

WILL LAURIER RETIRE?

Rumors of the early retirement of Sir Wilfrid Laurier from public life are very persistent. They do not necessarily mean that the Premier's life is in danger. His illness may be ascribed to the excitement and worry of last summer, following on the anxieties of the last three years. Rest and quiet seem to have made an immense improvement in him, and the inference might be that his system requires a longer period of freedom from care and anxiety.

Sir Wilfrid has said publicly that he was reluctant to assume the cares of the premiership. "No one," he said, "was the person for whom the position was intended. Mr. Blake's leadership he appeared to take over a languid interest in the business of the House, and he once asked a reporter 'if it was not terribly tedious work listening to all those dry speeches.'" His own speeches were not frequent, and he certainly did not take the same grace and air of distinction about them which at once caught the ear of the gallery. They were rather forcible, however, as elegant rather than forcible, and few who heard them would have picked up the speaker as the coming leader of the party.

Under the strain of responsibility the sterner side of Laurier's character has been rather unexpectedly developed; but his strong point has been his hold upon the Province of Quebec. The French-Canadians were so proud of having the Premier of the country that they were almost willing to believe that anything that Laurier did was right. In this respect he has no successor; and no one can predict what Quebec will do when the Laurier cement disappears. A well-known journalist was heard of saying with regard to Sir John Macdonald, "After me, the deluge." The remark would be quite as applicable to the condition of Quebec after Sir Wilfrid Laurier's removal.

As to the leadership of the Liberal party, the Premier's first objective is that of Sir Richard Cartwright. He is, besides the Premier, the only man of real distinction in the cabinet; and his position and services are such that it would be impossible to ignore them if he desired the post. His age and infirmity, however, might lead him to prefer the comparative ease of his present position, which he certainly seems to enjoy thoroughly. Putting his name aside, a good many observers of politics are inclined to select Mr. Fielding for the premiership. He is not the strongest man in the ministry, and he seems to lack especially what Bagehot calls "the demonic element," the fire and obstinacy which the political struggle seems to require. In certain points he would be surpassed by Mulock, by Sifton, or by Blidy. But he is also free from certain objections which might be urged against these candidates. He is level-headed, good-tempered and generally what American politicians call "an available man." Possibly all these speculations are premature, and it is quite likely that Sir Wilfrid Laurier may postpone his retirement long enough to lead his party in the next general election. But the indications are that he will not remain very much longer in public life.

COMMUNITY COLLEGE RESIDENCES

A news item in yesterday's World says that some objection has been raised to the University of Toronto giving a site to a Greek letter society for a residence in the Park for a nominal sum, and lending the money to build at a moderate interest. There are two sides to this question, and we await further information; but in the meantime we offer it as a fact that similar societies have secured similar privileges in connection with nearly all the universities in the States, and the net result has been that the students are better housed, better fed, and are morally improved by living in more book learning, and if university students thru community living are improved in their manners and ideas, a distinct gain is made. The old plan of students living in garrets and subsisting on a dollar a week has been exploded. Another good feature of university residence is that every member of the community is bound to assume his share of the responsibility of the management, and in that way everyone comes out with an experience somewhat of a business man, as well as being learned in books.

A SOURCE OF CORRUPTION.

A great deal of the corruption in politics may be traced back to the idea that the prime object of the party struggle is the obtaining and holding of certain offices. There is, of course, such a thing as an honest ambition to serve the public in a government office, and we could point members of the civil service, both at Ottawa and Toronto, who are actuated by this genuine public spirit, and who love their work as a good physician does. These, however, are not the men who show a desperate eagerness in the party struggle for the offices. They are so useful that a Minister belonging to either party would be foolish to turn them out. One of the best features of public life in Great Britain is, or used to be, a certain carelessness about power and office. Public men advocated certain principles and were prepared to stand by them in adversity as well as in prosperity. They held that it was better to be in opposition than to abandon or even modify their principles. "If," they said, "the government of this country must be carried on according to methods and ideas which we abhor, let it be carried on by our opponents, and let us in opposition retain our freedom to denounce those methods, and advocate our own."

But when public men become desperately anxious about office, and the outward show of power, it is not surprising that politics take a low tone, and that the humblest members of the party follow the bad example of the highest. If the men in the first rank are thinking mainly about their portfolios, the men in the second rank are likely to think mainly of ending their days in the comfort of a fat office. From this you work down to the men who can be satisfied with tide-water, clerkships, and the like. Finally you come to the class whose members can hope for nothing better than a few dollars which float about in election time. After all, what are they but humble imitators of the fellows who get the big snaps, the profitable contracts and the big railway subsidies?

