SEYMOUR READY TO FIRE AT A MOMENT'S NOTICE

And the French Will Open too—A False Prophet Defeats an Egyptian Corps.

LONDON, July 7.—The Times says that it must not be imagined that matters in Egypt will remain as they are indefinitely.

Military preparations continue. Yesterday all the officers of the first battalion of the Scots Guards were ordered to rejoin their regiments.

The English consul declined to attend the meeting or entertain any suggestion to obtain the consent of Seymour to the proposed meeting.

Three thousands Egyptians under Gen. Youssif attacked a false prophet and were defeated. They lost 2000 men, four guns and 8000 rifles.

It is feared that the Arab laborers will refuse to coal the steamers.

Monaghan yesterday attempted to shoot the Khedive, not Arabi Pasha. He said he wished to shoot the Khedive for Arabi.

Seymour ordered the Eastern telegraph office to close to-night.

VIENNA, July 7.—It is believed in ministerial circles that the Porte will indubitably accept the proposal of the conference for Turkish intervention in Egypt.

DEATH OF SKOROFF.

The Famous Russian General Succumbs to Heart-Disease—Sketch of his Career.

Moscow, July 7.—General Skoroff, the famous Russian general, died suddenly at the Hotel Russeaux here to-day of heart-disease.

General Michael Skoroff was born in the district of Riazan, near Moscow, in 1845. He began his military career in Turkestan as commander of a company of Cossacks.

He was transferred to the 8th battalion of the 7th regiment of the line.

GLADSTONE CONSIDERS THE VOICE AGAINST HIMSELF—WILL HE RESIGN?—Reported Hint of Resignation.

LONDON, July 7.—In the house of commons, during the debate on the report of the repression bill, Gladstone said that the government had taken measures unknown to parliament to operate against the secret societies.

TRADES AND LABOR COUNCIL

Election of Officers—Report of Demonstration Committee—Harmless Marches Averted.

The regular semi-monthly meeting of the above organization took place at the usual hour last evening in Dufferin hall, the president, Mr. Beecher, in the chair.

The secretary stated that he had a telegram from Mr. Moor, who is out of town, asking that his name be withdrawn from the list of nominations for the office of president.

In answer to an inquiry the president said according to parliamentary usage the nominations could be re-opened on the night of election.

Some objection was taken to the ruling of the chairman but on a division the ruling of the chair was sustained.

Contrary to precedent the president ordered the elections to be proceeded with in an reversed manner, legs will start at 10 o'clock.

The following gentlemen were then elected: Mr. John Armstrong, president; Mr. Murchy, treasurer; Mr. Gardiner, financial secretary; Mr. Moore, recording secretary; Mr. Lawhorn, vice-president; Mr. Armstrong, president.

After a few words thanking the meeting for the honor done him, further business was proceeded with, short speeches being made by the other gentlemen elected.

The following credentials were then read and on motion accepted: Messrs. J. A. Tremaine and Norman McLeod; from the Laborers Union, Messrs. C. M. Harris, John Booth and Michael King.

The demonstration committee reported progress with regard to the celebration at the school grounds on the 22nd inst. The procession through the city will start at 10 o'clock sharp on the morning of that day.
