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



 OTTAWA, Feb. 23.—The establishment of a nation-wide grower-owned selling agency which, while obtaining the best price for the grower-owned wasteful overlapping, is recommended by Commissioner Lewis Duncan, of Toronto, as a remedy for existing evils in connection with the marketing of fruit and vegetables. "Provided four tests are met, no merchandising, no favoritism, the strictest accounting, and the employment of men of probity," says Commissioner Duncan, "that way lies business".
 Mr. Duncan was appointed by the Minister of Labor to investigate an alleged combine into the distribution of fruit and vegetables in British Colum-bia, Alberta, Saskatchewan and Mani-toba, and finds that the Nash Combina-tion of jobbing and brokerage houses is a combine which is operating "and has operated detrimentally to the interests of the Canadian public, including in that term producer, consumer, and trade opposition."

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

Interest aroused abroad in the project undertaken by the Dean and Chap-ter of St. Paul's, London. England, to safeguard the cathedral for generations to come has led to their making an appeal not only to the British Empire but to Anglo-Saxons throughout the world to assist in preserving the great national memorial, threatened by crumbling inside the massive piers which support the famous dome. 