PROCESSION 2 MILES LONG

Twenty-Fifth Anniversary of Death of King Victor Emmanuel II. Observed in Rome.

THIRTY THOUSAND PEOPLE TOOK PART

King Victor Emmanuel III. Shakes Hands With One Thousand Veterans of Independence.

Rome, Jan. 9.—The twenty-fifth anniversary of the death of King Victor Emmanuel II was observed today by a pilgrimage to his tomb in the Pantheon. The procession was two miles in length, and 30,000 persons participated, including delegations from all the provinces and a thousand veterans of the War of Independence, with whom the King, Victor Emmanuel III, shook hands. Hundreds of wreaths were laid on the tomb. Great crowds witnessed the ceremony.

The city was lavishly dressed with draped flags, while the Pantheon was hung with black draperies. Veterans, including Gen. Sarr, aide de camp of the late monarch, stood guard around the sarcophagus. On reaching the Pantheon the procession filed past the King's tomb, and each delegation, headed by flags, placed wreaths on or near the sarcophagus, the standard bearers tipping their flags as the floral offerings were deposited. The King and Queen attended a mass celebrated at the Pantheon prior to the arrival of the procession.

Study of Browning.

The Browning Club held its regular meeting Wednesday evening in the lecture-room of the Unitarian Church, Jarvis-street. An interesting biographical sketch of "Browning's Adult Life to His Marriage" was read by Miss Pearson. A second paper on "Browning's Dramatic Pictures" was read by P. W. White. It was Browning's energetic treatment of all that concerned human life, he said, that gave the dramatic character to his work; while the form of the dramatic monologue admitted the reader into the innermost recesses of the speaker's mind. "My Lost Duchess" and other poems were cited in illustration. The meeting closed with the reading of "Count Gismond" by Miss Lillian Burns.

After Human Diets.

New Haven, Conn., Jan. 8.—With the fund recently received from the Carnegie Institute in Washington, the department of experimental psychology at Yale University will continue next summer experiments on the human voice, which were begun more than a year ago. Plans are being made for collecting dialects all over the United States by means of a car, equipped with voice-recording machines.

London, Jan. 9.—Philip Burt, general traffic manager of the North-eastern Railway, speaking at the Hallway Institute of York, relative to his recent investigation of American railroad methods, expressed general admiration of them, and said he was of the opinion that British railroad men can learn much from America. At the same time, he added, the best American roads will find much to learn and admire in English railroad management.

ANDERSON AGREEMENT FOUND SECURING BANK OF HAMILTON

Even If Blanket Mortgage is Nullified the Claim of This Institution Will Have to Be First Satisfied Before Oakville Depositors Get a Cent.

The assignee and depositors' committee of the Oakville bank are actively at work in Toronto getting the accounts and books of the defunct firm in shape for the official inquiry. Yesterday the record of an instrument was found which sheds a good deal of light upon the relations between the Andersons and the Bank of Hamilton. It is an agreement signed by Cyrus Anderson, president of both the Palm-erston and Oakville banks, making his personal estate liable for any claim held by the Bank of Hamilton against these two private banks. Under this document, which is dated March, 1894, the Bank of Hamilton could have taken the personal estate of Cyrus Anderson without receiving the blanket mortgage, over which there has been so much dispute. Accordingly, the presence of this document would argue that the Bank of Hamilton suspected seven years ago that these two banks were very weak, or they would not have been ready to secure their debts by the personal security of their president. LOVE AND HUNGER

Cause Vienna to Take Front Rank as City of Suicides.

Vienna, Jan. 9.—Statistics for 1902 demonstrate that Vienna continues in the front rank of the European capitals in the number of suicides. Last year's records show that there were 453 deaths from suicide and 467 attempts at self-destruction. The number of women suicides increased in ten years from 57 to 124. Most of the deaths are attributed to love and hunger. The former was responsible for 190 suicides or attempts at self-destruction, poverty for 158, insanity for 127, domestic troubles for 72 and financial losses for 19. One hundred and eighty-two persons, 148 were females, 34 were males, 60 drowned themselves and 35 took poison.

Another Earthquake at Andjan.

Akhabad, Russian Turkestan, Jan. 9.—There was another violent earthquake at Andjan on Wednesday, but it did not result in any further loss of life.

German Minister at Havana.

