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

NOTICE.

The Church Society was established in 1842. Its objects are :

1. A Mission Fund to aid in paying missionaries to struggling congregations.

2. A General Fund to aid in the erection of churches and parsonages, in the education of the children of the Clergy, to aid struggling congregations in maintaining schools for their children, and for the general expenses of the Society.

3. A Widows' and Orphans' Fund for the Clergy.

4. A Pension Fund for aged and infirm Clergy.

5. To provide bibles, prayer books and religious publications, either gratuitously or at reduced prices.

Its affairs are managed,

1. By the Central Board and its sub-committees.

(a) The Central Board is composed of all the Clergy, the Church Wardens, and others elected by the Society, being Members of the Corporation.

(b) The sub-Committees are the Finance, the Land, the Investment, and Education Committees.

2. By the Clergy Trust Committee, which manages (a) the Bishopric Endowment Fund; (b) the capital arising from the commutation of the clergy reserves, and (c) the endowment funds of the several missions and congregations.

3. By The Diocesan Board of Missions, composed of clergymen and laymen elected by the Church Society and by the Synod.

This Board pays all the missionaries of the Diocese, and receives for this purpose (a) the annual grant of the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, (b) the Mission Fund of the Church Society, (c) the contributions or assessment of the congregations served by the missionaries, (d) a grant from the Clergy Trust Fund, (c) the Interest of the Sustentation Fund.

All letters referring to the assessment or contributions of congregations should be addressed to the Rev. A. A. Von-Ifiland, the Secretary, or to Mr. W. G. Petry, the Treasurer of the Diocesan Board.

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ANNUAL MEETING.

The Annual Meeting was held on Wednesday afternoon, 1st February, in the National School.

The Lord Bishop of the Diocese in the chair.

The reports of the Central Board, Diocesan Board, and Clergy Trust Fund were presented, adopted and ordered to be printed. A report from the District of St. Francis was submitted and ordered to be printed. Mr. Geo. Veasey submitted the accounts of the Clergy Trust Fund, Local Endowment Funds, the Bishopric Endowment Fund and those of the Church Society, and Mr. Edwin A. Jones those of the Diocesan Board. which were adopted and ordered to be printed.

The following Resolution was adopted unanimously, "That the Church Society do offer to Mr. Veasey and Mr. Edwin A. Jones their warm thanks for the valuable services which they have rendered to the Church in this Diocese, the Clergy, the Congregations, and the Finances, by the faithfulness, thoroughness and skill which have characterized their tenure, respectively, of the important office of Treasurer of the Church Society and of the Diocesan Board."

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One Life Member and twenty-two Members of Corporation were elected. The Vice-Presidents and Members of Diocesan Board and Clergy Trust Fund Committee were re-elected, and twenty-one Gentlemen were elected to serve on the Central Board. Amendments to Articles II, VI and XV were adopted, and await confirmation; also, the repeal of Article XI. A new By-law on the custody of the secu-

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rities was introduced, adopted, and awaits confirmation at the next meeting of the Society.

Resolutions concerning the management of Local Endowment Funds, on issuing of circular to members and on the amalgamation of treasurerships, were adopted.

An arrangement was adopted with the authorities of the Colonial and Continental Church Society, by which, for the future, the grant of that Society of £75 sterling, for assisting schools in poor Districts, will be managed by the Education Committee of the Church Society, thus avoiding two committees and unnecessary expense. 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ANNUAL REPORT OF THE CENTRAL BOARD FOR THE YEAR 1881.

Presented to the Church Society, February 1st. 1882.

The Central Board, in presenting their Fortieth Annual Report of the proceedings of the Society, desire to express their gratitude to God for His continued blessings during the past year.

The income during the year for the five funds of the Society amounts to \$6,268.86, composed only of voluntary subscriptions and donations, which though \$57.65 less than last year; yet, when it is remembered that a considerable increase has been made in the amounts given to the Foreign and Domestic Mission Board, with larger and more regularly paid assessments to the Diocesan Board, and the addition of the large amount of \$3,600 subscribed for a Diocesan Missioner, a thank offering for the Reverend Canon Wilberforce's faithful and zealous effort in conducting a ten days' mission in the City of Quebec, together with the failure of five missions in making any return before closing the Society's accounts; it must be acknowledged that the year's proceedings have been very satisfactory.

Your Board, while thus thankfully announcing a growing interest in the work of the Society, feel it nevertheless to be a duty to remind the members of the Church throughout the Diocese that the amount contributed is hardly commensurate with the resources and ability of our Church people.

Your Board also deem it a duty to point out that there are certain missions in the Diocese characterized unfortu-

nately in the statistical tables by the words No Financial Report.

Your Board also feel convinced that were the labours of the Society properly laid before Churchmen, and an organized band of collectors appointed in each Congregation, all would aid in the Society's work, and especially those Parishes and Missions which have received in times past so liberally of the Society's bounty.

GENERAL FUND.

(To aid in the crection of Churches and Parsonages, in the support of Schools, in the Education of the children of the Clergy, in the formation of Local Endowments, and for the general expenses of the management of the Society.)

Your Board express very deep regret that the Fund has not been enabled during the year to respond to the applications for aid referred to on the 11th page of last report. Another application has been added to the list, viz.: for a grant to the new Parsonage at Robinson Village, Mission of Bury.

Grants have been made to two new Endowment Funds, viz.: Rivière-du-Loup (en bas) and Danville.

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EDUCATION OF THE CHILDREN OF THE CLERGY FUND.

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This fund received a grant of \$300 from the General Fund, and has also been aided by \$119.50 received in subscriptions and donations.

The fund is one of the greatest possible benefit to the Clergy, enabling them to provide a first-class education for their children either at Bishop's College School, Lennoxville, Compton Ladies' College, or at some other Educational establishment approved of by the Committee. Mr. Robert Hamilton has generously added \$270 to the Fund, being half the amount actually expended.

There are now seven children receiving aid.

MISSION FUND.

(For the payment of the Stipends of Missionaries in conjunction with the Annual grant from the Society for the Propagation of the Gospel, assessments from the Rural Congregations, and a grant from the Clergy Trust Fund, the Interest of the invested capital of the Sustentiation Fund, administered by the Diocesan Beard.)

It is gratifying to notice that the voluntary subscriptions and offerings have exceeded the amount of last year by \$41.41.

This is especially noteworthy when it is remembered that the receipts for 1880 included a special gift of \$400 from an old friend of the Society.

A full account of the Missionary labours of the Society will be found in the Report of the Diocesan Board.

WIDOWS' AND ORPHANS' FUND.

The following Clergymen have, according to the terms of the By-law, made the required number of subscriptions, and are therefore paid up members, viz. :-Revds. Smith, Lyster, Dr. Ker, Dr. Roe, Von Iffland, Kemp, Wm. King, Burrage, Vial, Fothergill, Housman, Jenkins, Boydell, Washer, Thompson, Foster, Riopel, Debbage and Hepburn

The following are in course of completing their payments, viz. :--Revds. Ball, Richardson, Sykes, R. Ker, Richmond, Harding, Rawson. Stevens, Colston, Chambers, Wurtele, Boyle, C. D. Brown, Blaylock, Brock, Dr. Lobley, Searth, Dinzey, Chapman and Thorneloe.

There are at present seven widows and four children upon the Fund.

The subscriptions and collections during the year were \$363.38. The capital of the fund has now amounted to over fifty thousand dollars.

PENSION FUND.

(For aged and infirm Clergymen.)

The receipts for the year were \$1420.64. The capital has reached \$20,695. At the present time there is no claim upon the fund. When the sum of \$25,000 has been invested, it will be necessary, according to the terms of the By-law, to form a scale of pensions, and provide for the retirement of Clergymen after reaching a certain age or length of service in the Diocese.

FOREIGN AND DOMESTIC MISSION BOARD.

During the recent Session of the Provincial Synod, it was ordered that Boards of Foreign and Domestic Missions be formed in each Diocese; the Foreign Board to have charge work & mestic for Alg side th

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charge of all moneys for the S. P. G. and Missionary work generally outside our own Dominion, while the Domestic Mission Board would take charge of all the moneys for Algoma and Missionary objects in the Dominion, outside the limits of our own Diocese.

Two Boards were formed for this Diocese, but it was soon apparent that they could best do the work assigned to them by acting through one Secretary-Treasurer.

Captain Carter kindly accepted the office, and through his zealous and well directed efforts a large amount of money has been received and transmitted to the S. P. G., Algoma, Saskatchewan and Rupert's Land. The Mission Board by circulars and other letters has stirred up a vast amount of missionary zeal in very many of our congregations, and it is gratifying to notice that our people are beginning to realize the great duty and privilege of being able to join in the glorious work of spreading the Gospel of Christ beyond our own borders.

Your Board, in noticing the amounts given during the year as shewn in the report of the Foreign and Domestic Mission Board, viz:—\$1211.37 for Domestic, and \$308.28 for Foreign Missions, is pleased in Leing able to announce that these figures were increased by \$107.43 for Foreign, and \$150.46 for Domestic Missions, received from the District of St. Francis too late for insertion in their report, making a total of \$1361.83 for Domestic, and \$415.71 for Foreign Missions. Your Board, while expressing very deep regret that Captain Catter has been obliged, through other business engagements, to relinquish his position as Secretary-Treasurer, must offer its congratulations in the appointment of Mr. R. Campbell as his successor.

Grants were made of 12 Testaments, 87 Prayer Books, and about 5,660 Catechisms and Tracts.

During the 8 years from 1874 to 1881 inclusive, there were sold :--950 Bibles, 3,065 Prayer Books, 373 Testaments, 6,830 Miscellaneous Publications, besides Tracts and Almanacks to the value of \$160.00.

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And given away during the same period :---35 Bibles, 45 Testaments. 1,049 Prayer Books, 25,000 Catechisms and Tracts.

During the year the Venerable Society supplied a large number of suitable Mission Tracts to the value of $\pounds 10$, free of all cost, for use during the Mission conducted by the Rev. Canon Wilberforce.

Your Board cordially recommend the different Parishes that may require books to avail themselves of the privileges afforded of obtaining the Venerable Society's Publications through the Depository.

BEQUESTS.

The late Reverend George Milne, M. A., late Incumbent of New Carlisle and Paspebiae, has bequeathed \$100 to the Pension and \$100 to the W. & O. Funds,* he has also bequeathed \$100 to St. Andrew's Church, New Carlisle, and \$50 to St. Peter's Church, Paspebiae, to assist those congregations in maintaining the ministrations of religion.

While thankfully recording the above bequests made by one of the Clergy of the Diocese, your Board would respectfully venture to point out that it would seem to be a part of the proper discharge of the Stewardship of money to make provision, by will, for charitable purposes. As a

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with a Georg That do wi witho defatig years office Church we have hitherto come short of our duty in this matter, as will be evident when we compare what has been done among us with the liberal bequests made by Church people in the Mother Country and in the United States.

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Your Board has pleasure in announcing that the late Mrs. Aylwin, of Montreal, has left \$1,400 to the Mission of Bourg Louis, and that the Parish of St. Peter's, Quebec, has been benefitted by a similar amount from the late Mr. Edgeley, a former Parishioner.

Your Board begs to suggest to any who may desire to bequeath money or property for Church purposes that suitable "forms of bequest and devises by will" are to be found at the end of the Annual Report.

OFFICERS OF THE SOCIETY.

During the past year there have been some changes among the officers; Mr. Geo. Veasey has felt compelled through business engagements to relinquish the office of Treasurer, which he has filled for eleven years with an ability and zeal which have entitled him to the gratitude and respect of all the members of the Society. On receiving his resignation, the following resolution was unanimously adopted by your Board :—

That the members of the Central Board have received with much regret the announcement of the resignation of George Veasey, Esq., Treasurer of the Church Society. That while accepting Mr. Veasey's resignation (which they do with great reluctance), they cannot allow him to retire without tendering to him their sincerest thanks for the indefatigable manner in which he has discharged for eleven years the important and responsible duties attached to the office he has held.

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That they are fully conscious that on all occasions Mr. Veasey has displayed the most lively interest in everything connected with the Church Society, and that its present satisfactory financial position is, in a great measure, due to the painstaking and untiring care with which he has managed its funds.

That the members feel grateful that the interest hitherto manifested by Mr. Veasey in all that concerns the welfare of the Church Society will not be diminished, but that he will still exert his influence in promoting its many objects of usefulness in the Diocese.

Mr. Edwin Jones, after eight years' faithful and painstaking work, has resigned the Treasurership of the Diocesan Board, and been succeeded by Mr. Petry.

Mr. Robert Peel Campbell is now the Secretary-Treasurer of the Boards of Foreign and Domestic Missions, and Mr. Walton Smith has taken charge of the Depository.

OBITUARY.

Your Board regret to place on record the death of three of the Clergy of the Diocese during the year, viz.:

The Rev. G. Milne, M.A., who for many years faithfully discharged the duties of Incumbent of the Mission of New Carlisle and Paspebiac. He was beloved and esteemed by his people, and died full of years with the satisfaction of seeing his Mission in a prosperous condition, almost ripe to become a self-supporting Parish.

The Rev. W. C. Merrick, formerly Missionary at East Frampton, and for many years Incumbent of Berthier, in the Diocese of Montreal, with duty in this Diocese at Rivière-du-Loup (en haut). Mr. Merrick was much esteemed and respected by all with whom he was brought in contact, and zealously discharged the duties of his office.

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" Mu contril Treasu warded The The Rev. A. J. Woolryche, late Incumbent of Bury, who was ordained in 1854 to the Mission of Stoneham, from which he was removed to Levis, and became Secretary of the Society, an office which he held for nine years.

Mr. Woolryche was an excellent scholar, affable and genial in his manner, and notwithstanding his long, continued illness, was ever cheerful, and to the utmost of his abilities ready to further the interests of the Church.

The Society has also to deplore the loss of Mr. Thomas Andrews, a Life Member, annual subscriber and generous supporter of all Church work.

The following is the abstract of the Revenue account of the Diocesan Board for the year ended Dec. 31st, 1881 :---

On comparing the above Statement with that contained in last year's report it will be observed that the balance at the close of 1881 is nearly \$200 less than the corresponding item at the close of 1880.

This fact clearly shows that the actual revenue for the past year has all been employed and that in addition a portion of the balance has also been used.

No new ground has been taken up, the expenditure having been strictly confined to the missions on the list at the close of 1880. It w realize Society some o Durhat Ascot (Dioces upon f involv be talstraine

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about engag be tak grant and f the m caref It will thus be seen that your Board has been unable to realize the hope expressed in its last Report to the Church Society and increase the number of its Missions by dividing some of the more unwieldy ones, such as Danville and Durham, or taking up entirely new ground as in the case of Ascot Corner, Westbury and Sandhill. The revenue of the Diocesan Board is not a certain fixed amount to be reckoned upon from year to year, whilst the opening of new missions involves a long continuance of liability : and great care must be taken that our responsibilities in the future be not strained beyond our means of meeting them.

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It was with very great regret that your Board was obliged to abandon for the time being at any rate, its intention of affording the much needed relief to the Missions above referred to: but the comparatively large expenditure of the past year (due to the fact that all the missions without exceptions, were enjoying the ministrations of a resident Clergyman) and the notification of a large reduction in the grant of the S. P. G., for 1852 left your Board no option in the matter.

