TENTH ANNUAL REPORT
OF THE
TORONTO HOME FOR INCURABLES.

THE Board of the Toronto Home for Incurables presents the Report for the tenth year of its work, acknowledging the kind and loving Providence of God, who prompted the commencement of the "Home," and has ever sustained its daily wants and pressing needs.

The decade marks the advance from the humble beginning in the hired house on Bathurst-street to this large and comfortable and permanent "Home;" for all this great success let us in thankfulness say, "Not unto us, O Lord, not unto us, but unto Thy name give the praise."

At the annual meeting last year it was resolved that steps be taken to remove without delay the mortgage debt remaining on the building. We are happy to report that this has been done. The statement of the Treasurer of the Building Fund shows how, and from whose generous hands the required sum of \$6,000 has been received, and to-day the Home stands *free of debt*.

This done, our duty lies plain before us. We have built and paid for one-half of the complete building designed for the "Home," and *that* half is full, and in consequence of the want of space in which to keep separate those incurable of cancer, we are obliged to refuse their admittance; we therefore call for help to build the new wing in which we shall be enabled to admit these sufferers to the kindly care for which they so earnestly desire.

We ought to begin this work *at once*, the plans are ready, the need is great.

During the past year twenty-seven patients entered the "Home," nineteen inmates were taken from suffering to rest, and our family-to-day numbers fifty-seven (57), 25 men and 32 women.

Deaths must of need be numerous in a Home for Incurables, which all enter that their pains may be allayed by cleanliness and care, their closing days, secured from want, brightened by kindly sympathy, by cheerful surroundings, and by an atmosphere of content, wherein the fear of death is replaced by happy hopefulness of another and a better Home.

We therefore thank the many friends who have visited and relieved the inmates of this Institution.

On the 13th of September, last year, the Marquis of Lorne (then Governor-General of Canada), Her Royal Highness the Princess Louise and His Royal Highness Prince George (son of the Prince of Wales), came to visit the "Home." They made a minute inspection of all the wards.

One poor dying girl to whom the Princess spoke long, and gave a bouquet, had been very anxious that the day of the visit might come, and after it was over, expressed her great pleasure and said, "Now I shall die happy that I have seen the Daughter of my Queen." A few days afterwards when she was laid in the grave, the flowers were laid upon her breast.

The Princess visited every bed, and from her womanly and affectionate conversation, left a memory with the inmates which they greatly prize.

Her Royal Highness further sent a donation of fifty dollars, and in saying "It was the brightest 'Home' she had ever seen," desired that a Report should be sent to her every year.

We have to thank the executors of the late Mr. Michie for having granted us the legacy of \$4,000 which was so generously bequeathed to us by him.

A bequest has been made by the late Mrs. M. J. Roaf (in memory of her husband), for the permanent endowment of a Bed, to be known as the "Roaf Bed."

The Chapel has been completed during the year, the seats having been given by Mr. Robert Gooderham, and the gasaliers by Mr. Gooch, of Parkdale. Services are held every Sunday, and the daily spiritual needs of the inmates supplied by the several clergymen of Parkdale, whose services are thankfully acknowledged.

Mrs. Hall, with the assistance of Mr. Alexander, kindly gave a concert to the inmates during the summer; Mr. and Mrs. Cornell and family, Mrs. Barton, and the choir of the Dundas Road Presbyterian Church, also contributed their musical talent.

Mrs. Lauder has conducted weekly Bible classes, and to these and many others who have contributed, either to the recreation or the quiet thought and solace of the inmates of the "Home," we tender our heartfelt thanks.

In the month of July a strawberry *fête* was held at the "Home," much to the pleasure of the inmates, and from this, and the sale of useful and ornamental work, the sum of \$225 was realized. It is probable this festival will be made annual, and greater success is hoped for each year.

The subscriptions for the year have been \$3,327 31. We thank all the donors for their greatly appreciated gifts.

The grants from the Ontario Government and the City Council have been continued and are thankfully acknowledged.

It may be well here to say that Dr. Crowdy, of Newfoundland, who visited us, reported that he considered the working of our "Home" to be "perfect and strikingly economical."

A portrait of our late President, Mr. McMurrich, has been completed by the well-known artist, Mr. Forbes, and hung in the Board room. The expense has been defrayed by the proceeds of a special entertainment which have been devoted to that purpose.