Berlin, Jan. 9.—The German foreign budget estimates provide \$10,625 for a minister resident in Havana.

PARADE OF UNEMPLOYED.

One Thousand Persons March Thru London With Police.

London, Jan. 9.—In pursuance of a general plan for attracting attention, over a thousand of unemployed persons, accompanied by a few mounted and unmounted police, marched thru the city and west-end of London today. There was no disorder of any kind.

Russia and China.

Peking, Jan. 9.—The negotiations between Russia and China on the subject of the Manchurian customs are believed to have ended without an agreement. Russia proposes to establish a custom house at Port Dainy (the new Russian seaport of North China, forty miles north of Port Arthur), but will permit China to appoint a customs commissioner to cooperate with the Russian official.

Conductor Killed at St. Philadelphia, Pa.

Philadelphia, Pa., Jan. 9.—Stephen Krause, 57 years of age, the oldest freight conductor in the employ of the Philadelphia and Reading Railway Company, was killed by a freight train here today. He was in the employ of the company 70 years.

PRINCESS VICTIM OF PLOT

Archduke Leopold Almost Solely Blamed by Court for His Sister's Action.

GIROU CONSIDERED A WILLING TOOL

Stories of Cruelty and Neglect Denied—Deserted Husband Stands His Loss.

New York, Jan. 9.—The Dresden correspondent of the Herald writes: I have just had interviews with a number of the highest officials of the Saxony court, including a close relative and confidant of the Crown Prince, in order to obtain a faithful picture of the present attitude of the Saxony court towards Princess Louise and likewise its future plans in the event of a fatal change in the condition of the King.

The following is a faithful account of the Saxony court's official version of the affair: Archduke Leopold Ferdinand is almost solely blamed for the action of his sister. While M. Girou was a willing tool with his words and his pen, he is not to be held responsible for the action of the Crown Prince to desert his wife and children, the Crown Prince is willing to bring about a reconciliation to the extent that Princess Louise will be permitted to return to Saxony and be under the care of the crown, some shrewd retreat where she may occasionally see her children.

END OF TICKET BROKERS.

Railroad Men Talk of Legislation to Suppress Traffic in the States.

Charles M. Markell of Kansas City, Mo., is registered at the Queen's. Mr. Markell is third vice-president of the Missouri Pacific Railroad and prominent in transportation circles of the country. He is visiting friends in Toronto. Talking of the railroad legislation now before the United States Congress, Mr. Markell said: "The most important measure for the railroads of the States is that relating to ticket brokers. We have a measure now which I think it can be made into law, can stand the attacks of the powerful combinations of ticket brokers. Many states have adopted laws similar to those in Canada, which prohibit brokerage in railroad tickets, but these laws have never held. It requires a national enactment to make it binding, and this the transportation companies have not yet been able to secure. It is not the legitimate brokerage that the companies object to so much, but that which is done by many brokers after tickets which they secure. This is downright forgery, and yet it is most difficult to make a jury convict in such cases.

TROOPS WERE NECESSARY

Testimony as to the Difficulties of Maintaining Order During the Coal Strike.

GENERAL'S ORDER AND ITS INTENT

Several Witnesses Give Evidence of Inciting Remarks by Leading Union Men.

Philadelphia, Jan. 8.—After occupying eight days, during which they presented 100 witnesses, the non-union men closed their case to-day before the Coal Strike Commission. The principal witness to-day was Gen. Gobin of the National Guard of Pennsylvania, who was in command of the third brigade during the time the troops were on duty in the hard coal fields. From his observations, and from reports made to him by his officers, it was his opinion, he said, that an excited state of lawlessness existed in the regions that disturbances were numerous, that the presence of the troops was absolutely necessary to preserve law and order, and that it was difficult to maintain the law, even after the troops in the state had been placed in the disturbed territory.

The witness said that when he first went into the coal regions he was unable for a time to obtain a faithful picture of the present attitude of the Saxony court towards Princess Louise and likewise its future plans in the event of a fatal change in the condition of the King. These interviews, without exception, contradict some allegations attributed to Princess Louise, M. Girou and the Archduke Leopold Ferdinand, also coinciding in the main with the statements of Princess Louise.

ARSENIC IN HIS BONES. New Phase of the Husband Poisoning Case in U.S.

Syracuse, Jan. 9.—The bones of William A. Kehl were examined at Cornell last night, and the result was the calling of Prof. M. W. Booth of the science department of the Cornell Normal School to testify before the grand jury.