In the early part of the past year the labours of your Board were directed to the question of re-assessing the congregations, and with this object in view a large amount of valuable information as to the numbers and circumstances of the people in the various missions was collected.

It was hoped at the time that a moderate increase of about ten per cent, would enable the Board to meet all its engagements; but before definite action in that sense could be taken, the notification of a reduction of £400 stg., in the grant of the S. P. G., for 1882, was received by the Bishop and forced upon us a reconsideration of the subject. At the meeting of the Synod the whole question was fully and carefully dealt with, and recommendations made to your Board embracing a detailed list of assessments to be levied, as well as fixing the date, in the case of a few Missions, at which they were to become self-supporting.

These recommendations have—with scarcely any modification—been adopted; and although the full results of the work done cannot be ascertained for another twelve months, it is with great pleasure that your Board is able to announce such an increase in the assessments, as will enable the Board—together with decreased expenditure—to meet its engagements for the current year.

Your Board believes that this most gratifying result is due to increased appreciation of the ministrations supplied to the different congregations throughout the Diocese, and the growing conviction on the part of the people that it is their duty to bear as large a share of the burden as they can.

That the fresh obligations entered upon by the various congregations will be faithfully and punctually fulfilled there is strong reason to hope.

Your Board can point with satisfaction to the ever increasing regularity of payment on the part of the Church-Wardens, and the sense of pride and honour which seems to influence them as representatives of their respective congregations.

As your Society is aware the past year has been exceptionally marked by larger contributions towards Foreign and Domestic Missions on the part of Members of the Church in the Diocese, than were ever before collected for purposes outside the Diocese. The Church people of Quebec also, having enjoyed the blessings of a Mission conducted by the Rev. Canon Wilberforce, have readily contributed of their substance towards bringing similar religious influences to bear in the country districts of the Diocese.

Diocolong nndc the S If we bear these facts in mind, the aid which your Board has received in the past year from the Mission Fund—a slight increase over the previous year—is matter for congratulation, and discountenances the view held by some that the multiplication of objects of benevolence does not increase the aggregate amount given.

In connection with the large reduction of the S. P. G. grant for the current year, your Board deems it necessary to draw the attention of the Clergy and Congregations to the instructions of the Society, conveyed in the following resolution which the Diocesan Board has been requested to carry out:

"That some of the Colonial Missions which have for a long period received, and still receives support from the Society, should be required to depend on local resources; and when a Mission of many years standing is still inadequate to the support of a resident Clergyman, it should be annexed to a neighbouring Mission and receive periodical visits from a neighbouring elergyman. In adopting this plan the difficulty arises of fixing a term of years which, without unfairness, shall be applicable to various Missions whose circumstances are not identical. Thirteen years ago the Society (Regulation 46,) laid down nine years as the time during which it might contribute towards the support of a Clergyman in a Colonial Mission : and if this rule were to be strictly enforced, it would doubtless have the effect of setting at liberty a considerable sum annually to meet the the new wants of the Foreign Churches. It is therefore submitted, that the Colonial Biships in whose Diocese such Missions exist, should be requested to relieve the Funds of the Society from further charge in respect of such Missions."

In view of the fact that there are many Missions in the Diocese which have received the Society's aid for a very long period, it is well that the above resolution be brought under their notice. It may be that before long any aid the S. P. G. may grant to this Diocese will be made depen-

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dent on a strict observance of the directions in question. In one case the injunction of the Society has already been obeyed, and the old Mission of Stoncham and Lake Beauport has been united to the neighbouring mission of Valcartier.

Your Board has the satisfaction of announcing that another old Mission, New Carlisle and Paspebiac, has become self sustaining since 31st Dec. last. It is not improbable that within the next three or four years several other Missions will follow this good example.

In July last the Diocesan Board adopted the following resolution and urged the Clergy and Wardens to give it their earliest attention.

"That all aid extended the Ministrations of the Church in any congregation be made and continued expressly on condition that the Church-Wardens do obtain duplicate receipts of the premiums paid on the Insurances of their Church and Parsonage and do place one of these receipts in the hands of the Secretary of the Board, and that the receipt of no Mutual Insurance Company will be accepted except in the case of engagements now pending."

Your Board regrets to be obliged to say that the above request has not been generally complied with.

Receipts for premiums paid have been received from the following six Missions only, viz:—East Frampton, Bourg Louis, Shipton and Tingwick, Sandy Beach, Portneuf, New Ireland.

Your Board has, with great regret, to announce the resignation of Mr. E. A. Jones, who, for the past eight years, has so faithfully, efficiently and courteously discharged the office of Honorary-Treasurer. It is satisfactory to know that the Board will still continue to receive the benefit of his experience as one of its members. During the past year the following appointments and changes have been made in the Diocese :---

In the month of July, the Rev. E. J. Harper to the Mission of St. John's, Melbourne, his predecessor in that Mission, Rev. R. W. Brown, having accepted the charge of the Mission at Labrador.

In the month of November, the Rev A. J. Balfour having resigned the Mission of Hatley, in order to accept the Rectory of Melbourne, the Rev. A. Stevens was appointed to Hatley and Waterville, and the Rev. C. B. Washer to Barford and Hereford.

In the same month, the Rev. F. M. Webster was appointed to the charge of Bury, owing to the serious illness of the Rev. A. J. Woolryche :* an illness which shortly afterwards resulted in his death.

The Rev. James Boydell, one of the most faithful Missionaries of the Diocese, has removed to the Diocese of Rupert's Land.

The Rev. E. C. Parkin has resigned the Mission of Cookshire and accepted charge of Nicolet with the outlying stations in the neighbourhood.

* Mr. Webster's appointment, as Missionary in charge, dates from 1st January,

There are thus three Missions vacant at present, viz.: Cookshire, Kingsey, and Brompton and Windsor.[†]

In the death of the Rev. A. J. Woolryche, the Church has not only lost a faithful Missionary, and large numbers a friend whose bright intelligence and kindly feeling irresistably attracted them towards him, but one to whom more than to any other is to be credited the work of founding the system which your Board is carrying out with such great advantage to the Diocese.

At a recent meeting of the Board the following resolution was unanimously adopted :

"That the Diocesan Board have heard with deep regret of the death of the Rev. A. J. Woolryche, and beg to convey to Mrs. Woolryche and her family the expression of their sincere sympathy with them in their great loss, and assure them that the remembrance still lives amongst the members of the Board of the days in which the Rev. Mr. Woolryche laboured as their Secretary, in promoting the important interests committed to them."

The Reports of the Clergy are hereunto appended and convey very full and interesting information as to the work of the Church in all the Missions aided by the Board.

The prominent reflection which rises in the mind after reading these reports is, that a great deal of work is being done, and that on the whole, real progress is being made. evidenced in many visible results.

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REPORT

OF THE SAINT FRANCIS DISTRICT ASSOCIATION OF THE CHURCH SOCIETY OF THE DIOCESE OF QUEBEC-DECEMBER 14, 1881.

There are circumstances in all Missions, which cause the money receipts to fluctuate with the actual wants and supplies of the material confort and prosperity of their temporal necessities; while the Divine work of spiritual increase may be going on, under a Divine blessing, to bear its fruit in God's due and appointed time; verifying the word which teaches us, "one soweth and another reapeth."

With the view of placing before the members of this Association a true index of the Church's work during the past year, it has been thought desirable by your Secretary to condense the Clerical Reports by an analysis, presenting the most interesting features of each report in a practical form, diverted of mere theory or homiletic tendencies.

Acton—presents us with the first report—it commences by saying, "Nothing of great consequence has to be recorded this year;" and then, after describing a routine of services, adds, the number of services, Sunday and week-day, amounted to 235.

With respect to the ministrations among the French Roman Catholics, the Missionary says, "My work among the French has not been of much account; but with respect to this work my position is really not a satisfactory one."

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He recommends that an assistant, who may understand the French language thoroughly, be provided for the incumbent whenever an opening is available, to be paid from a special fund opened by the Church Society for that purpose.

The Church has been reshingled, the sides of the Church painted with fire-proof and the windows with white paint, which has added much to its elegance.

Amount raised during the past year, \$430.62.

Bishop's College.—The Principal of Bishop's College reports that since the reoccupation of the College buildings, the daily services in the chapel have been held, full choral on all festivals and their eves, with an early celebration of the Holy Communion on Sundays and Saints' days. The services are hearty and reverent, and constitute a real means of grace to many.

Last December there were 22 resident and 7 non-resident students; there are now the same number of residents, but only 5 non-resident. 16 of the students are candidates for Holy Orders.

The Missionary Union is still in full working order, though during the dispersion of the College students in the early part of the year, its operations were to a certain extent suspended; from the same cause there was a diminution in the amount of offertories, there being no Sunday evening offertories for four months.

Amount raised for all purposes, \$69.08; being \$35.61 less than last year.

Bishop College Missions.—These are Milby and Capleton under the charge of the Principal, and Ascot Corner, Sand Hill and Monlton Hill under the Professor of Divinity. Westbury was handed back to the Rev. T. S. Chapman, in June.

In January last the Rev. Isaac Thompson held a most successful mission in Ascot Corner; the immediate results were the baptism of 12 adults, besides a family of 5 children, and the confirmation of 15—all adults. Of the 15 confirmed, 13 have become Communicants making in all 31. There is also a hopeful Sunday School in Ascot Corner, instructed by the Professor of Divinity. The Professor of Divinity suggests "if this ground, so hardly won, is not to be lost, a resident pastor must without delay be stationed in charge of these Townships.

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For reques At Sand Hill the congregations have been good, and the Sunday School well attended. The funds for horse hire and other expenses have been provided through the envelope system, and everything connected with this Mission Station is satisfactory.

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The services at Moulton Hill have been regularly kept up and much appreciated by the good people of the neighbourhood. The people have purchased a small harmonium for their Sunday services.

Barford and Hereford.—The services at all the stations of this Mission have been more largely attended this year than formerly, and a greater uniformity marks the observance of the rubrics with regard to kneeling and responding. At St. Lawrence Church the congregation has been reduced in number by removals from the neighbourhood.

At Sianhope the congregation has been larger and more regular than ever before.

This Station has had a flourishing Sunday School under the superintendence of Mr. Geo. Marston, who, to the regret of the people, has removed to Boston.

At Perryboro there is a reverence and warmth of feeling in all the congregation,—upon the whole the incumbent considers the work of the Mission encouraging.

The financial statement shows an increase over last year, viz. : \$93.29.

Bury.— The Secretary regrets to have to report that owing to the serious illness of the incumbent he will be obliged to resign on the \exists 1st December, when he will be placed on the Pension List of the Church Society, with the hope that he may, after a year's rest, be able to enter again on active service.

The new Parsonage will be shortly completed. The successful issue of this work is owing, in a great measure, to the efforts of the Ladies of the Church Guild, and to Mrs. Woolryche, whose untiring energy justly claims the gratitude of the mission. The Guild has raised this year \$115.00.

For the past three months the Rev. F. M. Webster, at the request of the Bishop, has acted as *Locum Tenens*.

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Brompton and Windsor.—The incumbent of Brompton reports "there is steady progress here," 15 persons in the mission were confirmed during the year, many of them from dissenting communities. In Windsor the church building debt and a mortgage on the church land have been paid. The mission is free from debt, and the Diocesan Board assessments have no arrears.

Coaticook.—The chief subject of material progress in this Mission during the year has been the enlargement of the Church, by which one hundred sittings have been added to the accommodation of the worshippers. The Church has also been newly shingled and painted, and a furnace has been placed in the basement, costing altogether \$900.

A pleasing feature in this report is a recognition of assistance in the public services by the aged, retired missionary resident in Coaticook, the Rev. A. Balfour. A large class was presented to the Bishop for Confirmation, all the members partaking of the Holy Communion.

The incumbent concludes his report thus; "On taking a careful retrospect of the work done during the current year, I have every reason to thank God and take courage. The financial statement shows an increase of \$442.82.

Compton.—The Rector of Compton forwards a long list of subscribers to the General Fund of the Church Society, giving a total of 62. An effort is being made to collect 1200 to pay off a debt on the Rectory property. When this is paid there will be the prospect of a new Church. Financial statement shows 185.48, over last year.

Shipton, Troutbrook and Lorne.—The report from this Mission is full of interesting information and exceedingly lengthy, it is difficult to epitomize its valuable contents. The incumbent's time may be said to be taken up by a continual preparation of candidates for confirmation, and is best described in his own words. He says "the difficulty of properly preparing persons who cannot read; who cannot commit a line to memory, elderly married people their time constantly occupied with domestic and farm work, who possibly cannot get to Church once a month, can only be appreciated by those engaged in the undertaking. A scheme has been set on foot for the completion of Saint Augustine's Church :--Through the generosity of a former parishioner now living in N. Y., \$500 has been given supplemented by a similar amount from local and other sources, so that the work of renovating and finishing the Church is guaranteed, that work consists in placing a furnace in the basement, re-lathing and plastering the whole interior; replacing the woodwork by brown ash, new roof and handsome spire.

The Mission of Lorne is expected to be opened very shortly. "At present," writes the Incumbent, "we require prayer desk, pulpit, altar table and rails, service books, a font, painting within and without.

Very handsome frontlets for desk and pulpit, and an altar cloth were presented by Mrs. Williams, a set of altar linen by the Rev. C. Hamilton, a surplice by the ladies of St. Matthew's guild, and a handsome bible by a lady friend. The financial statement shows \$1,470.08 more than last year.

Drummondville.--After referring to the regular and continued services of the Church, special services and Sunday Schools, all of a satisfactory nature. The Incumbent mentions a feature of a novel and special interest in regard to his Missionary meeting. It was held in the Parish Church, and in order to sustain the life and interest of the meeting without sacrificing the solemnity due to the subject in hand, the meeting was commenced with a short service, in great part choral. There was no chairman, nor introductions, nor apologies or personal platitudes. The speakers, who were in surplices, stood forth each in his order, and said their say. The result was satisfactory beyoud expectation—the amount was the largest ever taken in the parish. The amount collected exceeds that of last year by \$18.63,

Durham.—With regard to the temporalities of this Mission, there is much that is encouraging to record. An old debt has been completely removed—Church repairs have been made costing over \$100.

In L'Avenir, an old debt has been reduced, the debt on the Parsonage has been paid off; mainly through the exertion of the first promoters of the work, Messrs. Soloman Lyster, C. M. Lyster, Albert Lyster, Wm. Stevens and Wm. Burrill, who assumed the remaining debt of \$280.

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Eleven persons were confirmed by the Bishop in June. An increase of \$100.01 is shown over last year's receipts. atten

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Hatley.—The Missionary of Hatley testifies to the growing reverence and attention to the ordinances of religion throughout the Mission. The number of communicants has increased. The additional assessment has been guaranteed and paid in advance. A Parsonage house is well nigh completed, upon which \$1,100.00 have been paid and a debt of \$700.00 still remains. Two Sunday Schools have been maintained. A Ladies' Guild is in successful operation. \$997.95 have been raised over the sum collected last year.

Kingsey.—The events most worthy of notice in this report are:—The admission of 13 persons to full Church membership by the rite of confirmation. The erection of a Church at Spooner Pond, which promises to be the Church of the Mission, being the most central with the largest and most regular congregation. The increased assessment was cordially acceeded to. The Mission was thoroughly canvassed by the Church Wardens with the most satisfactory result, and the amount required raised.

