





REPORT OF GRAND MASTER WORKMAN.

Nanaimo, B. C,. March 9th, 1898.

To the Officers and Representatives of the Grand Lodge of B. C., A. O. U. W.:

BROTHERS:—It affords me great pleasure to extend to you all a hearty and fraternal welcome on this the occasion of our Seventh Annual Session, and in obedience to the requirements of our Constitution I have the honor to submit for your approval and information a detailed statement of my official acts for the term ending with this session.

The year that has just passed has been one of the most important in the history of our juris liction, radical and far reaching legislation enacted at the last session of our Grand Lodge has made the year one of anxiety and care, probably one of the most frui ful sources of anxiety was the misunderstanding, and I am sorry to add misrepresentation, of the nature and effect of the Classified Assessment plan adopted at the last session of this Grand Lodge. I am pleased to be able to tell you, however, that as our membership informs themselves more fully as to the nature and effect of this plan they are becoming better satisfied with it, and now but very little objection is heard, and as a general thing our membership are supporting the action of the Grand Lodge in adopting the Classified Assessment plan at our last session.

Our death rate for the year that is past has been an exceptionally heavy one, but I am glad to be able to inform you that notwithstanding the heavy liabilities to be met, our financial position is sound, and we are able to pay all our death claims promptly and in full, and for this our thanks are due to the great fraternity with which we are bonded, for had we been alone it would seriously have embarrassed us to have paid all the claims upon us in the year that is past, but the beneficient effect of the Relief Law adopted by our Supreme Lodge, was exemplified in our jurisdiction, and we were granted relief to the extent of about \$10,000, which sum, owing to the justice and equity which abound in our Supreme Lodge Relief Board was \$2,000 more than we at first claimed or considered we were entitled to. Considerable expense was incurred in sending the Grand Recorder to Chicago to explain our claims to the Relief Board, but I am sure you will all agree with me that the result has more than justified our action

Early in the year I divided the jurisdiction into districts and appointed the following as D. D. G. M. Workman:

I also appointed Brc. Wm. Ragless as Grand Organizer for the juristion on the same terms as he was employed by this Grand Lodge last year.

Shortly after the appointment of Bro. Clute as District Deputy I forwarded him all the papers and necessary instructions in the Dimsdale and Goldberg cases, and I am pleased to say I believe he was able to effect a satisfactory settlement in each instance.

I regret that I have found it impossible during my term of office to visit as many lodges as I desired, but the most of those visited I found in a fairly prosperous and flourishing condition, and those that were not so owed their condition principally to lack of individual effort. In some instances I found lodges condoning the offence of drunkenness, and carrying members who were habitual users of intoxicants to excess. In these instances I pointed out our laws dealing with such cases and advised the strict adherance.

Early in April a protest was lodged by the Recorder of Vancouver Lodge No. 5 against the payment by the Grand Lodge of the sum of \$51.40 to Wm. Ragless, to this I replied in effect that the action was that of the Grand Lodge in session, and I had no power to alter it.

Certain of our membership have been corresponding with the official organ of the Rebel Grand Lodge of Ontario, evidently with the intent to stir up in our midst a feeling of disloyalty to the Supreme Lodge. The knowledge of this action led me to communicate with G. M. W. Unitt of Ontario, desiring him to inform me as to the extent of such correspondence, and his reply assured me that for the present Ontario was quite content to mind her own business, and was not inviting the amalgamation of any other Canadian jurisdiction, at the same time admitting that considerable correspondence had come from individuals in this jurisdiction calculated to that end.

Owing to the temporary absence from the jurisdiction of the Grand Medical Examiner, on August 23rd last I appointed Bro. Dr. R. E. Walker Grand Medical Examiner pro tem.

Our jurisdiction has been favored by a visit from Supreme Lecturer and Past Supreme Master Workman Bro. J. G. Tate. I regret that

owing to the short time he was allowed to be with us, that it was impossible to have him speak to all the lodges in the jurisdiction. However, he has done good work, which it remains for each member of the Order to make permanent by a strong effort to increase our membership.

The time of Bro. Tate's visit was inopportunate, coming as it did in our most inclement season, and, realizing that his success was to a considerable extent hampered by this cause. I have written the Supreme Master Workman Bro. Robson, expressing our satisfaction with Bro-Tate and his efforts, and asking if it is possible that he be permitted to spend his holidays in B. C. and be with us again in August, September or October of this year.

