Manitoba Government Has Secured a Permanent Lease of Northern Pacific and Canadian Northern Lines.

War is Declared Against the Canadian Pacific—Government Has Option of Purchase for Seven Million Dollars—The Whole Thing Turned Over to Mackenzie and Mann.

Winnipeg, Man., Feb. 14.—(Special.)—At the banquet given here, J. A. Davidson, Provincial Treasurer, here tonight, by the Liberal-Conservative Association of New Brunswick, Premier Roblin announced the details of the Government's railway bargain with the Northern Pacific and the Canadian Northern Railway Companies. The contract, a copy of which is in the hands of your correspondent, was dated Feb. 11, and is in brief as follows:

The Government agrees to lease from the Northern Pacific its entire lines in Manitoba, with all the rolling stock, equipment, apparatus, real and personal property, for 99 years, at an annual rental as follows: Five hundred and ten thousand dollars for the first 10 years, \$250,000 for the next 10 years, \$200,000 for the next 10 years, and \$150,000 for the next 10 years, with the option of purchase of all franchises, rights and powers, from time to time, for the sum of \$7,000,000, at any time.

This concludes the deal with the Northern Pacific.

The Mackenzie-Mann Agreement. With Mackenzie & Mann, the Government has agreed that these gentlemen shall take the lease of the hands of the Government on the same terms as those embodied in the Government contract with the Northern Pacific. The lease is simply transferred to Mackenzie & Mann, with the following conditions: Mackenzie & Mann shall pay the rental, carry out all terms of the lease and guarantee the Government against any possible loss or expense in connection therewith. The Government will guarantee 20-year bonds at \$20,000 per mile on the Port Arthur and Rainy River Railway for a distance not to exceed 99 miles, with the interest payable half yearly at 4 per cent. per annum, upon security of a first mortgage on the said line, together with a guarantee on the Northern Pacific and Canadian Northern lines, upon which the Government guarantee bonds at \$10,000 per mile. These bonds are not to be paid until the 1st of January, 1920, and are to be secured from Port Arthur to Winnipeg, on the Rainy River road, and the outstanding bonds on the Northern Pacific and the Canadian Northern are to be delivered up to the Government. The Rainy River line must be completed before Oct. 1, 1901.

Passenger and Freight Rates. Until June 30, 1900, the freight rates on all Mackenzie & Mann lines shall be fixed by the Lieutenant-Governor-in-Council, provided that the company shall be heard in defence of their interests. The passenger rates shall be reduced to three cents per mile. If the receipts do not cover the rentals and working expenses, the Government agrees to bear the balance, provided it has the privilege of auditing the books of the company, with the Chief Justice of Manitoba as supreme arbitrator.

The company may allow remaining rights over their lines to any other company save the Canadian Pacific Railway.

The road must be maintained in a condition to accommodate all traffic, and any dispute thereon shall be decided by the Railway Committee of Canada. The station must be made between Sprague Station on the Rainy River Railway, and some line going to Duluth. The company shall pay a tax of 2 per cent. on its gross earnings on its lines in Manitoba, the work of the Northern Pacific in Winnipeg shall be maintained, where its general office shall also be located.

The company shall not amalgamate or divide profits with the Canadian Pacific Railway, on a plan of nullifying the contract.

The Government has the option, during the year 1920, of purchasing everything belonging to Mackenzie & Mann at a fair market value, to be determined by arbitrators. This option is not assignable by the Government.

The agreement is signed by R. P. Roblin, Premier, and J. M. Smith, secretary of the company, and witnessed by Z. A. Leah, solicitor.

## IMPERIAL PARLIAMENT OPENS WITH POMP AND GRANDEUR

### Procession From Buckingham Palace to House of Lords Was Such a Spectacle as Has Not Been Seen Since 1861, When the Prince Consort Was Living.

