About Assessments.

Mayor Thomson's admirable letter on county assessment has done much good in directing general attention to the inconsistencies, inequalities and inequities which result—

In a recent suave and ingenious communication to the Kentville contemporary the Warden of the County, whom we take to be the official mouthpiece—or shall we say apologist—of the Council, went over the ground at some length from the old to nothing point of view.

It goes without saying that nothing but inequalities and inequities could be expected when the county assessment is made up by Trustees groups of assessors, appointed it is to be feared in many, if not most, instances for any qualification rather than competence.

Leaving out of view all questions as to the competence, honesty, favoritism or partiality of the 28 assessors, the practical effect of the system is to create 28 separate inequalities of assessment. To expect anything else is grotesquely absurd.

The divergencies and eccentricities of the assessment are still more marked, gross and palpable when the comparison is made as between the towns and the county. A proper consideration of this important point would, however, take up more space than we can devote to it now.

Municipal Councillors in Session.

The Municipal Council met for its April session in the Court House, Kentville, on Tuesday afternoon at 2 o'clock, the warden and all the councillors being present.

The minutes of last day's proceedings were read and approved and surveyors and other county officers were appointed for the various districts.

C. Y. Johnson was appointed black knot inspector for Ward 3 and E. Naylor for Ward 10. In other wards where inspectors had not already been appointed, the rate collectors were authorized to act in this capacity.

The most interesting part of the afternoon's proceedings was the hearing of offers from the towns of Wolfville, Kentville and Barwick for aid in the erection of a Court House and jail.

Mayor Thomson and Coun. Bowles, who were present as delegates from Wolfville, were asked to state the offer, which Wolfville was prepared to make.

The warden replied in the negative to the first of these questions, but stated that the council was unwilling to answer the second until after the different offers were heard.

Dr. Bowles asked what the intention of the members of the council was at the time the request for offers was made. Mayor Thomson refused to make an offer until he should be informed how the council was prepared to act in the event of Wolfville's offer being the highest, and the warden asked for the offers of the other towns.

No offer from Kentville was heard. Coun. Anthony stated that Berwick would offer a site and a \$5000 bonus, and that at a public meeting of that town it was resolved that the county council be asked to memorialize the Legislature to divide the county into two parts for the purpose of holding court.

Moved by Coun. Morse and seconded by Coun. Anthony that a committee be appointed to consider this offer and report on the following day. Moved in amendment by Coun. Reid, seconded by Coun. Patterson that the committee be authorized to receive offers from Wolfville and Kentville.

Considerable discussion was engaged in on the outstanding motion to dispose of the different buildings and poor farms and to erect one building for the poor of the entire county.

Finally on motion of Coun. Balcom, seconded by Coun. Reid, it was decided to leave the matter over to the next April session and in the meantime an experiment to have six harnessed teams haul the material to the site of the new building at a cost not to exceed \$75 each, per annum.

It was resolved that the road money be divided and laid out by commissioners as follows:

Ward 1, \$435. Ward 8, 207. " 2, 119. " 9, 296. " 3, 254. " 10, 150. " 4, 296. " 11, 260. " 5, 172. " 12, 340. " 6, 301. " 13, 250. " 7, 358. " 14, 283.

Interest on Bridge money, \$3092.58; cost of road machine bought in 1895, \$333.34; interest on same, \$60.50. Town of Kentville, 25.00; Bridge over Cornwallis river, 16.72.

At the Wednesday morning session, the committee appointed to hear offers from towns reporting that Wolfville had made an offer not to exceed \$25,000, with proper view that the offer be accepted at this session of the Council.

Moved by Coun. Reid, seconded by Coun. Gaul that the offer of Wolfville be accepted.

Coun. Lyons moved in amendment that the offer be not now considered, but that after finishing the regular business the April session stand adjourned to the 21st of May, when the matter should be fully considered. Amendment carried.

The question of the sale of Exhibition building was then taken up. On request Mayor Rockwell, of Kentville, stated that Kentville was willing to undertake to pay one half of the expenses of keeping the building in repair, providing a lease of it should be granted to the town council.

