By a recent invention paper boxes are mado directly from paporpulp. The boxes are turned out of any size or shape, pufectly seamless, nud of uniform thickness. After diying, the boxes are run throngh a second machine at the rate of sixty per minute, receiving, under a pressure of 4,000 pouvels, such embossing as maybe necessary. From the time the paper stock is taken from the bales until the perfect box is turned from the machine maneal labor is entirely avoided. By the use of one set of these machines, 30,000 boxes can be produced daily

Toronto carpenters helda meeting on Saturday last, and decided to ask for 25 cents per diem increase of pay. This adrance, mahing

Murnay \& Manotte of "City Coffee and Spice Mills," after about tbree months stringgle, have censed operations. Murray it is said is going on a farin, and Marotte lias associated himself with D. C. Brosseau, wholesale grocer, of this city, who is starting a coffee and spice mill.

Ine management of the Grand Junction and Belleville and North Inastings Raitways has been transferred back by the G.T.R. to the Companies agnin, the G.T.R.'s lease hating expired on the lst inst. The local companies propose to amalgamate and operate the roads on
their own account, buying and leasing necessary rolling stock.
F. A. Ficis, of Simeoe, Ont., slripper of poustry, eggs, \&c., has secured a composition with his creditors at 20 cents in the dollar. Linbilties about $\$ 5,000$. 'Ithe insolvent made a certain shipment from which he received no returns, owing, as we understand, to a complete dehal: on the part of the consignees.
IT is rumorerl that the leading millinery and fancy goods firm of the Duminion, Messrs. Thomas hay \& Co., of Montreal and Turonto, have acquired the Albert Buildings on Victoria Square, lately occupied by Geo. Wiuks \& Co. and the Mechanics bank, and will remove thither as soon as the necessary altemtions huve been completed.

The Fall-Wheat fields in the County of Peed are as varied as they well cin be, ranging from those which have been ploughed up to some which look as well as it is possible. The remarkably fine wather siuce seeding has made all kinds of spring crops so exceptionally geod that not a complaint is leard, and anticipations of better times seem to previlil generally.
The liabilities of Robert W. Dawson, of Paris, Ont., who failed last March, are stated at \$7,500, and assets $\$ 6,000$. The crediturs are taking legal procecdings to gatin possession of a certain brick house built by Dawson at a cost of 53,000 , and made over to his vife. His failure is attributed to withdrawal of copital from business in order to make this investment. The estate it is estimated will paj 50 cents on the dollar.

Mr. J. D. Wells, formerly of the Globe ILife, has severed his relationship with the New York Life, with which Company he has been connect-
ed as general agent in Philadelphia for somo mouths past, and where, it is believed, himself and his chaplain were doing a large business for the Cominny. Mr. Wells is a live Life man, and is probably worth more than hot house authorities canalways be made to perceive over their spectacles.

## THE BEET SUGAR QUESTION.

We have read with much satisfaction the article in tho Hamilton Spectator in reply to that in our last issue. We trusi that our contemporary is no longer of opinion that our warnings to those about to engage in the beet sugar inclustry were given with any idea of subserving riyal interests. We proceed to consider "the one or two points of distegreement or rather of misunderstanding between us," and we are not without hope, having reference to the Spectator's expressed opinions, that we shall yet gain him to our side. In reply to our enquiry whether, in view of the facts stated by the Spectator, the logical deduction is not that "an excise duty should be imposed in Canada equal to the customs duty,' our contem. porary frankly states, "We say yes, the "excise duty and the customs duty sthould " be made equal by the inorease of the "former or the reduction of the latter, if " it is thought the most convenient way "to collect revenue." Now this we must be permitted to remark is going even beyond our contention. In view of the fact that Parliament has given its sanction to incidental protection to Canadian in. dustries, we think that beet sugar should be suhjected to an excise tax of something like 20 to 25 per cent. We call the Spectator's attention to this proint specially because, after admitting that the beet sugar manufacturers could afford to pay the same duty as the importers of cane sugar, our contemporary falls back on the stereotyped protective argument that "it " is worth while for Canada to give a large "temporary protection to the beet sugar "industry in order to overcome the timid. "ity of capital, and to help to bridge over
"the period, when lack of skill, imper.
"fection of machinery, want of experi"ence, bcarcity of pav material and "general projudice might land enterpris"ing investors in ruin." of conrse we aro well aware that the grounds stated by the Spectator are those on which all protective duties are defended, but wo want to be informed why the protection in the case of sugar is to be so much larger than in that of other industries. It is precisely on the grounds stated that we think that a moderate excise tax might be imposed, together with the heavy customs duty which our necessities demand. Would it be argued for one moment, even by beet sugar manulacturers, that if our milroads and canals should begin to yield a large revenue, and that it was in our power to reduce taxation, we should bo required to keep up our enormous sugar duties merely to protect beet? The most ultra protectionist would scarcely make such a demand. The Spectator itself referred to tho mode of placing the two industries on the same footing by the increase of one or the reduction of the other. Our claim is that the excise daty should be about one half the customs duty, and the native industry would have, in addition to the large protection thus afforded, the benefit of the freight and other charges as well as the loss from drainage. The spectator is anxious "to overcome the timidity of capital," but we think that unreflecting people who are pressed to embarls capital in hazardous undertakings, which depend mainly on a protection, which may be removed at any moment, should be made avare that even protectionists do not contemplate any lengthened torm of enjoyment. We fear that, if left to the judgment of thoso engaged in protected industries, the period would be very remote when they would admit that their industries could be sustained without protection. We do not believe that in France, "when the infant became strong, they (the beet growers or manufncturers) asked to bear the burden." We are inclined, however, to concur with the Spectator in thinking that if the agricultural element can be interested in a real monopoly, it will be able, by its political influence, to ensure what is called fair play from any govern. ment, meaning that all other classes will be smartly taxell for the benetit of the farmers. Fortunately only a percentage of the agricultarists will engage in beet cultivation, and the remainder will have to help other classes to pay the piper. We apecially conimend the extracts which we have given from the Spectator to the attention of those about to engage
in the beet sugar enterprise, and who have thought our remarks prejulicial to their interesta. They may be assured that it will be simply impossible to maintain such a protection as that now existing. but wo achmit that we lean to the opinion that it will be dificult to oltain the consent of Parliament to an excise duty on sugar, and we therefore look for. ward to the reduction of the present sugar duties, which will have much the same effect on the beet industry as if those duties, wero maintained, and an excise tax phaced on beet to about halt the amount. Should such be the result, we pity the finance minister who will be called on to find a substitute for the sugar duties. We trust that we have made our position clear. Had the sugar duties been no higher than the duties on cottons, woollens or hardrare, we should not havo deemed the domestic industry a fair subject for an excise tax, but wo deem it most unwiso to foster any new industry with such an enormons protection as our present sugar duties would aftord.

