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LAURIER WILL BASE CAMPAIGN ON "ALL RED" FAST SERVICE

SIFTON TO BE CHIEF ORGANIZER.
Indications in Political Circles Point to a Dissolution of Parliament—Gossip is Interesting.
LAURIER WILL RETURN TO CANADA JULY 1

OTTAWA, May 23.—(Special.)—Your correspondent was talking to-night to a gentleman who had read the article in to-day's World which stated that Hon. Clifford Sifton had turned into a financial magnate and would not likely be active again in Canadian politics.

He said this is only partly true; that Mr. Sifton is a financial magnate, as stated; but that he will be active in fact, on his way back to Canada to take a hand in Canadian politics and to become the chief election boss of the Liberal party in an appeal to the country which was to take place as soon as Mr. Sifton could complete arrangements, and that he had all the necessary requirements to that end at his disposal. There would not be another session of the present parliament.

His idea was that Sir Wilfrid would take a while longer in Europe under the guise of not being concerned about Canadian affairs while in Europe, but that he would be in close touch with them and with Mr. Sifton by cable.

Mr. Sifton would soon after his return to Canada spring upon the country the international or "all red" steamship and railway service between Asia and Europe which would be running in full force to-day, pending the case coming up in the courts next Monday.

After a lengthy consideration on the action taken by Chief Inspector Purvis in closing up the Woodbine bar, the board of license commissioners decided yesterday afternoon to take no action whatever in the matter, and expressed themselves as content to leave the matter to the discretion of Mr. Purvis.

To The World, Mr. Purvis stated that he would give out nothing as to what his intentions were. He would take the night to think it over, at least.

H. M. Ballantyne, who is appearing for the Jockey Club, stated that the bar under the grand stand would be running in full force to-day, pending the case coming up in the courts next Monday.

He argued before the commission that it was not the business of this board to deal with this question. The bar was closed simply through deference to the inspector and the board. The carrying-on of the bar was clearly within the limits of the law, and it was purely a question of law, which should be taken up before the courts.

This had been going on for twenty years and had no trouble whatever. The place was being, and had been, conducted in the most proper manner, until an intoxicated man had never been on the premises. The Jockey Club entered to the best people in the community.

Mr. Ballantyne read the act, and explained that there was no question but that the grand stand bar was a part of the premises, and therefore legal. He was all round for any kick on the allegation that the license had been granted to one single number. It had been granted, not to 369 East Queen, but to the whole premises—the Woodbine racecourse.

If we are not within the law, we will stop, and I think the proper course for the board is to say that we have no business with this, as it is up to the law courts.

Mr. Wilson wanted to know if Mr. P. Fraser and Bryant were the servants of the Jockey Club, and Mr. Ballantyne stated they were.

Bryant Servant of Club.
"Mr. Bryant was appointed manager of the bar by the Jockey Club," said the lawyer, "and makes payments to them. I do not know that there is any contract between Bryant and the club, separating the two premises, but during the night he received \$1000. for conducting the grand stand bar.

"I don't see that that affects the license. Surely if we are wrong, it will close us up in the middle of a meet."

Chairman Wilson disagreed. Inspector Purvis said he was wrong, and that he had been informed that Bryant bought the privileges from the Jockey Club, and was therefore doing it as a business. The inspector might have seized the liquors there.

Mr. Defoe thought that it was a pretty serious matter to close it up at the time.

Jos. Haverson, K. C., advised the board to leave the matter alone.

Reform Pleaded.
Hon. S. C. Biggs and Rev. Dr. Chown appeared for the Methodist Moral Reform Association. Mr. Biggs believed the action of Inspector Purvis to be correct. This license had been issued to Fraser, not to the Jockey Club.

Mr. Millicamp pointed out that Mr. Biggs was wrong in this idea, because, under the act, the license was issued to the corporation, thru Mr. Fraser.

Mr. Biggs continued: "He had been informed by Dr. Chown that Bryant had paid to the Jockey Club \$3000 for the privilege to sell under the grand stand. There was no doubt that Bryant was selling liquor, and that the privilege had been farmed out to him by the Jockey Club."

"My learned friend wants this board to let them go on," continued Mr. Biggs, "to sell liquor for the next two weeks, even if they have no license. My client contends that the bar is illegal, and there is no evidence to the contrary."

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ASKED \$150,000 FOR ELECTION PURPOSES

In Return for Concessions to Belgian Syndicate—Quebec Minister is Accused.