Moved by Coun. Balcom, seconded by Coun. Reid that instead of selling the Exhibition building the sum of \$200 be expended in repairs and it be used for public purposes, under direction of the public grounds committee.

Moved in amendment by Coun. Anthony, seconded by Coun. Morse, that the matter be deferred until the meeting in May, so that the Council might visit grounds in a body and decide what steps should be taken. Amendment carried.



The Island of Cuba.

In 1894 the total population of Cuba was 1,631,096. Of this it is said about 65 per cent. was made up of whites and the balance negroes and mulattoes and a few Chinese. Of the whites probably less than 20,000 exclusive of soldiers, are Spaniards. The rest are Cuban Creoles, to the number of nearly a million. There are over half a million negro and mulatto laborers, and about 50,000 Chinese. The Spaniards hold all the offices and include the wealthy merchants and the professional class. There are even more Chinese than Spaniards on the I-land. Whittaker's Alma gives the total population of the chief cities as follows: Havana 290,000; Santiago de Cuba, 70,000; Pinar del Rio, 45,000; Higuay, 35,000; Sancti Spiritu, 30,000; Cadenusa, 24,000. Since the present trouble began three Spanish military leaders, Marshal Campos (1895), General Weyler (1896), and Marshal Blanco (1897), with all together about 290,000 troops, have been sent out from Spain in the fruitless effort to quell the rebellion. The debt of Cuba is \$70,220,000 on which the interest of 1896 was \$3,359,900. The revenue of the island seldom exceeds twenty million dollars.

Dr. Paton, missionary to the New Hebrides, in his autobiography in reference to the tobacco habit writes: "Most of our natives, on their conversion, have voluntarily renounced the tobacco habit; but what more could I say to You will with thousands of white Christians at my back burning incense to that same idol every day of their lives? Marvellous to me in this connection has often been the working of a tender conscience asking itself how to serve and please Jesus, or how to do more for Jesus. Some years ago, for instance, I met a state school teacher in Victoria, who had been lately brought under the power of the Gospel. In his fresh love he wanted to do something to show his gratitude to Jesus. He had a young family and the way was barred to the mission field. His dear wife and he calculated over all their expenditure, to find out how much they could save to support the work of Jesus at home and abroad. Little or nothing could be spared from what appeared necessary claims. He fell upon his knees, and in tears implored God to show him how he could do something more to save the perishing. A voice came to him like a flash: "If you do so care for Me and My work, you can easily sacrifice your pipe." He instantly took up his pipe and laid it before the Lord, saying: "There it is, O my Lord, and whatsoever it may have cost me, shall now from year to year, be thine!" He was not what is called a heavy smoker—anything under one shilling per week being considered "moderate," as I am informed. But he found that he had been spending thirty shillings per annum on tobacco, and every year he had laid that money upon the altar to Jesus, and prayed Him to use it in sending His Gospel to heathen lands. I wonder which soul is the richer at the end of a year: he who spends his money, saved from a selfish indulgence, at the feet of Jesus, or he who blows it away in filthy smoke?"

NARCOTICS.

What the Tobacco Money Came to. BY MRS. J. E. MCCOY. There was once a lad of twelve who learned how to cheat tobacco. He had a terrible time of it at first. Now he began to see what a sum he had wasted on his sinful indulgence. So every week he laid aside the same amount for the savings bank, and as he had enough for himself and family with it out, he allowed the principal and interest to remain untouched. Some years rolled on, and his little children were growing up in the pent-up walls of their city home; but they were not contented there. Every year they paid a visit to grandfather's cherry farm-house, tumbling about in the green grass and picking rich fruits from the orchard. Oh! how they longed for such a home; and when father came home from his voyage they would climb about his knees and beg him to get them such a home in the country. These frequent appeals set father a-thinking and looking about him. By and by the very place to suit was offered for sale. A snug little homestead, surrounded by shade and fruit trees, two acres of fine land attached to it, a beautiful view of Long Island Sound, the school and church within walking distance, and all to be had for six thousand five hundred dollars. The cigar money in the savings bank was counted over and found sufficient. The place was theirs, and the happy mother and little ones took possession with the quickest possible delay.
