Our Breathers Club.

We have a new club in our neighborhood.

It is an extremely informal affair—no dues, no initiation, no meeting.

All there is to it is a name and a promise. The name is "The Breathers" and the promise is that at least three times a day, and preferably much oftener, we will really breathe.

Of course that sounds perfectly absurd, but give me a few minutes and I'll try to make it less so.

How often do you breathe to the full depth of your lungs' capacity?

Probably not once a week if you are an average person.

Well that failure is what we promise each other to avoid.

When that lazy, listless feeling comes over you and your work—be it office work or house work or teaching or what all drags, and your head feels stupid, did you ever try going into an adjoining room, opening the window, and deep breathing?

That's what we do.

And though we don't advertise this remedy as a cure-all, we do feel it comes pretty near being a help-all.

Won't you join our club?

You can do it without any fuss or feathers—simply by making our promise to yourself.

Let me give you one or two suggestions in case you do.

Breathe, of course, way down to the bottom of your lungs. While you are doing it draw the head in and back, lift your chest and stretch upwards.

You can let the shoulders hang limp. After you have done this a few times try holding the breath and letting it out as slowly as possible, trying not

to let the chest collapse until it is all out.

If you care for more vigorous exercises you can swing your arms, striking your chest very lightly with the tips of your fingers while you hold the breath.

Another good accompaniment to breathing is to hold the arms with the elbows crooked and the fists clenched close against the side, and as you exhale, force the arms back as if you were pulling against something.

One thing that these exercise always do for me, and fancy for anyone else, is that when I come back into the room where I have been working after doing them, I instantly realize how stuffy it is, and air it.

If you haven't the backbone to do these formal exercises, it will help some to remember to breathe deeply often when you are out in the open air.

And even if you do do the formal exercises it will help to do this too. You can take the first exercise all but the stretching as you walk along the street, without anyone being the wiser.

An article on sub-oxygenation as the reason d'être of half our mortal sins aroused our interest in our lungs. It pointed out that better oxygenation of the system by deep breathing would improve the complexion, deepen the chest, increase the vitality, improve the appetite, digestion and circulation, and, by the pressure of the diaphragm muscle—estimated at two hundred pounds—would correct sluggishness of the bowels.

It sounds like a pretty big promise, doesn't it?

But we thought it was worth trying out.

Two Liberals for Mr. Main.

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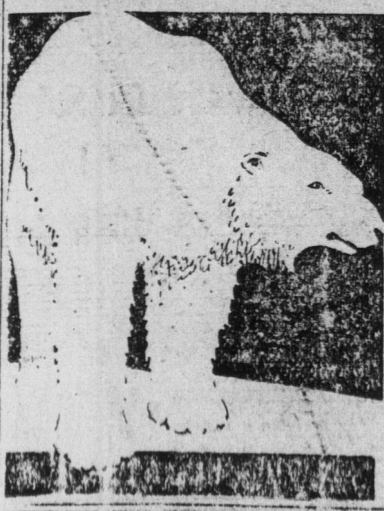

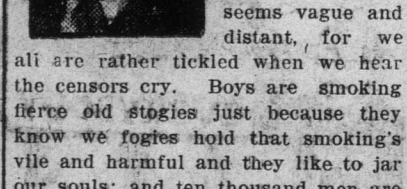

Cable News.

Special to The Evening Telegram. LONDON, To-day.

American Ambassador Page and the Japanese Ambassador were guests of honor at the Navy League Banquet last night. The Company included Earl Selborne, Earl Brassey, Baron Amphil and several foreign naval attaches. Earl Selborne, in toasting the glorious and immortal memory of Nelson, whose victory at the Battle of Trafalgar the Banquet celebrated, urged the necessity of Great Britain maintaining the two keels to one standard, and expressed disbelief in the possibility of any naval holiday. Ambassador Page, after expressing his gratitude for the privilege of being a guest of honor at the anniversary of the greatest battle of England's great naval hero, quoted Nelson's message after that of the Nile to the effect that he had pleasure in commanding a band of brothers. In this spirit, said the Ambassador, in referring to the acceptance by Britain of the invitation issued by the States Government, to send representative vessels of the British navy to celebrate in the competition of the Panama Canal, the States decided that the international fleets would gather at Hampton Roads, for the most mighty and impressive naval demonstration in the history of the world, and thence proceed through the Panama Canal to San Francisco. The Ambassador said he had permission to announce that His Majesty's Government had accepted the invitation for England's participation, and he added it will be a happy feature of the celebration of the centenary of peace and the American Admiral leading this fleet can say with Nelson, that he had happiness in command of a band of brothers.