QUEBEC, May 23.—(Special.)—Baron Lepine swore positively to-day, while under examination as a witness for the defence in the libel case of Hon. Jean Prevost against Mr. Asselin of Montreal, that the Belgian syndicate for which he acted here in 1905 was asked by Mr. Turgeon to contribute the equivalent of \$150,000 to the Liberal election fund, in exchange for an option on a large tract of land in the Abitibi district.

Hon. Mr. Prevost's lawyers endeavored to shut out the evidence on the ground that it had nothing to do with the libel upon Prevost, but Mr. Lafamme, representing Asselin, urged that Prevost was shown to have known of these land negotiations and the court admitted the testimony, and compelled the baron, who had hesitated, to tell all he knew.

Lepine produced the letter from Turgeon, minister of lands, giving the option on lands to the baron, with the right of transfer, and also a letter from the baron to Mr. Desjardins, head of the Belgian syndicate, notifying him of the fact and saying he thought he should cross to Belgium to see him, because there were things which could be better explained verbally than by writing.

Counsel insisting on what he referred to as "the baron's case," urged that he should especially explain the different usages in vogue here from those in Europe, and to which Belgians were not accustomed.

"Pressed to say what they were, he replied: 'Well, it was a Canadian minister who said that elections were not made with prayers, was it not?'"

Mr. Lafamme: "Yes, he said it and practiced it. But what followed from that in your case?"

Mr. Turgeon: "What had the minister with whom you negotiated said to you relatively to these usages?"

Baron Lepine: "Well, that it was the habit of the party in power to provide by great public works or great concessions for a reserve, a surmount."

Mr. Lafamme: "A reserve for what?"

Answer: "I don't know."

Another story from Ottawa is that a prominent minister is expected to return to the pursuit of his regular vocation.

No Definite Scheme Laid Before Conference

LONDON, May 23.—(C.A.P.)—In the house of commons Winston Churchill stated that no definite scheme was laid before the conference for a proposed subsidized "all red" mail route. The contracts would have to be examined in minute detail.

He also stated that a verbatim report of the conference would be issued at the end of this month.

Laurier Will Return To Canada July 1

PARIS, May 23.—The Canadian premier, Sir Wilfrid Laurier, arrived here last night from London, and spent the day paying official visits. He called on Premier Clemenceau, Foreign Minister Pichon, and the British ambassador, Sir Francis Bertie, and will be received in audience by President Fallieres to-morrow.

The purpose of Sir Wilfrid's visit to the continent is to see if it is possible to negotiate and make mutually more advantageous tariff arrangements, between Canada and France, Italy and Belgium. The subject, however, has not yet been broached at the French foreign office, as Sir Wilfrid desires the presence of W. S. Fielding, the Canadian minister of finance, and L. P. Dineen, the Canadian minister of marine and fisheries, who arrive here Saturday.

IS LEFT TO INSPECTOR TO REGULATE BARS AT WOODBINE TRACK

License Commissioners Take No Action, and O.C. Officials Say Sale of Liquor Will Be Resumed To-Day.

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ROBBED EMPLOYER FOR NUMBER OF YEARS

Clerk and Saloon Keeper Arrested on Serious Charge, May Amount to Many Thousands.

HALIFAX, N. S., May 23.—(Special.)—The police authorities to-day unearthed a robbery, the extent of which will only be revealed after an official investigation. Smith & Proctor, large produce commission merchants, missed a quantity of butter and cheese, several hundred dollars' worth, from their warehouses to-day. The police were notified, and in a few hours had Wm. Hubley, a clerk in the packing department of the firm, and a saloonkeeper named Young under arrest, charged with the theft.

Hubley, during the day, would carry out cases of butter and cheese and hide them in an alleyway at the rear of the store, and after dark, in company with Young, removed the goods and sold them to a storekeeper, on whose premises were found a large quantity of the stolen goods.

There is evidence that the operations of the thieves have extended over a long period, and that the firm have been robbed of thousands of dollars.

SEEDING ABOUT OVER.
Weekly Report Shows Things to Be Satisfactory.

WINNIPEG, Man., May 23.—(Special.)—The weekly seeding report made by the agents of the Canadian Pacific Railway shows that in a large portion of the country the wheat has all been sown, and at many points the sowing of the coarse grains has also been finished.

NEW TENDER FOR READERS AT HALF RATE

Government Saves People \$60,000 Year—Canada Publishing Co. Get Contract.

The Canada Publishing Co., Ltd., was awarded the tender for the publication of school books by the provincial government yesterday, the prices for the set of five readers being in all 66 cents, as compared with \$1.15 for the old issue.