A committee was formed at the close of last session to arrange for the publication of a fraternal paper in this jurisdictien. Investigation by this committee has shown that the publication of a paper was too expensive an undertaking for this Grand Lodge to assume just at this time, and the matter was accordingly dropped.

NEW LODGES.

On July 23rd last, Grand Organizer Bro. Ragless instituted Nelson Lodge No. 10 at Nelson, B. C., with 22 charter members.

Bro. Ragless resigned the position of Grand Organizer on October 3rd last, and since that time the position has been vacant.

Few, if any, of the Grand Master Workmen who hold office, however much they would desire to do so, are unable to spend the time that should be spent visiting and instructing the several lodges throughout the jurisdiction and the neglect of this is in my opinion very detrimental to the interests of our Order. I think for that reason it is advisable for this Grand Lodge to secure the services of a first-cless man and place him permanently in the field in the interests of our Order in the province.

EDW1N FIELD CASE.

In December last suit was brought against the Order by one of the beneficiaries of the late Bro. Edwin Field. This was a case where the member prior to his decease, desired to change his beneficiaries, and on the proper form being complied with a new certificate was issued, leaving the former beneficiary \$500.00 less than provided for in the first certificate. This they refused to accept, claiming the full \$2,000, hence the suit. Acting under advice the Grand Lodge will pay the money into court, leaving the parties to the issue to come to such settlement as the court shall decide.

CONSOLIDATION OF LODGES.

Permission was granted to Sullivan Lodge No. 6 to consolidate with Vancouver Lodge No. 5, and on November 26 last the consolidation was effected, by mutual agreement, the consolidated lodges to be known as Vancouver Lodge No 5.

DECISIONS.

March 20th, 1897.—From Fraser Lodge No. 3, two brothers granted Clearance Cards, both became members of other lodges in the jurisdiction.

Query.—What assessments or liabilities are due this lodge by the above brothers. They paid dues in advance for two months; also assessment for the month of February. Should assessment notices be sent the respective lodges of which they are now members, of the assessments they would have been liable for had they remained members of this lodge, and if not will the lodge be liable for such assessments. Above Clearance Cards were granted by the Recorder without the authority or knowledge of the lodge.

Answer.—The first requisite in granting a Clearance Card from one lodge to another is that all pending dues and assessments be paid to the date of granting such case. The card is then granted and member continues to pay assessments to the granting the card until such time as the card is deposited in another lodge, i. e., there is no transfer of membership until the deposit of said card. After the deposit of the card the Grand Recorder is notified, and thereafter the member pays his assessments through the channel of the lodge in which the card has been deposited. This ruling is not changed in the case of a new lodge, and even if the new members admitted are not liable for assessments the member entering by card is liable and should pay his assessments through the new lodge. You could not assess members in advance on any prospectus of assessments needed, as you would have no authority to do so, but you collect the assessments in the regular way through the lodge to which they have entered. There is only one way in which a Clearance Card can be issued, and that is provided by law. Clearance Cards can only be granted by a vote of the lodge. This clearly makes it necessary for your lodge to take immediate steps to legalize the cards granted by your Recorder without the consent or knowledge of the lodge. I would suggest that a resolution, citing the facts and ratifying your action in issuing the cards, be adopted by your lodge and spread upon its minutes.

January 5, 1893.—From the Recorder of Granville Lodge No. 2.

1st.—Is a regular election for officers of a lodge held on a meeting night, after the regular meeting night in December, without a legal excuse therefor a legal election?

2nd.—Is an officer declared to be elected by the Master Workman who has not been balloted for, a legally elected officer?

3rd.—What would be a legal excuse for holding an election after the last meeting in December?

Answer.—1st. If a subordinate lodge has not held an election at the time specified by the Constitution, and does hold such election at a subsequent meeting, I am of the opinion that such election is legal, our laws are silent about this point, but common usage has been that if for any cause the election was not held at the time it should have been, that if held as soon after as possible that such election was proper and legal.

2nd.—The Supreme Lodge Digest, page 113, declares that a ballot is not necessary when only one candidate is in nomination, and that the Master Workman may declare him elected by consent.

3rd.—A legal excuse for holding an election subsequent to the time appointed by law for such would be the fact that such election was not held at the time it should have been our laws do not contemplate that because an election was not held as and at the time appointed by law that there shall not be any election.