The Medical Staff, the Matron (Mrs. Craigie), and the servants under her charge, have all done their duties well and with a cheerful heart, and have maintained the happy character of the "Home."

MEDICAL REPORT.

In presenting their Annual Report of the Home for Incurables, the Medical Staff of this institution regret to be compelled to record an unusually heavy mortality.

There have been nineteen deaths during the year. This at first sight will appear to be a very large per centage from an average of only fifty-eight (58) inmates of the "Home." When it is remembered however that this is a Home only for those suffering from incurable diseases, the death rate will not be a matter of so much surprise.

An analysis of those cases, moreover, will show that a large proportion of those who died, had either reached, or far passed the allotted period of human life. One was 92, one 86, one 84, two 77, and one 73.

Of the remaining twelve, there was one 66, one 62, one 61, one 59, and one 50. It will be observed therefore that two thirds of the deaths occurred in persons of fifty years of age and upwards. In all the cases of death, the subjects were protracted sufferers from incurable diseases, and there is no doubt that their residence in this delightful "Home," not only prolonged life but contributed most materially to the comfort and happiness of their closing days.

The present arrangement for the supply of drugs for the "Home," will doubtless prove convenient and economical.

It is respectfully suggested, however, that in order to make it complete, a competent dispenser will be required.

So far removed as the "Home" is from the centre of population in the city, the attendance of a majority of the members of the Medical Staff involves the expenditure of considerable time, under the most favourable circumstances. When to this is added the labour of compounding all the medicines ordered, the members of the staff, feel it to be a heavier tax upon their time, than they can very well afford from their regular professional work

At comparatively trifling cost, the services of a senior medical student might be secured, who could attend daily, and see that all the medicines ordered were promptly prepared.

It is felt that a room devoted exclusively to the accomodation of those in a moribund condition would be a very desirable addition to the present marked completeness and comfort of the "Home," at present there is no place without encroaching upon the room usually occupied in common by a large number of the inmates, and if it is occupied in this way, for any considerable time, serious discomfort is the result.

In the case of persons suffering from malignant diseases, loathsomeness, sometimes considerable, but always, more or less, is a necessarily painful accompaniment. If it were possible to isolate such cases in their advanced stages at least, such an arrangement would materially augment the comfort of the other inmates, and be quite unobjectionable otherwise.

In closing this report the Medical staff cannot omit expressing the great satisfaction they have uniformly felt on the occasions of their professional visits to this noble institution, in observing the excellence of its entire management.

They take great pleasure also in expressing their personal obligations to the excellent and very efficient Matron for the marked courtesy which she has invariably extended to them.

Moved by Mr. John Macdonald, seconded by Rev. Dr. Reid :

“That the meeting desires to record their thankful appreciation of the services of the Medical Staff of the Institution, and the unceasing care and attention of the Matron, Mrs. Craigie, and her staff of faithful nurses ; and also to the earnest efforts of many loving visitors, clerical and lay, who have by their kindly offices so greatly benefitted the inmates of the Institution.

Moved by Dr. Thorburn, seconded by Alderman Harvie :

“Whereas the presence of cancerous patients has been found in the opinion of the Medical Staff, to be detrimental to the health of the inmates of the Home,

“*Resolved*,—That in the judgment of this Board such patients cannot be received until an increased accommodation is provided for them.”

Moved by Dr. Thorburn, seconded by Alderman Harvie,

“Whereas this Home has been provided for the comfort and relief of those who are possibly to live some time in an incurable state,

“*Resolved*,—That the admission of patients in a dying condition, and where there is slight hope of their surviving, the change is both a detriment to the inmates and a cruelty to the sufferers themselves, which so far as possible should be prevented by the Medical visitors.”

"Any person received into this Home as a free patient, if possessed of money or property shall be required to convey the same to the Board for the use of the Institution; and if investing property while an inmate of the Home, and desiring to leave, shall be required to pay the usual charge for board, during the period of residence in the Home."

All the foregoing resolutions were unanimously adopted :

Rev. H. M. Parsons gave notice, that he would, at the next Annual Meeting, move the adoption of the following changes in the Constitution :

Clause IX, after the word "always" insert, "That a certificate as to general character and circumstances shall have been received from such persons as the Board may approve."

After the word "Institution," add, "And that the application be approved by the Board at a regular monthly meeting."

Rev. H. M. Parsons gave notice, that at the next annual meeting he would move the adoption of the following changes :

Clause X. After the words "given at," add, "least three months before the annual meeting, and approved by a majority of the Board of Managers."

