to retain somewhat of the original green colour of the new-mown hay.

"Make hay while the sun shines" is an old proverb which takes cognizance of the most potent in haying. In dry, sunny, breezy weather it is frequently possible to affect the thorough, rapid curing of hay in the swath or windrow.

Washington, July 24— The \$240,000,000 aeroplane bill became a law today with President Wilson's signature. This immense appropriation is only the beginning of preparations for the campaign intended to overwhelm Germany in the air.
