In a by election for the Ontario Legislature, held in Brockville or Monday last, Mr. W. A. Donovan Conservative, was elected by a majority of about one hundred and sixty. This adds another to Premier Whitney's large majority in the Legislature, as the seat was previously held by a Liberal,-no less a personage than Mr. Graham who had been Leader of the Opposition in the House and retired therefrom to become Minister of Railways in the Federal Cabinet Well done Brockville.

During the last session of th Federal Parliament a vote \$100,000 was passed for additions to Rideau Hall, the residence of the Governor General. Architects have made estimates and tenders have been called for. But it appears that the lowest offer for the work is \$300.000, just three times the amount of the Parliamentary vote of last session, and it is not impossible that even this large amount will not come anywhere near the prospective cost of new buildings, with furniture and landcape surroundings to match.