## THE GOTERNDENT CLRCURATHON RETURES.

We have been for soveral weeks waiting patiently in the hope of seeing in the Oficial Gazette a satisfactory return of the Dominion note issue, but we hare been hitherto doomed to disappointment. It is inconccivable to us that there can be any difliculty whatever in the government giviug once a wreek, or at all events once a moith, a statement similar to that which the Banks have to render. The return given in the Oflicial Garette is most unsatisfactory, and nothing can be more absurd than the stereotyped notice signed by Mr. Courtney, deputy minister of finance, which is appended, and which reads as follows: "The above form for the circulation returns has been adopted "to obviate two inconveniences in the form "previously in use: 1st. The weekly state"ment cannot give the amount of the circu"lation at any particular date, but only "its amount according to the retimns "received al the date of the publication " of the Gazette ; and 2nd. The subdivision " of the circulation into Provincial, Dom"inion and Fractional can only bo ap"proximately correct in the weekly state"ments, and cannot be accurately ascer"tained till the parcels of cancelled "notes have been examined and checked "off." It is only fair to Mr. Courtney to state that the notice was first published by Mr. Langton.

It must be obvious that there is no more difficulty in the Dominion Govern-
ment rendering returns of the notes in circulation, and of the gold, debenturns and bank deposits held against such circulation, than in the chartered banks making similar returns. Every week the Bank of England furnishes a statement of the circulation, and the gold and securities held against it, and a similar statement should be made here every week, but, if inconvenient, surely once a month would not be too great a demand. The latest returns in the Onicial Gazette of the 29th May gives the circulation and gold on the 7 th February at Montrea, Toronto, Halifax and St. John, and 31st fanuary at Winmipeg, and yet, in the very same Gazette, the circulation in gross is given on the 30th April, or nearly three months later. At that time, 30 ch April, there ought to have been on hand $\$ 3,904$. 729.63 in gold, but ouly $\$ 3,693,739.92$ is accounted for, being the amount held nearly three months earlier. Commonsense might have dictated to the department to lix certain days at the end of each week or each month on which each of the local oftices should make their returns, witich could be published in the first Gazette after receipt.

The fact is that there has been a most unaccountable laxity in the deparment in regard to the Dominion note issues, and the form of return requires amendment.
There has always been a great desire to furnish particulars of the notes payable at Montreal, Toronto, Halifax and St. Jolm, and the Provincial and Fractional notes, and also the amount of fractionals, $1 s$ and $2 s$ and other donominations. Such statements are desimble, and should not be omitted, but they are of secondary importance in comparison with the statement which ought to be published in every Gazette at the latest date that can be given, and which we shall venture to sub. mit in the shape of a pro forma statement, taking as our guide the amount of issue stated by the Eunomist and Sir A. T. Galt, viz: $\$ 12,400,000$.

The statement in the Gazette furuishes no information whatever, except as to the gold on hand, and that, as we have already observert, is given at a period nearly three months prior to the latest return of circt . lation. It does not appear from the official statement that there are more than five offices, and the returns ought certainly to be in earlier than those of the chartered banks, some of which have ageucies at
the rame places. We shall be very glad indeed if the organs of the Government should be enabled to furnish any satisfactory explamation of the reason for the inability of the Finance department to furnish on the 20 th May later returns than those of 31 lst January and 7 th February.

## THE FISHERY DISIUTE.

Notwithstanding the unaminity exhib. ited by the Cantalian 1 ress, regarding the unreasonableness of the demand of the United States for compensation for what the government of that comtry has seen fit to describe as the "Fortune Bay outrage," we regret to observe considerable difference of opinion as to the best morle of solving the aifl mhy which it is manfest has arisen. Our latest adviees encourage the tope that, it the two Gavernments should continue to take different views of the proper construction to be placed on the Treaty of Washington, the Government of Great Britain will propose to refer the point or points in dispute to the arbitration of one or more friendly powers.
tue ghobe on arbination.
The Toronto Globe objects to this mode of settling the difficulty, preferring that it should be left open, because it cannot trust "the Imperial and Canadian authorities who assented to the Washington treaty after assisting to frame it." It is a dangerous thing to lave questions unsetthed on which powerful nations entertain couflicting opinions; and it must be obvious that no part of the Empire would suffer more than Canada, were Great Britain and the linited States to be involved in an angry controversy on any disputed point, but more especially on one, in which neither Great Britain nor the other colonies have any special interest. During the 17 th century, the questions which were settled ly the Treaty of Washington would have been considered a casus belli, and there was during the progress of the controversial discussion considerable doubt whether war could be averted. The mere possibility of Great Britain being compelled to engage in European war is occasionally arlduced by the advocates of separation as anadequate reason for their opinions, and yet Canata stands alone as a complainant, because a war, the brunt of which would have fallen upon her, was prevented by negotiation.

