GARDENING CUCUMBERS.

The home garden is not complete unless there are cucumbers. They are a splendid addition to the table served sliced, or they can be used for pickles. It is worth noting that pulled fresh cucumbers are the same stomach troubles as they sometimes do when they have lain for days after they have been taken off the vine. For the amateur it is better to plant them in the open ground. They are usually grown in hills, and they spread over a good deal of ground. If your garden is small grow them on trellis work or poultry netting. Or you can grow them up a wall by giving them netting or string as support. This is another of the vegetables which like warmth, and the seeds should not be planted too soon. From the middle to the end of May is the proper time. Try a few seeds as soon as you think the ground is warm enough. If they do not do well you have lost no time anyway. Soil.—This vegetable thrives very well in soil that is rich. Use lots of half rotted manure if you can get it. Hills.—If you have ground enough to plant in hills, the hills should be at least four feet apart. Dig the earth thoroughly, mixing the manure in generous proportions. A few inches of trillix, dig a half inch deep and leave three strong plants to the hill. On Trellis.—If you want to save space and grow them on a trellis or a wall, plant a trench along the trellis a foot and a half deep. Fill this with soil and manure, half and half, well mixed. Plant the seeds half an inch deep, and six inches apart in the rows. Insects.—Cucumbers are very susceptible to the attacks of insects and spraying with Bordeaux mixture is necessary from the very start. When the plants are a couple of inches high, start spraying and continue it till blossom time. Watering.—Watering is necessary if the season is a dry one, but they do not want too much. The hills or trench should be heaped up to give good drainage.

THE OLD GARDENER SAYS.

If you have a town garden and you cannot get stable manure, you will be wise to put pulverized sheep manure or some similar natural fertilizer at the seed sowing. Commercial fertilizers alone. Spread it along the rows before planting and work it well into the soil. If you get any quantity of soot when you clean out your furnace or chimney spread it around the roses or the apricot plants.

UNITED STATES TO PUT CENSORSHIP IN FORCE

Washington, April 25.—Censorship on all cables touching the United States and on telegraph and telephone lines into Mexico will be established shortly by executive order. Regulations formulated jointly by the state, navy and justice departments and the new committee on public information were approved today by the representatives of the various wire and cable companies. As the French, British and other allied governments long have been exercising strict supervision of the European cables, whatever is done at work, Canadian telegraph and telephone lines will not be watched for similar reasons. Nothing that reaches Canada can get past the British censorship, and the Washington government desires to restrict ordinary communication just as little as possible.
