Militia Irregularities in Quebec The Committee on Public Accounts are at present engaged in investigating into certain alleged irregularities in the Quebec Militia service. It seems from the evidence laid before the Committee that, during the an nual drill in camp last summer at Levis; serious frauds had been practised in procuring and returning to the militia authorities false musters. tied in procuring and returning to the militia authorities false musters. Col. Cassault was examined, and testified that a Mr. Fortier, brother to Major Fortier, had been guilty of making this false muster. The Major was held to be the really guilty party, as it seems his brother was acting under his instructions, or with his knowledge, and consequently he was put under arrest. It also turned out in evidence that Col. Panet had stated to the Colomel of the Garrison Artillery that twenty-two of his men were in that brigade. Col. Ross, the Adjutant General, on whom rests the responsibility for not bringing these irregularities sooner to light, in his evidence before the Committee, defended his course, and stated that about a month after, he inspected the camp at Levis he had to leave for British Columbia. He blamed Col. Powell for not bringing the report of the Court of Enquiry, which sat on the case, before his notice. The matter was brought before his notice in March last, when he ordered a search to be made for Col. Cassault's report of the finding of this Court, but it could not be found anywhere. Col. Powell, on the other hand, denied ever having seen the report, and Col. Cassault in explanation said that he had transmitted it direct to the Adjutant General, whose Secretary opened all documents in his absence.

From all the evidence' submitted, there is no room for doubting that very grave irregularities have been allowed to go on unchecked in the militia service of Quebec; that false muster rolls have in many instances been sent m, and money drawn from the Department for meh who never served in the ranks Into whose hands this money has fallen has not yet transpired, but the Government having had this matter forced upon their attention, has at last promised to institute an investigation into the whole matter, and not only with regard to this particular case, but into the working of the whole Militia system.



Taught by the sad experience of the Crimes that a widely scattered population, however numerous, is in a military sense useless, unless means are found to mass troops quickly ard in overwhelming numbers at any given point, the Russians have intersected their country with a vast web of rail-ways, the completion of which is now only a matter of a few months, and by the aid of which they will be able with startling rapidity, to concentrate the whole strength of their Empire in any direction where it may be required. Fortfeations have been rebuilt or repaired; they have been mounted with the best and heaviest guns, and communication with them is rapid and easy. Among other means of offence and defence, it is worthy of mention that the Caspian Sea swarms with Russian war steamers, and a scheme has been set on foot to connect that lake with the Black Sea by a canal. The navy, too, has received much attention. It is beyond all doubt that for the last seventeen years Russia has been making preparations for war. Her present weakness lies in her finances; but it must be remembered that war is sometimes a lucrative speculation."
