PUTTING ON GLOVES.

ever Do It When Your Hands Are Waln

A great deal depends on the first put-A great deal depends on the first putting on of gloves, says the Dry Goods Chronicle. Have the hands perfectly clean, dry and cool, and never put on new gloves while the hands are warm or damp. Where a person is troubled with moist hands it is well to powder them before trying on the gloves; but, in most cases, if the hands are dry and cool, this is not needed. First work on the fingers, keeping the thumb outside of the glove and the wrist of the glove turned back. When the fingers are in smoothly put in the thumb and work the smoothly put in the thumb and work the glove on very carefully, then, placing the elbow on the knee, work on the hand. When this is done, smooth down the wrist and button the second button first, then the third, and so on to the end. There were about 270 head of butchers' cattle, 25 mutton critters and two calves offered at the East End Abattoir Monday. A large number of butchers were present and with an active demand and rather small supplies, the high prices of Thursday were well maintained, and common stock brought even higher prices than on that day. The best beeves sold at about 44c per lb. and pretty good stock at 4c to 4½ do.; common dry cows sold at about 3½c, and the lean beasts sold down to less than 3c per lb. The market for butchers' cattle is yery firm and unless there are more liberal supplies shortly prices will go up still higher. The few mutton critters offered Monday were of rather indifferent quality and sold at about 4½c per lb. for mixed lots. There are not many fat hogs being brought to market and prices continue atabout 4½c per lb.
