British Drive On North of Ginchy

French Beat Back Enemy Seeking to Recover Territory Recently Captured By Foch's Army

London, Sept. 14.—The British have made further progress on the Somme front north of Ginchy, it was announced officially today.

Paris, Sept. 14.—The Germans made vigorous efforts last night to drive the French from territory occupied recently on the Somme and Verdun fronts.

Petrograd, Sept. 14.—On the western (Russian and Galician) front the situation is unchanged, says today's announcement from the war office.

Paris, Sept. 14.—The speed of the French advance in Tuesday's battle on the Somme front took the Germans completely by surprise according to a description of the fighting given by an eyewitness.

GERMAN PRINCES IN COMMANDS ON WEST

Berlin, Sept. 14.—Crown Prince Rupprecht of Bavaria has assumed the over-command of the German armies on the Somme front.

MASSACRE BY TURKS IN KAVALA

Bashibazouks Pillage and Slay When Garrison Leaves THE CITY IN A PANIC

Bulgarians Drop Bombs and Kill Nine Persons—American Lives as Well as Property in Danger

Paris, Sept. 14.—The Greek port of Kavala was pillaged and civilians massacred by Turkish Bashibazouks on the withdrawal of the Greek garrison, according to a Saloniki dispatch to the Havas Agency.

A terrible panic occurred in the city when the garrison withdrew. The Bashibazouks entered and, after breaking open the prisons, indulged in an orgy of pillage and slaughter.

Athens, Sept. 18.—The British legation today informed Garrett Droggers, American minister, that the Greeks have surrendered to the Bulgarians the last of the forts defending the seaport of Kavala.

Rioting at Kavala is reported and it is said that houses and shops have been pillaged. Some Americans are endangered as is property of American consuls.

ST. JOHN PURSES OPENED TO LEND COUNTRY MONEY

Local Subscriptions to War Loans Already Large—Some Phases

That there is plenty of money in St. John awaiting a favorable opportunity for investment is demonstrated by the applications for the new government war loans.

It is taken for granted that the new loan will be oversubscribed. The first loan offered was \$600,000, and applications were received for twice that amount.

One of the brokers who held off before because they were unfamiliar with such issues, or for similar reasons, are more inclined to produce their money this time.

The government loans have been popular with the small investor who seldom has had an opportunity to get such a good investment, and before the lists were open, they had received applications for many times the total amount they had handled for the previous loan.

Subscriptions from the United States are likely to be prominent in this issue. It is known that some very large applications have been received from across the line, and the same is noticeable in Boston, New York and Chicago also.

It is expected that the results will be a fine tribute to Canada's financial situation, and that it is likely to have a beneficial effect in almost all lines of business activities.

ENEMY EFFORT TO STEM TIDE IN THE BALKANS

Report That 200,000 Germans and 100,000 Austrians Are to Be Sent There; Serbs and Bulgars Fighting

London, Sept. 14.—A wireless press despatch from Rome says that at the general council of the Central Powers at the headquarters of the German Emperor, an offensive campaign in the Balkans was mapped out, and that Germany will send 200,000 men and Austria 100,000 for this purpose.

Paris, Sept. 14.—Serbians and Bulgarians are engaged in violent fighting on the Macedonian front. The war office announced today that the Serbians had captured Bulgarian trenches near Vetrinac and a height northwest of Lake Ostrovo.

London, Sept. 14.—3:40 p.m.—There has been considerable activity on both our Struma and our Dobran fronts, says the official report of today in regard to the Macedonian campaign.

Petrograd, Sept. 14.—Roumanian troops have repulsed a series of attacks by the Germans and Bulgarians in Dobruja.

Athens, Sept. 18, via London, Sept. 14.—(Delayed)—M. Dimitracopolis has asked King Constantine to allow him forty-eight hours in which to consult his friends before deciding as to whether he will undertake the formation of a new cabinet.