## THE SAN JEAN QOESTION.

It is said that "we lost the Island of San Juan" by arbitration, and we are well aware that it is a receiced opinion
among Canalians generally, that our clam was so clearly right that the award which depmived us of that lishand musi have bean an amphiteous one. And yet no disinterested person can examine a map showing the present boundary line without acknowledging that there is no just ground of complaint. The 49 h parallel of latitude is the established boundary between the United States and British North America, and there can be no doubt that, if there hard been no Istand of Yancouver, there never would have been a question as to Sam Juan and the adjoining islands being in United States territory. To avoid the inconvenience of dividing Vancouver's Island between the two nations, the boundary line was carried after reaching the straits through one of several channels, and it was at least open to cloubt which was meant. Hal we obtained the strait that we claimed, wo should have had not only San Juan, but several other ishands, all clearly south of the boundary line. If, therelore, there was a reasonable doubt as to the channel established by the treaty, it has alyays seemed to us that the United States was entitled to the benefit of that doubt, and that, consequently, wo havo nojust ground of complaint.

## the fishigry question.

As to the Fishery branch of the treaty, while admitting freely that the settlement agreed upon was not the best mode of dealing with the question, yet the failure of the late Senator Brown to effect a dif. ferent mramgement in 1874 ought to reconcile us to that which was agreed to by the treaty, and which, by leaving the money value to be settled by atbitration, was at lea-t fair. The oljections to leaving the fishery guestion an open one nre obvious. The expenee of cruisers to wateh the trespassers on our fishories would be immense, and the danger to Which we should be exposed from the mashess or ignorance of the commanters of those cruiscrs would be most serious, and would be sure tolead to endless complicatious.
the hadiand question.
It is all very well for the Globe to express a readiness that the treaty should le abandoned, incladiug the right to fish within the three mile limut, but he amits all reference to the fluct that there is a long pending dispute as to what is the "three mile limit," and which is generally lnown as "the headhand question." It was the alisolute necessity that existed for retthing this question that led to the treaty of Washington. When a proposition was male to the United States to endeavor to come to an agreement as to the head.

Iand question, the counter-proposition was made to refer all other questions in controversy to the same tribunal. Un?ess it be possible, therel'ore, to grant fishery rights to the United States on terms that can be agreed to, the lieadland question must be amicably disposed of in some way, as, otherwise, fresh complications mould arise in aweek's time.
GUN BOATS.

We observe that suggestions have been made by a contemporary that three or four gun-boats should be sent to the waters in the gulf. Now in such a case the very first step that would have to be taken would be to frame instructions as to whether foreign vessels sloould be allowed to enter bays, or whether the threemile limit should be calculated from the headlands. We certainly could not give way as to our construction of the international law, and it is equally $c$ ertain that the United States would not yield their pretension. We have just had experience of a claim founded on a complete difference of opinion as to the construction to be placed on a treaty negotiated a few years ago. 'Ihat claim appears to us absurdly extlavagant. It has been generally compared by our press with the agrgregate award of $\$ 5,500,000$, but that is not the proper mode of treating it. The Newfoundland claim was made quite distinct from that of Canada, and the United States demand for damages sustained by the obstruction offered to a Sunclay's fishing on Fortune Bay is considerably more than the amoal value of the whole Newfoundland fisheries, according to an award which the United States declare to be absurdly excessive. So much for the gum-boat solution of the difficulty.

## indeprendence.

A Torontocont emiperaiy: The Telegram, has availed itself of the opportunity to discuss the question of separation. He asks what Canada is to do "in case England refuses to enforce her rights to the fisheries," suggesting that "there is every prospect of very serious complications arising between the two countries," and expressing his belief that "the present "Government of England would not go to "war with the United States to enforce "the rights of Cganadn in that respect." The idea of war between the two countries on such a question is simply preposterous, out the suggestion is obviously made to afford an opportunity for a fling at Mr. Bright, Sir Charles Dilke, and Mr. Chamberlain, and likewise to enable the writer to call attention to a jamphlet, entilled "The Canadian Question," which is said
to be discussed in a more clear, comprehensive and intelligent manner than anywhere else. The pamphlet in question, by Mr. William Norris, is of all the various schemes propounded by visionary constitution framers the most absurd, and what is rather singular, the very question which has led the 'lelegam to call attention to it, and to recommend it to his readers, aflords the most conclusive proof of its absurdity.

## Mr. NOMHS'S PAMPHLET.

We can assure our reaclers that we lave no intention of troubling them with a review of Mr. Norris's panmplet. He is one of those who hold that we camot remain as we are, and he is against absorption by the United States. He goes for independence, after which he proceeds to discuss the very important question, which is the title of his sixth and last chapter, "Could Cana da support independence?" As Mr. Norris cannot pretend to support the a firmative of his question, he argues that England through dread of the aggrandizement of the United States would be compelled to guarantee the independence of Camada. Mr. Norris is simple enough to declare, "this guarantee would not cost England much," but a page or two further on he states that, in case of war, the chief want would be money, and how does he propose to get it? Why, he coolly states, "No doubt "England would fumish from her almost "inexhaustible coflers these means on our " credit, or she would subsidize us, is she "did nearly all Europe, except Fuance, "during the Napoleonic wars." Can it be believed that a witer who complains, like the Telegram, that. England will be unwilling to go to war in defence of Cana. dian fishery rights, and that therefore we ought to set up for ourselves as an independent mation, can imagine that Eng. land would undertake the responsibility s.a only of guaranteeing an independent Carala against the consequences of war, but of finding the ways and means either by direct subsidy or $l y$ guananteed loans? Mr. Nomis's "clear, comprelien. sive and intelligent:" pamphlet furnishes the most conclusive proof of the impracticability of the scheme which he recommends, und as he armits that the contrast between the Canadian and American Governments is "very unfayorable to the latter," the logical inference is, to let well enough alone, and we recommend the Telegram not to set up Mr. Norris as a rival to the Bystander, but if he is determined to go for soparation, not to attempt any half way measures, which every man of sense fully understands are intencted to bring about the same result.