MEXICO CITY, To-day.

Dissolution of Congress by President Huerta is purely an international affair which could not possibly have any bearing upon the presentation of my credentials, said Sir Lionel Carson, British Minister, when asked concerning the comments in the press growing out of the coincidence of the two events, instructions of my Government were definite, he continued, had it been desired that I should without the presentation of my credentials I would have been so advised personally; it is not presumed that I knew whether dissolution of Congress was an act authorized by laws of my Government. I am not sure but that it is a matter wholly within discretion of my Government and should not be subject to comment. Minister declined to talk about recommendations, which might be made concerning intervention, he said he was inclined to believe States did not fully appreciate the seriousness of the conditions in Mexico which in his opinion were due to lack of accord between Government and people, there was such diversity of aspirations among revolutionists, no one element could be expected to dominate.

By the Way.

Morris's Manifesto contains a lot of figures and statistics. We all know that statistics can lie if they want to. The greatest figure in the Manifesto is E. P. Morris abusing Sir Robert Bond. The greatest cod is Morris trying to persuade himself that he rose the price of fish.

D. Morison—I don't want this to come out, but look here, Strong, if you can get a purchaser for Orange Bay Timber, he can steal logs from Crown Lands.

D. Morison—When you are in a hole crawl into it, and out again at the other end quietly, or—Forget the law.

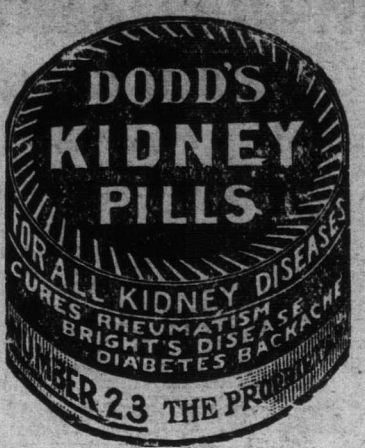

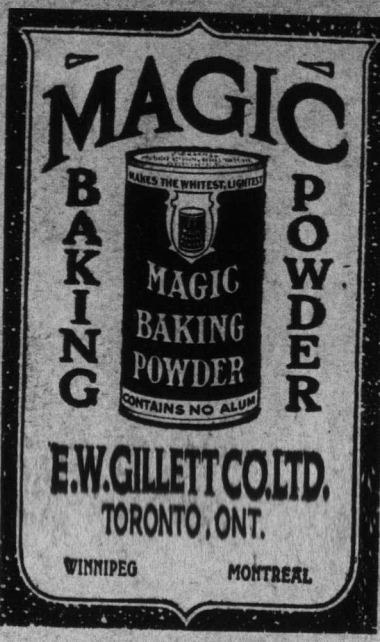
A Warning From Ferryland District.

Editor The Evening Telegram.

