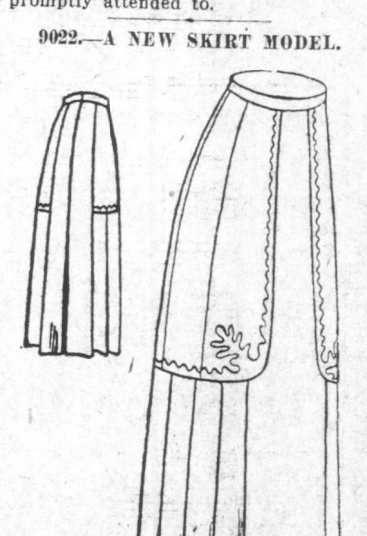

The French Navy and the German.

The great display of enthusiasm at Toulon which accompanied the recent French naval manoeuvres, brought out an extraordinary display of acerbity in the German press. It has long been the fashion with the German press to belittle the French navy, and this time the papers seem to have regarded it as an affront to Germany that the French themselves should take any pride in their warships. The speeches of President Fallieres and M. Delcasse, the Minister of Marine, seem to have caused special offence.

The point that Delcasse dwelt on was the high standard of preparedness which had been reached by the French naval force itself, but he said that it was animated by the single ambition to be as genuinely ready as was the French army to respond at any moment to the country's call. This declaration was treated in Berlin and other German centres as a threat 'veisslich brutal and empty.' Only the 'Voassische Zeitung' kept its head. It said that M. Delcasse could hardly have said less, and it credited him with holding in the French Cabinet a prudent and moderate position throughout the Moroccan crisis.

The German press to the contrary notwithstanding, the French naval display at Toulon was very impressive. Absolutely no lame ducks were paraded, and no new vessels which were not complete and in commission were placed in line. The warships mustered were ninety in number, including five 18,000 ton battleships of the Danton class. All were tuned up to battle pitch with their full complement of men, stores, armament and ammunition, just as if they were to tackle a hostile fleet the next day. The flags of four Vice-Admirals and eight Rear-Admirals were flying. The fleet represented a displacement of nearly 420,000 tons and carried 37,000 men and 1,247 guns.

Almost simultaneously the German annual review took place at Kiel. The fleet which Emperor William reviewed consisted of twenty-six battleships, many of them, however, by no means of the Dreadnought class; four large cruisers, eight small ones, seventy-five torpedo boats, eight submarines and two divisions of 'mine searchers,' about 130 vessels of all sorts and sizes. The column as it passed the imperial yacht 'Hohenzollern' was about eight and a half miles long, but many of the vessels in it, at any rate according to English appraisal, were far from being of real efficiency.—New York Sun.

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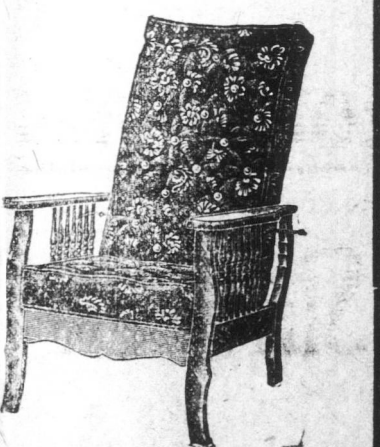

Household Notes.

Cold Reception

The frigid reception accorded Sir Edward Morris at the opening of his speech at Harbor Grace apparently convinced him that he had better refrain from politics. We are told that he did not receive a single cheer or clap on rising, and that he did not bronch politics as he did in his speeches at Burin and St. George's. It is clear that the people were determined to have no political speech, and that Sir Edward noted the temper of the people, and shaped his course accordingly. But apparently this absence from a partisan speech did not make the people forget that he had made partisan speeches at the towns we have just referred to, and they permitted him, according to our informant, to sit down without a clap or a cheer. The Chairman, however, called for cheers for Sir Edward after Messrs. Goodson and Parsons, members of his party, had proposed and seconded the vote of thanks, and to this those in the platform gave a feeble response, those in the body of the hall taking no part in it.

It would appear from the tenor of this information that it will take Sir Edward quite a time to live down the mistake he made in introducing politics at the Burin and St. George's exhibitions, and this taken with the intense unpopularity of his administration cannot be done this side of the General Election. Sir Edward is finding it difficult to retrieve the error of his ways. He sowed the wind and he is now reaping the whirlwind. He is a sadder man to-day than he was before he went to Harbor Grace. It would have been wiser of him to have stayed away. He did not see the wisdom of this course, and had to endure the chill of an icy reception.