In addition, 25 per cent. is allowed off all books, one or more, when bought direct from the publishers, and an extra ten per cent. on quantities of \$2500 worth and over.

It is estimated that should each child purchase one book a year in the schools the saving over the old prices will be \$60,000 a year to the province.

This is figured on 91,000 in the first reader, part one; 66,000, first reader, part two; 75,000, second reader; 81,000, third reader; and 76,000, fourth reader. The new prices are as follows for the Ontario series of readers:

First reader, part one, 6c; old price, 10c. First reader, part two, 7c; old price, 11c. Second reader, 9c; old price, 12c. Third reader, 13c; old price, 16c. Fourth reader, 15c; old price, 40c.

Total cost under new prices for complete set of Ontario readers, 49c.

Under old price, \$1.15.

Premier Whitney was particularly pleased with the result of the tendering.

"It is very satisfactory to me," he said, "having regard to the statements and promises made by me to the people of the province that after five years in the past ten years that we would bring down the prices of school books, or know the reason why."

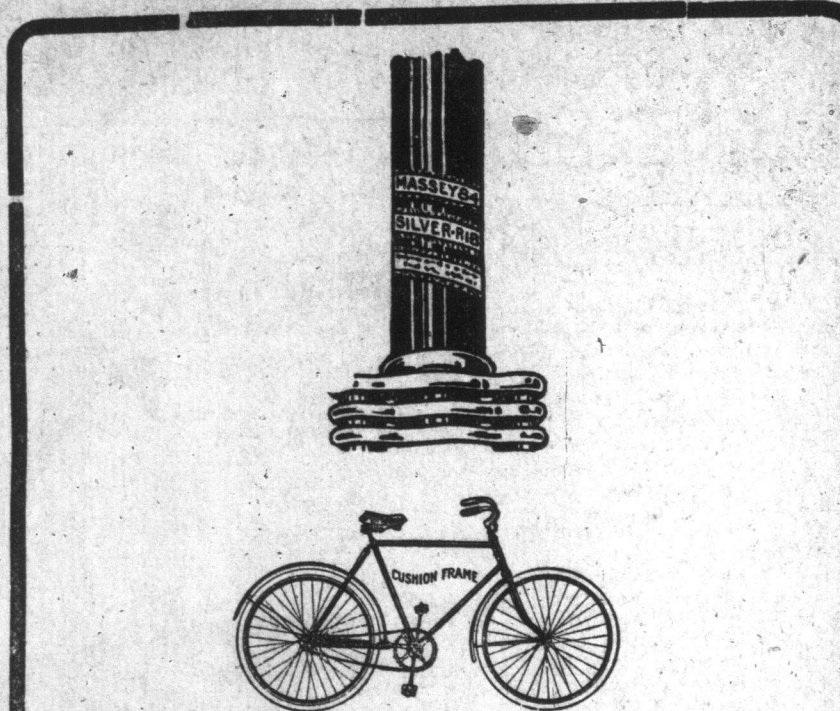

WHERE WILL WE GET THE BANK CAPITAL?

The suggestion of The World the other day that the time had arrived when some of our leading banks should double their capital stock has been suddenly confirmed by the decision of the shareholders at the annual meeting of the Imperial Bank to increase their capital from \$5,000,000 to \$10,000,000.

We believe a similar policy will be adopted by quite a number of other banks.

We are glad to see this move now under way in view of the rapid expansion that is taking place in Canada, but it has this rather unsatisfactory feature, that as long as the right to take up the new stock is limited to existing shareholders, who are most of them residents of Canada, it follows that the increase in national capital will be more apparent than real.

For bank shareholders will simply be taking money that they now have invested in one business and putting it into another, and the transaction thus becomes a mere transfer from one page of the ledger capital amount to another page.

What Canada really needs is an increase of capital from outside, and some way must be found or sought to be found whereby outside capital, namely, money from Europe or the United States, can be induced to come to this country to be put into bank shares.

At present we do not suggest what, if any, modifications might be made in the bank laws in this direction, but we are open to receive suggestions and hope some of our readers will be able to make a contribution that will be of some value.

For instance our loan companies get their additional money by the sale of debentures, most of them to capitalists in Great Britain. We can also imagine an arrangement being made between Canadian banks and European banks for a transfer of a portion of their capital or their deposits to Canada, for investment in Canadian business when the circumstances warrant it.