The Incumbent, who is about leaving the Diocese of Quebec for Manitoba, records a sense of his gratitude to the Diocesan Board for their spirit of brotherly love and consideration in all times of the prosperity and adversity of the Mission. The financial increase in the amount contributed is \$123.86.

Lennoxville.—The Rector of Lennoxville says :—"I have to notice the establishment of the Sustentation Fund and the envelope system last Easter which so far has succeeded beyond our expectations. The members of the Missionary Union have been able, owing to the generous assistance of kind friends in the parish, to undertake the support of Hannah Grey, a little Indian girl, at the Wawanosh Home, Algoma.

Amount of contributions falls short of last year by \$82.84."

Magog and Georgerille.—The out-stations of this Mission are six in number. The Missionary writes :—"I am thankful to say that in all these stations I now have a certain number who are deeply in earnest, and are coming surely into the Church, valuing her offices more than any other; attending her services on week days as regularly as if they had been on Sunday. The week-day services are fortnightly in addition to those given in the churches and necessarily make a large demand upon the Missionary's time. During the residence of the Rev. P. C. Read in Magog, he kindly volunteered an extra service each Sunday."

Melbourne.---St. Ann's, \$2,558.45. Melbourne.---St. John's, \$382.94.

Stanstcad.—From this Mission the incumbent reports a weekly Sunday afternoon Service at Beebe Plain throughout the year.

On All Saints' Day the Church at Beebe Plain was consecrated, thus rewarding the efforts of past years with the first fruits of success. A regular congregation, not large but interested, now worship in its own free-seated church, where five years ago it was not an easy matter for the Church of England to obtain a hearing. On the same day, All Saints', the Bishop confirmed six persons in Christ Church, Stanstead. The various agencies of the Church, such as Sunday Schools, and Guild, have been in successful operation during the year. Financially there is a decrease under last year of ξ -08.10. [10.440]

Respecting Churches we notice :--Aeton Church, repaired and painted. Brompton Church, debt and mortgage on Church land paid off. Coaticook, enlargement of Church. Danville, completion of Lorne Church. Durham, Church debt paid. Sherbrooke, erection of a Church Hall.

Respecting Parsonages we notice :--Bury Parsonage, nearly completed. Hatley Parsonage, nearly completed.

And now I have been your Secretary for fifteen years, and had it not been that you have been kind enough to say I have discharged the duties of mine office efficiently, I should have thought I had done so very inefficiently. Such as it has been, it has been to me a labour of love, and in parting from you I pray that God's blessing may rest upon your Association, that you may go on prospering and to prosper through Jesus Christ Our Lord.

EDWARD CULLEN PARKIN, Hony. Secretary, St. Francis District Association.

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The Rev. L C. Wurtele reports :-- That the usual three Sunday appointments of Acton, Upton, and Roxton Falls, have been regularly kept up, with a very satisfactory attendance at the services.

In St. Mark's Church, with few exceptions, I have read the shortened service on Friday evenings, with a short reading from Browne on the Articles. Of other week-day services, which were, I am happy to say, wonderfully well attended, 26 were held in Danby, 8 in West Wickham, 7 in River David, and 5 in S. Theodore of Acton. In all, the number of services, Sunday and week-day, emounted to 235. Of my work among the French, three heads of respectable families have lately dissented from the Church of Rome. But with respect to this work, my position is really not a satisfactory one. Almost the whole duty in this department has to be done on week days. On Sundays the three English congregations have to be served, and this, too, with a drive of twenty-five miles. It is true when a few of the French members are present in Church, several of the Collects and one of the lessons are rendered in French, and after the congregation is dismissed, a short discourse in French delivered to those remaining behind; but even in this, great circumspection has to be used lest too much of the service be rendered in the French tougue, as the English portion of the congregation are jealous of their rights, and on occasion do not fail to express their dissatisfaction. The French are well awars of this, and it makes them feel somewhat like intruders. On this account it is seldom they attend, except when purposing to partake of the Holy Communion. Now, it seems to me a radical cure ought to be effected soon, or else, even here, as it has happened in many places (with sorrow I say it) God may be willing to remove the Church's opportunity, through our neglect, and allow that glorious department of the Church's work to be done by human organizations, though it be accomplished in an inferior manner. The remedy to be applied is this: Whenever there is an opening available for this work, an assistant should be provided to the incumbent, and either one or other of the two to under-

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stand the French language thoroughly, so that the French members may at least have, once a Sanday, the entire service in their own tongue. To pay the salaries of these assistants, a fund should be created in the Church Society, the interest of which could be applied for that special purpose. Surely some of those noble churchmen in the Diocese who have done so much for the prosperity of our Church, will be willing to make an effort and take this matter in hand in time, and so ward off what the good shepherd may be obliged in the end to allege as a reproach to this part of His vineyard : for the Church in this Province, in my opinion, is placed under God in very peculiar circumstances, as it is her duty to care for those members of a different language who have left the pale of the Roman Church, fully convinced that she "has erred, not only in her living and manner of ceremonies, but also in matters of faith."

This summer, one side of the roof on our Church had to be reshingled, and both sides were painted with fire proof. The windows also were all painted in white, which has added much to the elegance of our little Church. The cost of these repairs was \$75, of which a generous member of the congregation contributed \$40.

BARFORD AND HEREFORD.

The Rev. Albert Stevens reports :---

The services at all the stations have been more largely attended this year than formerly and a greater uniformity in observing the rubrics with regard to kneeling and responding has been noticeable.

At Dixville our "unhappy divisions" work against us and in fact against all religious feeling. We must wait till the influence of God's Holy Spirit shall cause "all those who profess and call themselves Christians" to be

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led into the way of truth, before we can expect the Church of Christ to grow or to exercise the influence for good which it ought.

At St. Lawrence Church the average attendance during the summer is about 25 but in the winter not so large owing to the removal of Dr. Ward's family to Montreal.

At Stanhope my predictions of a year ago have been more than fulfilled. The Congregations have been larger and more regular than ever before. A flourishing Sunday School was held during the summer. Its success was in a great measure due to the perseverance of the Superintendent, Mr. Geo. Marston. To our great regret he has lately moved with his family to Boston.

The work at Hereford is yet discouraging, but on the whole the attendance has been more regular than last year.

Perryboro' still continues to be the bright st spot in the whole mission. There is a reverence and a warmth of feeling here which I would like to see infused into all our congregations.

In the early part of the summer I opened a new station at the Neill school house, situated between Dixville and Perryboro'. A Sunday School was organized with the names of forty scholars on the roll. The services, though held late in the evening as I am ou my way home from Hereford, have been well attended. Besides the Sunday services, I have a Litany service with short lecture during the week.

On the whole I consider the work in the Mission to be encouraging. With the exception of Dixville, there are now no religious services at any of the stations but those of the Church of England. The greatest difficulties to be met with are the indifference of the people to all religion, the perversity of the human heart, and the wiles of Satan. These are fees truly formidable, but they must give way before the gentle influences of the Holy Spirit.

Being lately appointed to the Mission of Hatley, I cannot leave without feelings of sorrow. During nearly seven years of residence here, I have met with nothing but kindness from all, of whatever age, sex or creed. I trust and pray that God's blessing may rest upon the work here, and ma abunda Bapti riages Our Chun dren's Sunday and oth

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and make every effort for the building up of His Church abundantly fruitful.

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st , The Church services have been held without intermission, during the year, at St. Bartholonew's Church, Bourg Louis, and during the summer months at Pont Ronge. It is gratifying to note that nearly all the people are habitual attendants at public worship. One noteworthy feature of all our services deserves special notice,—the large number of men who congregate, and their earnest, reverent behaviour. The responding is good, and the singing, which is congregational, is not only vigorons and herrty, but at the same time musicel. I attribute much of their good will toward me, and their constant attendance at Divine Service, to parish visiting, and looking after the sick and aged.

It is my painful duty to record the death of Mrs. Aylwin, late owner of the Western half of the Seigniory of Bourg Louis, who has ever taken a warm interest in Church matters, and been ready at all times to encourage Church work here, not only by her countenance and advice, but also by substantial, pecuniary assistance. St. Bartholomew's Church was built forty years ago by her mother, by whom "God's acre" was also given to the Church, together with the glebe, which consists of one hundred acres. Her last gift was a legacy of fourteen bundred dollars, the interest of which was to be applied, by the terms of her will, to augment the stipend of the Incumbent. This kind lady will long be remembered by her tenants in Bourg Louis.

Besides Mrs. Aylwin's generous legacy, I have to thank Miss Gugy for a beautiful lace chalice veil, and Mr. and

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Mrs. Ogden and Mr. Simpson for a second stove for the Church, which is thus rendered comfortable in the coldest winter days; a pleasing contrast to our former experience, as many besides myself can testify. The parishioners have not only succeeded in paying their Church assessment and the other necessary expenses, but they have been enabled to put by twenty dollars into the bank as a small beginning towards an endowment. They have also undertaken, without being prompted by me, to build in the spring a barn and stable to replace those burnt during the present winter.

BROMPTON AND WINDSOR.

The Rev. C. B. Washer writes :--

Brompton.—There is steady progress here. The Bishop visited this station in June, and confirmed lifteen persons, four of whom were from Windsor. The number was small, but not so the importance. It was extremely gratifying to know that several of the candidater were from communities that in the past wandered from Mother Church. Thank God, this little has been done to repair the breach made in the brotherhood by Satan. The number on our communicant list is thirty-one. Had it not been for removals and relapses, we might have reported forty-two. When we remember that four years ago there were only eight communicants, it will be seen that progress has been made. I wish I could report that *all* on my list are *frequent* commun no doub that ere ing as o may als Table w after ho

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communicants. The infrequency is in some instances due, no doubt, to early and wrong impressions. Let us hope that ere long the duty and great advantage of communicating as often as opportunity offers will be recognised. We may also express a hope that those who come to the Holy Table will give greater and greater diligence in their effort after holiness.

Windsor.—Here, to the usual observer, the work is not making much advance; but the leaven is quietly operating. We have been going on unostentationsly, with no stir of socials, tea-meetings, or concerts. We found, four years ago, the Church building account not fully paid, and a mortgage on the Church land. There is now no debt anywhere in the Mission. We have recently built a new foundation under the Church, with a balance in hand after paying the cost. The structure sadly wants painting; this would have been done this fall, had it not been for circumstances over which I had no control. I must confess that my spirit has often been weighed down by the indifference of many, and the inconsistent lives of others. But the Lord's work is going on, and will go on, and herein do we rejoice. I record the addition of five new communicants to the list, on which there are now twenty-six names. In this place also, my people need to learn more the benefit of frequent communions. We have, however, to "wait on the Lord, he of good courage," pray and strive for more growth in grace. God's hand is visible, and the venture of faith even now is well rewarded.

I may report also that there are no arrears in our Diocesan Board assessment of the two stations.

In retiring from this Mission, I would express my thanks for the kindness I have received during my tenure of it; and I would ask the members to remember me in their pravers, when I am in my new sphere of labour.

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CAPE COVE.

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The Rev. Wm. Gore Lyster reports :---

With the exception of a welcome visit from our Bishop in August, when twenty-live young persons were confirmed here and five at Percé, little worth noticing has occurred in the Mission since my last report.

The Bishop was kind enough to express his approbation of the handsome appearance of the interior of our new Church, the walls and roof being ceiled with spruce and fir, stained and varnished, and shewing the grain of the wood to great advantage.

Within the year, five members of the Congregation have been removed by death. Among these was our loved and respected teacher, Emma Beck, who left us on the first day of the year. She had been ill for some time, and had borne her weakness and sufferings in a spirit of resignation and even of cheerfulness; and when at last the Master's call was heard, it fell upon no unwilling ear.

Captain Joseph Cass also died after a lingering illness, in which he displayed much fortitude. He left a widow and a large family to mourn his loss.

We also lost Captain John Baker, one of our oldest and most respected members. He had been for many years a Church Warden, and his place in the House of God was seldom vacant until age and infirmities forbade his attendance. He was one of the pioneers of this long-settled but rather unprogressive place, and was full of reminiscences of old times, when the Judge used to make his visits in an open boat, and when a journey from Cape Cove to Pereć occupied a day, as horses were unknown, and a track partly through the woods and partly along the sea-shore was the only road.

I am sorry to report that financial depression continues, and as a natural consequence our Congregation has been much weakened of late. Seven families have either left or have been broken up by the removal of the fathers and other members to the United States, to look for employment; and at least a dozen young men and women have also gone from us.

Some of these will probably return ; but it is to be fear-

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I can all the number ing we apprece of Can The bers; the M ed that unless times improve a still larger number will desert us next year.

There is no remunerative employment to be obtained here in winter.

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With the exception of Messrs. King's lumbering establishment at Pabos, there is nothing in the shape of a factory giving winter work in this county, and the little earned by lishing in summer, is insufficient to support a family during the long winter. Then, there is no market such as would encourage agriculture; for no one pays cash for produce: fish alone commands money.

The depressed condition of the county arises, partly perhaps, from the evil system of advances and barter which has prevailed, I suppose, since it was first settled.

In part also, from the comparative neglect of farming: and in a great measure from the want of remunerative employment in winter.

In all these matters a change is sadly needed, unless the population is fated to emigrate to some more favoured country. Many hundreds of Roman Catholics, French and Irish, have left the coast within the past two years, and many more are preparing to follow. Indeed I have heard it said of a certain part of this county, "there are none but the old people left."

To a stranger the poverty of the coast seems inexplicable. The soil is generally fertile. Crops are easily raised and are of excellent quality. The sea swarms with valuable fish; and the climate is bracing and healthy, neither so cold in winter, nor so hot in summer, as in the neighbourhood of Montreal or Quebec: and yet, with all these advantages, the people are mostly poor and in debt, and the country is notoriously unprogressive.

I cannot too strongly draw your attention to the fact that all the Missions in the County of Gaspé, both as to the numbers and means of their members, are actually growing weaker, as the county does not seem to share in any appreciable degree, in the increasing prosperity of the rest of Canada.

The Congregation of Percé has also lost some of its members; and the firm of C. Robin & Co., which not only aids the Mission liberally, but also helps to fill the Church, has of late greatly reduced its staff of employees. The decorations of the little Church were most tastefully arranged last Christmas and were worthy of all commendation.

COATICOOK.

The Rev. J. Foster reports :---

In the early spring a special Vestry meeting was called for the purpose of taking into consideration the necessity for enlarging St. Stephen's Church. A subscription was opened at the meeting, and in a few days (thanks to the energy of the Church Wardens) over five hundred dollars was subscribed towards that object. The work was commenced immediately, and finished early in September By the enlargement we have gained about one hundred sittings The spire which was blown off three years ago was replaced, and the Church newly shingled and painted. A furnace was also placed in the basement, the whole costing about nine hundred dollars.

Divine service has been regularly kept up in the two Churches of the Mission on every Lord's day, two at St. Stephen's and one at Christ Church. The Rev. A. Balfour kindly assists me at the services in St. Stephen's. There are two Sunday Schools, in both of which I teach a Bible class. The congregation of St. Stephen's is much larger since the enlargement. There is also a small increase in the attendance at Christ Church, though the congregation there is very small.

The Bishop of the Diocese held a confirmation in St. Stephen's Church in June last, when a large class was present class th were ca Paro Owin Society] regre Church accordi during to be 1 The A few are dil and th memb service On t done d God at I ap Bap Asso &c., 4 Domes Bisho aud g Schoo

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presented for the Apostolic rite; all the members of this class then partook of the Holy Communion, for which they were carefully prepared.

