"In former times, when every salesman olled his own trade, independently of the firm that employed him, the sales-men themselves used togo on sprees with their customers when the latter came to the city. As business competition grew keener, business men began te realize that there was a tremendous evi chants realized that it was expensive dis sipation, and so to some extent the cus-Very many men were utterly ruined, and gradually it came about that the best salesmen would no longer devote them-selves to the entertainment of customers