M. Dimitracopolis is known to have declared that his acceptance of the premiership will be made only on the basis that he be given full power to control the national policy.

London, Sept. 14.—Every effort to persuade Alexander Zaimis, the aged premier, to remain in office was fruitless.

The appearance of the Allied fleet off Athens at the very moment when negotiations have begun for the entry of Greece into the war.

"I hope the Entente now sees where its policy of trying to force matters in Greece has opposed the Greek official with sympathies for the Entente, to the moral effect of Greece's entry into the war with the Allies unquestionably will be a shortening of the war by many months.

The correspondent, referring to the anchored observation balloons, says the Germans have adopted a new means of defending their balloons from the British aeroplanes which already have downed several of them.

The correspondent sends extracts from many letters found upon German prisoners confirming the terrors of the British artillery and the severe German reprisals.

A letter from a Prussian artilleryman says: "The Englishman is a damnable enemy. The Frenchman and Russian are not so cunning."

Letters from friends of German soldiers at home deplore the terrible German losses. One says there are 6,000 widows in Offenbach, besides the unmarried men who have fallen.

Constantinople and The Dardanelles For Russia

Duma Member in United States Says Allies Have Agreed to This

San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 14.—That Constantinople has been promised to Russia by the Entente Allies should the Central Empires be defeated was said here yesterday by M. M. Itchas, a member of the Duma and one of a Russian parliamentary delegation sent by the Czar to England, France and Italy to confer with these governments.

"Russia has the solemn promise of the other allies that Constantinople and the Dardanelles will become Russian territory," said Mr. Itchas. He came here by way of Japan, and is visiting America to consult with committees of his countrymen measures for the relief of the thousands of refugees who fled into Russia when German troops occupied Lithuania.

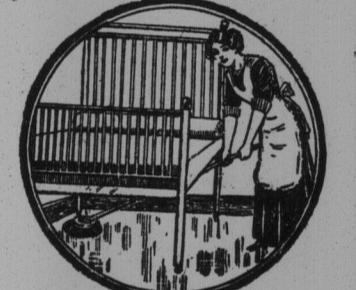

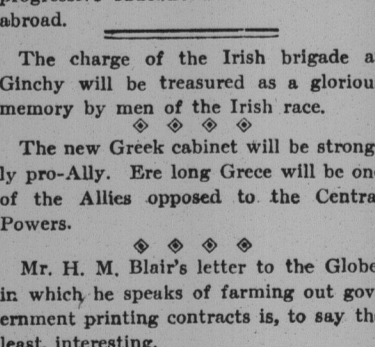

**Steamer Elaine Proves Popular**  
River Craft Taken From St. John to North Shore Cuts Ten Hours Off Gaspe Schedule

That the steamer Elaine, which formerly ran on the St. John river, has filled the needs of the service for which she was taken to the North Shore, is indicated by an eulogistic article in a recent issue of the Campbellton Gazette. Extracts from the article follow:

Heretofore very large boats were placed on the route, many of which were entirely unsuited for the service, with the result that the trip to Gaspe occupied entirely too much time, some twenty-eight hours being required to make the trip, where today the S. S. Elaine makes her trip to Gaspe in practically eighteen hours, a saving in time of some ten hours over the former boats.

"The trip now to Gaspe is one which may be properly termed a day trip, and one with which tourists are greatly pleased. **BRITISH AIRSHIPS OF ZEPPELIN TYPE**  
Are Far More Readily Handled Than the German Model; Will Be Eyes of Fleet

London, Aug. 24.—Recently a sufficiently guarded description revealed the fact that Britain possessed a new class of airship comparable to some existing with the German Zeppelin. **HELD PRISONER WITH A DEAD MAN**  
Patron of Crawford House, Boston, Crushed in Elevator

Boston, Sept. 14.—George H. Webster, 66 years old, living at 115 1/2 Hampden street, Cambridge, night watchman at the Crawford House, was arrested, charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of a man who registered at the hotel as J. Stevens of Springfield.