THE ST. PAUL, MINNEAPOLIS AND mantroba railway.
We have noticed with pleasure the satis. factory report recently submitted to the sharcholders of the above railroad, in which several of our fellow citizens have a considerable interest; indeed having reference to its connecticn with Winnipeg, and the prospect of its connection at the Sault St. Marie with the Camadian system of railroads, it is a public work well deserving of public attention. The retuns submitted covered the operations of the soad for a jeriod of two monthe, since the reorganization of the Company. The total earnings from all
sources were.................. $\$ 2,365,287.30$ Operating expenses............. $1,078,973.49$

Net earnings.......... $\$ 1,286,313.57$
The operating expenses were 40.60 per cent. of the gross earnings, which is an unusually low rate on this continent. The transactions of the land department were $\$ 1,008,086$, as the total amount of sales chiefly on credit. The boided indebtedness of the Company has been reduced in 10 months by $\$ 040,200$ under the operation of a sinking fund derived from real estate sales. The Company ate spending a considerable amount in permanent improvements, and there is every reason to believe that it will be a great success. Among the directors are Geo. Stephen, president; R. B. Angus, vice-presi dent.

THE QUEBEC LEGISLATURE.
The Quebec Legislature has met; and we are at last in possession of some information that can be relied on, regarding the loan which was recently negotiated in Paris by Mr. Wurtele, M.P.F., and which, it cannot be denied, was a successful operation. The loan was for $\mathbb{2} 800,000$ sterling or, in roumd figures, $\$ 4,000,000$, and the price was 9 S net, without commission, the rate of interest being 5 per cent. There was no truth in the rumor that any special pledge either of the Dominion subsidy or of the revenues from any other source had been given. The speeches were indicative of moderation on the part of the opposition, and Mr. Joly retains the leadership at the solicitation of the gentlemen, one of whom would necessarily have had to take his place. The financial statement will be interesting. Mr. Wurtele, if we may judge from his remarks, is sanguine that the ways and means can be foumd without resorting to direct taxation.

Beater Cousty gold mini ig is attacting increased interest. Some two hundred miners have arrived in that section since the opening of spring.

## TLIE STANDARD FIRE.

The report of the Standard Fire Insurance Co., which will be found elsewhere in our columns, affords conclusive evidence that it is quite possible to conduct a profitable insurance business without occupying that large field of operations which insurance companies generally aim at. The Standard is strictly an Ontario Company, and the present is only its third report. It says a great deal for the local agents of the Standard that on being called on early in the year to send in $\$ 70,000$ in premiums on desirable business, they responded by obtaining 574 ,500 , being an increase of $\$ 27,184$, or over 50 per cent. from the previous year. It might reasonably have been apprehended that the increased business would have been less desirable than what had been previously obtained, but the report states that the agents deserve thanks as well for the quality, as for the quantity of the business which they had secured for the company. The losses were moderate, being only $\leqslant 28,720.68$, and the various ex. penses of management, re-insurance, returned premiums a trifle more, so that there is the result of a handsome net profit to the sharcholders. We have not failed to notice the abstract of the re-. ports of companies, some British and American and some Camalian, doing business throughout the whole Dominion, which are embraced in the report, and we can congratulate the Standard on the very moderate percentage of its losses on the
premiums, as compared with companies of the highest standing doing business not only in Canada but throughout the word. We sincerely hope that the Standard will continue to have the same success in the future which it, has obtained during the last theree years.

## the London and lanoashire dif

The ammal report of the London aud rancashire Lite Assumance Company, published on another page of this issue, shows that 883 new policies for $\$ 1,600,740$ wereaccepted during the past year, fielding a new andun premima of Sis3,365. This, however, represents the operations of eleven months ondy, owing to the closing of the compuny's year a month eardier tham usual to make it agree with the calendar yent. Taking this and the adverse character of the periox into consideration, the business of che company compares farombly with that for the previous year. Alter piaying a dividend of tive per cent. on the erpital, which has been inereased out of the profits from $\$ 5$ to $\$ 6.75 \mathrm{per}$ shate, the balance of receipls over expenditure amounted to abont 860,000 , and this sum has been added to the funds of the company, which now mount to $\$ 016,645$. The confulence of the investing pablic of Great Britain in the stannebmess of the Landon and Lancastire Life Assurmee Company was well seen lately when the new "Fire Insurance Association," which is abont to open up in Canada also, was being fannched. The new company wis started from the olitees of the life company under review, with nearly the same directorate and under the same manalgement, and the result of the invitation to subscribe to the capital was, that applieations were immediately received for shares representing nearly three times the amount required. The aequisition of the business of the Loudon and Southwark Insurance Company, referved to some time since, fud the conjunction of the fire ollice will, it is supposed, tend to greater economy in expenses. The company, in enteriag the field of tire anderwriting, is not by any means attempting a bustness in whith they are tondy inexperienced, and it is not unreasomable to bespeak for them a degree of success at least equal to that which hats characterized the life business of the as:ociation. Zhas mamber of policies for the year in Cathada was 295, coveriug 5400,600 . The amount paid for elaims was 518,850 , and it may be cited to the credit of the company that, of the unusuthly henvy clams for the year, not one has been resisted.

## Re HENDRY \& OUWAN.

The proceditigs of the creditors in the case of Hendry $\&$ Cowan of this city, who fatiled last Friday, will be watched with special interest, as they are likely to test the slottcomings or sufficiency of the common law of Quebec in cases of insolvency. J. R. Ifendry, of the firm, begra business here in 1875, in a small way; shortly after the failure of Heniry (a brother) ESonle, of London, England, in which fitm he had been an employec. He had spent some time in Chita, and was known to the trade as a professional "tea-taster." He lad little or no
menns, but his experience and knowledge were deemed a sufficient offiet agatinst the eapian, $\$ 5,000$, put into the business by Wm. Cowat, when they started together in 1876. Mr. Cowan is one of several heirs to an estate on Drummond street, in which the widowed mother has a usufract interest, and money was advanced him by the curator, both to put into the business and for his liviag expenses from time to time as required, including the $\$ 5,000$, part of which wis lent him by his sisters. He had puit iato the business sone $\$ 7,000$ or 33,000 in all. llendry also contributed nearly $\$ 1,000$ a yẹar ago, which he oftained from his wife on Cowan's endorsement. The provailing impression that the firm lad been extravagant in their personal expenses is not confirmen by an exmmination of the drawings made by Cown From the family estate, which amounted to $\$ 50$ a month for a considerabie lime. The total business done in 34 years amounted to $\$ 33,000$, and during that time their persound drawings and business expenses amounted to about half that sum, and this miey he equally divided between lising exprases and those of the business. Whey had latterty deroted themselves more to the wine and spirit trme, atad their lending ereditors are W. F. Lewis \& Co., S2, 258 ; Osborn, Sun E Co., $\$ 1,500$; L. G. Green \& Co., $\$ 1,275$ and several others for S1, 100 and under. Kirk, Lockerby \& Co., grocers, are represented for $\$ 1,025$. The total linbilities direct foot nearly $\$ 1 \%, 000$, of which abont $\$ 300$ are privileged. The indirect liahilities, amount unter discount in Union Bank, are $\$ 6,303$. The assets consist of stock in trade $\$ 3,350 ; \$ 3,300$ under advance to $\mathrm{E} . \mathrm{G}$. Green \& Co., Gco. Tate, O. R. Cronkite \& Co., and John Scanlan; book debts good $\$ 1,440$; doubtful $\$ 1,657$; showing in all an apparent deficiency of about $\$ 10,000$. Several of the creditors bave taken action in the matier, and one of them, Johm Osbori, Son \& Co., have instituted criminal procedings, alieging purchases when they knew they were insolvent; both, however, are out on bail. Some of the creditors who have male seizure are within the law; others, it is said, are without the is days limit. Money was advanced to Cowan in March aud meantime from the family estate, and as the fiam had shown a better condition bately than when they balanced last Oetober, they hoped to be able to pull through. And now some or the "unco guid" think that wholesale spicit bills should be relegated into the sane category winh a common tavern or saloon whisky account, which, we believe, is uncollectable by law. It is possible that during the trial some curious disclusures will be made, tending to explain how it is possible to make a profit on goods sold below the price of purchase.

Great was the ery a few months since against the Insolvent Act, and anything less Han its prompt reneal would then have been luoked as an immeasurable grievance. Now there are daily regrets expressed at the prospect before us, and soon the ery will be as loud against logislators who could repeal an act of the kind withont furnishing a substitute thercfor; so rapidy does public opinion change.

The opening of the American Union Telegraph for general business took place by formal announcment on Monday last. The line has been in active operation for months pret, but with incomplete connections nud only to a limited number of points, fud competitive antes were not estnblished. The president, Ths. T'. Eckert, now announces a redaction ranging from 15 to 30 per cent., and signifies his readiness to compete for business. The company clams to bave 50,000 miles of wire alreaty constructed, with more adding thereto ripitly. Certainly the opposition gives evidence of activity, energy and fisity of purpose, and the Western Union may well look to its best re. sources if it would not be rudely shorn of the laurels of pactical monopoly. In any event, the public will benefit from the contest while it lasts, though it may have to pay dearly therefor in the end, when compromise or victory shatl have led to a settlement.

A Knowntos correspondent writes that, notwithstandiug the late spring, crops are looking splendid, and with propitious weather the hay crop will be a very fine one. Butter he quotes at lac to lue. The business in horses for the United States market is brisk, thourlt the duty narrows the margin for profit considerathy. Moncy is in good supply, and cmpinalists are compelled to accopt much lower rates than formerly. It is admitted that emigration has been large, but the exodus is attrituted to the glowing accounts and zeal of railroad runuers, rather than to the necessities of the emigrants. Our correspondent thinks this ought to be stopped, just as similar efforts to induce Camudiaus to join the Northern army were slopped yents ago. The English poople as a rule go to the far West and the French South. Firms are very cheap, and are thought to offer excellent inducements to European emigrants wiha a litile capital. Unimproved land is especially luw. Lumber finds a ready markel.

Witu reference to the recent order of the Depariment of Customs, relative tu invoices te. presenting foreign depreciated currencies, the officers at this port state that merchams and importers generally comphin that the enforesment of the new clanse was sprung upou them too suddenly, that no time was allowed them to communicate with shippers of goods atready purchased, in order to bnve the reguired athidavit and British Consular's ecriticate formarded, along with the invoice. Nuch neonvenience is oceasioned, therefore, to inforters of goods now arriving, as such goods camot be entered until the required cort:ficute and affidarit are produced, unless the ovners chouse to pay duty upon what is considered the excessive values.

The Consolidated Bank has issued a statement of its afliris, dated May $281 \mathrm{~h}, 1880$, in anticipation of the meeting of shareholders and creditors on the 9 th inst. for the purpuse of appointing liquidators. The exbibit shows ontstanding liabilities spart from capital amounting to $\$ 474,581.01$, aud assets placed at $\$ 1,063,578.62$, but on what principle of valuation this result is attained is yot stated, fis-
suming that the sum named is an estimate of the amount to be realized from the assets, there would still remain, after paring all other obligations in full; a fund of $5588,906.61$ to be divided amongst the shareholders, or about 39 per cent. The general manager chams that under careful management 25 per cent. sbould surely be realized.

Tue barkentine, Our Annic, laden with sugar from Barbadoes, which struck last week on Green Island in the Gulf of St. Lawrence hatd her cargo insured for $\$ 50,050$, divided equally between the Insurance Oompany of North America, Hampson agent in this city, and the British and Foreign Marine Insurance Company. The loss is almost total.

Mr. W. W. Oalvit, of this city, has been appointed by the Dominion Goverument one of tho boly of five liquidators of the Consolidated Bank. The remaining members are to be appointed on the 9 th instant, three by the stockholders and one by the creditors.

## LONDON AND LANCASHIRE LIFE ASSU. RANOE COMPANE.

The serenteenth annual meeting of this com$\mathrm{p}^{\text {any }}$ was held on May 11th, 1880, at the offices, 158, Leadenhall-strect, Colonel Fingseote, C.B.', M.P., presiding. The report was as follows:

The accounts, as set torth on the anmered page, ate in accordance with the Insurance Companies $A$ ct. The balance of receipts over payments amounts to $\$ 64,924.33$ and increases the finds of the company to solc,648.10. In accordance with the deed of setthement and in terms of a resolution of the proprietors, 5 per cent, fur the past year has been praid out the capital increased out of profits to $\$ 6.75$ per share, equivalent to Gas per pent. on the origimal amount $^{2}$ paid up of $£$ per share. The directors who retire by rutation are:-JohnJ. Kingstord, Esq., R. Barelay Reynolds, Esq., תud Samuel Gurney Sheppard, lesq., all of whom are eligible for reclection. A. H. Phillpots, Eiq, one of the auditors, is also eligible for re-election, but J. U. Hopkinson, Esc., retires, and J. I1. Powell, Bsq., has announced his intention of becoming a cundidate for the auditorship. The directors liave the satisfaction of informing the proprictors that they have recently acquired ine life business of the London and Southwark Iusurance Corporation on terms which are advantageous to the interests of both parties, the valuagion of the policies having been made necurd-

Ing to the Carlisle Table on the basis of 3 per eent. interest, and the whole of the loading reserved, the same sate principles which have always been adopted in the valuation of tho London and Lancashive Company. Ihis transsaction not having been entered into until late in 1879 , and the sanction of the Court of Chancery only recently obinined, it is not, therefine includedin the accounts of the past year. With the accession which this transfer brings of a large number of agents and nev connections, it is hoped that the new businese of the compray will be materially increased. The directors are glarl to have received anple proof that their shareholders approve of their active co-operation in the promotion of "The Fire Insurance Assnciation," and they nvail themselves of this opportunity to congratulate the shareholders on the new comection which has been thas secured, and the consequent benefit that must ensuo to both companies by the matual interests that even now exist, and they have every renson to believe that this union will be still more closely ceminted before long. In conclusion, the directors desire to express their appreciation of the zeal and ability continued to be showa by the various representatives of the eompmy.

The Clanirman, in moving the adoption of the raport, said, -Gentlemen, it is ntancerseny to detain yon rery lones in telliug how he company stands. The report for the gast year conhatins many snleffactory fatares, and I thiti Hat, looking to the fact that the revival in ceneral business did not really tuke phace unit late in the year, the results of the operations of the company during the rear mist, on the whole, be considered as mosi fitorable. It will have been seen that the report refers first to the new assurances which have heen eficterl, and the new polieies number 8SS, for be sum of S , 690,740, giviug an additional :mmual income of $\$ 50,500.62$. Now I onght 10 explain that the new business return on this oceasion is oniy: for eleven monilis, it lating bern found convenient to close the books for new as well as for old business on the 31st of December. But for this a larger mmount of new lusiness would lave been the result of the yeat 1879 over the previous year. Of course, in every other respect, the receipts and payments are for the twelve months, and, I may say, with the decidedy betier prosuect for us and for all life companies which the present yen seems to indicate, I tuast that it will be my good fortume io report that the Jonulon and Linnenshire Lito Gompany has participated in the improvement of rade and of genemb business now generally nad contidently loolsed for. Before going from the "new business," 1 may slate that the average of the lives insured under the 888 policies! lave mentioned is 35, an merage age which points to the fact of a very desinuble chass of husiness for the compray. The claime, which have been within the expectation, have been mather more than last year, while the surrenders are also heavier. Surrenders are not coveted by life offices, thongh an immediate profit is made by such trunsactions; but at the same time it mast be stated that our experience in this respect has been of most other ollices. I desire to repeat here what, I think, 1 have stated before, that every facility is given to those who, from temporary embiarassments or other circumstances, cannot pay their preminms, these fincilities being that the coupany will grant lonns at 5 per cent. interest to the extent of the value of the policies, and in many instances this is taken advantage of in mace of surrendering the policies. Thefunds have been increased during the year by $S 94,924.33$, after the payment of all out-goings, iretadiug the proprictors' dividead of "is per cent. per anmum, and they amount now to $\$ 916,648,10$. Respecting the investments, they are all sound nud of increased value; but this increased value has not been taken into account in uiving you this amount. The proprietors wilt have observed 1 wo special monters reierred to in the report. With reference to the first- the purchnse of the life business of the London and Southwark Company-I can only repent the words of the report, that the principles of the valuation adopted in taking over the policies of the Lonadopted in taking over the policies of the Lon-
don and Sonthwark Company were those whict!
have always guided the London and Lancashive in valuing their business, namely, 3 per cent. interest, and a reserve consisting of the entire lombing. This transuction, thengh referred to in the repurt for 1879 , dow's not appear in the nceonnts for the year it having been thonglat desimble nut to inclide ary of the figures in the lsta business-the sanctien of the Court of Chancery as required by the lisumance Companies Act having ouly been obtained guite secemby. The addition to the iasome and assels of the company, together with the large assels of hie company, together with the large
mimber of tew ngente, are all satisfictory elements, and will, it is loped, materially increase the business of the compray. Another matter of importance, and, 1 mm sure, of great interest to the proprietirs, is the amonncoment made i.t the remes that the Fire Assurance Association bas bera sucer-ssfully formed, and with a constituency which augurs well for its future suceess. There can be no doubt tinat considerathe henetic will acern to buth companies from the formation of this Fiae Assuciation. They will work closely tugeher andassist each otber 1 also, in conclution, have phensure in mentioning, lhat for the hasiness of both compnaies the directors have secured, on very farorable terms, wrectors havesecmed, on rery farorale terms,

muiting where the business of both the fire and life comparies will be conducted. I heg to move that the repert and statenent of accounts be received and adopited.

