PARISH NOTES.

—OFFERTORY.—March 28, \$54.30. Good Friday, for Jewish Missions, \$30.07, and for Sunday School, \$11.31. Easter Day, \$172.90, and for Improvement Fund, \$7.50. April 12, \$46.68; 19, \$41.30, and for Theological Students' Fund, \$14; 26, \$43.69. Total ordinary \$185.97. Corresponding period last year, \$211.68.

—Easter Offertory last year was, \$130.18.

—The amount required weekly is \$55.

—The number of communicants on Easter Day was 307; last year 370.

—As will be seen above, the offertory on Easter Day was liberal, being over \$40 more than last year.

—A meeting was held in our schoolhouse on Thursday, 9th April, of those interested in the work carried on by the Sisterhood of S. John the Divine. The Bishop presided.

—It gives us great pleasure to note that among the floral decorations on Easter Day was a beautiful cross which was sent up from Montreal, the gift of a young lady who has been a member of St. George's all her life until her marriage a few months ago.

—The Parish has sustained a great loss in the removal to a distance from St. George's of Mr. Lightbourn, the members of whose family have been valuable helpers, always ready, and foremost in every branch of Parish work. They will carry to their new home our kindest wishes for their welfare and happiness.

—THE SALE OF WORK by the Ladies of the City Parishes to raise a special fund for Algoma has been very successful. We understand that \$800 was the amount which it was hoped would be obtained through this means, but the ladies had the pleasure of presenting to Bishop Sullivan about \$1,800. The receipts at the table of S. George's and S. John's Parishes united, were about \$240.

—The schoolhouse has been repaired and renovated, and has also been improved by excavation underneath, which will enable a proper heating apparatus to be introduced and be an advantage in many ways. The whole interior has been cleaned, calcimined, and painted, and is a pleasing change from the dingy and unkempt appearance which it has had for some time past. It is to be hoped that we may soon be able to record similar work accomplished in the church.

THE EASTER MEETINGS.

The annual meeting of the Vestry was held on Easter Monday. The Rector in the chair.

The Churchwardens' Report was presented.

The report has been published in an extra number of the *Parish Journal*.

The Rector appointed Mr. Chadwick as one of the Churchwardens.

Mr. Murray nominated Mr. Harman, who however, declined the appointment, when Mr. Henderson nominated Mr. Harry Hayes, who was appointed.

Mr. W. J. Baines nominated the Sidesmen, including all those of last year except Mr. Lightbourn, who is about changing his residence to a distance, and Mr. Hayes appointed Churchwarden, with the following new names: Messrs. G. F. Harman, W. P. Burrowes-Close, and Wm. Bain.

Dr. Snelling and Mr. McCarthy were reappointed members of the Parochial Tribunal, on motion of Dr. Lough.

The by-law for the establishment of a St. George's Scholarship in Trinity College was then read a third time and passed. Mr. Henderson, in moving the third reading, stated that about \$950 had been subscribed, and he had no doubt the amount required, \$1,000, would be fully made up.

Mr. Chadwick, seconded by Mr. Henderson, introduced a resolution to authorize a grant in aid of purchasing a site for the proposed new Church of St. Mary Magdalene. It was stated that the promoters of the scheme for the erection of that parish expected to obtain a site for about \$1,000, one-half of which we are asked to provide, the other half being undertaken by another of the older parishes. The amount would be payable on very easy terms, so that only a small amount each year would be required.

On motion of Mr. Murray, seconded by Mr. G. F. Harman, Messrs. Beverley Jones, Henderson, and Chadwick, were appointed a committee to make enquiries, and to report at the adjourned meeting.

The Rector stated that steps had been taken for the establishment of Mission Rooms at one or two points in this parish with very gratifying success, and explained the difficulties which were encountered for want of suitable rooms, upon

which it was moved by Mr. G. F. Harman seconded by Mr. Murray, that a committee consisting of Messrs. Chadwick, Henderson, Jones, and Frank Cayley should enquire and report upon a site in the neighbourhood of Soho street.

The meeting then adjourned.

The meeting for election of Lay representatives was held on Easter Monday, the Rector in the Chair.

Messrs. H. W. M. Murray, E. M. Chadwick, and Elmes Henderson were nominated, and there being no other nominations, they were declared elected.

The adjourned Vestry Meeting was held on Monday, 25th April.

Rev. R. J. Moore took the Chair, the Rector being absent from town.

The Churchwardens' statements, duly verified according to law were presented, and their Report presented at the annual meeting was adopted.

Mr. Henderson, for the Committee, appointed to consider the application for aid to the projected Parish of S. Mary Magdalene, reported favourably to the proposal, but recommending that the matter should stand until further arrangements should be made by the promoters of the scheme, a site for the Church not yet having been decided upon or secured.

Mr. Baines offered some practical suggestions with regard to securing a site, and a clause was added to the report recommending that this vestry should join in an application to the North American Land Company for that purpose, and the report was then adopted.

Mr. Frank Cayley reported that the Committee named at the last meeting had had three sites for a Mission Chapel under consideration, and recommended the selection of one on Phœbe Street, which is offered for sale or lease renewable.

Mr. Cumberland considered that the property should be purchased and not leased, and this view was supported by Mr. Henderson and others.

On motion of Mr. Henderson, seconded by Mr. Boyd, the report was adopted, and the Rector, Rev. R. J. Moore, Mr. Frank Cayley, and the Churchwardens, were appointed a Committee to deal with the matter, with power to purchase the

property, and upon sufficient funds being secured to proceed with the erection of a building to cost not more than \$1,000.

A resolution was also passed that the purchase should be made through trustees with power to mortgage under the direction of the Vestry.

The meeting then adjourned.

MISSION ROOM.

That a room or house is very greatly needed for Mission Services is shown by the numbers attending the Tuesday night service at No. 7 Bulwer Street. Four weeks ago there were 30 present; on Tuesday, 21st, there were nearly 70 crowded into every available space and corner. Naturally the heat was almost unbearable.

It will be observed by our report of the Easter Vestry Meetings that definite action has been decided upon towards endeavouring to secure a site, and build a Mission Hall. In accordance with the resolution of Vestry steps have been taken with this view, and we believe that a site has been secured on Phœbe Street, almost directly opposite the end of Huron Street. Subscriptions are earnestly solicited towards this object, both for the erection of a suitable building, and for the maintenance of the work. It is intended, if possible, to proceed at once with the erection of a Hall, and it is expected that one can be built for \$800.

THE NORTH-WEST.

In common, no doubt, with most other city congregations, many of our people have friends and relatives in the North-West, and as all eyes are anxiously turned in that direction at present, we can scarcely refrain from some reference to them, though we cannot undertake to do so in detail. There are two or three names, however, which especially occur to us among those in whom our people have an interest. Mr. and Mrs. Edward Nash, long members of St. George's, are in Battleford, where they took refuge on the outbreak of the insurrection. Mr. William Bain, Jr., late a member of our choir, is in Col. Denison's corps, now pushing on to join Gen. Middleton. Dr. Lesslie of the Queen's Own, is named as having entered Battleford with the advance guard

of Col. Otter's Brigade, whose splendid march to the relief of that place reflects the highest credit upon the commander and his command, of whom a large part have time and again assembled within the walls of St. George's.

The following are the special prayers now in use :

FOR THE DOMINION

O Almighty God, Governor of all things, whose power no creature is able to resist, save and defend our country from all secret conspiracies and open violence. More especially we beseech Thee, at this time, to deliver the North-west Territory from the hands of rebellious and lawless men. Abate their pride, frustrate their designs and defeat their enterprise; that the people of this Dominion, being protected by Thy power and encompassed with Thy favour, may continue in peace and quietness to serve Thee their God and Saviour, and to enjoy the blessings of the land and the fruits of their labours; that so we may ever acknowledge Thee to be our defender and mighty deliverer in all dangers and adversities; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

FOR THE MILITIA.

Most gracious God and Heavenly Father, the protector of all that trust in Thee, we humbly beseech Thee to preserve, amid the perils and dangers to which they may be exposed, the young men of this and the other Provinces of the Dominion, who have cheerfully gone forth to deliver their country from the insurrection of wicked men. Be Thou unto them, O Lord, a strong tower against the face of their enemies, that, being kept under the shadow of thy wings, and supported by thy power, they may triumph over all opposition, and return to their homes in health and safety, to offer with Thy grateful people, in the courts of Thy House, the sacrifice of praise and thanksgiving unto Thy Divine Majesty, for such Thy preservation and providence over them; through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.

PAROCHIAL NEEDS.—Besides the means of meeting ordinary expenditure—

1. Debt, \$3,500, should be paid off, or at least reduced, but the ordinary revenue is insufficient to provide funds for this purpose. One dollar monthly from every pewholder would soon extinguish it.
2. The improvement of the Church, to render it more worthy and suitable for the sacred purpose to which it is consecrated. \$3,000 is wanted for this, and would be provided if every family in the Congregation gave a moderate sum towards it.
3. \$1,000 for the erection of the Phœbe Street Mission Hall, and subscriptions to maintain the Mission.
4. Donations and bequests towards an endowment, of which there is at present a sum of \$280 only.
