In accordance with the resolution of Vestry steps have been taken with this view, and we believe that a site has been secured on Phœbe Street, almost directly opposite the end of Huron Street. Subscriptions are earnestly solicited towards this object, both for the erection of a suitable building, and for possible, to proceed at once with the erection of a Hall, and it is expected that one can be built for \$\$00.
