White's Boer Sortes PLAYED HOG WITH BOERS

Anxiety in London is Now Much Relieved, Owing to the Reassuring News From South Africa—Are British Forces Again Occupying Colenso?

Reinforcements Now at Estcourt En Route From Durban to Ladysmith—Joubert Believed to Have Pulled in His Horns After His Reverses—Hand of Buller Now Seen—No Troopships Yet at Cape Town—Good News Expected.

There is more reassuring news from South Africa this morning. It is only a question of General White's being able to keep the British flag floating over Ladysmith for a few more days, when the public may be promised cheerful reading.

Have They Gone to White's Relief? The most interesting news is a despatch from Estcourt, announcing the departure of a strong force of mounted troops of artillery for a destination not given in the despatches.

To Retake Colenso. Another message announces the arrival at Estcourt and Pietermaritzburg within the last few days of reinforcements from Durban, and that 3500 troops are assembled ready for a re-advance to Colenso when the opportune moment arrives.

General Buller, a Queenstown, Cape Colony, despatch says, has taken effective steps to check the Boer advance, and good news is expected soon.

The severity of the fighting at Ladysmith on Thursday and Friday is confirmed by eye-witnesses. The natives assert that the Boers were so cut up that they howled for mercy on the field.

As yet none of the British troopships have been reported at Cape Town, but it is hinted that they have been intercepted under orders from General Buller and sent on to Durban for the immediate relief of General White at Ladysmith.

To pull through successfully. It is asserted that she has written to Lady White, expressing sympathy with her husband in the trials and difficulties he is now experiencing, and assuring Lady White of her own undiminished confidence in his generalship. The public report of this letter has been cabled to Gen. White by the Marquis of Lansdowne.

Have They Gone to White's Relief? The most interesting news is a despatch from Estcourt, announcing the departure of a strong force of mounted troops of artillery for a destination not given in the despatches.

Treachery Use of White Flag. Reports of a treacherous use of the white flag by the Boers coming from native sources are not received with complete credulity, but at the same time their repetition is making an unfavorable impression.

To Protect Pietermaritzburg. A despatch from Durban gives details which, though rather indefinite, seem to show that the Natal volunteers are moving the big guns, which are not sufficiently mobile for field use, from Estcourt to Pietermaritzburg to assist in the defence of the latter in the event of an attack.

Destroyed the Calvert. A despatch from Maitland, Cape Colony, filed Monday morning, says that, on learning that the Boers were relaying the rails at Nortal's Post, the Railway Department, the previous day, destroyed the culvert between Arundel and Twendale.

Boers Howled for Mercy. Ladysmith is crowded with Boer prisoners and wounded. After the last fight, Durban, Natal, Sunday Evening, Nov. 5.—Other information confirms the statement of native eye-witnesses respecting the severity of the fighting on both Friday and Saturday at Ladysmith.

To Kill General Buller. There was a plot to assassinate the General while en route to Ladysmith. Arrival at Cape Town.

BRITAIN RECOGNIZES SAMOA. An Agreement Reached, Subject to the Approval of the United States.

THAT APPROVAL IS EXPECTED. Germany in Turn Renounces Claims on Tonga Islands and Other Territory.

Berlin, Nov. 8.—It was officially announced this morning that an agreement, subject to the approval of the United States, had been arrived at between Great Britain and Germany, by virtue of which the Samoa Islands and the islands of Upolu, Savali and the small adjacent islands fall to Germany as free property, and the island of Tutuila and the subsidiary islands go to the United States.

At the same time an arrangement has been arrived at between the two powers, by virtue of which the German colony in the Hinterland of German Samoa and the British gold coast will be divided in a manner that leaves the boundary of the German and British territories will be formed by the Palka River up to a point where the Samoa river crosses the degree of latitude, thence north by a line to be fixed by a mixed commission. The countries of Mampuru and Gambia shall fall to Great Britain and the countries of Yendi and Chakosi to Germany. Finally, according to the decision of the Colonial Council, Germany renounces its claims to her extra-territorial rights in Zanzibar till the expiration of the commercial treaty of 1875 with the province of Tanganyika.

Regarding this agreement it is observed that the United States' assent is regarded as assured. A further agreement concluded between Germany and Germany when it was stipulated should be first submitted to the ratification of the United States. This was necessary, as the plan proposed would be only valid if the United States would require approval of the Senate.

It is believed that the arrangement proposed now will be satisfactory to the Department. The United States is not concerned with the amount or character of the compensation to be paid to the other nations. Besides retaining the cooling station at Pago Pago, acquiring the island of Tutuila, the harbor of Apia is located, and the three or four smaller islands in the vicinity. The United States continue to enjoy its stipulated privilege of trading with Apia under conditions as favorable as those existing elsewhere. The islands referred to are not of any particular importance from a commercial point of view, but they are of great importance politically in order to prevent smuggling.





Pacific Mining Letter No. 22—Relating to the West Fork of the Kettle River.

Rock Creek, B.C., Oct. 19.—I have already indicated that to the west of that part of British Columbia known as the Boundary Creek district, and tributary to the upper reaches of the main Kettle and West Fork Rivers, there lies an extensive mineral belt that bids fair to attract the attention of mining men.

C. P. R. May Build Up the Fork.

As previously noted, the West Fork flows into the main Kettle at a point about 100 miles north of Rock Creek, and the camps upon its banks may be reached in any way either Rock Creek or Penton. At present the district is handicapped for want of transportation facilities.
