THE PROHIBITION

Sir Oliver Mowat Makes a Definite Statement.

WILL PASS A PROHIBITORY LAW

Should the Privy Council Decide the Province Has Jurisdiction.

If the Decision of the Council is That the Province Has Jurisdiction to Pass Only a Partial Prohibitory Law He Will Introduce This Should It Be Considered Sufficiently Effective.

The Department of Justice Has Wholly Checked the Premier's Remarks.

If the decision of the Privy Council should be that the province has jurisdiction to pass a prohibitory liquor law as respects the sale of intoxicating liquors I will introduce such a bill in the following session if I am then at the head of the Government.

The decision of the Privy Council is that the province has jurisdiction to pass only a partial prohibitory liquor law as the decision will warrant, unless the partial prohibitory power is so limited as to be ineffective from a temperance standpoint.

Thus spoke Sir Oliver Mowat yesterday afternoon in answer to a deputation from the Prohibition Convention.

Hon. A. S. Hardy, who was present, endorsed this declaration, and said that it embraced the united opinion of all the members of the Cabinet who were in town.

The prohibitionists greeted the announcement with wild applause.

What the Delegation Asked.

It was 5 o'clock when the delegation, which comprised nearly 100 prominent men and women of the temperance movement, reached the Parliament Buildings.

The members' reception room and waited for the appearance of Sir Oliver. Their mission was to present to him their resolution:

Resolved, That a deputation be appointed to wait forthwith upon the Ontario Government and respectfully request them to declare in favor of the total prohibition of the traffic in intoxicating liquor to the full extent of the power vested in the Legislature.

The Cabinet members were in council and the deputation waited uneasily for their appearance. Feasible attempts were made at jokes, but they fell rather flat. The deputation were not at all sure of the result of their mission and talked as if in suspense.

When Sir Oliver Mowat, followed by the Hon. Messrs. Dryden, Hawley, Ross and Hecourt entered, the deputation rose and greeted them with applause. Sir Oliver was evidently in merry mood and the course of his mouth twitched into a smile as he gazed upon a little piece of typewritten paper he had in his hand.

E. J. Davis, M.P. for North York, introduced Rev. Mr. Kettlewell, chairman of the committee, and Rev. Dr. Potts made the first speech.

He represented to-day a convention of about 1400, who come from all parts of Ontario. As you know the majority for prohibition at the late election was over 80,000. The magnitude of this movement is sufficient to impress every one who is interested in the welfare of this province. These who are in this room represent every creed and every political party. All are united to demand one thing, total prohibition of the liquor traffic." [Applause.]

Mrs. Thornley made an eloquent and impressive speech, which brought forth long-continued applause.

John Cameron of London was the third spokesman of the temperance people, and stated that he was a strong Conservative, but no less strong a prohibitionist.

Sir Oliver's speech.

There was an ominous silence when Sir Oliver, still smiling, rose to reply. He said:

"I have listened with much attention to the eloquent words which have been addressed to us on this occasion. After so decided a vote as that of the plebiscite I consider that no Government would be justified in disregarding it. I observe that it is said that if all who were entitled to do so had voted on the question the result might have been different, but that is always the case in a vote of this kind. The vote is a remarkable one and is extremely significant. I think it is impossible not to regard the effect, on the whole, as expressing the strength of public sentiment of this country. You know that a large extent of my sympathies have been with you in this matter. I perceive that a large proportion of the misery, suffering, disease, crime, vice and poverty of the world has resulted from intemperance. Men who perceive this and do not concur in my method

FINANCE AND TRADE.

Speculators in wheat, as well as exporters, appeared to be rather sanguine yesterday regarding the market. There was no encouragement from Britain, while the American markets were unusually heavy in consequence of local buying and shipping.

The last statement showing the condition of the United States treasury placed the amount of gold at \$745,000,000, or \$10,000,000 more than the previous day. This large increase is due to proceeds of new loan, and comes from the New York banks.

A large number of people attending the last yesterday of the Rose Publishing Company in Montreal were disappointed. The show showed a varied stock in mostly light literature. Bidding was fast and sales ranged from 60 to 70 per cent.

Mr. W. C. Band of James Carruthers & Co. has returned from New York, where he had been on business for several days. "The impression down here seems to be," said Mr. B., "that spring wheat is very scarce and will run much higher than winter wheat."

The following are given as real reasons by a New York house why an advance in securities may be expected before a great while:
