There is a theological seminary for training their missionaries, also schools for children all the way from the kindergarten classes to the seminary course.

A large tract of land surrounding the targe tract of land surrounging the building is also controlled by the Shilohites. Those who work are employed chiefly in farming or at other pursuits necessary in a colony of that kind. They associate freely with the neighbors who are not of the sect and trade with them. Sanford is at present in the Mediter ranean with his personal yacht, and a ranean with his personal yacht, and a smaller vessel, on board of which are about fifty disciples as well as the prophet. Their ultimate object is to circumnavigate the globe for the purpose of spreading the gospel as they understand it, in all parts of the earth. They propose to stop at such points as they consider expedient, and on the conclusion of the voyage a return to Shiloh will be made.






