Sir John Macdonald said it was impossible, having regard to our political system, to carry on affairs with less than thirteen Ministers. Acting on the suggestion made, he would on an early day move a series of resolutions providing for an increase in the salaries of the Ministry of the Crown.

At 1.30 the House adjourned.

Militia Irregularities in Quebec
The Committee on Public Accounts are at present engaged in investigating into certain alleged irregularities in the Quebec Militia service. It seems from the evidence laid before the Committee that, during the annual drill in camp last summer at Levis, serious frauds had been practised in procuring and returning to the militia authorities false musters. Col. Cassault was examined, and testified that a Mr. Fortier, brother to Major Fortier, had been guilty of making this false muster. The Major was held to be the really guilty party, as it seems his brother was acting under his instructions, or with his knowledge, and consequently he was put under arrest. It also turned out in evidence that Col. Panet had stated to the Colonel of the Garrison Artillery that twenty-two of his men were in that brigade. Col. Ross, the Adjutant General, on whom rests the responsibility for not bringing these irregularities sooner to light, in his evidence before the Committee, defended his course, and stated that about a month after he inspected the camp at Levis he had to leave for British Columbia. He blamed Col. Powell for not bringing the report of the Court of Enquiry, which sat on the case, before his notice. The matter was brought before his notice in March last, when he ordered a search to be made for Col. Cassault's report of the finding of this Court, but it could not be found anywhere. Col. Powell, on the other hand, denied ever having seen the report, and Col. Cassault in explanation said that he had transmitted it direct to the Adjutant General, whose Secretary opened all documents in his absence.

From all the evidence submitted, there is no room for doubting that very grave irregularities have been allowed to go on unchecked in the militia service of Quebec; that false muster rolls have in many instances been sent in, and money drawn from the Department for men who never served in the ranks. Into whose hands this money has fallen has not yet transpired, but the Government having had this matter forced upon their attention, has at last promised to institute an investigation into the whole matter, and not only with regard to this particular case, but into the working of the whole Militia system.

The matter came up again before the Committee on Thursday, when Mr. Mackenzie moved a resolution, reciting all the facts gleaned in the evidence submitted, that these facts show a very serious want of discipline, honesty, and business capacity on the part of certain officers of militia, and tend to the conclusion that the returns of the men mustered in the service, and the accounts of expenditure thereof, are not reliable; that the retention in the service for ten months of officers proved to have been guilty of deliberate fraud is a great scandal to the service, and tends to its demoralization, and that the state of affairs developed is such as to demand an immediate and searching investigation. This was, however, voted down, and an amendment carried to the effect that as the Government have promised to make a full and searching enquiry into all the irregularities complained of, it is inexpedient for the Committee to express any opinion on the subject. Mr. Mackenzie then moved that the proceedings and the evidence taken by the Committee be laid before the House, and there the matter remains for the present.

James Beatty, M. P., of the Toronto Leader, and formerly occupied in the York Roads business, gave us a remarkable example of the benefit of patience and perseverance. After many years of indefatigable waiting we perceive in the supplementary estimates for 1873, the following item: To refund amount received from Sheriff, as proceeds of stone illegally seized on the York Roads, \$6,142.00.

At a meeting of the citizens of Ottawa, on Tuesday, resolutions were unanimously adopted thanking Mr. McKellar and the Ontario Government for their prompt and satisfactory conduct towards that city—a justice it may be added, that they never could obtain from the Sandfield Macdonald Government.

A Brief Outline—Brief but Nasty.
At Sir John Macdonald's command 107 ministerialists voted down Huntington's motion for an inquiry into the Pacific Scandal.

Is there any foul dose that Sir John Macdonald could present to such men that they would not swallow? Is there any contemptible act they would not perform to keep in power the conspirators who call themselves the Government of Canada? As was well suggested by Mr. Anglin, in his own famous letter, Sir John's first act was to plunge them so deep in political mire that they are now as much in his power as if they were his house servants. With such a record as that given above they have proved themselves as devoid of honor as they are of consistency; as destitute of principle as they are of self-respect.—*Hamilton Times.*