Parochial visiting has been kept up as usual.

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Owing to the withdrawal of the grants from the Church Society, and the Colonial and Continental Church Society, I regret to say we found it impossible to carry on our Church school beyond the end of June last. It was accordingly closed on that day, having done a blessed work during the past fifteen years, for which I shall never cease to be most thankful.

The Beet-root sugar factory is now in successful operation. A few of the employees are members of the Church, and are diligently looked after by me; Mr. Lorne and his son, and three of the officers of the company, though not members of the Church, have rented a pew and attend the services occasionally.

On the whole, on taking a careful retrospect of the work done during the current year, I have every reason to thank God and to take courage.

I append the usual statistics:

DANVILLE, TROUTBROOK AND LORNE.

The Rev. II, J. Petry reports :---

First, as to Shipton. The regular services have been rendered to the congregation of St. Augustine's Church, Danville, during the past year, without a break. The attendance, on the whole, is good, considering the distances which most of my people have to travel, there not being more than half-a-dozen Church families residing in the village of Danville.

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A good deal of my time is taken up in confirmation yisiting. As soon as one confirmation is over, I begin to east round for candidates towards another. Picking up and preparing them is almost a twelve months' work, for it must be remembered that, owing to the distances they live from each other, and from the Church, the candidates have to be visited personally at their own houses. I intended to have had a confirmation before the expiration of this year (1881), but some of my most distant candidates are not yet sufficiently prepared. Its a matter 1 do not like to hurry through. The difficulty of properly preparing persons who cannot read, cannot commit a line to memory. who may be elderly-married people, their time constantly occupied with domestic and farm work, who possibly cannot get to Church once a month, can only be appreciated by those engaged in the undertaking.

The singing and responding are very good. It does occur in our congregation, as in others, that some keep silent who should almost be leaders, but we do not complain, though we often, and that publicly, urge the peopleto their duty in these particulars.

Marriages, baptisms and burials are, with rare exceptions, performed in the Church. With regard to the first, 1 make *no exception*.

A scheme has been set on foot to complete St. Augustine's Church. Ira E. Doving, Esq., now of New York City, but formerly one of my Parishioners, offered five hundred dollars towards the Finishing Fund, provided we raised a similar amount. A subscription list was immediately started, and \$182 were subscribed by members of the congregation. A Promenade Concert brought in \$66, while the proceeds of a Social, held some years ago, amounting to \$64. were added to the fund. Local friends, non-members of the Church, generously contributed \$102. Mr. Doving's noble little son, Arthur, gathered up \$295 from his friends in New York. No appeal, as yet, has been made to Quebec, though sixteen dollars, unsolicited, have reached us from that city, ten of which were given by the founder of this Mission, the Rev. M. M. Fothergill. A hundred dollars from the Incumbent brings up a grand total of thirteen hundred and twenty-five dollars (\$1,325) The work to be

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accomplished is placing a furnace in the basement, relathing and plastering the whole of the interior, replacing the wood work with brown ash, new roof and handsome spire, the whole to be finished by the 1st of next August or September.

I mentioned in my last report, that Mr. Doying contributed one hundred dollars towards Lorne Church, Troutbrook. There are families in this settlement living twelve and thirteen miles from my stable door. The Church itself is about nine miles distant; and at times the roads are very bad. I allow neither weather nor roads to interfere with my appointments. On eleven occasions, last winter, I had to hire a carter to drive me in. I would not venture with my own horse.

Searlet fever broke out in this settlement about the Advent season, with peculiar virulence, spreading from house to house, carrying off the little ones in twenty-four or thirtysix hours. I buried eleven children in the course of five weeks. The population, to a certain extent, is very floating. There is a good deal of going backwards and forwards, to and from the States; the young men gravitate towards Vermont, where they find remunerative employment in the Ely Copper Mines. Even heads of families have been attracted there, working steadily, saving money and then returning after a period, with funds sufficient to pay off debts on the land, and build a new house, etc., etc.

The farming population seem to be doing well all round. They get good prices, *in cash*, for most articles. The old fashioned style of doing business, bartering produce for store goods, seems on the wane.

Lorne.—This Mission is expected to be opened very shortly. The inability of the Church Society to extend its grant of one hundred dollars, brought matters to an abrupt check. At the present writing, we require prayer desk, pulpit, altar table and rails, service books, a font, painting within and without.

Thanks are due to Mrs. Williams, for two frontlets or hangings, suitable for desk and pulpit, also for an altar cloth, all very handsome; to the Rev. Charles Hamilton, for a complete sett of altar linen; to the ladies of St. Matthew's guild, for a surplice; to a lady friend, for a fine

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handsome bible. The Lorne people have promised to put up a commodious shed as soon as there is sufficient snow in the woods to cut and haul the lumber.

Should I be spared to write a report for the year 1882, I trust to be able to say something interesting and satisfactory anent this new Mission. On this occasion, I may simply state that it has to be built up from the very foundations. To this important work, full justice cannot be rendered by the Incumbent, who has already on his hands the pastoral charge of the two large Missions of Shipton and Troutbrook. The necessity of dividing this Mission grows more pressing each year.

According to the registers, there have been 2 marriages, 20 baptisms and 19 burials.

I conclude by appending the financial statement.

DRUMMONDVILLE.

The rector (Rev. F. J. B. Alnatt) has to report a condition of unbroken harmony and pleasant relations between his flock and himself.

The regular services have been continued as usual, namely, twice each Sunday, in the Parish Church, and on every Friday evening; also, afternoon services at two outstations on alternate Sundays. The special services, together with the classes and Sunday Schools have, generally speak-

ing, followed the same order as has been observed for the last two years. The general results have been not less satisfactory than in former years.

The Bishop was here on Sunday, 19th June, and confirmed ten candidates.

As a point of special (and to some extent novel) interest in the year's work, varying the quiet tenor of its even course, it may be worth while to say a few words about The object aimed at by its the Missionary meeting. conductors was the ascertaining, by exteriment, whether the usual objection to hold such gathe in the Parish Church might not be satisfactorily obversed by combining the Missionary meeting with a short service, and by attempting to sustain the life and interest of the meeting without sacrificing the solemnity due to the subject in hand, or resorting to the introduction of the comic element, too often considered necessary to relieve the monotony. The service was very short, and in great part choral, the Psalms and Lessons being chosen as suitable to the occasion. There was no Chairman, nor introductions, nor apologies or personal platitudes. The speakers, who were in surplices. stood forth each in his order, and said their say with the feeling that their success depended on the intrinsic interest of their subject, and their power to communicate that interest to the hearers. The result was satisfactory beyond expectation, as partly attested by the amount of the collection, the largest, it is believed, ever taken up in the Parish.

During the incumbent's absence on a visit of somewhat over three months to his English home, the work of the Mission was carried on in the most satisfactory manner by Mr. Arthur Judge, B.A., and after his departure by Mr. Woods, another student of Bishop's College. The Parish was also indebted to the kindness of the Rev. Messrs. Wurtele, Harding and Thompson, for visits from time to time for the purpose of celebrating the Holy Communion, both in public and private.

Baptisms (all infant) 10, marriages 1, burials 6.

The diminished amount of total contributions as compared with last year, is to be attributed to the special effort then made towards building the Parsonage. Deducting the amounts raised for this latter purpose, a slight increase,

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\$18.63, will be observed in the contributions of the present year. I have to call attention to a mis-print in the published report. The figures against the item "Contributions to Parsonage" should have been \$169.31.

Church Society, \$19.77; assessment, \$350.00; Domestic Missions, \$4.70; Missionary meetings, \$19.00; insurance and other purposes, \$59.43; Easter offering, \$9.00. Total, \$461.90.

DUDSWELL.

The Rev. T. S. Chapman reports:---

My three services, with the exception of two Sundays on account of illness, have been continued with regularity throughout the year. Until October, St. Panl's, Marbleton, had morning and evening services, and the Good Shepherd an afternoon one—since which time, at the Bishop's request, I have given a service every Sunday to the congregation of St. Thomas, Westbury, alternating between afternoon and evening with the Church of the Good Shepherd.

As age is creeping on, and my life has been one of exhaustive labor, and my general health a good deal impaired, I hope to be relieved as soon as may be, of the long and late drives caused by the addition of Westbury, which is no part of my Mission proper. I trust that before long this congregation, with Ascot Corner and Sandhill, will be erected into an independent Mission, needing as they do, more pastoral oversight than they can well receive either from Bishop's College or from here.

Church attendance has, upon the whole, been encouraging. My three Sunday Schools have suffered from my attention having been taken up so much with other work. The Church Model School is working well under Miss Brown, a lady of considerable experience in school and parish work, and a graduate of the Normal School. The attendance during the winter promises to be a large average. We have two practical difficulties to contend with in keeping up numbers and a good standard of work: One is the smallness of the population within school-going distance, and that diluted by a French element; the other, the cos board a cheaply bring t intende more th of the accordi only b only of abound with th Provim We

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Th Th tions year, last r ment to rec So: wint the cost to our farming population of paying a pupils' board away from home—what very few are able to do. A cheaply constructed boarding house, where pupils could bring their bedding and board and live under the superintendence of the master or mistress (costing but a trifle more than when under the parental roof) is the only solution of the educational problem that I can see; otherwise, according to the plan of the Protestant Board, there can only be the survival, I would not say of the fittest, but only of those institutions where both population and wealth abound, and the country generally will have to put up with the wretched and ill paid elementary schools of the Province.

We had two Xmas trees, upon which the incumbent and his family were remembered by various parishioners in useful articles to the amount of \$40. Another tree has yet to be set up in another part of the Mission, which I hope will be very fruitful also. We are a trifle behind in the assessment of the year 1881, but will shortly eatch up.

The assessment of 1882 looks formidable, and will hardly prove beneficial, even if it can be collected, which I think is doubtful in this, and many other cases; however, here as elsewhere, history will make itself.

DURHAM.

The Rev. G. T. Harding reports :---

The usual services in our three Churches, with celebrations of Holy Communion, were continued, during the past year, in the same order and regularity as set forth in my last report. I cannot say that there has been any improvement in the average attendance; though I am not obliged to record a falling off.

Some extra services, on week nights, were held, last winter, at a school house near Lisgar Station, which may

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With regard to temporalities, there is much that is encouraging to record. In South Durham, an old debt which has been hanging over us for some years, and which, last year, was reduced to \$96, was this year completely removed. In addition to this, some repairs were put upon the Church. The chimneys, which were breaking away at the top, and had always caused us a good deal of trouble by not drawing properly, were pulled down, and rebuilt from the ground in such a way as will probably prevent their causing any further inconvenience. A part also of the brick casing of the end wall, and one of the butments. which threatened to fall from a defect in the foundation, were rebuilt and made secure. In all, the cost will be something over \$100, but as something still remains to be done in the spring, and the amount necessary to defray the expense has to be raised during next year, I have not noticed the matter in my financial statement.

In L'Avenir, an old debt against the Church was this year reduced by \$32.50, and in another year we hope to have it entirely removed.

In Upper Durham, an extra effort was made, and f am thankful to say with complete success, to remove the debt upon the Parsonage. By the exertions of several members who undertook the work of collecting, especially to Mr. W. H. Lyster, whose name is worthy of particular mention here, the debt was reduced by subscriptions from different parts of the Mission, from \$469.20 to about \$230, and then, five of those who had given the largest sums, in the first instance, to start the work of building the Parsonage, and who had made themselves liable for the debt, agreed to divide names as foll Lyster,

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divide the balance, in due proportion, among them. Their names ought also, I think, to be recorded, and I give them as follows: Solomon Lyster, C. N. Lyster, Albert Lyster, Wm. Stevens and Wm. Burrill.

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It is a matter of especial gratitude to Almighty God, that, notwithstanding the extra amount raised this year for local purposes, as set forth above, there has been no diminution in that given to outside objects. It is true that in Upper Durham the sum thus offered is less by \$4 than was given last year; yet, in L'Avenir, and in South Durham, it is larger by about \$22: so that, in reality, there is an increase of about \$17 in the total amount sent out of the Mission for the various objects of your Society.

Six Mission eards are used in collecting for this branch of our work, and the sums collected, through their means, are as follows: Mrs. Arthur Mountain, \$13.25; Miss Ginn, \$12.50; Miss McDougall, \$10.15; Miss Doyle, \$8.50; Miss McCrea, \$8.00; Ellen McDougall, \$4.75. The last mentioned is quite a young girl, who regularly collects for the "Wawanosh Home," in Algoma. It will always be a pleasure, I am sure, for your Society to know that the little ones of Christ's flock are learning diligence in gathering up the small coins for His service.

In a confirmation held in South Durham last June, 11 persons received the Rite, and I have to record, for the year ending 30th November, 12 baptisms, 15 funerals and 7 marriages.

EAST FRAMPTON.

The Rev. F. Boyle reports:---

There are two congregations in this Mission, Standon and Hemison. Will treat of the former first: The members of this congregation last summer put up a good substantial fence round the greater part of the Church property in that place; costing about forty dollars, and they also partly built anew an old abandoned School House, and converted it into a suitable Church stable at a cost of about twenty dollars. No man now in this mission can, as we too often hear, give as an excuse for neglecting the services in God's House, "it is too cold to leave my horse standing out," for we have now two good stables, one at each church, quite equal in accommodations to the requirements of the Mission in that line.

At Hemison we have had double windows for the Parsonage; cost of which seven dollars. And we have done this year about twenty dollars worth of improvements on the glebe. Besides which, Mr. Edward Smyth, of Crapodier, has made over to the Church Society a half-acre lot of land on the front of his farm as a site for a School House, on which we have a building for that purpose pretty well advanced. Worth in all at present thirty dollars.

The services have been regularly kept up in both the churches. The attendance has been good at both stations, especially in summer, but in winter there is, of necessity, a great falling off in the congregations; as nearly all the young people, both men and maideus, are compelled to leave here for the winter and seek amployment elsewhere, where they can earn something; for here there is nothing at all doing at this season. This is discouraging, but, if we have our little downs in Missionary life, we frequently have too our corresponding ups, and I may here say that nothing pleased me more than the readiness with which both my congregations responded to the demand of the board requiring an increased assessment. The amount, and more than the amount demanded, was subscribed in a few days; and part of next year's additional assessments paid in. My hands would be idle indeed, if they were to hang down, with such proofs of spiritual manifestations among my people.

Our two schools are doing well, taught by the Misses Penney and Bartholomew. Again I must thank the Church and and C. & C. C. S. for their munificent and timely aid to our schools.

GASPÉ BASIN.

The Rev. J. P. Richmond reports :---

That several of the young men have left and many others think of leaving the coast as soon as they can save the means. This state of things has been brought about in my Mission by the failure of the salmon fishery, entailing a loss of at least ten thousand dollars a year; and the failure of winter work, the supply of boards, fish tubs and firewood required by the merchants being very little when divided among the population. The Mission of Peninsula and Little Gaspé is likewise suffering from the failure of salmon and mackerel fisheries, and less than an average catch of codfish. In spite of all these drawbacks to their prosperity, the people have struggled hard to meet their engagements with the Diocesan Board.

