





(From MR. A. M. SAMUEL, M.P., Parliamentary Secretary to the Department of Overseas Trade.)

There is a maximum that sentiment should not influence business. It is a saying with which I disagree. Sentiment does-and, I hope, will always -enter into business. It is precisely because of this fact that words and actions, not connected with business at all, which drew closer the sentimental ties existing between nations have, in the past, been followed by extended and more cordial commercial relations. It is because of this fact that anything which tends to bring into closer sympathy the nations of the British Commonwealth has such an important bearing on its future prosperity.

It lies within the power of com paratively few to take action which directly affects trade between the scattered communities which together make up the Empire, but it is within the scope of many to foster still warmer sentiments, and every step taken with this end in view brings nearer the day when the Commonwealth will indeed be a Commonwealth in the fullest sense of the word.—Empire Mail.



#### The Romance of Lloyds

(Continued.)

Committee and Members

Lloyd's were greatly stirred by an effort which was being made to secure an investigation into the system of classification, Mr. Marshall, when the Committee of Lloyd's had reported adversely to any change, made a powerful speech at a meeting held at Lloyd's, in the course of which he made the following remarks, which, even at this distant time, one cannot but read with more than interest:-All that is now asked for is inquiry; and to make that efficient, and to secure the approbation and support of all, it is proposed that all the great interests concerned shall take part in the investigation, by each appointing an equal number of persons to constitute the Committee. That this house will on this occasion act worthy of its character, I entertain no doubt: celebrated as it is from Pole to Pole for its liberality; ever ready, as it has invariably shown itself, not only to concur, but to take the lead, in objects involving the welfare of the country, and more especially its maritime prosperity and greatness. Looking, sir, at the public spirit which has ever been conspicuous in the proceedings of this house, at the tone and imnulse it has at different times imparted to the country, whenever its best feelings have been properly appealed to, recollecting, too, that the very name of Lloyd's is regarded, not at home only, but also in every part of the world where the British name is known as synonymous with everything that is liberal, just, publicspirited, and honourable, I cannot, I will not, believe, unless the conviction is forced upon me by a decision to-day contrary to my expectations that this house will on this occasion forget, or choose to lose sight of, those great principles of equity and justice towards others by which every community must regulate its conduct, or must retrograde in its char-

The result was that the meeting resolved almost unanimously to nominate eight of the members of Lloyd's to serve on the Committee of Inquiry. It was found, however, when the day of election arrived that most of the 24 gentlemen nominated had withdrawn their names from the ballot. Another general meeting was accordingly called. It was held on March 3rd, 1824. The intense interest created by it the feelings exhibited in its progress, and the extraordinarr efforts made by most of those who so mistakenly exerted their opposition, will never be forgotten by the friends of inquiry who on that day supported the moderate and reasonable proposition submittee of them. Suffice it to say REA-SON TRIUMPHED! No fewer than six hundred and seventy-nine Members of Lloyd's voted on that occasion: almost every counting house and coffee house in the City being visited to procure the attendance of every Subscriber who could be found. The result, however, was that the resolution 'That Lloyd's do concur in nominating eight of their Body to represent them in the Committee of Inquiry was confirmed on the ballot by a majority of twenty-five-there being 352 to 327 against it.

The Committee of Inquiry was finally completed, and set to work to investigate the matter with great thoroughness, and prepared a valuable report on the subject. An improved constitution was proposed, which had for its object to provide for the fair and equal representation therein of all parties immediately interested, asd a superior system of classification was proposed. Coming to deal with the important question of the best mode of raising funds adequate to meet the expenses of the system recommended for adoption, the Committee, while preferring to leave this problem to the wisdom of the general meeting, recorded their decided conviction that all expectation of raising a sum sufficient to cover the estimated expenditure must, except under the sanction and authority of Parliamentary provision, prove visionary and





# THE DELCO Electric Plant

FOR OUT-OF-TOWN LIGHTING.

"DELCO LIGHT" consists of an air-cooled engine which will operate on gasoline or kerosene, directly connected to an electric generator and switchboard, on which are the necessary controlling instruments. These are all enclosed in one unit and may be called the Generating Unit.

The second unit is the Storage Battery, consisting of sixteen glass or rubber jar cells for 32 volt equipment. The engine is self-cranking, when the starting lever is held up electricity flows from the storage battery through the field coils and armature. This electric energy is conducted to the incandescent lamps by means of copper wires to any position desired.

The lights do not, as a rule, require the entire output of the Generator, so the excess is taken up and stored by the Storage Battery. When the engine stops the storage battery is used as the source of supply, after which it is necessary to run the engine again to re-charge the battery. It may only be necessary to run the engine two or three times a week when used to light a residence, but when used in stores, or where considerable current is used the engine has to be run more frequently. It can be used to light your church, residence, barns, wharf, store or mill. The operation is simple, and the cost of running, very low.