#### The Ancient Carriage of State Was Used to Convey the King and Queen, and the Heralds, Equerries, Ushers and Other Attendants Were Costumed in the Ancient Fashion—Brilliant Gathering in the House of Lords—The King's Speech Read by Himself.

London, Feb. 14.—The first Parliament of the reign of King Edward VII. was opened this afternoon by the King in person. His Majesty was accompanied by Queen Alexandra, the Duke of York and Cornwall, the Duke of Connaught and many others of the royal family.

The last state ceremony of the kind occurred in 1861, when Queen Victoria opened Parliament, accompanied by the Prince Consort, and since the death of the latter nothing equal to today's pomp has been witnessed in London in connection with the opening of the Legislature. Not since the wedding of the then Prince of Wales and Princess Alexandra has the gorgeous state coach used to-day been seen in the streets of the capital. In this coach to-day the King and Queen rode from Buckingham Palace to the Palace of Westminster.

The members of the royal family, including the Duke and Duchess of Connaught, the Duchess of Cornwall and York, the Duchess of Argyll, the Duke of Cambridge, Princess Christian of Schleswig-Holstein, drove out in plain two-horse coaches, with two footmen in scarlet cloaks on the box, half an hour before the procession started.

## THIS STRENUOUS LIFE

### WARDING PUBLIC FUNDS

#### Auditor-General McDougall is Growing Tired Thru His Efforts to Stampede Liberal Encroachments and Suggests a Change.

Ottawa, Feb. 14.—(Special.)—Auditor-General McDougall in his annual report to the House of Commons to-morrow says the difficulties which he has experienced with the present Government in trying to make an independent audit for the Canadian public. Many of his decisions during the year have been overruled by the Treasury Board, and the Auditor-General publishes a long letter on the subject which he addressed to Finance Minister Fielding on July 23 last. In this letter Mr. McDougall declares that his decisions have been "over-ruled without consideration." He proves this by quoting a letter of the Secretary of the Treasury Board, dated June 18; then he remarks: "If the practice heretofore followed by the board is persisted in, all that a statement will require for me to have will be to induce a member of the board to take up his case. What a pleasant prospect to anyone who is connected with the country's finances, while everything else about Canada and Canadian is glorious!"

Mr. McDougall declares that the board has done the following things: "It has established the principle that an arrangement may be regularly entered into between the Government and an employee that he is to get a certain salary for a year. He is pleased to take the salary and occupation and gets his salary each month to the end of the year. He then makes a claim to be paid a higher salary for the period of his services, gets the additional claim and may come as often as he likes for more."

Growing Tired of the Fight. Mr. McDougall seems to be growing tired of the fight with the Government. Here is a striking sentence: "I have plenty of other work to do and dislike having standing differences with the Government. It seems to me that the Government should have these matters put in the way of settlement by introducing in Parliament appropriate private amendments which would be easily understood and short."

## THE WAR POLICY IS UNCHANGED

### AND BOERS WILL BE CONQUERED

#### Lord Salisbury's Remarks in Reply to Lord Kimberley, Discussing the Address in Reply to the King's Speech, Give No Uncertain Sound on That Matter.

London, Feb. 14.—The House of Lords today, after the formal opening of Parliament, proceeded to business. The Lord Chancellor read the King's speech, and the address in reply. He is perhaps the youngest member to whom the honor has ever been accorded. Lord Mansfield seconded the motion.

Resolute Lord Kimberley. Lord Kimberley, the Liberal leader, after complimenting the mover and seconder of the address, said the House needed no further assurances that the King would follow the policy of his mother, and proceeded to express dissatisfaction with the conduct of the war in South Africa. He said the present conditions in South Africa filled him with apprehension. The Government had been living in a fool's paradise. Unless they imbedded General Buller to speedily terminate the war, the situation could easily become more dangerous. If the Government attempted to put the whole military system on a more satisfactory basis they would receive every support from the Liberals.