Patrolman Chester Shaw of the Court street Station arrested Webster after he had been released from the elevator car, where he was held a prisoner as a result of the accident.

After Stevens had registered at the hotel, he went out across the street. When he returned a few minutes later he stepped into the car on the office side of the hotel. There was a door on the rear of the car opening into a corridor, which leads to the dining room and the halls of the hotel.

Webster started the car, and the first he knew of the accident the car suddenly stopped. Webster was facing the office front of the car at the time. The clerk of the hotel, who had seen Stevens cross the office floor, heard a crunching sound, caused by the crushing of the body of the unfortunate guest, and he ran to the elevator to see what the trouble was.

Webster, who had not discovered what caused the car to stop suddenly, tried to start it again, and when the clerk confronted him he looked around and was horrified to see the body of the guest crushed between the edge of the floor of the car and the elevator well.

The car was held fast between the office floor and the next landing. The body was motionless, and it was evident that Stevens was dead, having been probably instantly killed.

The police were notified and they called a surgeon and an ambulance from the Relief Hospital. When the surgeon was unable to do anything for the victim of the accident and it was found impossible to extricate the body, the fire department was notified.

Besides being unable to remove the body, it was impossible to move the car, and Webster was held a prisoner inside near the dead man. Webster is an old man, and he was badly affected by the accident and his terrible predicament.

Members of Ladder Company 1 worked for an hour with jacks and axes, cutting away the doorway, the casing and side walls of the elevator well. The body was taken out at 4.10 and removed to the Relief Hospital, where Dr. Fraser said the man was dead. The body was then removed to the Northern District mortuary in North Grove street.

Webster was released on surety furnished by the hotel management. Webster told the police he was unable to explain how Stevens was killed, except that from his position it would appear that he had fell out of the car through the rear door, which was open. The only witnesses in the case are Webster and the night clerk, and their stories were taken at police headquarters.

Hobart Bosworth in "The White Scar," a Story of the Great North West

Many pictures have come and gone, since there has been seen such a live red-blooded story as is presented in "The White Scar," a feature in which Hobart Bosworth appears to wonderful advantage. It is a tale in which Indians and trappers monopolize the cast, figures that are always responsible for the completion of a strong, virile story of the northwest.

Ulysses Davis has not allowed his reputation for the selection of beautiful and appropriate exteriors to suffer in "The White Scar." His locations are revelations, everyone of them. Not a vestige of civilization is apparent. The players appear before backgrounds of rivers, lakes, mountains and forests. They move in settings that fit the action down to the last degree of perfected realism.

And these wonderful scenes are not in the least belittled by inferior photographic work. Throughout the five reels the photography maintains an even standard of clarity. Most always it is excellent, never is it anything less than good.

The story, conceived by Bosworth himself, is of a fine character. It catches the attention at its very commencement and keeps it until the very final scene. Bosworth has painted his villain with a very black brush and consequently, as practically every other character suffers by his evil ways, the sympathetic quality of the production is considerably above the average.

Bosworth is also responsible for the subtleties, the great majority of which are modeled after the style of Longfellow's "Hiawatha."

"The White Scar" is the tale of the love of Na-ta-wan-gan and Janet, the young daughter of the factor of the trading post. The unrequited affection of Wehnomah, an Indian girl, for the trapper provides an interesting subsidiary theme; her self-sacrificing devotion to the interests of Na-ta-wan-gan and those he loves adds to the charm of the story. There are many red men in the cast, and among them are several who show an appreciation of the drama in the making of which they are a part.

Mr. Bosworth's portrayal of the bearded trapper will add to his fine reputation. It is dignified, powerful. Anna Lehr makes an impressive Indian girl. Norval McGregor is Mackintosh, the factor who rules the little community of white and red inhabitants. Jane Novak is the daughter, who, with her brother, encompasses the escape of the trapper when he has been condemned as the thief and sentenced to go to death via a long traverse. Her portrayal of Janet, following his assumption to the theft for which the girl's brother has been adjudged guilty, is well done. Ronald Bradbury is Henri, the bad young man who makes all the trouble—a convincing characterization—and Frank Newburg is Robert, the brother of Janet.