Novel With a Purpose.

A Test For Libel—Names of Well-known Writers to Figure in a Story—Witty Reply by Authors When Permission Asked.

A novel in which the names of well-known writers are bestowed upon its characters as a protest against the present law of libel is about to be published by Mr. Stephen Swift. The story, "Motley and Tined," by John K. Prothero, appeared some months ago as a serial in "Lloyd's Weekly News." To be strictly accurate, only the opening chapters were published, for the commencement of

action by an actor whose name was similar to that of one of the original characters brought it to an abrupt close.

\$1,000 Damages.
At the trial of the action of the author, a lady went into the box and declared that the character complained of was a purely fictitious one and was not intended in any way to represent the plaintiff. Nevertheless, the jury considered that the plaintiff was entitled to \$1,000 damages.

In publishing the novel in book form, the author has given her own name—Prothero—to the character which was the subject of the libel action. "Extraordinary as the law of

libel appears to be," she says, "I have not yet learned that one can libel oneself."

G. B. S. and G. R. S.
Her appeal to other authors to give their consent for the use of their names has been strikingly successful. Some of the characters, indeed, now bear very interesting names. George Bernard Shaw represents a stage-door keeper, George R. Sims is a cab driver, Robert Barr is a stage manager, with Pett Ridge as call boy, and Cecil Chesterton a fiery-tempered lover. Barry Pain divides his name between an aged man of weak intellect and his dead son.

In giving permission for the use of his name Mr. Geo. R. Sims wrote this amusing letter to the author:—

By all means use my name in the way you suggest, but be careful about the cabman. I have not the slightest doubt that there are several of them who bear the aristocratic name of Sims. I know that a Sims was very nearly hanged a few years ago, and one was a famous thief. But if a cabman named Sims brings an action against you, you can call me as a witness to prove that the name has long been associated with crime and other amusements of the period.
Mr. Cecil Chesterton wrote: "You can rely on me to bring on libel ac-

tions. You may depict me as a burglar, or a blackmailer, or a man who steals pennies from blind beggars, or even as a politician."

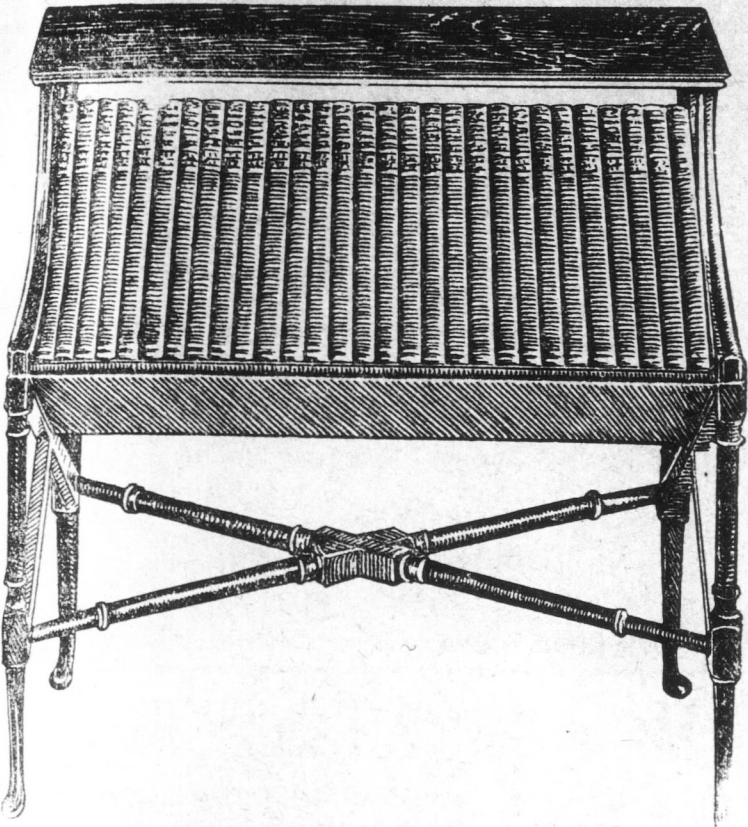