There are also people who think that if the country requires an increase of capital, and inasmuch as the government has already made an issue of its own notes, the time has arrived when the amount of these notes ought to be considerably increased, especially if such an increase would in any way enlarge the amount of money available for business.

There are banking experts, however, who contend that an increased issue of government notes is no increase of the currency of the country. We do not quite agree with them. The whole question, however, needs consideration, and we do not know of any question so worthy of careful investigation. Certainly if anybody has a suggestion to make that would throw light on the subject, he will be conferring a favor on the public by presenting it. How can we get more outside money into Canada, do bank capital or as deposits in Canadian banks?

THE GREAT CROSS-TOWN CUT.

Men there are in plenty who hear themselves called to the vacancy in this city council created by the untimely demise of Ald. Wilson. But the citizens in choosing should have more regard for the program the candidate fathers than for his person. Presently, no persons, should weigh most in the selection of an alderman.

With this thought in mind, candidates should not be slow to state in what regard they hold the Bloor-street viaduct proposal, for instance. West of Yonge-street and to the north, the city is growing apace. But the Rosedale ravine blocks all progress north-eastwards.

Overcome the Rosedale ravine with a high level bridge, making Bloor-street the great cross-town cut, and a new district northeast of the city will be opened up for habitation. Toronto will thus be given a chance to grow naturally and in harmony with her great future.

CANADA AND THE CONFERENCE.

Now that the imperial conference is of the past and the dust of controversy has had time to settle, the wisdom of the course pursued by the Canadian premier becomes more clearly apparent. No one can say that the circumstances under which it convened were altogether favorable so far at least as regards the matter of an inter-imperial preference. Discussion of this subject could not be avoided even to the attitude of the British government had been plainly disclosed in advance and the problem presented to the representatives of the new Britain was so to place themselves on record that while reaffirming their desire for a preferential trade system, they could not be charged with interference in the domestic politics of the United Kingdom.

THE BEAN AND THE MOTE.

Editor World: In commending the stand taken by your paper this morning under the caption "The New Tyranny," I feel that only my own feelings but the sentiments of thousands of Toronto's best citizens—the people who have made Toronto what it is to-day—one of the most progressive cities on a continent. Preachers and reformers who wear ministerial garb may have a comprehensive knowledge of many things, but they appear to know very little about the conditions of the people as they do practically about the gospel.

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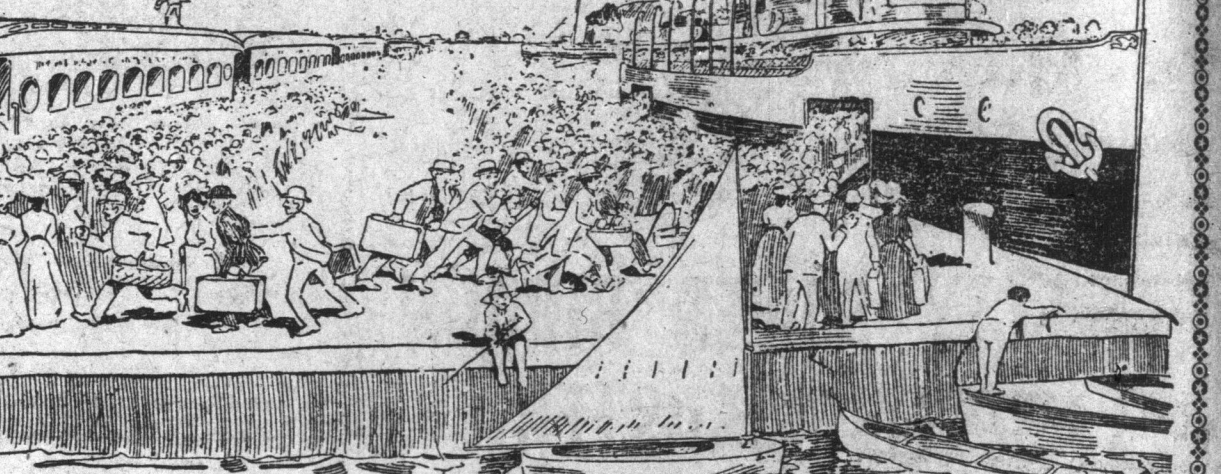

Reference was made to the significance of such an assembly in Rome and a message of good-will from President Roosevelt was read. The next convention will probably be at Tokio in 1910.

Reformed Episcopal Synod. BELLEVILLE, May 23.—The synod of the Reformed Episcopal Church of Canada convened in this city this evening, and will last all day tomorrow.