Na-ta-wan-gan is one of Mr. Bosworth's best impersonations.



The War Situation

(By the Military Expert of the New York Times.)

The Russian attacks against Halicz and the railroads radiating from that town are leading back all resistance there. The accounts of the fighting are still meagre, nothing being given out yet which would show exactly what has taken place. The name of not a single town is mentioned in the official reports, although it is positive that several have been taken and left well in the rear by the Russian advance.

than was the position on the Ziota and on the Stripa. Retirements from the latter streams could be made without immediate danger. In each case there were two railroads well suited to such a purpose. In the case of Halicz and the Ziota, there are practically none.

The Russian report of yesterday stated that the Austrians had fallen back to the western bank of the Ziota and were firing on their advancing columns. No mention of any point of crossing is made, and whether the entire Austrian line has fallen back is not apparent. But the Austrians are on their last line of defense is certain.

This brings about a peculiar condition in this section. South of the Ziota the Russian lines run northeast and southwest, while north of the city they run practically at right angles to this course. They are fighting, then, on two fronts—one facing east and the other south. In the angle between is Halicz. This means that the town is under fire from three sides. Its escape from Russian capture seems impossible.

Another point in connection with this offensive in Galicia must be borne in mind. As the Russians advance along the Dniester line the Austrian right wing is constantly being pressed out against the Carpathian Mountains and the entire Austrian line strung out and stretched. Instead of becoming shorter it is just as it is in the west. Every retirement makes the new line more difficult to hold, as it makes it longer by the degree of the angle and leaves a smaller number of men to hold it. There must be a limit to this. If the Russians can reach the railroad and cut it, and there are only a mile or two from it, there does not seem to be any escape for a large number of Teutonic soldiers.

BURROUGHS JOINS EDISON CAMPERS

Tents Are Pitched in Naturalist's Orchard

Ford's Name Cut on Boulder; Pair Chat Before Roaring Wood Fire Like Happy Schoolboys

Roxbury, N. Y., Sept. 14.—When Henry Ford reaches Roxbury to join the camping trip through the Catskills and Adirondacks, which Thomas A. Edison, Harvey S. Firestone and John Burroughs are taking he will find his name immortalized in John Burroughs' own handwriting. It is engraved in solid rock beside the road a few rods from Woodchuck Lodge, Md. Burroughs' Roxbury cottage in the mountains. The naturalist has just put it there himself with hammer and chisel, which Mr. Ford sent him for the purpose.

Two years ago Mr. Ford was visiting Mr. Burroughs in Roxbury. One day time was hanging heavily on their hands. Mr. Burroughs said to Mr. Ford: "I have a lot across the road which has not been of any use to me because it is full of rocks, and I don't know what to do about it."

Mr. Ford, being a practical man, replied: "Why can't we go over and clear them out?"

For two whole weeks, with the occasional assistance of two farm hands, John Burroughs and Henry Ford, with their shirtsleeves rolled up, dragged rocks out of that field. Mr. Burroughs admits that they paused occasionally and that there was a day once in a while when they did other things, but the fact remains that the field is now clear of boulders.

In honor of his distinguished helper, Mr. Burroughs named the plot "Ford Field." He spent most of Tuesday being stretched out on a big boulder at the side of the road getting the title chiseled into it. Below the name is a huge hand pointing out the location of the field.

Like Happy Schoolboys.

At eight o'clock John Burroughs and "Tom" Edison were sitting together like two happy school boys before a roaring wood fire in front of their tent, discussing the nature of primitive man. The camp was pitched in the orchard in front of Woodchuck Lodge on the high hills, with the beautiful Delaware Valley spread out before them.