Alderman Bir Thomas Dakin seconded the motion for the duprion of the report and statement of accomats, ath said he did so with great plensare, epecialy as the matters had been so clearly explimed by the chairman. All conmected with the cembuty conhl very fining comgatulate hems.lyes upon its prosperity, for very few companies indeed eould point io new bisianes athieved on the same seate as the Jondon and Lamashire during the hast ejeven montis. Vary few companies cond point to business on the seale of $L l, 100$ a month preminm for twelve monthe, or 413,000 a year, and he could say that, after having looked over the reports of many. The directors took some little credit to themselves for the favorable position in whidh the company stood; but he wus fain to confess tha very much of that success was due to the excrilent manger and secretary, Mr. Olivelugh, whose great care and attention-in hact, his whole mind-was given to the aftairs of the company, and to his example and influence mach of the suecess of the company was atributable. A new career of tusiness was oprened to the emmpuy by the reqaisiion of the London and Sututhwats Gompiany, whose agents and clientele wouldancrease the natural prosperity of the London and Lancashire, nad make it still wore sucecesful than it had been: As to the new fire company, he regarded it as a great, compliment to the Liondon and Lancastive Lifo Commany that the applicutions fir shares in the Five Association should have been bearly thre times more than could be reccived. This fach showed the good credit in which the London and Lancashire Life Assurance Company stood, and also accounted for its increased business ar the rate at which the popntation itselt increased. The establishment of the Fire Association would bring increased busi vess to both, and the expenses of both woild be diminished by the conjumetion of the two. He hud much pleasure in supporting the view of the chairmm in respect to the new offices. There had been much trouble to the new oftices. There had been much trouble
in obtaining a fit and proper site for new oflices, as, indeed, might have been expected from the great scarcity of hand in the city; but a good site had becn obtained, and thougle land was very expensive, the site would prover profitable and goud return for the money the conspany would expend upon the new olfices. One good thing would le that with a fire office with 1,300 shareholders commodious offices would be requisite, and there would be tben a greater fuducement for the shareholders in this company to attend these meetings.
Mr. J. H. Powell-who cordially agreed with all that had been said-said be was in perfect accord with the steps which had been taken to promote the fire ecupinny, which he thought
would be a great aid to the life company; hut he noticed among the directors of the 1 ire Associntion the natacs of some of the diectors of the life company. He spoke as a shatehohier of the life compray in ex, ressing the hope that in all the armarements made the interests of the life company had been well considered.
The chmirman, in reply to the alservations of the last speaker, said the directors hat not entered into fire busiaess without great consideration b-forehand. The interests of the life compatay would cerianly bu huightened by the connection with the fire company.
The report was then pmit and umamonsly adopted.
Mr. Chapman moved that the reling directors shouk be re-elected, mamely, J ${ }^{5}$. Kingsford, Esg., IR. Barchay leynolds, Eeq., and S. Gurney Sheppard, Esq.
Sir Thomis Dakin seconded the re-election of Mr. Kingsford, and Mr. Philipotts that of Mr. Reyootds and Mr. Shempard, and the motion was carried unanimously.
Capinin Tharburn mosed the re-clection of A. Il. Phillpolts, Esq, as retiring andior, and the election of J. H. Powell, Lisq.: in the phace of J C. Jopkinsom, Fer, who retied.
Me. Sheppard seconted the motion, which was unanmonsly adopicd.
Mr. Phillpotts, in :cknowledging his re-election, said italway gave him pleasite thattend It the offiers of ine company, for he found the accounts in the most perfectorder, and presentinge evidence of the admirable mathagement olsservable in all hrameles of the company.
Nr. Powell, in moving a vote of thanks to the chairman, directors and staff, said he was perfectly satisfied with the explimation given by the chaiman to lis questions, and he beggen to congratulate the diretors upon promoting so successfally the Fire Assoctation. In raspect so successmathe proposed thathe manager ant staff, le held that it was apparent to ant that the manager on ve his whole mind to ble affints of the company, which was a truly well-mathaged comcern.
The votes were carried umamimonsly.
The chaiman, iu reply, said that the directors desired to carry on the compmy most conomically, nurl to increase its business in a sound umaner. They fele that the counection With the Fire Associntion would tend to this end, and the directors were prond to le connecled with a company which, it was evilent, had the confidence of ine pablic at large. There was no doubt that the shareholders, and every oue connected with the company, would thank Mr. Olirehugh, who was a host in himself, for his arduous work in connection with the company, and upon whom the would call to speak.
Mr. Olimhagh thanked the meeting for the vote so comially mased, and, in aceepting the compliment, sitid that his colleaptes in the othice had been most zanlous in their work to promote the interests of the compane, and withont : heir henrty co-operation he conld not have achieved the results which bad been so warmly and fully acknowledgen.

In view of the above record and the finct of the year just closed heing out third year, usually considered the critica period in the history of a Fire Insurance Company, we feel we may congratalate each other and all interested apon the continued success and eheering prospects of our Gompany. Eirly in the year we asked our agents to send us $\$ 70,000 \mathrm{in}$ premitums on desirable business during the year. Our request was nobly responded to, agents vieing energeticnlly with each other in meeting the wishes of your board, which they fully accomplishad, as shown by the premitm income of the rear aggregating $\$ 74,500$, beiug an increase of $\$ 27,184$. A comparison of the same with the losses for the year, Slo,902.49, w-rrants your Directors' in saying that the business secured is of the most desirnole class aud that the agents merityour thanks for the quality, as well as quantity. of business secured for the Company. It is doubtfil whether any Fire Insurance Company in the land can boast of a corps of agents more efficient, more fithful and energetic in pushiag the best interests of their company. Ot the number of claims (85) presented for fires occurring during the year, your Directors are pleased to state they found it necessary to resist only two. Payment of these two was resisted as well on the ground of public policy as in the interests of the Company.
While the experience of this Campany in the ratio of premiums to loss has been more favorable than that of any of the Companics above quoted, yet your Directors feel hat a harge majority of the numerous and destructive fires occurring throughout the country may be fairly attributed to design, in the majority of cases
or the purpose of defrauding insumance companies. We therefore entirely agree with the surgestions that have been frequanly made ( 1 ) that there should be $n$ Govarnment ollicer (say fire marshat) for the Province, by whom - or his depaty - a sparching judicial investigation would be mude into the origin and anteading circumstances of erery fire, and if the same originated through lesign or gross carelessuess, suitable panishment should follow. 'f'he adoption of this surpestion by the Government, and the apainment of no oficer who wonld finthfilly aperform his duties, wonld we believe tead greatly to lossen the number of incendiaty tires, and thus prevent the destruction of a large amonat of property annually, (to the material advantare of the State). In this connection we dasire to express our emtire approval of the creation of the oftice of [nspector of [usurance for Ontario, and the appoimmont thorebs of a gentlemm,
 respect to fill the josition.
Your Board recommend tor the sake of convenience that the Cumpany's fiseal yena hereafter close on the 3 lstor December in each year, instead of the alst of Marohas at present, as the books are then required to be balanced and audited when making our returns to the Government, and thereby save the expense and tronble of a second andit. Detailed statements of the receipts and expenditure and assels and liabilities are submited herewith, acemmmied with the report of the Auditors. Your Directors all retire, but are eligible fors. re-clection.