DISPENSATIONS.

November 15th, 1897.—Maple Leaf Lodge No. 17, applied for a dispensation to hold a regular meeting on Friday, January 7th, 1898.

A dispensation was granted for the purpose of installing the officers for the ensuing term.

OFFICE OF THE GRAND MARTER WORKMAN, NEW WESTMINSTER, April, 1897.

To the Subordinate Lodges of the Ancient Order of United Workmen of British Columbia:

OFFICIAL CIRCULAR NO. 1.

Your attention is drawn to the amendment to Beneficiary Rule 13, passed by the Grand Lodge at its last session, and which will be operative on and after the 1st day of July, 1897, whereby the plan of assessment is changed from the level assessment of one dollar upon each member to the following classified plan:

OFFICIAL CIRCULAR NO. 2.

To the Officers and Members of the Subordinate Lodges, A. O. U. W., of B. C.:

GREETING:

I have the pleasure in announcing that the Supreme Lecturer, Bro. J. G. Tate, will visit this jurisdiction officially for ten days, commencing February 3rd.

I trust the members of our Order will avail themselves of this opportunity of hearing Brother Tate, who is a peerless orator, and I would suggest the advisability of lodges elsewhere located to make up parties and be present at one of the places when he is to speak.

Brother Tate is a regularly ordained minister of the Presbyterian Church, English born, and has been a resident of America for some fifteen years. During that time he has taken a very active interest in our Order. He has held office as Grand Master Workman of Nebraska for four consecutive years, from 1893 to 1897. In the Supreme Lodge he has held the

office of Supreme Overseer, Supreme Foreman, and in 1896 was advanced to the honorable position of Supreme Master Workman, which office he filled to the satisfaction of the entire Order.

In 1897 the services of Brother Tate were secured as Supreme Lecturer, and he has met with great success in each jurisdiction he has visited. He comes to us from the jurisdiction of Oregon.

I beg to urge upon all true Workmen the necessity of their earnest co-operation with the work of Brother Tate that the result may be a large increase in the membership of this jurisdiction.

SUGGESTIONS.

I trust that this Grand Lodge will again take up the question of the circulation of an official paper in this jurisdiction. If it be found too expensive an undertaking, possibly an arrangement could be entered into with one of our neighboring jurisdictions, who publish a paper in the interests of the Order to publish a British Columbia edition, which would cost probably very little extra over the ordinary subscription rates.

I beg that the Grand Lodge will consider the advisability of changing the date of our annual session. I am of the opinion that a later date would be preferable.

The Klondike gold excitement has added another element of risk in the issuance of Beneficiary Certificates and it may be advisable for you to enact such legislation that will prevent the issuance of certificates to applicants who intend incurring the risk of travel in that country.

CONCLUSION.

I cannot bring this report to a close without expressing in this public manner my sincere thanks to my associate officers and members of Grand Lodge Committees. This is particularly true of the Grand Recorder, who has at all times been ready to aid me in the discharge of my duties. His great experience in the work of the Order has made him a valuable counsellor in the year now closing. I am also under great obligation to P. G. M. W. Church, who as chairman of the Finance Committee has been a most valuable helper in carrying out the work of the Order. On every hand I have found a spirit of harmony and mutual helpfulness everywhere manifested by all the officers and committeemen with whom I have come in contact. Realizing the importance of my duties I have sought the advice and counsel of my brothers in every time of doubt, and if I have been successful in avoiding the dangers

incident to the business of the year, it is because I have been advised and aided by those who gave me their helpful assistance.

And now brethren as we are about to enter upon the work of the session of 1898, let me entreat you to sacrifice all individual interests to the common good of the whole, so that the result of your deliberations may more closely draw the silken cords of home and fraternity that tend to bind us all into one grand brotherhod, whose work of philanthrophy is worthy of your best effort.

I ask your charitable judgment on all my official actions, and praying God's blessing to rest upon our beloved Order I respectfully submit this report.

REPORT OF THE GRAND RECORDER.

To the Grand Master Workman, Officers and Brothers of the Grand Lodge, A. O. U. W., of British Columbia:

Brethren:—In compliance with the Constitution, I have the honor to submit the annual report of this office, showing the business transacted for the fiscal year 1897.

The financial transactions are fully set forth in detail in the exhibits herewith, which shows a larger volume of business than any preceding year.