St. Paul's Church.—This Church was used for Divine Service for the first time on the first Sunday in January last. I am very sorry that the congregation could not request the Bishop to consecrate the building last summer, owing to unpaid debt. The grant from the Church Society has been applied for but not yet received, and some subscriptions remain yet unpaid, the subscribers being unable to meet their promises owing to the failure of the salmon fishery. A new church-bell of over three hundred pounds weight has been added to the Church, chiefly through the liberality of C. Stimson, Esq., of Montreal, and other summer visitors. The new Church has cost nearly \$3,000, and there remains yet much to be done to furnish it decently. The attendance at the services has been good during the past year. On two or three occasions of special interest, e.q., the Confirmation and Christmas services, the Church has been quite full.

St. James' Church.—South-West Arm of Gaspé Bay. The causes of financial depression I have mentioned are very much felt by this congregation; many of the people have to leave the place during the summer and seek for temporary employment else where; some have left altogether, and unless there is a revival of lumbering, or some other industry springs up, the time is not far distant when the young men, the "bone and sinew" of the country, will be obliged to leave. Already, many of them are casting a longing eve toward Manitoba and the Lakes of Upper Canada. The attendance at Church has been average, and the churchyard has been in great part referced and cleared up, and is in more decent order than it has been for some years. Owing to the division of the Mission into separate parts by water, the people have a great number of schools to maintain, there being no less than five for the two congregations of St. Paul's and St. James. This entails a heavy l \$900, a does no Penia

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heavy burden upon the people, as they have to pay nearly \$900, and the combined "Government grant" to the schools does not amount to more than \$80.

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Peninsula.—The services have been held fortnightly with one intermission, and have been well attended. The Church is unfinished, the people poor and struggling h 1 for their livelihood. They would be much encouraged by the reception of a Church Society grant for which they have applied; also, by a grant of Service books for the Church. The people find it hard to pay church and school rates owing to the failure of salmon and mackerel fisheries, and yet have promised the increase asked for by the Diocesan Board.

Little Gaspé.—Regular monthly services have been held, and there has been an increased attendance at Church. The assessment has been regularly paid, and an effort has been made to decrease the debt on the Church, and necessary repairs have been made to the Church buildings, and more work will be done during the winter.

Under the present arrangement of the Diocesan Board, my charge of Peninsula and Little Gaspé ceases to-day, and is to be resumed henceforth by the Rev. Dr. Ker, of Sandy Beach.*

In the united Mission the number of baptisms, &c., during the year is as follows :---Baptisms 25, marriages 2, burials 18.

The great increase in the number of deaths during the past year is due to the prevalence of scarlet fever and diphtheria during the past winter.

During the past year the Lord Bishop visited this Mission and confirmed, in the Mission of Gaspé Basin, forty-four young persons; and at Peninsula six persons, making in all. lifty candidates. The Bishop also went to Little Gaspé and encouraged the people to endeavor to lessen the debt on their Church, with the following effect: Mr. Robert Price, Church Warden, collected in Quebec \$74; and the people, by a tea meeting and small bazaar, collected \$54, so that the debt has been reduced \$50, and some very necessary work will be done to secure the building.

HATLEY.

Rev. A. J. Balfour reports :---

It is with mingled feelings of joy and sadness that I present this, my tenth annual report. Of joy, in being able, as I am, to testify to a growing reverence and attention to the ordinance of religion throughout the Parish. The number of communicants has increased both at St. James and St. John's: as also very materially, the offerings of the people towards the support of the gospel. As an indication of prosperity and of a right spirit I may, by the way, mention that the quarter's assessment due a month hence has already been forwarded to Quebee by both congregations. I am happy also to say that when called upon to increase their assessments by \$100, the papers were signed on behalf of each congregation and returned without any delay. Nor can I omit to bear grateful testimony to the kind and cheerful manner in which my appeal for a parsonage was responded to; the people's only wish seeming to be that, as regards architecture, warmth and convenience, &c., I should construct it entirely to please myself, within reasonable expense. With little delay \$1,000 was raised, almost wholly within the Mission, and a willingness expressed to become responsible for \$600 or \$800 more. As a re Parson \$1,100 the ter by no that a I ha ing Se been 1 promi books. usual, \$10, n ful op therin they l latter of St. tribut ing la ance there But t if the unive has d be pa prom I n John sive] maki years at the and c of my cher, an aj \mathbf{Th} ness, everl ing f As a result we have, well nigh ready for occupation, a Parsonage surpassed by few in the Diocese, upon which \$1,100 is already paid and a debt of \$700 hangs. Most of the tenders for its construction exceeded \$2,500; and it is by no competent judge thought now to be worth less than that amount or actually to have cost less.

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I have during the past year kept up my Sunday Evening Service at Massawippi. Two Sunday Schools have been maintained; that at St. John's, Waterville, with much promise. \$10 having been raised here (St. John's) for S.S. books. Mr. Robert Hamilton, in response to an appeal, as usual, most kindly came to the children's aid with another \$10, much to their delight. A ladies' guild is in successful operation in connection with this congregation furthering by its handiwork many deserving objects. Already they have added two chandeliers and an altar cloth. The latter article, beautifully wrought, was made by the ladies of St. Matthew's guild, and \$9 towards the purchase contributed by ladies in Quebec, \$5 by Mrs. Williams. During last winter and spring, with the kind and able assistance of Mr. Mayo, I held a monthly Missionary Meeting, thereby endeavouring to awaken a true Catholic spirit. But to-day my connection with this Mission ceases. And if the thought of parting from a people who have been so universally kind, and whose affection, though undeserved, has deepened with each year, makes me sad at heart, I may be pardoned—even though the change that awaits me be a promotion and the call very complementary to myself.

I may mention, as of interest, that my last service at St. John's, naturally solemn, was rendered the more impressive by the public baptisms of five adults and one child making sixty adults that I have baptized within a few years. On the following evening I was the recipient here, at the hands of my kind, good people, of a new harness and other tokens of regard, and subsequently, at the hands of my dear friends of Hatley, of a massive silver water pitcher, goblet, bowl and tray, chaste in design and bearing an appropriate inscription.

That God may guide them all in the paths of righteousness, and richly bless them in things belonging to their everlasting peace, will be the constant prayer of their loving friend and late pastor.

INVERNESS.

The Rev. P. Roe reports :---

The most noticable feature in the progress of this mission during the past year has been the erection of a Church at "Campbell's Corners," now nearly completed. It is built after a model, made by the Rev. T. S. Chapman, of his new Church at Dudswell Corner; recommended to us by our generous friend, Mr. Robert Hamilton, who is a large contributor to the building fund. Substantial help has been also received from the Lord Bishop and other friends in Quebec, to the amount of, about, \$200; a grant of £25 stg. has also been obtained for us by the Bishop from the Christian Knowledge Society. The entire cost of the building which is 54 x 25 feet, will be about \$1,250. The site, a convenient and valuable one of an acre, was generously given by Messrs, James and Joseph Henry, Presbyterians. It is hoped the Church will be ready for consecration about Easter.

The amount contributed on the spot by the people, so far, has been in the neighbourhood of \$500. This is not a very large amount, but shows some progress in the way of duty. 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The congregation at Campbell's Corner held a Xmas Festival, with a Christmas Tree, on St. Stephen's Day. As the new Church is as yet unfinished, and is not yet consecrated, I consented that the Festival should be held in it. About 250 persons were present, crowding the building. The Tree was brilliantly lighted up with wax tapers and loaded with gifts. The kindly feeling of the people to their pastor and his family was substantially shown in gifts placed upon the Tree for them. Singing and Readings followed, the principal readings were by Mrs. Reed, who delighted the audience by her charming style, and a pleasant address was delivered by the Rev. J. Kemp, of Leeds.

The usual services at St. Stephen's, Campbell's Corners, and Bécancour have been held uninterruptedly during the year, the congregations have, as a rule, been large, and the number of communicants slightly increasing.

The Sunday Schools at St. Stephen's and Campbell's Corners have been well attended; the former has largely increased in numbers during the year. An Infant Class undertaken by Miss Roe has drawn in many little ones, and has helped to attract their mothers also to church. Altogether I feel encouraged in respect to this important branch of my work.

In the month of September our annual Sunday School picnic was held on Graham's Hill, a lovely spot, commanding a fine view of the country around. A great gathering from all parts of the neighbourhood, to the number of about 300, came to it. The day was passed pleasantly in games, and in discussing the good things provided for the children. Our Church was beautifully decorated by many willing hands for Christmas, and the services were bright and joyous.

I append the usual statistics :--Baptisms 13, marriage 1, burials 6.

Assessments, \$250.00; Bishop's College, \$2.37; Foreign and Domestic Missions, \$8.58; Church Society, \$70.70; New Church, \$500; General Offertory, \$87.77; total, \$859.42.

IRELAND.

The Rev. Thos. L. Ball reports :---

I entered upon the year just closing with many misgivings. My own health and that of my wife did not promise any long continuation in the work carried on nearly ten years in this Mission. With permission of the Lord Bishop, and at the request of many of our friends, we spent six weeks in travel, going as far as Washington, the Capital of the United States, where a very flattering address was forwarded us from the three congregations in the Mission, to which I was unable to reply till my return. We found the relaxation of great advantage, and with the exception of making fewer visits, which deprives me of a good deal of pleasure, the work has gone steadily on.

At Upper Ireland, one of our school boys has returned to us after a four years absence, two of which were spent at the Normal School and two in the house of another of our Missionaries who directed his studies. He is now engaged as teacher in the Parish School, and will, I trust, soon be licensed as a second Lay Reader. This will enable us to have service every Sunday in two of the Churches, and materially increase our forces in the schools.

At Lower Ireland, the necessity of restoring the Church, rapidly becoming unfit for use, is urgently pleaded. A successful tea-party was held during the summer, and \$55 added to the building fund started two years ago.

Adderley has lost more by removals than the other Churches, but shows some advance, though it has service but twice a month on Sunday.

The Rev. J. Boydell report :---

The events most worthy of notice that have transpired during the past year are :---The admission of thirteen persons to full Church membership by the rite of confirmation. The Baptism of two adults, the erection of the Church at Spooner Pond, which is now so far complete that we are

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able to use the building for divine service. This Church is free from debt, and promises to be in the future, as it is at present, the Church of the Mission. The situation being the most central, and the congregation the largest and most regular in the whole Mission. We are indebted to Mr. Wilcox of Richmond for a nice Harmonium and a large collection of Sunday School books, and to the Rev. G. H. Parker, for the promise of an Altar cloth, I am rejoiced to be able to state that the Mission has resolved to accede to the demands of the Diocesan Board, and raise the additional one hundred dollars required. This was not hurriedly or thoughtlessly done. The Mission was thoroughly canvassed by the Church-Wardens of the different Churches, and what was wanting after all subscriptions had been obtained was promised to be raised by the Church-Wardens, in proportion to their relative assessments.

Two well attended Sunday Schools are in active operation, one under the able and pains taking supervision of Miss Evans at Spooner Pond. The other under my own charge at St. Paul's, Sydenham Place. Since the erection of the Church at Spooner Pond, Divine Service has been celebrated every Sunday at the three Stations. As I am about to leave the Diocese I would wish to place on record my sense of gratitude towards the Diocesan Board and all its offleers, who in times of prosperity and adversity have uniformly acted in a spirit of brotherly kindness and consideration relieving (by their kindly mediation) the elergyman from a disastrons contact with his people in money matters, and leaving him free to teach and exhort concerning the duty of ministering to the necessities of the Saints.

LABRADOR.

The Rev. R. Wyndham Brown reports :---

Before the closing of navigation for some seven months, I hasten to send the Society a few words on Mission work 5

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at are here in Labrador. From the nature of the case, my account of the work must be brief, owing to the fact that scarcely three months have elapsed since I arrived on the coast. After a short and pleasant passage from Quebec, I landed at Natashquan towards the end of July. It was not without feelings of regret that I took leave of the Captain of the "Otter," at whose hands I experienced great kindness while on board. The dreary looking coast, with its endless cliffs and the stunted appearance of its vegetation. did not create in me a favorable impression of my future home; but further experience showed that my lot had been cast in "pleasant places" after all. The day after my arrival, Sunday, I held my first services at Natashquan, in one of the large rooms of Messrs. Robius & Co. Among the congregation I was pleased to find several of my brother's parishioners from Shigawake and Port Daniel. Here there was a disappointment in store for me. My pilot with the Church boat failed to meet me, and I found that I must make my way to Mutton Bay as I best could. Next day, however, I was lucky enough to get a passage to Casco in the schooner " Palma," chartered by Government, with the enumerators on board, engaged in taking the census of the coast. After a stay of five or six days in Casco (a small settlement with some eight families), I found no difficulty in securing a pilot to convey myself and belongings to Mutton Bay, which was reached on the 19th of August. During this journey, services were held daily at Casco, Washecootie, Cape Whittle or Wolfe Bay, Harrington Harbour and Whale Head. Nothing out of the ordinary appeared to mark this, my first visit of half the Mission. A kind welcome awaited the Missionary at each stopping place. Throughout the Church services were well attended, and were entered into by all with much earnestness. Despite the educational disadvantages under which the people of Labrador labour, both young and old are remarkably well informed, both in secular and religious things. This is a great encouragement and help to the Missionary, and is due in great measure to the patient and untiring efforts of my predecessors. Arrived at Mutton Bay I found it necessary to remain a short time to visit the people and look after my books, &c., which had suffered considerably from long exposure to the weather in an open boat.

On the 30th of August I proceeded to visit the Eastern part of the Mission, intending to go as far as Forteau, in the Diocese of Newfoundlaud. This I was prevented from doing owing to the severity of the weather; but by walking overland I was enabled to reach L'Anse-au-Clair, also in the Diocese of Newfoundland. Here a congregation of more than lifty persons assembled for the evening service, which was bright and hearty owing to the excellent singing and responding; and the young people at least, who had long been expecting the Missionary, were then made happy by my arrival. On the down and return journey the people were visited, and services held at the following Tabatière, St. Augustine. Thecatica, Baie-desplaces : Rochers, Lydia's Cove, Dog Island, Old Fort Island, Bonne Espérance, Salmon Bay, Blanc Sablons, and L'Anse-au-Clair. I returned to Mutton Bay on the 27th of September, after an absence of one month. On my arrival I found the people making preparations for moving into winter quarters, and was sorry to learn of the intended removal, from Schooner Bay, the winter headquarters of the Mission, of several families. This will reduce our numbers very low, and makes the prospect of a day-school there a very forlorn hope. Scarcity of fuel has compelled nearly all the families to leave Schooner Bay. As a consequence of this our services there will be poorly attended during the coming winter, and renders it necessary that our winter Mission house be removed elsewhere. On the 2nd of October one of the schooners from Quebec arrived, bringing with it Mr. Willis, the mails, and a large assortment of good things for the poor and for the Xmas tree. A hearty welcome was extended to all. With the exception of a few days my autumn's travelling has been done under very fine weather, and I have much to be thankful for. My health has been good, excepting an occasional twinge of neuralgia. I am thankful to say that a good year's fishing has been made on the coast, and that there will be no suffering or want. I have been informed, however, that towards the extreme east of the coast, in the Diocese of Newfoundland, the fishing has been a complete failure. Since my return from the east of the Mission, the services have been carried on as usual in Mutton Bay. There have been two celebrations

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of the Holy Communion; these of course do not include those held during my absence, and communions of the sick. Mr. Willis returned this week from Salmon Bay, having made arrangements for carrying on a school there during the winter. He will have the use of the school house, and the attendance will be good. It would be useless for him to stay in Schooner Bay, where there will not be half a dozen children. I am sorry we have to be separated. I hope to carry on a small day-school during the winter myself, at Schooner Bay. This of course will have to be closed while absent on my winter visit of the coast.

