CLUBS OF THE O.H.A. OFFICIAL INFORMATION

Synopsis of Rules for Guidance of Players During Championship Season.

Officers of O.H.A. clubs, especially managers and secretaries, should take cognizance of the following official information, which was issued last night by Secretary W. A. Hewitt.

Certificates are issued at the discretion of the executive, and are revocable without notice. All players must have certificates.

O.H.A. clubs are warned not to play with or against professionals, or teams sponsored by the association.

When a change of residence permit is desired, the player concerned must take out a statutory declaration covering the change of residence and forward it thru the club he desires to play with.

No player can play in the intermediate series who plays in more than one senior championship year.
