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ANNUAL REPORT

OF THE

MANAGERS OF

THE ORPHANS' HOME AND FEMALE AID SOCIETY.

In conformity with the provisions of their Act of Incorporation, " The Lady Managers of the Orphans' Home and Female Aid Society." proceed to set forth, this their Seventh Annual Report. In discharging, however, this important duty, they encounter in the outset, a difficulty of no ordinary occurrence. On former occasions, some incident has not failed to happen, which tended somewhat to diversify the oft-told tale, and give a new and fresh interest to the well trodden path of Annual Reporting, and thus while each preceding year had its own peculiar incidents to record, this year forms an exception, being signalized by no such events. For these reasons the Lady Managers are compelled, to confine themselves on the present occasion, to such general observations and statements, respecting the present condition and future prospects of "The Home," as may ensure it a continuance of that comprehensive sympathy and support which it has hitherto experienced from all classes.

Being essentially Protestant in its nature and constitution "The Orphans' Home" "brings up its children in the nurture and admonition of the Lord." It teaches them (humbly trusting that when old they will not forget the lesson.) to place all their hopes on the merits of Him, "who made by his one oblation of himself, once offered a full, perfect and sufficient sacrifice, oblation and satisfaction for the sins of the whole world,"—and it must be gratifying to those who have followed this Institution "through evil report and good report," to see how the observance of this one, great, broad and comprehensive Protestant principle, has not failed to enlist the sympathies of all classes of persons, and thus while the rich give of their abundance, and the poor their mite,

all alike give their good wishes, all "bid the Orphans' Home God speed." Those indeed who have seen 'The Home 'at its first formation, struggling with difficulties of no ordinary nature, and after a career of varied success, occupying its present eminent position, cannot for a moment doubt the general favour in which it is held. It is not only well known throughout the length and the breadth of these Provinces, its name is also honoured in the neighbouring Republic, it is not unknown even in Great Britain, and the Provincial Parliament does not deem it unworthy of a share of the national support—but enough of this; "Not unto us O Lord, not unto us, but unto thy name give the glory, for thy mercy and for thy truth's sake."

Amongst the many distinguished persons who have visited 'The Home' during the past year, the name of Lady Head stands preeminent. On the 5th of April, Her Excellency visited 'The Home,' and expressed herself as highly gratified, by the general arrangements and management of the Institution. She was particularly attracted by the clean and healthy appearance of the children, and made an entry in the Visitors' Book to that effect.

When indeed we consider the very general prevalence of Epidemics during the past year, and the great number of children assembled together under one roof, eating their meals at the same board, and sleeping in the same dormitories, it is with the most unfeigned thankfulness to the Giver of all good, we record the pleasing fact, that there has been very little sickness, and not one single death during the last two years. When persons hear this statement, and are further informed, that from fifty-five to sixty children have been sheltered in 'The Home' during the past year, they will naturally enquire, what the internal arrangements of the Institution are, which have led to a result so very favourable.

The Lady Managers would state in reply, that (under God's blessing) they attribute this extraordinary health of the children to various causes, and amongst these to a new, efficient and complete system of Drainage, which they have caused to be executed, by which all injurious exhalations have been removed, and

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the children, living in a roomy and well ventilated house, now enjoy, that most inestimable of all earthly blessings, a pure, fresh and invigorating atmosphere. In connexion with the health of the children, must be mentioned the name of Dr. Ogden, who, with his accustomed kindness, humanity and skill, continues to give the Institution the benefit of his professional services gratuitously. And here the Lady Managers fee' that they should add the unceasing efforts of the Matron, Mrs. Holmes, for the childrens' welfare; they therefore take this opportunity of saying, that this trustworthy person still has their entire confidence, and continues to give general satisfaction.

Under existing circumstances, when contributions are at times so liberally sent in from all quarters, the Lady Managers are afraid, lest their notice of any contributions in particular, may appear invidious and exclusive; they beg therefore to assure all friends of 'The Home' that their offerings have been well and fully appreciated, and that the narrow limits of an Annual Report alone prevent them from acknowledging each donation separately; but at the same time they feel that they cannot omit to mention, the very great liberality of the Butchers of the St. Lawrence Market, who, in a spirit of untiring kindness are ever ready to meet the unceasing applications that are made to them; for such kindness the Lady Managers do hereby give the Butchers of the St. Lawrence Market their best thanks.

The Finances of the Institution next claim our notice. Although it might naturally be expected, that at least one source of Income, namely, that derivable from the donations of Annual Subscribers, would have been considerably affected by the present and long continued depression of the money market, we are nevertheless enabled to state, that on the whole the Finances of the Institution are in a favourable condition; here however we must leave the Treasurer to speak for herself.