The quantities of warm and useful clothing sent in such profusion will be a great blessing to the poor of the coast; they ought, I am sure, to be very grateful to Mrs. Williams and other kind friends. For a very handsome woollen undercoat for myself and some substantial articles of clothing. For the Xmas tree, my that is are due to the ladies of the St. Matthew's Church Guild, Quebec. Many kind friends have remembered us by sending books, papers and clothing. I expect to gratify the "little ones" with a Xmas tree, laden with many good things, for which my thanks are due to friends of the Mission in Quebec.

The cold weather has set in, and there are indications of a very severe winter. I fear that this year we are to be deprived of a winter mail, but I hope for the best. It would be hard to hear nothing from the outside world during our long winter.

LEEDS.

The Rev. John Kemp reports :---

The services have been held in the several Churches and Stations as usual, with about the ordinary attendance, save for the past three months, when scarlet fever broke out at both ends of the Mission in some of our most constant Church-going families, which not only prevented families so visited from attending church, but, frightened away others also, lest the infection might touch them. One of my young candidates for confirmation and his sister, children of Mr. R. S. Marshall, of Leeds Village, wes taken away. 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er, ten onThe congregations were very good at the several churches where confirmations were held. His Lordship also preached at H. H. Mines. On our way back from Broughton to Leeds we were hospitably entertained at dinner by Mr. A. Martin, when we met two of the Directors of the new company, which is about to re-open the Mines.

A. Leeds, and at the Mills, a Sunday School is kept up during the summer months, with a very good attendance. There are at each place between thirty and forty scholars on the books; the average attendance has been about 25 in each school. Mr. George Bayne still superintends the Leeds Sunday School, assisted by Mrs. Siggans, Miss Marshall (our Organist), and Miss James I generally take part when I have morning service in the same church. Mr. William McVitty superintends the Sunday School at the Mills, assisted by Miss C. Duffett, and part of the time by Mr. John Duffett. I regret to add that Mr. McVitty also lost a daughter by scarlet fever.

I find myself getting rather old for such an extensive mission; though I do all the public work in the way of services, &c., that has ever been done by any of my predecessors, I am not able to do as much in visiting my people as a younger man could, but the people are considerate and make all due allowance.

I have taken the Church Society list round Leeds and neighbourhood this year, and the result is fully as good as I expected. The Collectors at the Mills were prevented from doing all they would have done by the fever breaking out in two out of three of their families. The increase of the assessment for next year, though not much, still makes the people more slow to contribute to outside objects. I have, however, done my best, and the result is—thirty-five dollars and seventy cents, in addition to \$10.50 for Foreign and Domestic Missions. Total for church purposes, \$460.

MAGDALEN ISLANDS.

The Rev. J. Chambers reports :---

We have passed a winter of unusual length, not marked by any great degree of frost, but by heavy and repeated falls of snow, which is a point to be noticed in mission work here, because it has made travelling difficult and tedious.

As usual all the islands have been visited as regularly as possible, with the exception of Bryon Island, this is in consequence of its isolated position, and the current running rapidly between it and Grosse Isle, prevents anything like an ice-bridge forming. The distance from island to island being ten miles.

Gross Isle is twenty miles from Grindstone Island, and the journey takes the whole of the day to accomplish, if there is much snow. However, this island has been visited frequently and regularly and the work carried on as usual. Here the people attend Divine Service well, travelling distances of from three to five miles for the purpose of worshipping God in public.

Grindstone Island has had the advantage of a good schoolmaster. Mr. Harvey Clarke, jr., who has done his work well and to the satisfaction of all. During my absence he has conducted Sunday School, thus supplying a great need.

Our deepest thanks are due to H. S. Scott, Esq., Quebee, who has kindly obtained twenty dollars (\$20) for school purposes, with a promise of twenty more at the termination of the scholastic year.

Amherst Island has been visited as usual. Here there are but five Protestant families all of which have been visited. One of these has but recently settled here from Prince Edward Island, the husband being a Methodist, and the wife a Presbyterian. They have always received me with marked attention, and on my last visit requested me to baptize their three children as they had not previously received the rite.

A good opportunity offered for visiting Entry Island, as the ice-bridge formed early.

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The Temperance Society still continues to hold its ground. Lately it has not added many to its ranks; this is owing to its having already embraced all the elder inhabitants of this island, with the exception of the veteran drinkers who still prefer the way of death.

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Travelling is much more difficult here for a missionary than for any other person, on account of having to meet engagements, *i. e.*, to be at an island at a given time, and thus have to force through all kinds of weather. And although the exposure on these bleak frozen bays is great, yet, it seems to me far less troublesome than that of the Fall of the year when boating in bad weather. I will give an example:—

I was returning from Gross Isle late last Fall, a strong fair wind was blowing, and with reefed sails the boat went along at a splendid rate until arriving at what is called "The Narrows," really a mass of sand banks, with a winding channel running through them, and a person must be a good pilot to avoid running aground continually. Unfortunately, I started late and arrived at this place just before sunset, and, as I could not see the channel distinctly, I had the misfortune of running the boat aground. Nothing remained now but to get overboard and try to heave the boat off, for one dare not lighten the boat by throwing away ballast, as fully six miles of deep water had to be accomplished after getting clear of these shoals.

At this season of the year the water is very cold, and as it took fully an hour to get the boat into deep water again, I was much chilled.

Darkness had now set in and with it rain and an increase of wind, which hauled right ahead and compelled me to anchor for the night. And such a night of misery is not easily explained here, suffice it to say that this and similar experiences of frequent occurrence are fruitful sources of sharp attacks of rheumatism.*

MAGOG AND GEORGEVILLE.

The Rev. J. Hepburn reports :---

In carrying on the work of this Mission disappointment has been mingled with encouragement; yet I cannot but say that when all things are put together, there is much more reason for hope than despondency. If my judgment is good, there has been improvement in both centres of work, that is in the villages of Magog and Georgeville; and for several months past I have been greatly cheered by the renewed interest manifested in the outstations, now increased to six.

I do not claim that there is a wonderful improvement anywhere; difficulties and trials of frequent recurrence keep me from saying so. I am glad however to think, I discern progress, if it be but slow. My people as a people, appreciate more highly the distinctive teaching of the Church; their attachment to her ordinances is deepening; many of them have told me of the power over them of the Book of **Common Prayer.** In consequence of this there is greater heartiness of worship. It troubled me sorely that our responses were generally so weak; and it was hard to understand how those whom I knew to be devout, expressed so little audibly in the course of divine worship. We who have 1 mm reared in the Church are not prepared to appreciate ti greatness of the change from ordinary extempore worship to our own. Those who have sat year after year and *listened* to what was said, supposing that was all that was necessary in regular worship, find it a wholly new thing to arise, and sing and pray with spirit in the presence of others; and they are startled at the sound of their own voices, as is the youth, who for the first time rises to speak before an audience and more than this, it takes some time to shake off the feeling that they are *taking* too much upon them.

Here the difficulty has been keenly felt, where the principal part of the congregation has been won to the Church. In the outstations I have laboured on in hope against this difficulty of responding, having often only one or two faint voices to accompany me, and this notwithstanding all the exhortations I have given from time to time. Young able sin is a con ing hyn very ho that if to God reveren *knec*.

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Young men seem almost afraid of committing an unpardonable sin, if they venture to pray aloud in the congregation. It is a comfort that they have not the same scruples about singing hymns. Frequently where I can get little response I have very hearty singing. In a quiet way I have told them that if they have no hesitation in singing prayers and praises to God from their hymn books, they should have none in reverently saying them from their prayer books on bended knee.

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I am very thankful to say that in all these stations I now have a certain number who are deeply in earnest, and are coming surely into the Church, valuing her offices more than any other, attending the services on week-day evenings as regularly as if they were held on Sunday.

Out of a possible 45 or 50 seldom less than 20 attend; and this where three years ago there was not one person who belonged to the Church, or had any regard for her,—she being commonly supposed a very formal and corrupt Church, first cousin to the Church of Rome.

One fruit of the work is to be seen in the baptism of children. To that all were strongly opposed: it had been preached as a "vain thing" &c., &c.

I have lectured *freely* upon the subject, and called very special attention to it as an "ordinance of God," and therefore of the utmost importance. Yes I went so far as to advertise two Lectures upon it some time ago in an Adventist Settlement (although I am strongly opposed to advertising generally) and secured a crowded house, among whom appeared the Elder and Deacon; and they gave me a very *patient hearing*. I offered then and there the privilege of asking any questions they saw fit before we parted, but none were volunteered. This could not have been done a year ago without stirring up a tempest. Another healthy sign is, that when the assessment upon the Mission was increased, I mentioned it to them and instantly they agreed to contribute, one congregation (the oldest) giving \$17. Magog had already, at the Easter meeting, volunteered \$50 extra, so that we have met the call upon us by the Board, without any trouble.

All will understand that fortnightly services in each of these six stations, besides those given in the Churches, accompanied by the necessary visits, make a large demand upon time. At one time I had monthly appointments, but found that the interest flagged between them, so the only thing to do was to double them. This often interferes with the observance of Saints days in the Churches; yet I think the object of the Church may be attained by auticipating or postponing them, venturing herein to express an opinion adverse to one of such great authority as the late Dean Hook.

If I speak of disappointments, I must instance the poor attendance at the Lenten and Advent services. The weather may be pleaded; also prevailing sickness; but making all due allowance, great fault is to be found. By special week-day services in the Churches, I have not been much encouraged; glad, however, that there is generally a fair representation of the young. Then again I have been grieved that the body of the communicants has not yet entered, as was meet, into the fortnightly celebration; a certain few do, but not the body. This has grieved me much, and still does grieve me. Then again I have met a good deal of opposition and much annoyance from the manœuvres of outside bodies. I flatter invself that our success has moved them more than anything else. They have nothing in common; but yet they have banded together in different things against me as against a common foe. It is distressing to find misrepresentations have hindered the work for months and years. Patience is necessary, and faith is the ultimate power of the truth.

In my last report I expressed a hope of building a tower to the Church in Georgeville, and also of securing an Endowment Fund. Both are yet in the future. More than half the amount necessary for the tower was raised, but there we halt for a while. I think it cannot be postponed longer than the spring. The ladies expected to raise the \$100 for endowment, but the organ being very poor, they purchased one instead. In this part of the Mission we have had trouble each year in raising the assessment. The amount was subscribed *but not paid*. I resolved to dun the guilty and save the innocent, and did so. This caused ill feeling, but it left me with an easy conscience. If men cannot learn that *honesty is a very necessary part of religion*, I am not ambitious to secure them as hearers.

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Now, I have thankfully to record the assistance I have had during the year. The Lennoxville Grammar School was obliged to move to Magog for the winter months. The rector (Rev. P. C. Read) at once volunteered an extra service each Sunday, in addition to helping during the week; and with Mrs. Read, freed me from all responsibility of the choir, for which I was especially grateful. I was delighted that, as they were leaving, I was asked to give them, for the congregation, a sum of twenty dollars as a small token of respect and gratitude. The Rev. gentleman kindly undertook the illumination of the chancel of the Church, but was hindered through severe illness from finishing it. We have his promise of finishing the work soon; and then a pleasing memorial of his visit will be often before us. When Mr. Read began the work of . illumination of the chancel, Mr. A. H. Moore, a resident, who had recently begun attending Church, volunteered the tinting of the body of the Church-a generous offer, of which we gladly availed ourselves.

For six weeks in summer, Mr. Chalmers, of Brooklyn, who is studying for the Church, lived in Georgeville, and he kindly undertook an extra Sunday service, much to the gratification of the people.

The annual Sunday School picnic in August was a great success, securing the presence of all classes and denominations to the number of 300. The Sunday School work has been somewhat trying, but my teachers have stood up well for me and with me, and we have kept our hold upon the young. The "Leaflets" used in the two principal schools are afterwards used in other districts, as I can secure help.

In addition to this sum, both ladies' societies have eash in hand to the amount of \$45, ready for use. I should be most unjust to the ladies if I did not record my special indebtedness to them for active and faithful work.

MALBAIE.

The Rev. G. Radley Walters reports :---

In sending my report to the Society for this year, I may say that I have nothing of great importance to chronicle, save perhaps it be the severe blow we received this summer from the Diocesan Board, in the shape of an increase in our assessment. For a time the Church Wardens were puzzled how to answer, being desirous to pay as we go and not to fall into arrears, and any increase during the disastrous times we are passing through here, they knew, meant a final collapse. However, I am happy to say that, though the Diocesan Board hit us hard, and for a time seemed to have crippled us, yet, after a little time for quiet rest and consideration (not reflection), we were able to put on a bold front, and boast that we intended to do our best, come what may.

This past season, for my poor people, has simply been a repetition of last year's failure of our cod fishing—owing more this year to the great scarcity of bait. When the weather was fine for the boats to go out, those would be, generally speaking, the days that there would be no bait to be had. A failure in our fishing means a failure of almost everything else with us; and those only who live among the fishermen of this coast and visit their homes, can tell all that the word failure means to them. Though in many instances the merchants are kind and considerate, yet failure in the quantity of fish means a shortened allowance of the common necessaries of life. In many cases, with the near approach of a long winter, any people find themse no flou more f

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themselves at the end of their summer's toil with no cash, no flour, and only subsist by acts of charity from off their more fortunate neighbors.

With regard to Church life in this Mission, I may say that were it not for the liberality of the Jersey firms here, our Church would long since have been closed for want of funds, though in point of numbers we are stronger than ever, though this past year I have actually lost from our resident members fourteen persons, who have left for other parts of Upper Canada to seek a more prosperous livelihood. It is the increase of poverty in my Parish which places its deadening effects on all things. Though poor, my people are strongly attached to our Church, and the thought of the Church being closed for want of funds would bring a pang of sorrow to many a heart. I think the S. P. G. ought to make a special grant for these purely primitive missionary stations along this coast, for the work here is second to none in the Diocese for its purely missionary character.

Throughout the year past, my Sunday and week-day services have been very well attended, and the numbers from time to time attending the Holy Communion have shown that the words of exhortation preached on the duty and blessed privilege of receiving that Holy Sacrament, have not been heard in vain. The number attending the Sunday School has continued on an average of 50.

In the month of September we were gladdened by a visit from our Bishop, who came on a confirmation tour. I presented to his Lordship thirty-eight young persons for that solemn rite, and I feel sure that the words of counsel, advice and encouragement that fell from the Bishop's lips that day, will not easily be effaced from many memories.

My best thanks are due to Adolphus Collas, Esq., my late Church Warden, as are also the thanks of the whole congregation, to whom we feel indebted for many a voluntary act of kindness.

NEW CARLISLE AND PASPEBIAC.

The Rev. Thos. Blaylock reports :---

This is my last report under our old position as a Mission receiving aid from your Board.

At the Synod it was decreed that we should be, for the future, a self-supporting Parish. I cannot say that this is not just and right, but I must say it has come upon us at a peculiarly hard time. We have still a considerable debt on our Parsonage, which must be soon paid off. The last year has also witnessed an exodus from New Carlisle for the Western States, which has left us weaker financially. Indeed I can say without fear of contradiction that any time during the last ten years New Carlisle was better able than now to bear its part as a self-supporting Parish. We do not intend however to grumble, but do our best in the circumstances in which we are placed. Last August we were stirred up from the usual quiet routine of Parish life, by a visit from our respected and beloved Bishop. 1 cannot express how cheered and encouraged we were by his stay for a few days with us. Sixty-eight candidates were confirmed, many of them middle aged, some quite elderly. One adult was also baptized by the Bishop and confirmed at the same service. Most, though not all, of the newly confirmed have since become communicants.