Another Temperance Demonstration. Premier Lord will again deputate with the temperance cause next week. The Government will be waited upon by a delegation from the Royal Templars of Temperance on Wednesday next.

#### CANADA'S NATIONAL PORT.

The port of Montreal is now upon its trial. The question for decision is whether the country will be justified in improving the harbor and approaches to Montreal, or whether Montreal should be abandoned in favor of some other Canadian port. Montreal will no doubt make a vigorous effort to maintain its ascendancy as the national port of the Dominion, but just at the present moment the prospects for the city do not look the brightest. Left to itself, Montreal is certainly destined to grow into some more favorably located port. Already business has begun to leave Montreal and is seeking other outlets. The Canada Atlantic Railway has deserted Montreal in favor of Quebec. The Grand Trunk voluntarily prefers Port of Montreal to the approach as Montreal is slow, dangerous and expensive. The vital objections to Montreal as a seaport are its lack of deep water and its dangerous approach. The question the country is called upon to decide is whether it is economically possible to improve the approach to Montreal and the harbor itself, so that it can compete with the deep water ports of the Atlantic, or whether our efforts should be centered on Quebec, or some other deep water harbor, as the national port. We notice that the Minister of Public Works is proceeding on the assumption that Montreal harbor can be improved so as to meet all the requirements of a modern seaport. He has just been making a visit to New York, where he has inspected the mammoth docks that are being constructed in New York harbor. He thinks if these monsters were put to work in the St. Lawrence channel the port of converting Montreal into an up-to-date port could be consummated in three years. The dip in the water in view is twenty-nine feet, and the width of the channel four hundred and fifty feet. The dredging of such a channel will be very expensive, and when the job is finished we will only have a twenty-nine foot waterway. This may fill the bill for the present, but in the event of a war will have vessels drawing thirty-five feet and more. In considering this question we must look to the future ere more than the present. It would be foolish for the country to spend millions in making a twenty-nine foot waterway to Montreal and then find out that the port was as far behind in the race as ever. As against Montreal, with its manifold imperfections, we have Quebec, a perfect natural harbor, capable of accommodating a large vessel as a matter of fact. As far as the country at large is concerned, there is no reason why Montreal should be preferred to Quebec, or vice versa. It is simply a question of the extent of the port to be constructed, and of the cost involved, and of economy in the expenditure of money. At the present time conditions point towards Quebec as Canada's national port. Before any large sum is spent in deepening the channel between Quebec and Montreal, the latter city will have to show the world that she is worth the outlay. There is nothing in evidence as yet to justify the Government in proceeding with the expensive work which Hon. Mr. Tarte thinks should be undertaken at once. Let the whole question be considered out before the country is committed to the great expense involved in making a twenty-nine foot waterway to Montreal.

#### CANADA AND THE CHILLED MEAT TRADE.

Canada ought certainly to make an effort to increase its dead meat trade with Great Britain. Last year Canada's exports of chilled and chilled meat consumed by the people of the United Kingdom. The figures for the year 1900, as published in Wedell & Company's review, are as follows:

The beef imported from Australia, New Zealand and River Plate was frozen, that from the United States and Canada chilled, and that from the Continent fresh killed. It is apparent from these figures that an immense market is open to Canadian farmers for dressed meat. The establishment of abattoirs in Canada should be encouraged, and we are glad to see that the Ontario Government has promised to do something to help the meat industry in this province. Whether a number of small abattoirs throughout the province or a large central one in Toronto would be best adapted for the business we are not able to say, but in the United States the concentration of the business seems to be the order of the day. Whichever view the Government may take of this matter there is no doubt that Toronto at least should have a large abattoir. It is the centre of the cattle trade of the province, and if the dressed meat industry cannot succeed in the city it cannot succeed anywhere else in Ontario. We understand a company is being organized to erect an abattoir on the business in Toronto so soon as the Government puts in definite shape its promises to encourage the industry.
