SAD EVIDENCE OF DISTRESS AMONGST THE OUVRIERS. The various classes in the manufacturing districts are now reduced, and the little hope which they entertain of an early improvement, is to be found in the prospect of a decent burial at the close of their life.

In the district of Ashton, such is the condition of the factory workers, that those of them who are members of sick and other societies, have met to divide the funds of the various clubs to which they belong.

The total number of operatives in the district was 20,000, but at present only 10,000 are working, three, and four days per week, whilst hundreds were entirely out of work.

It might be calculated that the total wages were 28000 per week, but it was probably that the present they only amounted to 14000 per week, so that in wages alone there had been a falling off in circulation to the district of one-half.

Not a single one of the operatives in the district was employed full time. When in full work, their wages might have averaged 21 per week, but now they were only getting more than ten shillings per week.

What is to become of all these poor people in the winter season? It is approaching it is not easy to say. We look to the wisdom of Parliament to enlighten us upon the subject.