After the Mayor had expressed his commendation of the work of the "Home," the meeting closed, with the Benediction by the Rev. A. J. Broughall.

CONSTITUTION

OF THE

HOME FOR INCURABLES.

Adopted and Amended 28th March, 1884.

I. This Institution shall be known as "The Toronto Home for Incurables."

II. Its objects shall be to afford maintenance, nursing, and medical and surgical aid to persons suffering from incurable disease, and to provide for them, while inmates of the "Home," the ministrations of the Gospel.

III. Every subscriber of two dollars and upwards per annum shall be entitled to vote at the annual meeting, at which a Board of Managers shall be elected for the ensuing twelve months. Every individual who shall pay in advance, and at one time, the sum of fifty dollars, shall be entitled to the same privilege for life.

IV. All money now in the possession of the "Home," or which may hereafter be collected or acquired by it, shall be applied (unless otherwise directed by the donor) to the general objects, uses and requirements of the "Home."

V. The affairs of the "Home" shall be under the direction, control and management of a Board of Managers, of whom at least forty shall be ladies and twelve gentlemen, and who shall be elected at the annual general meeting of subscribers, qualified as set forth in Article III.

The medical staff attending the "Home" shall be *ex-officio* members of the Board of Managers.

In case of a vacancy arising, the Board may elect a member to fill the vacancy until the next annual general meeting.

The Board shall control and direct all the business of the institution, and their decisions upon all points of management shall be final.

There shall be chosen annually, and by the vote of the Board, a President and Vice-President, and from among the Lady Managers, the following officers, viz.: First Lady Directress, Second Lady Directress, Third Lady Directress, Secretary, Assistant Secretary, and Treasurer.

For the more convenient working of the Institution, the Board may from time to time appoint committees of not less than three of their number, such as an Executive Committee, and committees for visiting and superintending the "Home."

The Board may also enact By-laws for regulating the duties of the various officers and employees of the Home.

The By-laws shall not be altered except at a regular meeting, after notice duly given, at least a month previously.

VI. The Board of Managers shall hold stated meetings at least once a month, and may hold adjourned meetings when necessary. At such monthly meetings the Board shall have power to make additional By-laws regulating its own government, and for the government of the officers and employees, as before provided, and when necessary, after due notice, to alter and amend the same.

Special meetings of the Board may be called by the President and one of the Lady Directresses, or on requisition of five or more members of the Board. When a special meeting is called, the time and place of meeting, and the business for which it is called, shall be stated in the notice calling the meeting, and no other business shall be taken up at such meeting.

VII. The annual general meeting of the subscribers qualified as set forth in Article III., shall be held in the month of March.

It shall be the duty of the Board of Managers to make all necessary arrangements for said annual meeting; to lay before the subscribers a report of the proceedings of the previous twelve months, and to exhibit a full and accurate view of the funds, property and effects of the "Home."

VIII. In view of the large contributions given by the citizens of Toronto, and the grant made by the City Council in aid of the "Home," applicants from the City of Toronto for admission to the "Home" shall have preference over others.

IX. The Board will receive incurable persons from any municipality in Ontario outside of Toronto, on condition that a bond be given by said municipality to pay such sum as the Board may determine from time to time, for the maintenance of each patient so sent. Provided always that a certificate as to general character and circumstances shall have been received from such persons as the Board may approve; that a certificate be given by the gaol surgeon of the municipality, or by such other medical gentleman as the Board may approve, that the person seeking admission is incurable; provided also that such certificate be endorsed by the medical officers of this Institution, and that the application be approved by the Board at a regular monthly meeting.

X. The foregoing Constitution shall not be altered, unless it be at an annual general meeting of subscribers, notice of such alteration having been given at least three months before the annual meeting, and approved by a majority of the Board of Managers.

BY-LAWS

Amended and Adopted March 28th, 1884.

I. DUTIES OF OFFICERS.—At meetings of the Board of Managers the Chairman (elected as such from amongst the gentlemen managers) shall preside. In his absence the Managers present shall name a Chairman *pro tem*.

The Chairman shall be the judge of order, and his decisions thereon shall be acquiesced in without debate.

He shall direct the Secretary when special meetings are ordered, to insert in the notices the import of the special business upon which the Managers are to convene.

II. The Secretary shall keep fair and regular minutes of the proceedings of the Board of Managers in a book to be provided for that purpose.

