There are several ways in which a loose coupler, which consists essen-tially of a primary and secondary, coi, may be connected so as to obtain regeneration when the tube detector is used. One method would be to place a third coil connected in the plate circuit of the vacuum tube in inductive relation to the secondary so that the energy from the plate would be fed back to the grid circuit in order to reinforce the oscillations there. Probably the simplest method is the one shown in the diagram which requires the least change in the circuit and the addition of the fewest extra parts or in-truments.








