

seek to impose crushing terms on Poland at Minsk on Wednesday, says a despatch from Hythe. These steps consist of a naval blockade of Russia by the British fleet aided by French destroyers. Neighboring neutral nations such as Sweden, Denmark and Norway would be asked to suspend exports to Russia and thus aid the first fight against the world danger of Bolshevism and eventually the Allies may appeal to Germany to effect the isolation of Russia by land. Another plan considered consists of forming a defensive front against Russia by appealing to Letvia, Lithuania, Caucasus and Azorbaijan as well as other states formerly parts of the Russian empire.

General Wrangel, the anti-Bolsheviki leader in southern Russia, will be supported by both England and France, and Poland would naturally receive every material and moral aid. If she should be cut off from Danzig, materials might be sent to her through Czecho-Slovakia. There was no question of sending French and British troops to Poland. Should the Bolsheviki continue stubborn and provocative attitude, the Soviet trade mission in London will be given a week to leave that city and the commercial negotiations, which might bave been soon transformed into political conversations, would be broken off.

"The premiers at one time," the despatch adds, "considered appealing to the League of Nations to settle the Russe-Polish problem, but were obliged to recognize them that the league as yet lacks means of acting and that the experiment might result in fallure, which would have a regretable effect on the future of the organization."

Ex-Bandit Given Quite Reception - Nine Hundred Followers With Him.

San Pedro Coahuila via Laredo Junction, Aug. 10—Francisco Villa marched Into San Pedro an Monday night between the lines of a cheering population which greeted him with cheers of 'Viva Villa." Behind came his band of faithful followers, who, with their leader, surrendered to the La Huerta government under terms agreed upon recently at Sanihas. There were 900 men in the band which Villa led into San Pedro, all of whom later pitched camp close by this little town after a twenty-four hour march across desert country without water for man or beast. Villa's entrance into San Pedro marked the first time in ten years of revolution that the bandit leader had neared a city without a plan of conquest or as a hunted fugitive. He was greeted and embraced by generals who two weeks ago were leading thousands of soldlers in an attempt to capture him.

6 wedes Return to Native Land — Food at Incredible Prices — Ill as Result of Experiences.

Stockholm, July 26—(Associated Press Correspondence) — One hundred and forty-eight Swedes, including thirty women and children, have arrived here by steamship from Russia.

Workmen in the party were unanimous in saying that it is impossible to exist in Soviet Russia. Despite the extravagantly high wages paid, they said they were insufficient to purchase necessary food and clothing. The arrivals included a number of Swedish bolshevist metal workers who, some months ago, set out workers who, some months ago, set out for Russia amidst the cheers of their friends. Some of their countrymen, they said, had been detained in Russia against

disappearance of the item of "war expenditure" which has contributed more than anything else to the growth of the public debt. The figures demonstrating this statement shows a total war expenditure for the first four months of the fiscal year 1919 as \$117,276,824 as against only \$2,078,074 for the same period this year.

The revenue side of the financial statement indicates such buoyancy that there is reason to hope that the time is not far distant when some of the revenue may be available for purposes of debt reduction. For the four months collections by the customs and other revenue producing departments totalled \$145,049,588, as compared with \$99,621,970 for the similar period in 1919. For July alone the collections were \$45,220,491, whereas in July, 1919, they amounted only to \$26,554,066. A jump in customs collections from \$49,154,603 to \$69,773,477 contributed the largest percentage of the increase, while the war tax revenues were higher than those collected in 1919 by several millions.

London, Aug. 10—With 38,954 flights and a total of 70,000 passengers carried during the first year of civil flying in England there was but one fatal accident. "We have conquered the air, and our immediate task is to exploit our victory in the interest of commercial development."

The number of miles flown was 784,200 for the first year and goods carried totalled 116,498 pounds. Up to the end of March more than 200,000 pounds worth of imports and exports were carried by air between the United Kingdom and the continent.

A total of 114 aerodromes were licensed and 519 machines were registered during the first year of civil flying in England.

AT NEW YORK TAKE PHOSPHATE

FERTILIZERS HELP
CONTROL INSECT PESTS. Anything which will give the plant best growing conditions—a well prepared seed bed, properly fertilized, good seed and a suitable rotation, will enable it to survive a greater amount of unfavorable weather, to be sown reasonably late and yet survive more or less an amount of infestation which would damage or even destroy a crop less well handled. A fertilizer which will hasten maturity is recommended for all southern Indiana soils and the use of lime on most farms is also much needed. Since the growth and vigor of a plant are directly related to Hessian fly, jointworm and wheat-midge injuries, it is important that the soil be not only properly manured but it should be so handled as to give a good seed bed and where the ground is to be plowed, this can best be done by plowing before the middle of August and subsequently harrowing as is necessary. Later plowing, even when thoroughly packed is never as satisfactory as earlier plowing and subsequent harrowing.