"It has been already stated that from fifty-five to sixty children have been sheltered in the 'Home' during the past year; of these, twenty have been newly admitted during the year, and

seventeen during the same period have been given out either in the way of adoption or of apprenticeship. But the Lady Managers having thus drawn your attention to the number of children, would in the next place seriously enquire, what would have been the probable fate of these sixty children were it not for this place of refuge so opportunely provided for them? Yes! what would have been their fate not merely in time but in eternity? Those who walk the streets of this rapidly increasing City can readily answer this momentous question. How often on such occasions are we shocked to hear the lisping lips of infancy uttering their Maker's name, but in angry imprecation or in blasphemy? How often do Parents hurry past such noisy groups lest their own children should be polluted by the obscene and ribald jest, with which their ears are greeted ? Suppose then these sixty children again let loose upon society, and what a frightful increase of crime would be the result? But thanks be to God, it is not so; 'the Orphans' Home ' has provided a shelter for them, it has snatched them from a life of infamy, and instead of suffering them to become the wretched victims of such scenes and such conduct as we have now described; it teaches them to 'remember their Creator in the days of their youth '-it trains them to be good and loyal subjects, to 'fear God and honor the Queen,' to 'obey Magistrates,' and that not from wrath only but also for conscience sake-but above all it teaches them their accountability to their God; it impresses on their infant minds the reality and the certainty of a future state, and that not only 'for every idle word they now utter, they must give an account on the Day of Judgment,' but also, that it is only by a patient continuance in well doing they can ever expect to attain to a blessed immortality."

Such are the blessings imparted to its children by the Orphans' Home, such the objects which the Lady Managers have ever in view, and for the attainment of which they are always ready to devote their best efforts; and this they say in no vain glorious spirit, they know well who has said, "Without me ye can do nothing," and, "that it is not by might or by power but by the Spirit of the Lord" that God's work is ever wrought. "When the enemy shall come in like a flood," it is 'the Spirit of the

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Room of 1st insta Dr. Lett, and J. H. Robarts, a

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Lord,' and not the hand of man, that will "lift up a standard against him." Still in humble dependance on the promise of Him, who himself "went about doing good," and who has said that even a cup of cold water given to one of his little ones in the name of a disciple, shall in no wise lose its reward, in sincere and heartfelt dependance on Him who has said, "My grace is sufficient for thee, my strength is made perfect in weakness," the Lady Managers hope that even they, may be the humble instruments of "bringing some few from darkness to light and from the power of Satan unto God." But in the meanwhile, their entire trust, their hope, their joy, their confidence, is in Him, who by the mouth of his holy Prophet has said, "Then they that feared the Lord, spake often one to another, and the Lord hearkened and heard it; and a book of remembrance was written before him, for them that feared the Lord and that thought upon His name; and they shall be mine saith the Lord of hosts, in that day when I make up my jewels, and I will spare them as a man spareth his own son, that serveth him."

ORPHANS' HOME AND FEMALE AID SOCIETY.

The Annual Meeting of this Institution was held in the Board Room of "The Home," Sullivan street, on Tucsday evening, the 1st instant. Among the gentlemen present were the Reverends Dr. Lett, T. S. Kennedy, H. Roe, Quebec, T. Curry, J. W. Small, and J. H. McCollum; and Major Denison, G. Monro, T. P. Robarts, &c.

The chair was occupied by the First Directress, Mrs. Murray.

The meeting was opened with prayer by the Rev. Dr. Lett.

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The Rev. J. W. Small, for the Secretary, then read the Report of the Lady Managers for the past year. It referred to the general sympathy which the "Home" received, "while the rich give of their abundance, and the poor their mite-all alike give their good wishes-all bid the Orphans' Home God speed." The liberality of the butchers of St. Lawrence Market was dwelt upon. They have gratuitously supplied the " Home " with all the meat required. Dr. Ogden's services were also alluded to. "This gentleman, with his accustomed kindness, humanity and skill, continues to give the Institution the benefit of his services gratuitously. The pleasing fact was recorded, "that there has been very little sickness, and not one single death during the last two years, among a household of between fifty and sixty children." Of the Matron, Mrs. Holmes, the Report says, "this trustworthy person still has their entire confidence, and continues to give general satisfaction." One passage we must give at length: "It has been already stated that from fifty-five to sixty children have been sheltered in the 'Home' during the past year; of these, twenty have been newly admitted during the year, and seventeen during the same period have been given out either in the way of adoption or of apprenticeship. But the Lady Managers having thus drawn your attention to the number of children, would in the next place seriously enquire, what would have been the probable fate of these sixty children were it not for this place of refuge so opportunely provided for them? Yes! what would have been their fate not merely in time but in eternity? Those who walk the streets of this rapidly increasing City, can readily answer this momentous question. 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Rev. Mr. Curry, in moving the adoption of the Report, said, the Report was both satisfactory to the Patrons, as showing that their exertions and labors were not without such solid results, and cheering to every Christian Philanthropist. Such institutions were a glory peculiar to Christianity; the offspring of the love of God; an imitation of that love-the love of Him, who, while " extolled in His name Jah," yet disdains not to call Himself" the father of the fatherless;" the product of that same love which, in Christ's mouth, said, "I will not leave you comfortless-or orphans." Orphanhood was the most desolate of earthly conditions, an epitome of human misery. This institution echoed the words, "we will not leave you comfortless-we will not leave you orphans." To the houseless, forsaken orphan—exposed to destruction of body and soul-it became a second parent, and more than a parent; giving material advantages beyond what many of the poor could furnish, and such advantages of secular instruction, and, above all, such godly training as are still more seldom received by the children of the poor. The Church of England was rich in divine faith and truth, and, compared with other bodies, in the goods of this world too: this good work showed her Members were not insensible to the obligations imposed by those circumstances. The recollections of the time and thought and money expended in this good work would be full of a sweet satisfaction in that hour when time, and memory and wealth were failing-the perishing wealth of this world being transmitted by Christian faith and charity into immortal treasure in Heaven. Such would be the judgment made in the day of consummation of such works as this institution was engaged in.