She shall preserve all the records and papers of the Society which do not belong to the office of Treasurer.

She shall cause a notice of each stated meeting, and of each special meeting of the Board of Managers, to be sent to the address of each Manager, at least one day previous to the day fixed for the meeting.

The Assistant Secretary shall assist the Secretary in her duties when required, and act for her at meetings of the Board in her absence.

III. The Treasurer shall receive all monies belonging to the Society, and shall give a receipt to the persons from whom she may receive money.

For the sake of regularity and in order to establish the amount, all persons who may hand money to the Treasurer are requested to ask for a receipt for the money so paid over.

When the Treasurer does not require the money in paying accounts which have passed the Board, she shall deposit the money or such part of it as may not be immediately required in the Savings Bank, to the credit of her official account as Treasurer.

She shall keep a fair and regular account of the receipts and expenditures, and her account book and bank book shall be open to the inspection of the Managers at each stated meeting.

Prior to the General Annual Meeting, she shall prepare a statement showing the receipts and expenditures of the year, duly classified and audited, that a lucid, full explanation, or exposition of the working of the finances of the "Home," may be submitted at the general meeting.

The Treasurer's accounts shall be audited by a Committee of the gentlemen managers named by the Chairman or by the Board.

IV. The Treasurer shall only pay accounts for articles, and services supplied to the "Home," when duly certified, and in all cases of payment, shall require a receipt.

Accounts shall be certified to be correct as to prices, by the Managers who made the purchase of the articles and shall be initialed "correct," accordingly. They shall then be initialed by the Matron or the Superintendent, to show that the articles were received at the "Home."

The accounts shall then be laid before the Managers at the stated monthly meeting, and when payment is ordered, the order shall be entered on the minutes by the Secretary.

The Treasurer can then pay the accounts, and an entry upon the minutes will be as sufficient authority to the Treasurer to pay whatever accounts or disbursements the Board may have ordered.

V. The Managers may appoint from time to time Committees from amongst themselves, to attend to any special duties.

As a rule such Committees shall consist of not less than three, and not less than two shall be considered a quorum to act.

These Committees for the sake of regularity and for future reference shall as a rule report to the Board in writing.

VI. The stated meetings of the Board shall be held on the last Friday of every month, at such hour as the Board may from time to time appoint.

VII. The Superintendent and Matron shall hold their offices at the pleasure of the Board.

They shall do all in their power to promote the comfort of the inmates of the "Home," and shall follow the instructions of the Board, of the Lady Managers for the week, and of the medical staff when orders are given.

They shall keep a book for entering all such things as they may consider necessary for the uses of the "Home," and submit it to the weekly visitors. When disbursements are ordered, a regular account of the same shall be kept for the information of the Managers and the Treasurer.

VIII. The Managers deeming the point of admission of Inmates into the "Home," to be a very important matter, decide that the following formalities shall regularly be observed.

1st. Applicants for admission into the "Home," are to state how long they have resided in the city, their residence, age, disease, and circumstances, also, whether he, or she has been attended by any medical man, and whether any clergyman has visited.

2nd. Thereafter two of the Managers shall visit the residence named (two ladies if the applicant be a woman, two gentlemen if the applicant be a man.) They shall look at the surroundings of the applicant, ascertain what can be practically known of the person's circumstances, habits, and general character, in short get all the available information about the case.

They shall see the clergyman and the doctor, if either have been in attendance, hear what each has to say about the applicant, and report to the Board of Managers.

3rd. That two of the Medical Staff of the "Home" shall visit each applicant for admission and report to the Board of Managers, the character of the disease, and if incurable; and for any applicant outside of Toronto, the equivalent testimonials shall be required.

Each application for admission to the "Home," shall be presented at the regular meeting of the Board, and, if entertained, after due investigation shall be acted upon at the following regular meeting of the Board.

4th. All the inmates of the "Home," must distinctly understand, that admission confers no right of permanent residence in the "Home," and that at any time the Managers have the power of dismissing an inmate, for what they may deem a sufficient cause. Of its sufficiency, the Managers are to be the sole judges.

IX. Any person received into this "Home" as a free patient, if possessed of money or property shall be required to convey the same to the Board for the use of the Institution ; and if inheriting property while an inmate of the "Home," and desiring to leave, shall be required to pay the usual charge for board, during the period of residence in the "Home."
