Moore equalled Jewtraw's record of 19 seconds flat after the 220 yard race.







Albany, Jan. 20.—Dr. George M.
Calvert, of Utica, who lost his sight in the war, wrote on his typewriter a bill introduced by Assemblyman James F.
Kiernan, of Brooklyn, appropriating 100 to tally blind Great War veterans. The bill provides that \$500 annually be given by the state to each veteran who was blinded while fighting overseas.







Lesson No. 211. MAKING A LOOSE COUPLER REGENERATIVE.

Many operators of crystal receiving sets build or purchase loose couplers in their progress toward a more sensitive and selective receiver. From the crystal detector they go to the vacuum tube detector with its batteries and other additional parts. The discovery is soon made that the vacuum tube detector gives only slightly louder signals than can be obtained with the crystal type and the range is increased little if any. The reason for this is itlat the simple vacuum tube detector without regenerative features does not anaplify the incoming signal as much as the operator has been led to believe. The superiority of the receiving set employing vacuum tubes is most apparent when advantages of amplification secured through regeneration are realized.

There are several ways in which a loose coupler, which consists essentially of a primary and secondary coi, may be connected so as to obtain regeneration when the tube detector is used. One method would be to place a third coil connected in the plate circuit of the vacuum tube in inductive relation to the secondary so that the energy from the plate would be fed back to the grid circuit in order to reinforce the oscillations there. Probably the simplest method is the one shown in the diagram which requires the least change in the circuit and the addition of the fewest extra parts or instruments.

Captain Became Desperate.

The captain fearing that the ship might be placed in a perilous position redoubled his efforts to regain control of his charge. Setzing his gun he again advanced up the companionway. Lorensen's foot was ready but before he could swing it Rassmussen pulled the trigger. He discharged the gun, he said, for the purpose of frightening the seaman, but the bullet found a mark in the arm of the rebellious sallor, who was immediately compelled to go forward in order to have the wound dressed. Lorensen later appeared on the after deck and tearing the bandage from his arm refused to allow anything to be done in the treatment of the wound. Econming gradually weakened, however, he was compelled to permit his arm to be dressed and later he was placed in the captain's bunk. He died six hours later from loss of blood.

The captain and mate were detained following their recital of the circumstances and as a result of an investigation by the police the justice department of the wound law it was without authority to try the case. 



This is distinctly a bright notion of Alexander Ross, a Westminster consulting engineer, who suggests making a huge subway connecting Whitehall, from a point past Downing street towards Trafalgar Square, with the Houses of Parliament, the Abbey, and the Westminster Guild Hall. The argument is that such underground facilities would link up parliament conveniently with official headquarters in Whitehall, enable ministers and M. Pristor reach St. Stephen's quickly and unobtrusively, and immensely relieve the traffic congestion at the corner of Palace Yard. Incidentally it would also enable Scotland Yard to keep in very close touch with parliament, and, in case of necessity, to rush a strong police garrison into Palace Yard. The one objection that suggests itself is that very elaborate measures of police patrol would have to be established to render the subway safe for well-known statesmen. 



WALLACE REID SPENT IT FAST

Movie Star Made Millions; Left But \$100,000

Home was Mortgaged--Only 30 Years Old-He Jumped from Newspaper Work Into Fame in Motion Pic-

(Canadian Press) Los Angeles, Jan. 20-Although he was one of the highest paid motion picture stars and his income during the last few years totalled more than a \$1,000,000, Wallace Reid left an estate estimated at considerably less than

stimated at considerably less than \$100,000.

Reid's immense fortune, persons in close touch with his financial affairs said, dwindled so that for months prior to his death he was practically dependent upon \$500 a week given him by the Laskey Company.

With his comparatively small estate, Reid left \$70.000 in life insurance. His home at 8827 De Long-Pre aveaue, was mortgaged. His equity in his home, his other personal property and notes, many of which are considered worthless, will not amount to \$100,000, it was said, and may total far below that figure.

While his income ran into the nillions, friends said, Reid's love for high priced automobiles and other expensive luxuries prevented him from accumulating the fortune one might expect would be saved.

Reid was thirty years old, the victim of his own rapid rise to fame. From the salary of a poor boy—a reporter on a Newark, N. J., newspaper, a handy man about motion picture studios, an extra man in big productions—he shot up suddenly to the status of star with a salary of \$5,000 a week. He was handsome, fun loving, attractive to everybody. His house began to be filled with "fair-weather" friends, who enjoyed his parties and tempted him to excesses which sapped his strength. At the same time he was working extremely hard in his studio, completing ten pictures in the year of his greatest popularity.



The money was turned over to Deputy Sheriff Conlin, and Johnson, lighting a fresh cigar, turned his car and thoughts Broadwayward.












