THE ATLANTIC TELEGRAPHIC EXPEDITION.

The Atlantic Telegraphic squadron, which left Portsmouth on Saturday afternoon, the 28th ult., on an experimental trip for the purpose of testing machinery and rehearsing various operations connected with the laying of the cable, returued on thursday evening the 3rd instant.

The piece of cable with which the experi- Majesty: ments were made was between 30 aud 40 miles in length, and was a portion of the coil lost in the attempt of last year, and which was so injured in its recovery from a depth of 1,000 fathoms as to be rendered unfit for electrical purposes. Dense togs were experienced during the whole

of the experiments. The vessels having reached deep water, being out of soundings, the experiments were commenced at a depth of 2, 800 fathoms, and we are informed that every thing proceeded satisfactorily until about 8 miles of the cable had been run out, when the eye of the buoy to which the wire was attached gave way, and the latter suddenly snaped, and operations were in conse-, quence prematurely terminated. We are glad however, to find that notwithstanding this misof ultimate success; and the squadron having G. H. Emerson, resigned. coaled, and the Agamemnon received her last No. 69. coil of 95 miles, the vessels took their final de-

parture on Tuesday last. The Submerging of the cable will be commenced by both ships from about the centre of the atlantic, and not from the Irish coast as was the case last year. The whole operation will be No. 70. thus finished in half the time, and a proporticrately less risk from unfavourable weather will be incurred.
