Washingtion Sends Note to Berlin Foreign Office

The following is the text of the not cabled to-day by Secretary Lansing to Ambassador Gerrad at Berlin, with instructions to deliver it to the German Minister of Foreign Affairs:

"The note of the Imperial German Government, under date of May 4 1916, has received careful considere tion by the Government of the United States. It is especially noted, as in dicating the purpose of the Imperia Government as to the future, that it is prepared to do its utmost to confin the operation of the war, for the res of its duration, to the fighting forces of the belligerents, and that it is determined to impose upon all its com manders at sea the limitations of the recognized rules of international law upon which the Government of the United States has insisted.

"Throughout the months which have elapsed since the Imperial Govern ment announced on February 4, 1915 its submarine policy, now happily abandoned, the Government of the United States has been constantly guided and restrained by motives of friendship in its patient efforts to bring to an amicable settlement the critical questions arising from that policy. Accepting the Imperial Government's declaration of its abandonment of the policy which has so seriously menaced the good relations behenceforth of the now altered policy two brothers now on active service of the Imperial Government, such as tition conducted at the Southside will remove the principal danger to Range on Thursday and Friday last an interruption of the good relations Privates Rice, Smith and Watts each existing between the United States

In order, however, to avoid any possible misunderstanding the Government of the United States notifies the Imperial Government that it cannot, for a moment, entertain, much less discuss, a suggestion that respect by German haval authorities for the rights of citizens of the United States upon the high seas should, in R. and Mrs. Flannery. any way, or in the slightest degree, be made contingent upon the conduct of ule time. any other Government affecting the rights of neutrals and non-combatants. 
