





It is not the legitimate brokerage that the companies object to so much, tho that is bad enough. But many brokers alter tickets which they secure. This is downright forgery, and yet it is most difficult to make a jury convict in such cases.

"The ticket brokers have several organizations by which they employ a powerful lobby at Washington to defeat hostile legislation. There is a great deal of money made by the brokers, and the more nefarious their tricks the heavier their profits. For instance, a man in New York buys a ticket for San Francisco, and when ticket brokers. We have a measure now which I think, if it can be made

He sells the unused portion. It has been sold to him in the first-place for \$60, \$10 less than the first-class rate, because of the short limit. He sells it in Chicago for \$20. Immediately he takes a piece of paper of similar color, fills the punched marks showing the limit, puts a new limit on the ticket and sells it for probably \$50. This is forgery, of course, but a jury is mighty lenient with people who rob corporations sometimes. There are ten thousand brokers in the States, and all are getting rich. Novel Method of Selecting Electoral Controllers Being Outlined to the Council.

MAYOR CHOSEN FROM ALDERMEN

Deserving Aldermen Could Retain Their Seat If Failing to

The following letter is being sent to the dayor and aldermen by the secretary of he Proportional Representation Society of

Dear Sir,-I beg to call your attention to ne very faulty method now used in the ction of the Board of Control. The vote f each alderman is split up amongst four andidates; log-rolling is encouraged; sevrai of the aldermen are always left unreresented, and it is possible for 13 aidermen to elect all four controllers, thus leaving the other 11 addermen without representation. Consequently it is difficult to get the best men elected.

The remedy is to use a plan of election founded on true representative principles. Every adderman should be represented, any six aldermen voting together should be able to elect one controller, no matter what this other 18 choose to do. There should be no waste or votes. Such a clear-cut method would enable votes to be consentrated upon the best man, without the mixing and madding that comes from the lour-fold vote.

For particulars I refer you to the enclosed description of the Hare-Spence system of proportional representation, as applied to the election of controllers. Incidentally I may remark that if the Hare-Spence system was used in the municipal elections, two very desirable results would be attained, namely.

1. The successful mayoralty can iddate would always have a clear majority, no natter how many other candidates were runing. men to elect all four controllers, thus leav-

2. A candidate could run for the mayor aty and for an aldermanic seat at the samtime without wasting any votes, thus abling a deserving and popular alderman to retain his seat as alderman if he failed to become mayor.