Strike Practically Ended. BUFFALO, May 23.—The strike of inside freight handlers at the docks was practically ended to-night, when the Western Transit Co. conceded the men an advance of three cents an hour to the 20-cent scale for which the men struck. Over 700 of the 1200 strikers came from the Western Transit sheds and it was said that the other companies involved would meet the advance.

Whiskey Prices Go Up. CINCINNATI, O., May 23.—The first advance in a year in bulk whiskey was made today. It is two cents a gallon, from \$1.29 to \$1.31 per gallon. The prevailing price of corn is given as the cause of the advance. Both independent and trust distillers will demand the advance in accordance with an agreement made when the whiskey war was compromised two years ago.

Teamsters Return to Work. MONTREAL, Que., May 23.—(Special)—The "Shedden" Company's teamsters gave in to-day and went back to work immediately.

COBALT --- Mining Shares Close Weak Over the Holidays --- COBALT

FOSTER STOCK FIRMER ON PROSPECTIVE REPORT

Trading in the Mining Markets Small—Foster and Trethewey Only Firm Issues.

World Office, Thursday Evening, May 23.

Considerable strength was shown by Foster and Trethewey stocks in the mining markets to-day, the buying being sufficiently good to carry prices up several points. The influx of new buying into the Foster stock was presumed to be on the grounds that a statement on the condition of the mine will be made in a few days, and that this will restore confidence among shareholders. Traders were suspicious of to-day's movement, and one rumor was to the effect that the report would not be nearly as eulogistic as many suppose. Aside from the strength in Foster and Trethewey, the market otherwise was distinctly weak. Peterson Lake, Cobalt Lake and Green-Meehan sold lower on very light liquidation. The markets will be closed until Monday, and the inactivity in the trading was due largely to the extended holiday.

ACTION IS DISMISSED.

Florence Mining Co. Fails in Action Against Cobalt Lake Co.

Florence Mining Co. moved before Master-in-Chambers Cartwright to stay the trial of their action against the Cobalt Lake Mining Co., which seeks to recover 20 acres, part of the land covered by the waters of Cobalt Lake. The whole of the land covered by the water of Cobalt Lake was, on Dec. 21, sold to certain persons by the Ontario Government for \$1,000,000, which has all been paid. On Dec. 27, the land was conveyed to the Cobalt Lake Mining Company for \$4,355,000, and a patent was issued to them. The master, after considering the matter, has given judgment, dismissing the application, with costs in the cause.

NOT OUT FOR CONTROL.

The firm of Clarence J. McCusgan deny in toto the rumor from Cobalt that they are trying to secure control of the Foster Company. The firm say they have not dealt in the Foster shares for upwards of three months, and have neither directly nor indirectly sought control of the mine.

PARTY LEAVES FOR COBALT.

J. A. McEwan, mining broker, and a party of sixteen leave to-night for Cobalt on a tour of inspection. A sleeper has been chartered for the trip.

WANT TO BUILD NEW LINE.

Cobalt, May 23.—J. W. Fitzpatrick and Hon. Frank Latchford, directors of the new Nipissing Central Railway Company, have been connected on electric road from Cobalt to New Liskeard at once. Their charter empowers them to build and operate from Timasami to Abitibi. Mr. Latchford was formerly of the T. & N. O. Railway Commission.

AN IMPORTANT CAMP.

Cobalt Shows Highest Grade of Mineral Concentration.

Hamilton Merritt, an associate of the Royal School of Mines, is quoted as follows regarding Cobalt:

"Cobalt," said Mr. Merritt, "is one of the few important camps in Canada that I have not hitherto visited professionally. My glance at Cobalt has been most cursory and superficial, still I have no hesitation in saying in connection with the occurrence of the ore, that while there are, in common with all veins, zones of enrichment and impoverishment, the camp thus far developed is in the aggregate the highest grade of mineral concentration that I have ever seen anywhere."

"What I consider of great importance is evidence of persistence that I was not altogether prepared for. In scientific parlance, I would say that, so far as I saw them, the mineral producers were from well-defined veins along fault lines (which show ample signs of extensive movement in slickenside and selvage or flucan (clay) on one or both walls of which, and occasionally thru and across which, stringers of varying richness occur. The stringers sometimes widening to nearly a foot."

"These fractures must continue to great depth. In this connection, however, we must not lose sight of the possible effect of change of formation. For example, where the strong vein at Silver Lake is in contact with the granite."

PRESEVATION BY PAINT.