## GENERAL MARKETS.

Thursday, June 3rd, 1880.
No further trouble has been experienced with the ship laborers, who are now stendily at work at an adrance of fully 5 cents per hom over the rates paid prior to the strike. The markets for the week have been quiet and not inactive. The drop in wheat in Chicago mond the closing of the May deal to the discomfiture of the shorts have heen watched with more or less interest, but this market has taken no pat obler than to record conformable quotations. The tone of current comment on the situation for cermals is just now benrish on acer unt of prospective abundant crops and probable ad interim surplasage of steck. Flour is heavy and lower, and dificult of sale at the decline. Hardware is still unsetiled, aluhotgh in raw materina a point has been rached at which sales are effected with less difliculy. The undertone is chamed to be wetter. Prices are reduced. Dry goods witness a moderate degree of activity, with payments not unsfisfaciory. Lather is quiet, and hundy so firm as heretofore reported. Ilides unchanged, tanners continuing to gromble at prices. Boots and shoes are inactive except in quarters favored with jubbers orders. A freak in the butter trade has had the effect of making, but not estublishing, prices for creamery some 2 cents above the quotation of a week ago. Boots And Shoms.--Wththe nearer aproach of the season for fall orders the trade pieks up, a hopeful tone, and, from the tenor of accounts from the conotry, looks forwatd to a fait volume of business for the summer montlis, thongh the margin for profits is elamed to be very small. The jobbers from the West are unjerstood to have phaced their orders on terms so favorable as to astonish themselves. The usual enrrent of small sorting up orders keeps manufincturers ont of idlencss, but, apart from these and the special prepmations for the supply of the jobbers alluded to, there is nothing doing. Manufiteturers are not attracted by the ruling prices for leather, and probably will not generally buy until orders in hnod shall determine their needs. Iravelers will be starting ont in the course of a week or two ; until theie reports are received the situation will doubless remain unchanged.

Oatrus.-Whe market continues active, with increased demand for good shipping cattle at a slight advance in prices over last week's figures. 100 car londs arrived at this port during last week, and of these 100 were for shipment. to Great Britain. 21 car loads were ollered al the St. Gabriel market on Monday, and were disposed of at mices varying from 33 c . to 0 c . per lb. for butchers and toc. to bije. for export trade. The shipments from this port for the zuonth of May were 6912 head of cattle and 1530 sheep.

Dry Goods.-The market ought to be called variegated, but, as no such commercial term is known, it shonld be explained that when different houses and even diflerent partners in the same house give reports differing in toar, it is difienalt to find a single expression that will fit the sithation. So far as our inguiries extent, a moderately acive business for this senson of the year is generally attested, though all the thade would not conincide with this riew. Figures for the month of Miy hear very finvorable comparison in two instances with those for the correspouliug period last year, but a good portion of the improvement is found in enhanced Falace, so that the consumption of goods has not inereased to the extent apparent from the total amount of sales. A buyer for a prominent house, now in Englind, ruorts winceys, lawn handkerchiefs, braids und bradford dress goods all liggher, the advance being roughly estimated ut 10 per cent, and linen goods lirmly maintained at the hate advance. A good demand continturs for bunting, the stock of whim, we gather, is somewhat concentruted, some houses not having been able to meet their customers' requirements in this line. The inquiry for cotton duck, which is said to be light for the season, gives rise to some disuppointment.

Satins hroughout the spring have been in good request, and silk as well. The accounts ats to money are not unfarorable. The want of an insolvency law has met with a sort of negative illustration. A lending house was induced to sell $n$ donbiful enstomer a line of goods under special conditions. The buyer neglected his business and quickly became involved, wherenpon the merchaut swept down upon him and by rare good fortune succeeded in procuring the store keeper's signature to a hastily drawn paper promising to assign his stock over to his creditors. Later, he obstimately refused to contirm this locument by making a regular formal assignment, regreting that in moment of weakuess he had committed himself to paper al all. The creditor acted upon the document, in hand and took possession of the estrite, which will probably pay about dia ceats on the dolar. The estate was in such slane that but for this prompt and energetic action, and the regretted honesty of the insolvent, the creditor would have got nothing whatever for his clam. The need of an iusulvency law is felt.

Dhugs and Chmicals.- There has been something of a full in business during the past week, with prices nominally withont elange. In England by last itelvices there is a much better feeling with it firmer tone in lrices, and orders beginning to come in.

Floun and Game-Wheat has sulfered a sharp decline since last report, and quotations unw rale nominal at $\$ 1.22$ to $\$ 1.23$ for Canada White Winter and Sl.24 to SL.25 for Red Winter. The only inguiry reported in the market is for milling parposes. Canada spring is neglected to the point that nominal quotations even are not given. The inarket here as to prices is but a fhint refiection of that at Chicago, where a further drop of 4 c . to 5 c . for June delivery is recorded. The nmaipulators of May deliveries were able to close up the deal at a price 111 c . above June, which shows that the shots were failly cornered, but it does not necessarily follow that the bill clique made money. Nimble operators on the outside are of tentimes the ones to profit most by cornering movements. The fortuighty returns issued on the lst inst. Show a decrease in the stock of whent in store in this city since May 15 of 60,308 bushels; Oats, 37,830 bushels; Burley, 2,547 bushels; Rye, 27,707 bushels. As the season progresses the promise of an abuadmat new crop of whent becomes better nssured, and estimates now point to $n$ considerable surphas of old stock to be carried over to the new cercal year.
