PUNISHMENT OF CRIMINALS.

The increase of crime of late years in this country, is somewhat alarming; and induces inquiry into the cause of such a darkening aspect of moral depravity.

Great pains in the adjustment of the criminal laws and in the graduation of punishment, have occupied the attention and exercised the wisdom of Legislators; penitentiaries have been built, and steps have been taken to increase the vigilance and effectiveness of those, to whom are officially intrusted the guardianship of communities against the perpetration of crime.

Without going beyond the limits of our own County, we have deplorable proofs that the punishment awarded to thieves is not an adequate terror to evil doers. Only six months have elapsed since half a dozen thieves were sent from Annapolis to the penitentiary.

It is one of the better feelings of our common nature to commiserate the misfortune and sufferings of others, although such sufferings are the result of crime. To pity our fellowmen in their calamities is humane—Christ-like.