The number of deaths occurring in the last month of the series of 1896, viz. four, made it impossible to assess for the requisite amount in that year to settle the claims, thereby adding to the burden of the present year. During the series of 1897 there were fourteen deaths, and one occurring outside the jurisdiction in 1896, for which proof of death was not obtained until January, 1897, was carried over to the series of 1897, making a total of fifteen deaths.

Twenty level assessments was issued during the first six months, and six classified assessments was issued during the remaining six months of the year, still leaving four claims unprovided for.

Application was made to the Relief Board, and the Board, after adjusting the accounts of the Beneficiary Fund for the year, granted relief in the sum of \$9,767.77.

For the first six months of the year, working under the level assessment plan, there was 126 suspensions and 41 re-instatements; for the remaining six months, under the classified plan, suspensions 123, re-instatements 78.

During the year three new lodges have been organized—one at Rossland, another at Trail, and the third at Nelson.

On the 26th of November, Sullivan Lodge No. 6 amalgamated with Vancouver Lodge No. 5, the membership of the former being transferred to the latter.

The net increase in membership is small, for which several reasons might be assigned, the principal one being the unnatural and excessive death rate and consequent heavy assessments.

One hundred and seventy-six medical examinations were received and passed upon by me during the year. This is an increase of 58 over the number received last year, and, I think, shows an increasing appreciation of the benefits of our noble Order. It is satisfactory to note also that the average age of applicants continues to decrease. This is particularly the case with accepted applicants, as will be seen by reference to Table E.

During the year assessments were called for 16 deaths. Most of these among the oldest members, but two had belonged to the Order less than one year. One of these died from pneumonia, and the other from consumption. Although consumption is, as a rule, a slow lingering disease, occasionally it is very rapid in its course, and, after giving due consideration to this case, I came to the conclusion that the medical examiner acted in perfect good faith, and could not be blamed for recommending the risk.

Since the last meeting of Grand Lodge the new medical examination blank has been put into use. It is an improvement on the old one, but is capable of further improvement in the arrangement of the spaces for the answers, and in the phraseology of some of the questions. These, however, may easily be remedied when the next supply is printed. As the medical examination papers are now filed in the office of the Grand Medical Examiner, I have not thought it necessary to procure the new Register, for which authority was given at the last annual meeting.

May 25th, 1897.—Claim from Vancouver Lodge No. 5, on death of J. W. Griffiths, was approved, and it was recommended that Assessments 18, 19, 20 for claim No. 6 be called for June 1st, 1897.

Also claim from Victoria Lodge No. 1, on death of A Laing, was approved, and it was recommended that Classified Assessment No. 1 for claim No. 7 be called for July 1st, 1897.

July 26th, 1897.—Claim from Victoria Lodge No. 1, on death of El. Field, was approved, and it was recommended that Classified Assertion ment No. 2 for claim No. 8 be called for August 1st, 1897.

Aug. 25th, 1897.—Claim from Vernon Lodge No. 16, on death of E. Driscoll, was approved, and it was recommended that Classified Assess-No. 3 for claim No. 9 be called for September 1st, 1897.

Sept. 25th, 1897.—Claim from Fraser Lodge No. 3, on death of H. V. Edmonds, was approved, and it was recommended that Classified Assessment No. 4 for claim No. 10 be called for October 1st, 1864

Oct. 25th, 1897.—Claim from Fraser Lodge No. 3, on death of M. M. English, was approved, and it was recommended that Classified Assessment No. 5 for claim No. 11 be called for November 1st, 1897.

Nov. 25th, 1897.—Claim from Vancouver Lodge No. 5, on death of M. D. Gleeson, was approved, and it was recommended that Classified Assessment No. 6 for claim No. 12 be called for December 1st, 1897.

Dec. 24th, 1897.—Claim from Granville Lodge No. 2, on death of C. A. Caldwell.

Claim from Sullivan Lodge No. 6, on death of W. Berridge.

Claim from Victoria Lodge No. 1, on death of L. E. Erb.

Also claim from Rossland Lodge No. 8, on death of John F. Waters, was approved. Having called assessments to the maximum required by the laws of the Order, the above claims was referred to the Supreme Board of Relief, through the Grand Recorder, Bro. J. T. McIlmoyl, and with the consent of the Grand Master Workman, Bro. A. E. Woods.

