THE FORTY-EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

TEMPORAL COMMITTEE OF KNOX CHURCH, OTTAWA,

PRESENTED AT THE ANNUAL MEETING OF THE CONGREGATION, HELD JANUARY 12th, 1893.

In submitting the Forty-eighth Annual Report for the year 1892, to be considered by the Congregation, the Temporal Committee desire humbly and reverently to acknowledge the goodness, mercy and loving kindness of the God of all Grace, from whom cometh down every good gift and every perfect gift, for manifold blessings freely bestowed upon

us as a congregation.

In presenting the Financial Statement, including revenue and expenditure, during the year, your committee report the revenue from the two fixed sources, viz.: Sustentation Fund, amounting to \$3,583.32 for 1892 as compared with \$3,651.30 for 1891, and the Ordinary Collections, amounting this year to \$586.92 as compared with \$615.60 for 1891, showing a decrease from these two sources from which our revenue is derived of \$96.66. If this had not been anticipated by your committee at the beginning of the year, by requesting those who could, to increase their contributions, and had not the invitation been responded to by a number, the shortage would have been very much larger. That there should be a falling off at all is to be regretted, seeing that the attention of the congregation was last year called to the downward trend observable from these sources for some years past. For this reason your committee had earnestly hoped to be able this year to report a marked improvement in these two contributions. In this connection your committee observe that the number of contributors for 1892 are only 191 as compared with 216 for 1891, shewing a falling off of 25, or about 12%, and that whilst the contributions in some cases shew an increase, in others they shew a decrease. The average contribution per contributor for 1892 is about \$21.84 as against \$19.75 in 1891; and although not equal to the average of the three previous years, is an encouraging feature in the right direction,

Referring to the matter of expenditure, your committee have found it necessary to exercise the most rigid economy, even to the exclusion of several matters of great importance, in order to avoid, if possible,

exceeding the amount placed at their disposal.

Owing to the special effort made by the congregation last year (1891) to wipe out the floating liabilities, the Thank Offering amounted to \$1,602.63, whilst in 1892 it dropped to \$376.60, being about the average contribution of the three previous years. This discrepancy your committe are extremely happy to report has been partially made up by the noble and heroic efforts of the Ladies' Aid Association, who very generously placed at their disposal the handsome donation of \$320.25, which amount we are informed, could and would have been largely supplemented had the ladies of the congregation generally given their

hearty sympathy and support to the efforts of their more energetic sisters. The committee venture to express the hope that, during the year upon which we have now entered, a much greater degree of unity and enthusism will characterize not only the ladies who have done so well in the past, but every person connected with the congregation, who might reasonably be expected to take a lively and loving interest in its work

By reference to the Treasurer's Statement it will be seen that the gross receipts for 1892 amounted to \$5,676.87 as against \$6,832.88 in 1891, a reduction of \$1,156.01, whilst the gross expenditure for 1892 amounted to \$5,787.59 as against \$7,135.15 in 1891, a reduction of \$1,347.56.

On examination of the receipts for the years 1891 and 1892 respectively, it will be seen that, at the commencement of the former year. the cash balance on hand was \$302.25, while in 1892 the cash balance was only \$52.52, whilst the Treasurer's Statement for 1892 shews a deficit of \$107.75. It may be stated, however, that this is due, largely, to the payment of liabilities carried over from 1891, and that when transactions pertaining exclusively to this year are taken into account. instead of a deficit we have a surplus of revenue over expenditure of \$45.48. In summing up the result of the work done during the year under the supervision of your committee, they feel that, as a congregation, we have great reason for gratitude to Him who causeth His sun to shine upon the evil as well as the good, and sends His rain upon the unjust as well as the just. May His blessing which maketh rich and to which He adds no sorrow, be more abundantly enjoyed by our successors and the entire corgregation by a closer walk and fellowship with Him.

MISSION SCHEMES REPORT.

This branch of our work has been diligently prosecuted and with fair success during the past year; and the financial result, while slightly less in amount than that of last year, compares yet favorably with

previous years.

The amount of receipts last year, at this date, and from the same source, was \$582.35. The amount this year is \$567.82, just \$14.53 less than last year. The deficiency could be accounted for in the case of one contribution, which this year is \$15.00 less than it was last year. But why there should be a deficiency at all, although one or two subscriptions should fall short; or why, instead of a deficiency, there is not rather an increase in the amount of the fund, I could not so easily ex-

plain. Let every one answer this for himself.

Our stated and permanent contributors have indeed again made proof of their interest in this work by maintaining their usual record of liberality. Some increased and a few doubled their contributions. Only for these neither this fund nor any other fund would present but a sorry figure to the church. And yet it is evident that while the rate of giving by the majority keeps so low, it will be always necessary to call for a special collection in order to afford a fair share of support to the schemes of the church. But this again only means another instalment out of the pockets of the few who have already contributed freely.

Let us hope, however, that this fund will yet make a fresh start. With a strong, energetic staff of ladies, who love their work, to visit and deliver *The Record* and receive contributions, engaged in this work, and with a fair measure of sympathy and co-operation on the part of all, we should have creditable advances to report in future years. The voice of our Missionaries is crying loudly in our ears for more

laborers and more liberal financial aid.

Where any irregularity has been observed in the delivery of *The Record*, I would ask your consideration and indulgence on behalf of the lady visitors. They all have other work to do besides, and they may at times be unavoidably delayed in making their calls as early, or as regularly, as is desirable and proper; but these defects will be remedied as much as possible in future.

