Three Tombs 1,000 Years Older Than King Tut's to be Uncovered

Paris, Sept. 13.—The wonders of Tutankhamen's tomb may pale into significance next year when three other tombs, at least 1,000 years older, uncovered by a group of experts who are already being organized by the

are uncovered by a group of experts who are already being organized by the Egyptian Government.

Knowledge of the existence of the mysterious tombs was obtained from ar inscription on the tomb of Tarachhamen opened by the late Lord Carnaryon and Howard Carter.

This inscription, which has been kept secret, was submitted by a native official to the Egyptian experts, and when deciphered provided a sensational clue, which has also been jealously guarded.

The inscription told of three other tombs of earlier rulers on the outskirts of the Valley of Kings and within five miles of the site of Tutankhamen's last resting-place. The rulers buried there were of one of the richest provinces, and Egyptian officials are convinced that, if the tombs are found, incalculable wealth, both material and historical, will be unearthed.

Interest in the new discovery is enhanced by the fact that the three tombs must have been constructed at a time when gold and ivory, instead of polished woods, were the chief materials used in royal furniture and decorations.
