





Local And Other Items

George Ballentyne and John McDonald, miners, were accidentally killed at Drummond Mine, near Westville N. S. Monday evening.

The first meeting of the cheese board, for this season, was held in the city on Friday last. Considerable cheese was boarded from several factories.

The Allan liner Grampian, which arrived at Montreal Monday morning, reported that when off the Irish coast she passed three British trawlers making their way hastily to port, towing a German submarine which was floating keel upward.

The village of Stanley, near St. John N. B. was visited by an earthquake on Sunday forenoon. The disturbance lasted about eight seconds. Churches rocked and terrified worshippers.

It is officially announced that the Bank of England is prepared to receive applications for the new war loan from abroad.

Albert King, of the Belgians was among those who at the 1914-15 convocation of McGill University were tendered honorary degrees, the principal, Sir William Peterson, announced at a meeting of the governors on the 15th.

On Wednesday afternoon last the wrecked Plant liner A. W. Perry broke in two, slipped off the rocks at Chebucto Head into deep water and on Thursday there was nothing of her visible above the surface of the water.

During the past month, seventeen Americans who have arrived in Liverpool on six steamers have been detained either for the lack of passports or for failing to have attached thereto the photographs of all the members of their families more than fourteen years of age.

Seven men were probably fatally burned in an explosion of gasoline on the 25th at the works of the Aetna Explosives Company at Pittsburg, Pa.

Damage estimated at half a million dollars was done at Red Cliff, Alberta early Thursday evening by a cyclone, which wrecked a large part of the town.

A despatch received at Petrograd from Kazan, European Russia, 400 miles east of Moscow, says that upwards of 100 lives were lost in the collapse of a River pier at one of the local pleasure gardens.

The floods created by the rising of the Saskatchewan River at Edmonton have caused a million dollars property damage. Some city homes were reduced to matchwood, and 2,400 people rendered homeless.

Bombs dropped by British aviators near Roulers, Belgium, caused the explosion of a large ammunition depot and also resulted in killing fifty German soldiers who were loading an ammunition train, says a despatch from Rotterdam.

Five severe earthquake shocks occurred at Calexico California last Thursday night. People were terrified by their experiences since Tuesday night when the city was badly shaken up.

The news of the loss of five lives in last Wednesday's storm was brought to Chatham N. B. last Friday night by Coroner M. G. Benson.

Three quarters of a millior damage was done at Calgary on Saturday last by storms and floods. The Bow and Elbow rivers rose eight feet in a few hours. Two men were carried to death.

D. Nicholson M. P., now at Ottawa interviewed the minister of Malitia on Monday regarding the formation in this Province of an exclusively Island Artillery unit for service at the front. The Minister granted the request, as was learned from a wire received by A. A. McLean, M. P., and from the following telegram to the Premier: Ottawa, June 28th.

The Trinity Term of the Supreme Court opened in this city yesterday forenoon, all the judges on the Bench. The only criminal cases were those against John Sherry for robbery and jail breaking and against Harrington for shooting a man named Thompson. The Chief Justice in his address to the Grand Jury urged them to make a strict investigation of the jail and the men in charge.

Windsor, Ont., June 25—William Laffer, aged forty-five, night watchman at the plant of the Tate Electric Auto Co., Ford City, is under arrest as a suspect in connection with the discovery of sixty sticks of dynamite at the rear of the factory of the Gramm Motor Truck Company, Walkerville, which is making automobiles for the British army. Laffer claims Detroit as his home, but refuses to give his street address. He claims to be of Dutch parentage, but speaks with a strong German accent.

Amherst, N. S. June 24—Considerable excitement was caused on the streets of Amherst today by the report that a concentrated effort had been made by a squad of German prisoners confined in the detention camp here to escape and as a consequence one of them had been shot. Recognizing the needs of accuracy in reporting any matters of this nature the correspondent got in touch with those competent to give a true version of the affair. This in substance is as follows: While the prisoners of war in the detention camp here were being conducted to the compound for physical exercise one of them, Fritz Clauz by name, assaulted one of the interment camp police, knocking him insensible. The guard was called to quell the mutiny, and in the melee which followed the originator of the trouble was shot dead, and four of the other prisoners more or less seriously wounded.