Any who should find himself passed over, and not receiving The Record, is asked to notify the lady visitor of his district of the fact and

the matter will be readily attended to.

Correction:—Attention is called to an error which instruction cocurred in the account of last year's report, viz: the omission in the column of disbursements of an item of \$50.00, which had been paid to Mr. Durie on the 14th March, 1891, on *The Records* of 1890.

FIFTH ANNUAL REPORT

-OF THE-

Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor, Knox Church.

To the Members of the Session and Congregation:

GENTLEMEN AND CHRISTIAN FRIENDS,—It may be permissible for purposes of information and inspiration to introduce the Report of our Society by a brief history of the origin and growth of the Christian

Endeavor Society movement.

The first Young People's Society of Christian Endeavor originated in the winter of 1880-1881 as the outcome of a revival in the Williston Church of Portland, Maine, under the pastorage of the Rev. F. E. Clarke, D.D., and in response to a real, felt necessity to bridge over the crisis period between conversion and church-membership and as a means by which to train young Christians for active and personal Christian work in bringing about the conversion and connection with the church of the unconverted or inactive members and adherents among the young people, of strengthening the hands of the pastor and of carrying out such schemes as wisdom should dictate and opportunity permit.

The Society was, as some one has put it, "contagious, like the measles; if one church had it the church next to it was pretty sure to catch it also," and it now numbers twenty-two thousand, with a membership of one million five hundred thousand, representing thirty Protestant evangelical denominations, the Presbyterian denomination being somewhat in the lead. There are eight hundred and sixty Societies in

Ontario.

Of the five trustees of the united Societies two, Rev. William Patterson, Toronto, and Rev. T. S. Tamlin, D.D., are Presbyterians, the remaining three being a Baptist, a Methodist and a Congregationalist.

The platform or basis principle of the Society is that the religious features of the organization shall always be paramount and that the source of power and energy shall centre in the weekly Prayer Meeting.

This principle it is believed has faithfully been kept in view in our own Society, which may account for the unobtrusive yet none the less, but rather the more, effective character of its work and the smallness of the membership as compared with the size of the constituency served. No extraneous means have been employed to popularize the Society.

A membership of some seventy members may not seem to represent great progress for about four years of existence, but the majority of the seventy will each engage to enter into a pledge which reads, as

recently amended :-

"Trusting in the Lord Jesus Christ for strength, I promise Him that I will strive to do whatever He would like to have me do; that I will make it the rule of my life to pray and to read the Bible every day, and to support my own church in every way, especially by attending all her regular Sunday and mid-week services, unless prevented by

some reason which I can conscientiously give to my Saviour; and that, just so far as I know how, throughout my whole life, I will endeavor to lead a Christian life.

"As an active men. ber I promise to be true to all my duties, to be present at, and to take some part, aside from singing, in every Christian Endeavor prayer meeting, unless hindered by some reason which I can conscientiously give to my Lord and Master. If obliged to be absent from the monthly consecration meeting of the Society I will, if possible, send at least a verse of Scripture to be read in response to my name at the roll-call.

Signed,...."

The results of such a work as is being wrought on the pledged and also, though less directly, on the associate membership by the religious influences and the growth of knowledge of the Bible which flow out of the regular weekly prayer meetings of the Society cannot, however, as has been indicated, be brought under computation by numbers, but must rest upon the testimonies of the individual members as to the measure of benefit and spiritual blessings received, and such testimonies are constantly being given.

Testimonies also come from outside. A mother said recently that she had great satisfaction now-a-days to find her children so interested and occupied in the religious work of their church and consequently

was relieved of worry of mind and heart concerning them.

A father also testifies that it is such a welcome change to be able to discuss religious topics and the Lord Jesus Christ Himself with his grown up sons and daughters and that without constraint or affectation and finds his own interest in the spiritual work of the church very much stimulated thereby. Similar testimonies would likely be given by most of the houses represented in the membership of the Society.

A definite work is also being done in strengthening the relationship of the Society with the church work proper, as is evidenced by the fact that from the membership has been drawn for the most part the ushers who officiate at the Sabbath services of the church, the officership of the Sabbath School, and the membership of the Bible Class, and to a greater or less degree the attendance at the mid-week prayer meeting.

An outlet has also been found for the energies of the Society through the medium of its various Committees, the Lookout, Visitation, Reception and Music; and latterly a Dorcas Committee was organized to provide or prepare clothing for such as are in need, and a Missionary Scheme was inaugurated on the basis of a systematic and pledged giving, by each member who is willing, of one cent per week towards a fund for contribution to such Foreign Mission work as shall at the end of the year be determined.

The Music Committee has, besides the practice of special hymns for the prayer meetings, undertaken to conduct a song service on Tues-

day of each week at the Home for the Aged on Bank Street.

The Society would therefore, while conscious of the fact that there

is much to do that has not been done or not been well done towards securing the attendance at its prayer meetings and at the church services and prayer meeting of a large number of the young people of the congregation, express its thankfulness to God for the way in which He has led us during the year just past and for definite blessings meted out to the Society and to the individual members thereof.

It may also be mentioned that our zeal for contributing towards the work of Foreign Missions is in large part due to the excellent paper on "John Paton," given before the Society by Mr. Macmillan, who is

shortly to give us another.