In the early part of the year, after a long illness, the Rev. Geo. Milne, M.A. died; he had lived for forty years in the Parish, and was for the greater part of the time incumbent. His age was eighty-one.

I have also the sad duty of recording the death of Daniel Bisson, Esq., Merchant, of Paspebiae, a consistent member of the Church, a liberal contributor to her funds, ever charitable to the poor, he is deeply regretted by all members of the community. Over 500 people attended his funeral, many of them Roman Catholics. Long shall we miss him.

We have been visited towards the close of the year with an epidemic of scarlet fever. Many have died after only a few days illness. My own family were all down with it, causing a suspension of services for three Sundays, but 1 am thankful to say we were all spared. It is still spreading, and searcely a week passes without a death or two. I am commu numbe My 1

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I am happy to report a steadily increasing number of communicants. On Easter day we had 106, the largest number on record.

PORTNEUF.

The Rev. R. Colston reports :---

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Sunday services have been kept up without intermission hoth in Christ's Church, Halesboro, and in the Village School House. It is with thankfulness that I am able to report a slight increase in the average attendance at Christ's Church. 'The number of the village congregation has remained about the same. Special services have been held in both places during the holy seasons: of Lent and Advent with increased congregations. During Holy Week daily services were held, in the morning at Christ's Church and in the evening at the Village School House. These were fairly well attended. During that week the roads were so bad that it was impossible for me to use either a summer or winter vehicle; I had, therefore, to walk to the church.

There are two Sunday Schools in the Mission. I regret to say that the attendance is very small and irregular.

At last our Parsonage is out of debt, saving \$100, which is covered by the grant which the Church Society so liberally voted. During the summer the East end of the Church was re-clapboarded, and the whole exterior received two coats of paint.

A new stable has been built for the Parsonage; for the frame of which we are indebted to the generosity of Joseph

Ford, Esq., Paper Manufacturer of this place. On this building we owe about \$70.

SANDY BEACH.

The Rev. Dr. Ker writes :--

No disasters or misfortunes, such as have visited so many localities on this continent, have fallen upon us; and though poor in worldly goods, we rejoice in the inestimable blessings of health and peace; and if I cannot add plenty, yet I trust that there will be a sufficiency to supply the necessaries of life, so that there will be no physical suffering amongst us, such as I fear will fall heavily upon some of the inhabitants of this coast, unless that aid be sent by the Government and the wealthy. The cause of the poverty to be found amongst us is the failure of all the fisheries which have hitherto been the support and maintenance of the people of Gaspé. These failing, as they have done, there is literally nothing to fall back upon to sustain the people. Were they skilled agriculturists, they might still live by the products of the soil, but they are not; all their energies and labour have been devoted to the development and extension of the fisheries, and this source having dried up, they are nearly helpless. Farms, in the usual acceptance of the term, they have none; a few acres in tillage, to furnish them with vegetables and hay, are all that they possess; and these patches of improved land they call not farms, but gardens. Were they at once to abandon the sea, and turn to the land, years must pass before fields could be won, by ardnous and incessant toil, from the forest. In the meantime, there is nothing on which they can support

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Very many of the young men-the bone and sinew life. of the land-struck almost with despair at the prospects before them, have left the place, and are seeking the means of living in more favoured and prosperous localities. - 11 these pioneers report favourably of the change, so many more will follow that the coast will be greatly depopulated. I mention these facts to the Board to account for the failure of the Mission in the payment of the assessment. I must, however, bear witness to their willingness to meet the requirements of the Board, and to pay for the maintenance of the ministrations of the Church amongst them. The Mission is divided into districts, and collectors appointed to each, who make monthly visits, and gather in all that is possible from the members. These collectors, mostly ladies, have spared neither time nor labour in working their districts; all that the most self-denying zeal can accomplish, they performed. Surely they will have their reward.

Leaving this tangled web of linancial difficulties, I turn to a more congenial subject. Morally and spiritually, the Sandy Beach congregations are growing in wisdom and grace. Few people are more attentive to the means of improvement, the ministry of the word and sacraments being well and fully attended. This summer we were cheered by a visit from our Bishop on his confirmation tour, and a class of twenty-two most interesting youths and maidens were presented to receive that most important rite, all of whom, with but two exceptions, came to the table of the Lord on the following Sunday.

During the greater part of last year, I was obliged, through ill health, to confine my labours to the Sandy Beach congregation proper. Thank God such a state of weakness has passed, and I am now able for all ordinary clerical duty, and hope to redeem past unavoidable lack of service by redoubled diligence.

A state of poverty tells against the contributions to the Church Society, as well as against the assessment. They amount in all to \$226,22. My register shows 19 baptisms, 13 burials, and 4 marriages.

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SHIGAWAKE AND FORT DANIEL.

The Rev. C. D. Brown reports : --

Sunday services in the three Churches of the Mission have been regularly carried on; and in the churches at Shigawake and Port 2 + 101, all Festivals and Holy-Days have been observed; χ_{-at} for extra services each week during Lent. These have been well attended throughout the Mission, and much attention and reverence have been manifested. I confidently believe that some spiritual improvement has been made.

Three Sunday Schools were in existance and in good working condition upon my entrance into the Mission, these have been successfully continued under the management of their respective superintendents. That at Shigawake is conducted by Mr. Wm. Skene, jr., assisted by an able staff of teachers. The attendance is large, and it may yet be increased. At Port Daniel the school is not so large as in the former place. The Superintendent is Mr. William McDonald, assisted by able teachers. Here, also, the attendance can be increased. This school experienced a a great loss, last summer, in the departure to another sphere of action of one of its ablest teachers--Miss Gadd--who for five years helped on the work, and acted as organist in the church.

The Sunday School at L'Ance-au-Gascon is the smallest of the three, but is in good condition, under the careful management of Miss Acteson and other teachers. These Sunday Schools have been in operation for a number of years, and are conducted with much earnestness; and consequently much good is done by them. I was able to judge of this when conducting the Confirmation classes. I take this opportunity of expressing my warm thanks to the superintendents and teachers of the Sunday Schools for their help.

We have had, during this time, in connection with the Sunday Schools, *four* very pleasant *pic-nics*, and *three* very successful "Christmas Trees," which afforded great pleasure to the children. I owe many thanks to my parishioners for their valuable and useful gifts to myself at "the Trees"; and als during An e vent of tion, 1 Fifty-t baptist

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An event of great interest to all concerned was the advent of his Lordship the Bishop, upon his trienniel visitation, for the purpose of Confirmation and Ordination. Fifty-three carefully prepared candidates renewed their baptismal vow.

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An event of extraordinary interest to myself was my own advancement to the sacred order of priesthood, on the 28th of August, in St. Paul's Church, Shigawake; His Lordship was assisted by the Reverends Dr. Roe, Boydell, and Blaylock.

Since then the Holy Communion has been duly celebrated. The largest attendance at any one service was at Shigawake, 40, at Port Daniel, 41, and in L'Ance-au-Gascon, 16.

The Church Guild still continues to flourish. I have reason to think that it is doing a good work, from what the people tell me, and from my own observation, considerable temporal work has been accomplished. The parsonage which had been uninhabited for some years, and which was going fast to ruin, has been put into a good state of repair, and is now occupied by the Missionary. A great improvement was made in St. Paul's Church, Shigawake, during the summer, by its being entirely repainted, and other repairs done. I hope to see it filled up with new seats during this winter.

Some little work was done to St. James' Church. Port Daniel, and also to the Church at L'Ance-au-Gascon, shortly before the Bishop's visitation.

The Diocesan Synod saw fit, at its last session, to increase its assessment by one hundred dollars (\$100,) for next year, very heavy amount for so poor a Mission. The Church-Wardens and myself devoted a week to the work of opening a new subscription list. The result was satisfactory; the extra amount being promised. It is, however, very difficult to raise so large an assessment here, there being so little money in circulation.

I owe my warm thanks to the Rev rends T Blaylock and Dr. Roe, for kind help received during the past year The following amounts for Church purposes have been received during the year :--

STANSTEAD.

The Rev. Geo. Thorneloe reports :---

The routine work of this Mission has been carried on, during the past year, with its customary regularity. The services at Christ Church. Stanstead, remain unchanged. At Beebe Plain, a weekly Sunday afternoon service has been maintained throughout the year. Our efforts in the latter place have, at length, been rewarded with the first fruits of success. A regular congregation, not large but interested, now worships in its own, free-seated Church, where five years ago it was not an easy matter for the Church of England to obtain a hearing. On All Saints Day we had the unspeakable pleasure of witnessing the consecration of the Church. On the evening of the same day (All Saints) the Bishop confirmed 6 persons in Christ Church, Stanstead.

We have, on the whole, much cause for fervent gratitude to Almighty God. Still how much is left us to strive and pray for !

The one great discouragement that I meet with contimully, is religious indifference, having in due course its fruit, neglect of Church-going. The ning of to over I ha zeal o for th and fa The School opera My buria

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The one great hope that I set before myself at the beginning of each new year is, in some measure, by God's help, to overcome this sin.

I have once more to acknowledge with thankfulness the zeal of our office-bearers for the year past, and I will add for the unmeasured kindness of our people towards m_j self and family.

The various agencies of the Church, such as Sunday Schools, Day School and Guild, have been in successful operation as usual throughout the year.

STONEHAM AND LAKE BEAUPORT.

Rev. J. B. Debbage reports :

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During the first part of this year, things were decidedly improving in this Mission. At the end of last year, the Lake Beauport people cleared a road for me over the hills which separate Stoneham from that place. This was done to enable me to hold services there every Sunday during the Winter. The plan proved a success. By this same means, I was enabled to give services every Sunday in Stoneham also. With more frequent services, I had larger congregations. The financial accounts show that there has been raised in the Mission during the past year nearly double the amount of the previous one. We had two Socials in the Parsonage last Winter. We tried one and found it so successful, that we determined to try a second. At the second we realized more than double what we did at the first. The object was to realize funds for putting a new fence around the graveyard in Stoneham. This work has been accomplished, together with other improvements about the Church.

In Lake Beauport, we have suffered a great loss in the departure of the Rev. Mr. Vial and family. But, before they left, myself and the Church Wardens had the pleasure of presenting a watch and chain to Miss Vial, from the members of the congregation, both visitors and residents, in recognition of her services as Organist and Sunday School teacher.

I still receive from Mr. Denis Vial, now teacher of the Day School, kindness and hospitality every Sunday I go to Lake Reauport.

ST. SYLVESTER.

The Rev. W. King reports :---

During the past year my accustomed rules for visiting the different parts of my extensive Mission have been carried out as far as possible. 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but ca rent. almos immi other a Div From head-quarters at St. Sylvester, are reached St. Giles, St. Thomas, St. Patrick, St. Margaret, St. Catharine, and New Armagh, for services, catechising and house-to-house visitation as frequently as is practicable. After an interval of every six weeks, about two succeeding weeks are usually spent in the Chaudière and neigbouring districts, comprising Scott's Junction, St. Joseph, St. Francis, St. George, Jersey, Cumberland Mills and the Kennebec Road. As a rule no Sunday passes without two (and more often three) services being held in one or more of the above places, including a celebration of Holy Communion at appointed times. Neither bad roads nor unfavourable weather are allowed very often to interrupt the ordinary round of duties in the Mission.

I still give, as I have been wont to do, what little oversight I can to the schools here and there.

The attendance at Church has improved in St. Giles. In Cumberland Mills (the seigniory of the late worthy Mr. and Mrs. Harbottle, who built the Church.) the attendance has much increased during the year, owing to the presence of many connected with gold mining operations in that vicinity; and the services have been hearty and encouraging. Great indifference, however, exists there in school matters, and my best efforts for a long time past in this connection have not been well seconded or rewarded.

Much of the difficulty or danger which used to occur at times heretofore in crossing the Chaudière River to St George, is now done away by the late erection of a good bridge. Not long ago, in attempting to ford the river as usual, I was all but carried into fatally deep water by the force of the current. My waggon was filled with water, and the horse almost taken off his feet, and I can ascribe my escape from imminent peril on this occasion, as indeed under many other dangerous circumstances, only to the special care of a Divine and gracious guardian. I was the more impressed by my deliverance, and I trust the more truly thankful for it f on the fact that when the same vehicle in which I had

rescued was being brought to the door of the manorhouse, next morning, one of its wheels fell to pieces from the all but collapsing strain it had received the previous day.

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
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
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
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Setting cut, however, in a borrowed eart. I had another narrow escape before that day was over, having been thrown out of it on my way, owing to the stumbling of my horse, without being at all hurt, however, I am thankful to say.

My ministrations have not been called for lately so much as usual on the Kennebec Road inasmuch as the Presbyterians, who have always been the majority of the Protestants there, have a minister residing amongst them, and have been looking to our few isolated people in their midst to help to build a place of worship, and to help also (as 1 understand,) to maintain their services.

Other things being equal, I suppose the general tendency of the majority of a different race and creed is to increase and of the minority of a different race and creed to diminish; so in common with many of my brethern of the Clergy, 1 have to deplore the decimation of my little flocks here and there (except as I have indicated at Cumberland Mills), by emigration to more attractive localities in the Eastern Townships or elsewhere.

I continue to receive, as happily has been my lot for so many years past, every possible kindness and attention in the many hospitable houses, and to me temporary homes, which receive me from time to time throughout the length and breadth of my mission. Of such unwearied attention I shall never be able to shew my full appreciation, and can but pray that all my kind friends may be divinely rewarded, and proportionately to those who g_{AVA} " a cap of cold water only in the name of a disciple."

VALCARTIER.

The Rev. Dr. Riopel reports :---

The Church has been progressing very favorably this last year, there seems to be a growing appreciation of Church ministration. There has been an increase in the number of communicants and a larger attendance at Divine Service. The assessment has been promptly paid. I have been presented by my parishioners with several palpable tokens of good-v congre flock. gratin caused We and en march Sun \$29;

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good-will. The disaffected from the defunct St. Catherine congregation have gradually dropped into Christ's Church flock. Though some more of our people have been emigrating, yet those remaining are supplying the deficiencies caused by those departed.

We thank God that we are enabled, in spite of poverty and emigration, not only to keep our own, but to make our march steadily and surely progressive.

WEST FRAMPTON AND CRANBOURNE.

Rev. J. S. Sykes reports : —

The year just passed has been an uneventful one in this Mission. We have been going on in a steady, quiet way. The services have been regularly kept up and well attended; there is, I am happy to say, no falling off in this particular; our average attendance is eighty-five; the largest number of communicants was fifty-nine, the smallest, on a Sunday with very bad weather and roads, thirty-two. The only break in the Sunday services, was during my attendance at the Mission conducted by Canon Wilberforce. During Lent, as usual, we had services on Wednesday evenings, the attendance being equal to that on Sundays.

Sunday School and Bible Class have been fairly attended. The north side and east end of our Church have been newly shingled, and a dairy has been built at the Parsonage, and \$4 received from Mrs. Wm. Pozer towards paying off the Parsonage debt.

The increased assessment has been cheerfully promised, but time will tell whether it is easy to collect and pay it. The Church Wardens have always done their duty in this matter in the past, and in many other ways, too numerons to mention, have always encouraged and helped me in the work of the Church.