Also claim from Victoria Lodge No. 1, on death of Henry Jewell, was approved, and it was recommended that Classified Assessment No. 1 for claim No. 1 be called for January 1st, 1898.

Jan. 25th, 1898.—Claim from Delta Lodge No. 12, on death of F. L. Lord, was approved and it was recommended that Classified Assessment No. 2 for claim No. 2 be called for February 1st, 1898. We also beg to report that this jurisdiction has been granted relief to the amount of \$9,767.77.

Feb 25th, 1898.—We recommended that Relief Call No. 18 for \$1 be called for March 1st, 1898.

RECOMMENDATIONS.

We beg to call the attention of this Grand Lodge to the fact that since the Grand Recorder has moved to the city of Victoria, he has provided an office at his own expense. We would therefore recommend that a suitable office (with vault if possible) be provided for the Grand Recorder, We call particular attention to the condition we would be in if the records should be destroyed.

We would recommend that a thorough organizer beengaged during the next year to build up the order, and that legislation be enacted at this session to that end.

We believe that if radical changes are to be made at any time in conducting the affairs of the Grand Lodge, the change should be made while the affairs in the different departments are in charge of brothers who have in the past, as well as the present time, the entire confidence of this Grand Lodge.

We therefore recommend that guarantee bonds be required of both the Grand Recorder and Grand Receiver, and that same be paid by the Grand Lodge. That the Grand Receiver be required to open an account in some chartered bank (subject to the approval of the Committee on Finance) in the name of the Grand Lodge, A. O. U. W., in which all moneys shall be placed, and that all moneys shall be paid out on cheques, signed by the Grand Receiver and Grand Recorder.

Your committee take pleasure in being able to report that their labors during the year have been facilitated and greatly aided by both the Grand Recorder and Grand Receiver in affording all assistance possible in auditing the books of the different offices, as well as by their aid and counsel at the meetings. The Grand Lodge is to be congratulated on having such able and efficient officers as Bros. J. T. McIlmoyl and R. T. Williams in charge of the business affairs of the Lodge.

REPORT OF THE REPRESENTATIVES TO THE SUPREME LODGE.

To the Officers and Members of the Grand Lodge, A. O. U. W., of B. C.:

Brethen:—We, the undersigned, your Representatives in the Supreme Lodge, beg to submit the following report of the action of the Supreme Lodge upon such matters coming before that body that we think are of interest to this Grand Lodge.

The twenty-fifth stated meeting of the Supreme Lodge was held at the city of Milwaukee, Wis., commencing June 8th, 1897, and concluded its session June 15th, 1897. The following amendments to the Supreme Lodge Constitution were adopted:

CONSTITUTION OF THE SUPREME LODGE.

Amend Section 20, Sub-section 3, to read as follows:

3. On Laws, to consist of three, to examine and report upon the Constitution, By-Laws, Rules and Regulations of Grand Lodges and of amendments thereto. When the Supreme Lodge is not in session their report shall be made to the Supreme Master Workman.

This committee shall also examine the decisions made by the Grand Master Workmen of the several jurisdictions involving any construction of the Ritual or the laws of the Supreme Lodge, and report to the Supreme Lodge at each session their recommendation of approval or disapproval thereof. Whenever the Supreme Lodge shall approve or disapprove any such decision, its action shall be decisive on the subject matter therein referred to.

This committee shall also perform such other duties as may be required by the Supreme Lodge or the Supreme Master Workman.

Amend Section 29, to read as follows:

29. Visitors. Grand Lodges may admit as visitors Past Master Workmen who are members in good standing in their respective subordinate lodges, and who have received the Grand Lodge Degree, and if a Grand Lodge sees proper so to do, all Past Master Workmen under its jurisdiction may be admitted to full membership, and when the nature of the business will permit, a Grand Lodge may, by a two-thirds vote, conduct business other than ritualistic in the Workman Degree, at which time Workman Degree Members in good standing in subordinate lodges may be permitted to be present.

Amend Section 38, Supreme Lodge Constitution by adding thereto a new sub-section, to be known as Sub-section 12, to read as follows:

"12. Grand Recorders shall send to each member of the Committee on Laws of the Supreme Lodge, as soon as published, one copy of the printed proceedings after each and every session of the Grand Lodge."

GENERAL LAWS.