The motion was seconded by F. W. Coate, Esquire.

The Rev. Dr. Lett rose to propose the officers for the ensuing year; but, before doing so, he trusted that he would be allowed to refer to one or two items in the Treasurer's accounts; and first, he was glad to see that although the past was a year of the greatest monetary depression, in which all had been obliged to retrench and economize, yet retrenchment had not commenced in the subscriptions and donatious to this institution. He regretted that the contributions from the Orange body, who always had been so liberal to them, were this year only nine dollars. He (Dr. L.) would engage that next year the sum contributed by the Orangemen would exceed £50. (Hear.) The household expenses were most astonishingly small, only £168 18s. 6d. for the year, demonstrating how admirably the Home had been managed by the Ladies and their invaluable Matron; the smallness of the drug bill also was remarkable-only £3 2s. 8d. (A voice-it accounts for the health of the children.) There was one item which the Doctor was sorry to see in the account, it was "£7 10s. Collectors' fees." Since the commencement of the Institution upwards of £100 had been expended under this item; he thought, if the ladies would themselves do the work of collecting, that they would do it much more efficiently and with much more benefit to the institution, and certainly with far more gratification to the donors, at least as far the gentlemen were concerned.

Dr. Lett then moved, seconded by Mr. Houghton, the following:

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The Rev. Mr. Roe, of the diocese of Quebec, being called upon to propose the third resolution, said that it gave him great pleasure to be present on this occasion, and to hear the cheering report which had been read to them. They had an Orphan Asylum in Quebec; and while he thought the Managers of this Institution might in some things learn from them, he saw clearly that in many respects this institution had the advanage. He was sorry not to see the children present, as they always were at their annual celebration in Quebec. He was equally surprised and pleased to hear for what a small amount the institution was supported, and he thought the great liberality of the Butchers worthy of all praise, and he hoped that it would be made known far and wide. It reminded him of a similar instance in France. A sisterhood of nurses of the sick, aged and infim poor, which from very small beginnings had spread over the whole country, were supplied in the same way with everything they required, the people vieing with one another in filling the panniers of their asses, as they passed through the streets and market-places. Those who had ever had to do with the management of such institutions knew the many discouragements to be contended with. The children often disappointed them. But they ought not to think any instance a failure, unless they could follow each one to the end. And one case of real success in life and death surely repaid them for many years of anxious and apparently fruitless labor. The great unanimity which evidently prevailed here was a happy augury of great success.

Mr. Roe then proposed, seconded by T. P. Robarts,—"That the thanks of the Corporation are due and are hereby tendered to Messrs. Desbarats and Derbishire, for printing gratuitously last year's Report of the Society; and to the Editors of the Colonist and Globe, for gratuitously inserting in their respective newspapers the acknowledgments of the Society to its benevolent contributors and supporters.

A vote of thanks was also given to the Lady Managers, and the concluding prayer having been said by Dr. Lett, the meeting adjourned.

RULES AND REGULATIONS *

OF

THE ORPHANS' HOME AND FEMALE AID SOCIETY, TORONTO.

I. That this Corporation shall consist of all persons now on the List of Life Members, as published in the fifth Annual Report, who are hereby entitled to Life-Membership without being liable to further subscription, and of all other persons whose names appear on the subscription list as published in the sixth Annual Report, as contributors to the amount of one pound currency, and that these are to have and enjoy all the rights and privileges of membership, so long as they continue subscribers of the same amount paid previous to the first Tuesday of February in each year, and no longer.

II. That should any subscriber of one pound currency desire to become a Member of the Corporation, his or her name must be recommended by two Members to the Secretary, at least one month before each meeting of the Corporation duly held for the election of members, and that at such meeting his or her election be decided upon by ballot.

III. Before the Society or the Managers shall enter upon any of their meetings, the following prayer shall be used:

PREVENT us, O Lord, in all our doings with Thy most gracious favour, and further us with Thy continual help: that in all our works begun, continued and ended in Thee, we may glorify Thy holy Name, and finally by Thy mercy obtain everlasting life, through Jesus Christ our Lord. Amen.