Our best thanks are due to Mrs. Williams, for the generous gift of a large parcel of new woollen clothing, to be given to the needy.

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last rch r of ice. oreof I have to thank my neighbor, the Rev. Felix Boyle, for taking my services during my visit to the Mission of St. Sylvester, on business connected with the Diocesan Board.

Gifts of all sorts have been brought to the Parsonage; all welcome as tokens of kindness and good-will, some showing that the heart was determined to win the day over the ability. All calls for help have been responded to, and, in addition to our usual number of special collections, we sent the sum of \$6 to the Rev. Mr. Maynard, for the Mission at Herring Cove, Diocese of Nova Scotia.

I believe that if any Mission in the Diocese can be relied upon to do according to its ability in the duty of giving, it is the Mission of West Frampton and Cranbourne, and I think I am warranted in believing that a large number of communicants, and a liberal and cheerful almsgiving, are signs of spiritual life and growth.

But, alas! we are too poor to help *ourselves*. If some wealthy churchman would like this to be explained, let him come and see our shabby and faded altar cloths, and the hangings on our pulpits and reading-desks.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE, LENNOXVILLE.

The Rev. Dr. Lobley, Principal, reports:-

During a portion of the year which has passed since I sent in a report to the Association, the religious work of the College, as well as its other work, had to be carried on under somewhat disadvantageous circumstances. A renewed outbreak of fever led to our sending the students out of College, and shutting up the College Chapel. The services were held regularly at the usual times in St. George's Church, which was placed at our disposal very kindly, by the Rector and Church Wardens, the only departure from our ordinary custom, being that a fortnightly celebration of the Holy Communion in the early morning, was substituted for a weekly one. The disadvantage consisted in our being scattered at some distance from the centre of worship, instead of being close at hand, as we are in College. Our love, too, for our Chapel, made us all very gl**ad** to come back to it, when in May, it was considered safe to use the College again.

We have now our usual daily services in Chapel, full choral on all festival and other events, with an early celebration of the Holy Communion on Sundays and Saints' Days. The services are hearty and reverent, and I cannot but feel sure that they constitute a real means of grace to many of us.

Last December, we had 22 resident students and 7 nonresident. We have now the same number of residents, but only 5 non-residents. Sixteen of our students are candidates for Holy Orders.

Our Missionary Union is still in full working order, though, during our dispersion in the early part of the year, its operations were, to a certain extent, suspended. The same cause has led to a considerable diminution in the amount of our offertories, in fact, for four months we had no Sunday evening offertories at all to call our own. The amount of our offertories from Dec. 1, 1880, to Dec. 1, 1881, is \$54.55, distributed as follows:—Expenses of Chapel, \$16.80; Chapel Building Fund, \$9.00; Foreign Missions, \$21.67; Diocesan Mission Fund, \$5.00; Pension Fund, \$2.08.

Besides the above, our Missionary Union sent to the S. P. G., for the Bishop of Madagascar, last July, the sum of \$14.53.

BISHOP'S COLLEGE MISSIONS.

The Rev. Dr. Roe reports :---

The Mission stations served from Bishop's College are now Milby and Capelton, under the charge of the Principal, and under the Professor of Divinity, Ascot Corner, Saudhill and Moulton Hill. During the first half of the year, Westbury also was served from the College; but owing to painful circumstances I was obliged, in June, to restore it to the Rev. T. S. Chapman, who three years ago had committed it to my charge. Down to the time of my resigning it, Westbury seemed to be in a healthy condition. The congregations were good, and the Sunday School The communicants had grown from five to hopeful. twenty-six. The people had begun to pay regularly, though not without a good deal of pressure and looking after, \$40 a year, their quota of the sum expended for horse hire. 1 was very sorry to be obliged to devolve the burden of this large and important station—imperatively needing as it does much pastoral care—once more upon Mr. Chapman, whose hands were already full. Indeed we had hoped that Ascot Corner and Westbury were just then upon the point of being formed into a Mission with a resident clergyman; but then came the sudden large reduction of the S. P. G. grant, and the project for the time fell through. In parting with Westbury, I wish to record my grateful acknowledgments for faithful services as Church Warden on the part of Mr. Anson Embury, and of much kindness and hospitality from many, especially from Mr. W. Chester and Mr. Thomas Staples.

Down to the midsummer vacation, Ascot Corner was served regularly every Sunday. 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compelled to take the entire charge of it into my own hands, and have consequently been able to give this station only a fortnightly service, any alternate Sunday being devoted to Sandhill. The prospects of this station at the beginning of the year were very bright, but it has shared in the blight which fell upon Westbury. In January last, the Rev. Isaac Thompson held a most successful Mission there, and moved the hearts of the whole neighbourhood maryellously. The immediate results were the baptism of twelve adults, besides a family of five children; and the confirmation of lifteen, all adults. Of the lifteen confirmed, thirteen have since become communicants; making the number of communicants at Ascot Corner up to thirty-one There is a very hopeful and interesting Sunday School at Ascot Corner, which I instruct for an hour before each service. These two stations of Ascot Corner and Westbury ought now to have a resident pastor. Every week that this is delayed they will suffer. It must be remembered that two stations so distant as these are from Lennoxville, seven and fourteen miles respectively, all we can furnish from the College is Sunday services, with little or no pastoral care. My experience makes it clear to me that a Mission station can only be carried on to a certain point by missionary services; after that, if pastoral care be not furnished, the work begins to decline. If this ground, so hardily won, is not to be lost, a resident pastor must, without delay, be stationed in charge of these two townships,

The services at Sandhill have been kept up regularly every Sunday during the year, Mr. Arthur Judge being my efficient helper. The congregations have been good, and the Sunday School well attended. The envelope system is successfully working here to provide funds for horse hire and other expenses. The horse shed has been raised, and will be completed now in a few days. Everything connected with this Mission station is satisfactory. During the midsummer vacation, the Rev. A. C. Scarth and Lt.-Col. Kippen, of Lennoxville, took the services alternately, Col. Kippen also most kindly giving his alternate Sunday to Ascot Corner.

The station on Moulton IIill is in charge of Mr. Ritchie and Mr. W. Worthington, two of our students. These

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gentlemen walk out every Sunday and conduct a Sunday School, concluding with a short service. Their zealous services are much appreciated by the good people in the neighbourhood. This little gathering of Church people have during the year purchased a small harmonium for their Sunday services. I visit this station about once a term, examine the Sunday Schools and address the people.

Church Society, \$79.50; Offertory, \$335.43; Stipend, \$800.00; Foreign Missions, \$24.85; Bishop's College, \$8.00; Easter Offertory, \$14.00; Missionary Meetings, \$65.00; Repairs to Parsonage, Synod and other current expenses, \$150.00. Total, \$1,476.78.

LENNOXVILLE.

The Rev. A. C. Scarth reports :---

I have to notice the establishment of the Sustentation Fund, and the envelope system last Easter, which, so far, have succeeded far beyond our expectation.

The members of the Missionary Union have been able, owing to the generous assistance of kind friends in the Parish, to undertake the support of Hannah Grey, a little Indian girl, at the Wawanosh Home, Algoma.

The Parish register shews: Marriages, 7; baptisms, 19; burials, 15.

LEVIS.

The following statistical summary will speak for itself, and in a brief way:

Services on Sundays, chief Festivals and Fests, at 11 and 7 o'clock; attendance, 15 to 100; shortened service, catechizing and Sunday School at 3 o'clock, average, 37; on Thursdays, Bible Class service, reading or sermon and choir-practice, attendance small, but, all appointments being considered, it has been a little better than during the previous year.

Baptisms, 11; marriages, 2; burials, 5; S. S. scholars, 49; confirmed, 18, of whom 5 were married persons, who had not been brought up in the Church of England, yet gladly embraced the opportunity of being instructed upon the history and nature of her scriptural ordinances and ministry, and of attaching themselves definitely to her ancient, national and comprehensive communion.

Communicants, nominal, 102; actual at Easter and the Octave, 54, and on Xmas and New Year's days, 62; added, including the confirmed, 33; removed, 20, including 4 nominal and 16 actual; dead, 2; ceased to communicate during the year, 7. Families, 56, almost invariably small; individual members, 10; Festivals for the children, 2; Protestant Schools, 1 dissentient, under a male teacher, at Hadlow, and one private school, under two young ladies, at the opposite end of the Parish, both well attended. Removed, parents and other adults, 28; children, 23; in all 51. Received, parents and other adults, 23; children, 6; and so 29 souls, by way of substitution, without reckoning those temporarily absent for the Winter or present in the Summer.

Contributions to outside objects, \$57.87., viz., to funds of Church Society, Domestic and Foreign (Jews) Missions, Bishop's College, and to Diocesan Mission Fund. This last was collected by Mr. Tofield. For all purposes, the total is less than last year's, by about \$150, but in that year were included a considerable sum for arrears, and also \$160 obtained for the endowment fund, so that, in reality, the local annual contributions have somewhat increased over those of the former year, and, at Easter, the Wardens reported the congregation entirely free from debt.

The Church received some handsome gifts, viz., a pair of kneeling-mats for the chancel, from Mrs. Williams, a flagon from Mrs. Peebles, two alms-dishes from Mrs. Davenport, books for the Sunday School Library, from Miss Annie Hamel and Mr. E. Holt, and an altar-cloth from Mr. and Mrs. Hallamore. The Rector was generously remembered at Easter, through the offertory, and at Christmas, in many much valued gifts.

Our present wants are: 2 surplices, 2 self-feeding coal stoves, to improve the heating arrangements of the Church; and, above all, a suitable building, to be used as a Sunday School house, and possibly as a day school, and also for entertainments, lectures, meetings and parochial gatherings. The fund started in the previous year for this purpose, has been increased during the past year by only \$26, chiefly because a claim, even more immediately pressing, had to be met in the repairs of the exterior of the Church, to the amount of \$210. Indeed, about twenty loads of new stones had to be inserted in the walls, as substitutes for those shattered by the weather. Here then is a hint for readers who may be interested in erecting any building of stone, to secure the least perishable kind possible. In order to augment the important Sunday School house fund during the current year, the "willing workers" of the Parish are preparing for a Fancy Sale in the Spring, and any help in contributions in money, or materials, or work, will be thankfully received.

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Upon the whole, it is hoped that there are good grounds formuch thankful gratilication, in regard to the past year's life of the Parish.

The services have been hearty and reverential, thanks largely to our kind voluntary organist and choir. The congregations are certainly not so large or so well sustained as they should be, yet they have improved, if it be but little. Marked kindliness and forbearance have led to more unitedly christian efforts for good, according as time and opportunity have been offered for their display.

NEW LIVERPOOL.

Rev. F. A. Smith reports :---

The services in the Sanctuary have been held with the accustomed regularity, and attended fully as well as in previous years. To our list of communicants there have been added the names of some newly confirmed ones, while, on the other hand, owing to their removal to other parts, we have lost a few. The Sunday School has been kept, I should say, fully up to the average mark, as regards attendance and progress.

Our little day school is now in charge of a well qualified female teacher, who holds a model school diploma, and the progress of her pupils already bears testimony to her zeal and diligence.

On Trinity Sunday, we were once more privileged to have our esteemed Bishop amongst us. His Lordship held a confirmation in Christ Church, when seven candidates were presented for the Holy rite.

Our ladies have, as usual, been diligent with their needles, in aid of the Parsonage Fund, to which some considerable addition has been made during the year.

The Incumbent was, at Christmas time, the gratified recipient of sundry tokons of his people's kindness and good-will, including a valuable overcoat, presented by the ladies of the congregation.

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ST. PETER'S CHURCH.-SHERBROOKE.

The Rev. Isaac Brock reports :---

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During the months of August, September, October, and November, I carried out and completed a systematic visitation of the whole of this extensive parish. As one of the results of that visitation, I am able to furnish the following parochial statistics :- There are at least 217 families of the Church of England in this parish, (at least that number, for some may have been overlooked,) and there are 44 persons not counted in the above families, either individual members of the Church, in families belonging to other Christian bodies, or otherwise. The total Church population in the parish, as far as I have been able to ascertain it, is 1,091, the number of communicants is 317. Out of the 217 families, 115 are either seat-holders in St. Peter's Church, or provided with seats through their relatives and friends. Of the remaining 102 families, at least 40, perhaps several more, would be willing to take sittings in St. Peter's Church, if they could get them. Of the 44 single persons not counted with above families, 18 have sittings of their own, or are provided for; of the remainder, about 10 would probably be glad to take sittings, if they could get them. A bonâ-fide Free Church would solve all our difficulties of Church accommodation, for some time to come; but, as this is a blessing not desired by many in the parish, some other means will have to be devised to provide for those who are at present practically excluded from our Church.

During the past few months, a Church Hall, attached to the Church, has been building. It is intended for our Sunday-school, week-day services, and other Church purposes. It will supply a want we have long felt. It will be a handsome and lofty hall, 65 feet by 35. We hope to open our Sunday-school in it, on the first Sunday of the new year, January 1st, 1882.

The usual services of the Church have been carried on by the Rector and myself during the past year. There have been 29 public celebrations of the Holy Communion, 32 baptisms, (4 of these adults), 14 marriages, and 40 burials.

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In the financial summary below, the collections for the Church Society are made up to Nov. 30, 1881; the other items, unless indicated by a date, are taken from the financial statements submitted by the Church Wardens and myself to our Vestry, on last Easter Monday. The offering for Algoma and the N. W., includes a special donation of \$100 from the Rev. C. P. Reid, sent direct to Quebec.

S. and Parochial libraries, \$48; Christmas, '80, and Easter, '81, offertories, \$182. Total raised in the parish, \$3,962.92.

For and towards a Fund for circulating, in the said Diocese of Quebec, the Holy Scriptures, the Book of Common Prayer of the United Church of England and Ireland, and the Books and Tracts approved by the said Church Society for circulation within the said Diocese of Quebec.

As an aid towards the erection, endowment and maintenance of churches according to the principles of the United Church of England and Ireland, within the Diocese of Quebec,—the erection and maintenance of parsonage houses,—the setting apart of burial grounds and churchyards, and the endowment and support of parsonages and rectories within the said Diocese.

III. A Devise of Real Estate for the general purposes of the Society.

I give and devise unto "the Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec,' incorporated by a Statute of the Province of Canada, passed in the fourteenth and fifteenth years of the Reign of Her Majesty, QUEEN VICTORIA, chapter 171, all and singular, &c., (describe the real estate clearly,) to have and to hold the said, &c., unto the said Church Society of the Diocese of Quebec, and their successors, for ever; upon trust to hold and apply the same, and the rents, issues and profits thereof to and for the uses and purposes of the said Church Society, as specified in the said Act of Incorporation, and none other, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.

IV. A Devise of Real Estate for any one or more of the specific purposes of the Society.

\mathbf{V} . A Devise to the Society of a site for Church, &c.

Same as No. 3, down to the words "for ever"—then go on as follows:—to the uses and upon the trusts following, that is to say '—upon the trusts to hold the same forever hereafter as and for the place and site of a Church and church-yard, and burial-ground, for the sole use and benefit of members of the Church residing in the place adjacent to the said site and premises with in the said Diocese of Quebee, according to the doctrine and discipline of the United Church of England and Ireland, and for no other purposes, and under the provisions of the aforesaid Act of Incorporation of the said Church Society.