Amend General Law XI, Section 1, to read as follows:

1. How Raised. The Relief Fund shall consist of a sum equal to one dollar for each and every Workman Degree beneficial member in good standing upon the 30th day of June, and shall be raised by each Grand Lodge prior to the 31st day of December of each and every year, by an assessment or assessments upon each Workman Degree beneficial member of the Order under its jurisdiction. The Relief Fund thus raised shall remain intact in the hands of the Grand Receivers of the various Grand Lodges, or in such other depository as the Grand Lodges may designate, until it is called by the Relief Board, and when called by the Relief Board it shall be forwarded to the Supreme Lodge Treasury in the manner hereinafter specified. Should the amount called by the Relief Board exceed the sum total of the Relief Fund in the hands of the Grand Lodges aforesaid, then the excess required shall be immediately raised by an assessment and forwarded as other relief funds are forwarded. Assessments for the Relief Fund shall be levied and collected in the same manner and under the same laws, rules and regulations as ordinary assessments for the Beneficiary Fund, and all laws of the Order in regard to suspensions for non-payment of Beneficiary Fund assessments or reinstatement of Workman Degree beneficial members shall be applicable also to assessments made for the Relief Fund. Grand Lodges may raise their Relief Fund from their Beneficiary or General Funds, and subordinate lodges may pay Relief Fund assessments for their entire membership from their General Fund; provided, that whenever a Grand Lodge, which raises its Relief Fund from its Beneficiary Fund is an applicant for relief, then the amount of Beneficiory Fund transferred to it: Relief Fund shall and must be accounted for and applied to the pay ment of Beneficiary claims by the Relief Board before such Grand Lodge is entitled to receive relief. The sum total of the calls made by the Relief Board upon the Relief Fund in the treasuries of the various Grand Lodges shall in no case exceed the sum of three dollars per member in any one year.

Any surplus arising from Relief Calls shall constitute a fund for the payment of subsequent relief, when one dollar may not be sufficient to pay the relief needed.

Although the foregoing has been published in the Journal of the Supreme Lodge, we deem it wise to present them in this report that they may be again brought to your attentich and duly placed in the Journal of Proceedings of this Grand Lodge.

In addition to the foregoing, there were some decisions of the Supreme Master Workman approved by the Supreme Lodge that may be of interest to the membership in this jurisdiction.

The following decision made by the Supreme Master Workman were approved by the Supreme Lodge:

Question.—Can we accept a candidate who is a manager of a hotel, employing a clerk to attend the bar, the license being in his wife's name and he simply looking after the business as a whole?

Answer.—In the light of Decision 3, page 37, of the printed Journal of the last Supreme Lodge, which was approved by that body, such a candidate cannot be accepted.

The following resolutions, affecting some or all of the Grand Jurisdictions, were adopted by the Supreme Lodge and are now in force.

Resolved, That any jurisdiction which shall make a net increase of new members from June 1, 1897, to June 1, 1898, of twenty-five (25) per cent., shall receive from the Supreme Lodge the sum of \$2,000, providing that no jurisdiction shall be entitled to receive said sum unles the net increase shall exceed 1,000 new members

Resolved, That the incoming Supreme Master Workman be and he is hereby authorized to secure the services of our present Supreme Master Workman, J. G. Tate, to labor for the upbuilding and extension of the Order, whenever and wherever, in the judgment of the incoming Supreme Master Workman he shall deem it to be for the best interests of the Order; provided that the total expense of the same to this Supreme Lodge shall not exceed three thousand dollars, all bills for services and travelling expenses to be approved by the Supreme Master Workman and Committee on Finance.

The following recommendation of the Relief Board was adopted, and the Relief Law amended, granting the authority therein requested:

RELIEF CALLS.

Item 12.—The Board would recommend that it may be allowed to call the "one dollar," now provided for in the Relief Law, at any time they believe the necessities of the Order demand it, and that they be not limited to the time now fixed by law, namely, after their meeting in January. The object of this recommendation is to allow the Board to extend relief to jurisdictions at any time in the year when it is clearly

apparent that any jurisdiction is entitled to relief. The protracted delay in the payment of claims in jurisdictions entitled to relief is a very serious detriment to their growth, as well as a great hardship to the bereaved beneficiaries of our deceased brethren. We recommend that the Committee on Laws be instructed to prepare necessary amendments to our Relief Law, to confer the authority herein requested.
