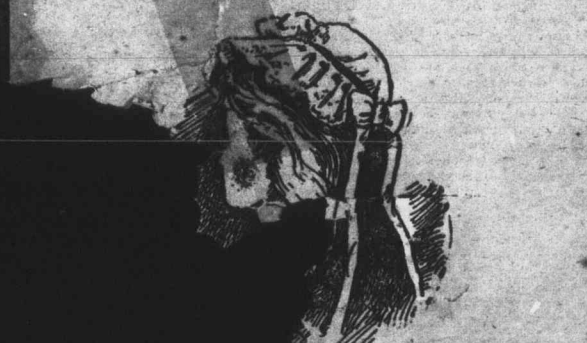

Our Journalistic Comment.

In an editorial in the Brockville Times of Thursday last, under the heading "Gross Inconsistency" this paper is attacked for not degrading its news columns by following in the well-worn rut of party papers. To show our inconsistency the Times re-published from the Reporter a number of paragraphs that do not harmonize with the policy of Tory editors and a number that would prove distasteful to the average Grit editor. It is not claimed that these paragraphs are untrue, but simply that they are inconsistent. Now, this is just where the Times editor makes a mistake. We pass without rebuke his impudent assumption of the right to exercise a censorship over our columns, and will merely point out the cause of his error and the cause of his attack. The Times, in common with many other party papers, makes the mistake of supposing that its readers desire only news that strengthens the claims made by its party. To show this to be correct we state that the Reporter has found a constituency of readers larger than the Times ever dreamed of possessing who are perfectly satisfied to receive news that is free from party bias. Our list includes a large number of the leading Conservatives of the county and this, no doubt, hurts the feelings of our little column.

About a year ago the Times discovered that the Reporter was receiving a very liberal share of Brockville advertising and endeavored to have the merchants withdraw their patronage from this paper. We pointed out then that we had the circulation that Brockville business men required and that they advertised in the Reporter because they found that it was the best medium through which to speak to their rural customers. That statement of the case was correct, and our advertising columns to-day may be taken as proof. Apparently, the logic of this proved convincing even to the Times man and he subsided into a state of silent resentment, but has ever since shown himself ready to stab the Reporter in the dark when occasion offered.

Last Tuesday we published a list of no less than eight auction sales for which we had done the printing during the previous week. This evidence of popularity and prosperity was too much for the pious mind of the Times man and he took up his little hole to attack the alleged "inconsistency" of our news paragraphs. The New Bank Building. The new quarters of the banking house of A. Paré & Son are comfortable, commodious, and richly and tastefully finished. The front is of plate glass with lattice transoms. The walls and ceiling of the public office are composed of narrow strips of spruce and tamarac (arranged alternately) with lacquered panels and butternut trimmings. A broad counter of polished birch, closely resembling mahogany, is surmounted by an iron fretwork with paying teller's wicket and spacious apertures for transmission of general business. Apart from banking, the latter will include the business of the G. N. W. telegraph and the new telephone exchange. On Sunday last the heaviest snowfall of the season occurred. Towards evening the wind sprang up and blew a perfect hurricane all night and part of Monday forenoon. A complete blockade of the roads resulted. The express train on the B. & W. got as far as Newboro, but was sent back to Westport to await the clearing of the line. The plucky driver of the Oak Leaf stage reported at the Athens P. O. on an hour late. Tom Connors was at Brockville and it was confidently expected that he would arrive at Athens some time on Monday; and, sure enough, the "old reliable" brought the mail here at 4 p. m., having been just eight hours in coming from Brockville. He had a hard fight. For one hour and a quarter he struggled with the drifts which sight of Elbe Mills P. O. Maltraverses shall find proof if called upon, which shall be considered by the board and their decision shall be final.

Before proceeding with the revision of the prize list, a long discussion took place as to the advisability of encouraging the introduction of a rule requiring all the classes of blood stock to be pedigree animals, and finally the committee decided that all exhibitors in Yorkshire, Gallopas, Holsteins, Jerseys and Durhams be obliged to produce registered pedigree for the inspection of judges, was adopted.

Owing to the very large number of animals and articles enumerated in the prize list, and the fact that the prizes were in most every case fully 50 per cent higher than in any other fair in eastern Ontario, it was decided to make a slight reduction in the amount of the prizes offered in the horse and cattle classes. The prizes remain the same as last year, and 4 prizes will be given instead of three as formerly.

Sheep will be judged at 10 a.m. sharp on the 2nd day. This change is made to accommodate exhibitors who have both cattle and sheep. The prize on sheep remain same as last year, and the grade class was struck out.

Swine and poultry remain same as last year, with the exception that the prize on poultry will be \$1 for first and 75c for 2nd.

Some slight reductions were made on the prizes in the grain class.

Roots, fruit and vegetables remain same as last year.

In the carriage and leather classes a few slight reductions were made in the amount of prizes offered, and sections 7, 8, 9, 10, 12 and 13 were struck off in the implement class.

The prize list will be out early and will be mailed to members as soon as printed. The days on which the fair of 1893 will be held was fixed for the 12th, 13th, and 14th Sept.