Vehicle Used is More Important Than the Pigment.

An important contribution to our knowledge of the composition of different preservative compositions for iron has recently been published by L. E. Andos, a well-known continental writer upon all subjects connected with paint. His lengthy tests have brought into prominence several facts, which often seem to escape notice.

It appears that a simple coat of linseed oil, raw or boiled, or some varnish of oil paint, is useless as a preservative when the metal is to be exposed to the weather—i. e., the sun, rain and damp air; but that granted an oil paint, when the metal is to be exposed to the weather, it will not matter much what particular pigment is selected. But the vehicle, or liquid material must be especially suited to the work. On the contrary, if the metal is to be always under water, especially fresh water, oil paints are of value—except red lead in boiled oil; and the proper red lead is one of those spout varnishes which fall in the air.

An oil paint, when tested on glass seems to indicate permanency under water. It is shown to be devoid of utility when applied to iron. Salt water, such as sea water, is especially dangerous to oil paints than fresh water, and a single layer of white lead in oil withstands a year of exposure to sea water. The best method of protecting iron, which has to be kept under water constantly, is still being investigated, at present it seems that a priming of red lead in boiled oil, is the most satisfactory varnish paint, is the most satisfactory.

For exposure to definitely corrosive influences, a spirit varnish composed of some resin and a hard solvent, is the most lasting coat; but the behavior of this material in air has not yet been studied.

FOUGHT UNDER 18 FLAGS AND DIED IN POVERTY.

MAJ.-GEN. Henry Ronald Douglas MacIver of the Serbian army, who was a modern soldier of fortune, was born on Christmas Day, 1846, in Hampton Roads, Va.

At the close of the war there was much dueling between the officers of the two armies. MacIver was in one of these affairs outside of Vicsburg.

His combatant was Major Tomlin of the Vermont United States Volunteers. They fought with swords, MacIver running his opponent thru the body and cleaning his blade with his handkerchief.

After the Civil War MacIver, with other southern officers, went to Mexico. He fought under Maximilian there.

When the fighting was over he went to the Turkish forces and to burn, destroy or capture any vessel bearing the Turkish flag.

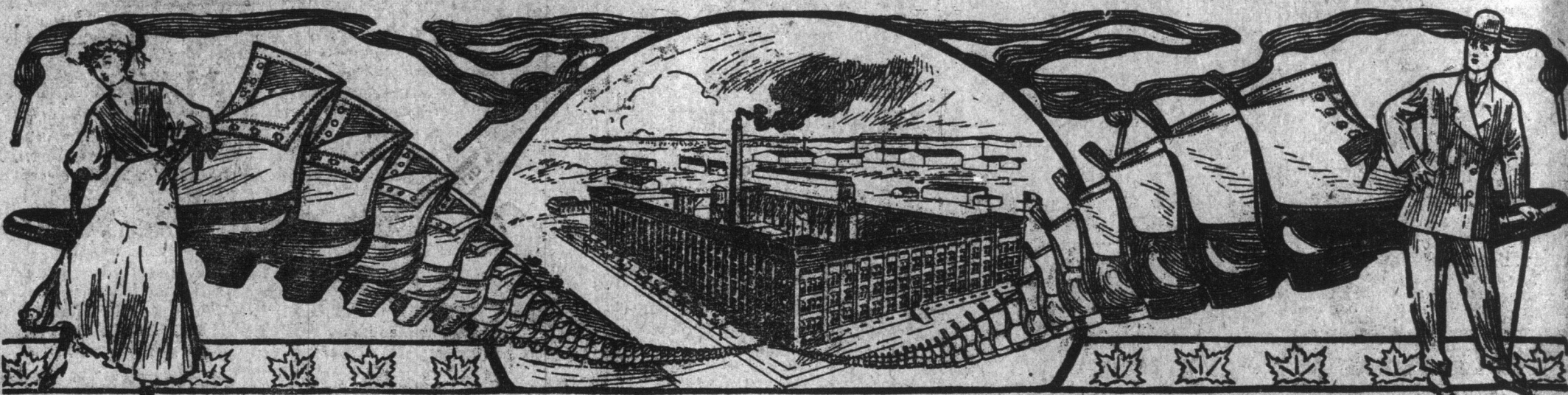
It was in Serbia that MacIver attained his highest rank as an officer. He received a commission from the Prince of Serbia to organize an independent cavalry brigade.

Gen. MacIver sought the lodging house of Mr. Campbell two months ago coming from Washington.