Dear Sir,—I wish through your columns to warn the District of Ferryland against Condon. He is going to stand for the Southern Shore in spite of the fact that he would not be accepted by the Bond Party, as he made such a poor showing the last time, though he had a strong backing. He has been several years seeking election and he must be very dense if he cannot understand the people don't want him. Mr. Condon may be a good business man, a fluent talker, and a man of average intelligence, but somehow or other he seems not to have much weight with the solid and intelligent men of the shore. The day of Independents is past. That sort of roosting on the fence is played out. An Independent is a fellow who represents no party or policy. If he is a Bond man he approves of the Government's condemnation as a result of the Bond's Manifesto. If he approves of Morris's Administration then he stands as the champion of misrule, neglect, extravagance, and idleness. Where is he? What is his platform? What programme has he outlined that can be shown to be an improvement on the splendid prospectus Bond has issued? Who are going to support him? Is he going to start a suffragist movement, or to nominate a pettifogger Government? If Condon was a sincere and honest supporter of Bond, finding he had no chance of being elected, he would not have presumed to force himself on the Bond ticket, but in the country's interest, and in emphatic disapproval of the change of the outgoing Government, he would have used his influence in support of the Bond candidates and not have done as he did. If he was not an honest supporter of Bond, then he should have remained with the other side and come out under his true colors. What is Mr. Condon after? Either he estimates the two parties are going to run ties, and if he got elected, he will be able to throw in his lot with those who give him the best terms, or being fooled in his ambitious desire to grace a seat in Parliament and sport for the glory of his country, he is in a spirit of revenge, has declared himself a traitor by his action, a man without fixed principles, and unworthy the confidence and respect of his fellowmen. We will not charge him with this dishonour. He has too much regard for the reputation of the name to leave it open to such an imputation. He is only misled. What is the former? Has Mr. Condon his price? Has he accepted a promise of remuneration if he go and split up the Liberal vote, drive out men from the field, send back again to power the worthies who have insulted the whole of you, treated you with contumely, walked over you. It

would seem hard to extricate Mr. Condon from one or other of these positions, but believe me, Mr. Condon, to be and if he pursue the resolve he seems to have taken, the public will impute to him such qualities of character as would make Morris's prosecution of Mr. Condon has no petty grievance, no sinister motives, no questionable aims, and will prove to be not seeking nomination, will openly maintain the cause he first espoused, and put aside low ambition or chances of emolument, for Bond and his country. I have no desire to show up Mr. Condon's action in an unfavourable light. Men must be judged by what they do. "By their deeds you shall know them," but what I want to do is to put the Southern Shore on its guard against the danger of being deceived by this man at a critical time, when every man that controls a vote seems bound to use it according to his conscience. Mr. Condon may have been led to believe he could rely on his popularity. There are lots in every district who like to make game of a man knock some fun out of him and drop him to become a laughing stock. I have no doubt that a lot of the support in which Mr. Condon presumes is of that type. I would say in all sincerity to Mr. Condon that by taking an independent stand he will leave himself open to suspicions not complimentary to his character in the first case, and in the second, he will certainly be the subject of such ridicule as could make no man comfortable. Furthermore, I am surprised that an intelligent man like I did believe Mr. Condon to be should so blunder in his estimate of the political situation. Does he not see that the country is thoroughly disgusted with Morris's manipulation of public trusts? Only those who share of the spoils, expect to share them, or who are in sympathy with the spoilers, will vote for a return of the Morris Government. Does he not see everywhere and about him how the mind of the electorate has gone? And if he is so dim-sighted as not to see the evidence before him that Bond is going to win with a big majority, because the fishermen of the country have taken a firm united stand, does he not see he is playing a fool's game, that he can get nowhere, and that he will have had all his gassing for nothing. Voters of the Southern Shore, do not mind Condon, do not be identified with him; he represents no party, and you can have any confidence, except he speaks for Bond. If any of you have any personal predilection for him do not be so silly to waste your usefulness on air. Vote the straight Liberal ticket, return triumphantly two Bond candidates—Williams and Hartery.

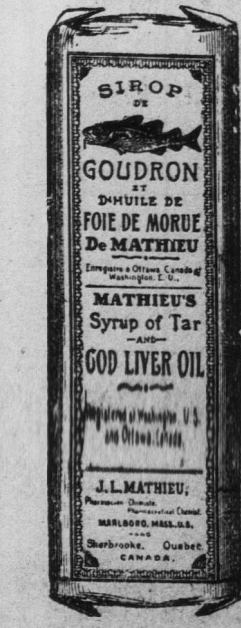

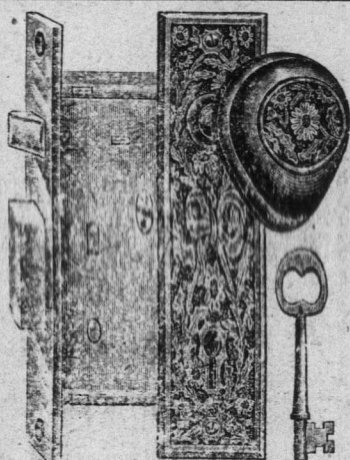