They reached Roxbury about six. Mr. Edison was in high good humor. He pointed out delightedly the arrangements made for the comfort of the campers—the electric lights in the tents, the camp cots, and the stores of good things that had packed away in the trunk which Mr. Firestone added to the commissary department.

The crowd dined on fish. Did they catch the fish themselves? That was what John Burroughs wanted to know. They didn't exactly catch the fish, but they got them off the man who did, which is certainly closer to nature than buying them in a fish market.

It must be added here that before the automobile party arrived Mr. Burroughs was a tiny bit uncertain as to what he was getting into.

Doesn't Fit Into Book.

"There is nothing like camp life," he said. "I've been camping all my eighty odd years, but I'll have to admit that at my age a bed feels pretty good to me, and I haven't particular scruples against a hotel once in a while. I find that my body doesn't fit into the crevices and bumps of a camp bunk as it used to."

When he heard that the expedition was to include tents, cots and other accessories, with four lousy men to take care of them, he looked relieved.

No one can charge that Mr. Burroughs is losing his hunter's eye.

"I've been doing a bit of gardening here," he said, with pardonable pride exhibiting a handsome squash and a peck of huge potatoes. "It's a bit difficult sometimes to get rid of the rabbits and woodchucks, but I've forced out the rabbits, and as for the woodchucks, well, I've shot twenty-six from my porch, and that's seventeen better than the record of my nearest competitor among the neighbors."

**JUST BACK FROM THE GUNS; WRITES HOME**

Gunner George Lawrence Says They're Making the Germans Uncomfortable

Gunner George Lawrence, son of Mrs. Mary Lawrence of 209 Rockland Road, who is at present at the front with a local artillery battery, writes as follows:

Just back from the guns. We did our best to make it hot for "Fritz." We kept banging at the German lines for about three hours; the batteries on our left and right did likewise. It must be very uncomfortable in the German lines; we do our best, anyway, to make it so.

Talk about rain! We get all we want of it and the same with mud. The boys say wait until the rainy season starts; we'll have mud up to our knees. I won't care much, I will have my big boots by that time, and if not I will write home. I have no much to worry about in that line.

I just finished my supper which consisted of tea, bread and jam—not so bad. We have a canteen here so if you want more you can get it—that is if you have the money. So you see we are getting along nicely for being so close to the firing line. Just have time to get ready to go back to the guns.

**ANOTHER ST. JOHN MAN HOME FROM WAR**

Gunner James J. Barbour of Brussels Street Suffers From Shell Shock

Gunner James J. Barbour, a member of the 1st Heavy Artillery, arrived home today from the front. He is suffering from shell shock and will enter the convalescent home here.

Gunner Barbour is a fighter, as he was through the Boer war, and when the call came for men to serve in the present war, he was one of the first to answer the call and crossed with the first contingent.

Gunner Barbour is a native of England, but has been residing in St. John for several years. He is thirty-two years old, and was in the employ of the C. P. R. as a steamfitter prior to going overseas. It is doubtful whether or not he will go again to the front.

He was met at the station by Charles Robinson, secretary of the Returned Soldiers' Aid Commission, and by members of the reception committee, and was taken by auto to his former residence, 30 Brussels street.

**THE MUNITIONS MATTER**

Military Expert Comments on General Kuropatkin's Statement

New York, Sept. 14.—The New York Sun prints the following news agency dispatch from London: Colonel Reppington, military expert of the Times, commenting upon the Russian General Kuropatkin's recent statement that it is necessary that the allies combine their men and guns to better advantage than hitherto, says it deserves careful consideration.

"If, on completion of our own order," he writes, "we turn over to Russian use our plants for the manufacture of heavy guns and shells except such as are required for the needs of our own army, we can enable Russia in 1917 and 1918 to develop her military power to a point where they will dominate the whole situation."

"We can do so only if we reach the limit of expansion of our own armies. These alternatives suggest several considerations, but the combination Kuropatkin seeks should not be beyond settlement by statesmanship."
