WILKIE GETS FIVE YEARS.

Fined Guilty of Embezzling \$900 From Matthews & Co., His Late Employers.

Alexander G. Wilkie, W. D. Matthews' accidental clerk, appeared in the Police Court yesterday, pleading guilty to the charge of embezzling the sum of \$900, was sent to Kingston Penitentiary for five years. Wilkie presented a haggard appearance in the dock, his bloodshot eyes telling of sleepless nights since his arrest. Mr. James A. MacDonald and Mr. MacKeisic, of Blake, Lamb & Cassella, made strong pleas for leniency on the grounds of the prisoner's excellent character, and the fact that his wife and six children were wholly dependent on him. Mr. W. D. Matthews also asked for leniency, stating that he was satisfied the prisoner had been punished sufficiently and had hitherto conducted himself as a good citizen. His Worship said, in reply to these pleas, that he had a document before him that showed the charge upon which the prisoner had pleaded guilty was but one of many, the total amount being a small portion of his total stock. It was his duty, painful though it be, to pass a heavy sentence, as a crime of this character was becoming more and more frequent. He sentenced Wilkie to five years' imprisonment. During the term of Wilkie's incarceration, Mr. Matthews will provide his family with a monthly allowance.

Good Work During the Past Year at the Elm-street Institution.

The 22nd annual meeting of the Young Women's Christian Association took place yesterday afternoon, with the retiring president, Mrs. Jeffrey, in the chair. The secretary and treasurer's report showed a prosperous year for the association. The Employment Bureau and other departments, The Girls' Industrial Institute of Richmond-street had had a successful year. \$1000 of the debt was paid off. In the boarding house, which accommodates 30 persons, \$200 were entertained, an increase of 10 over last year. The receipts from donations, payments, etc., were \$2884.50 and expenditures \$2881.10. In the Richmond-street branch receipts were \$1641.75 and expenditures \$1523.41. Building account receipts were \$1399.25 and expenditures \$1020.00.
