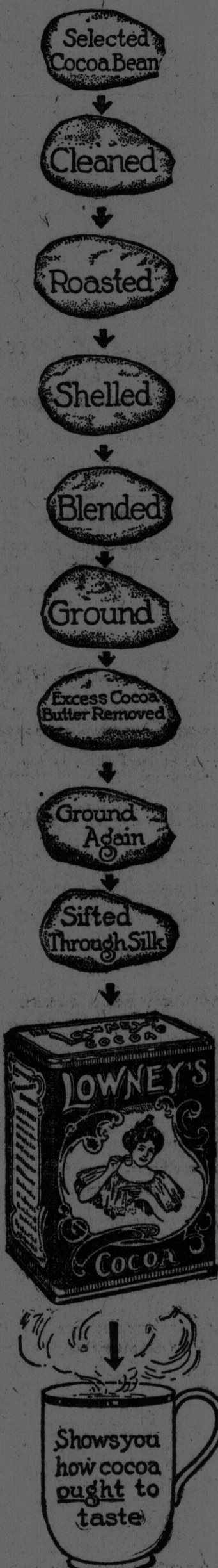

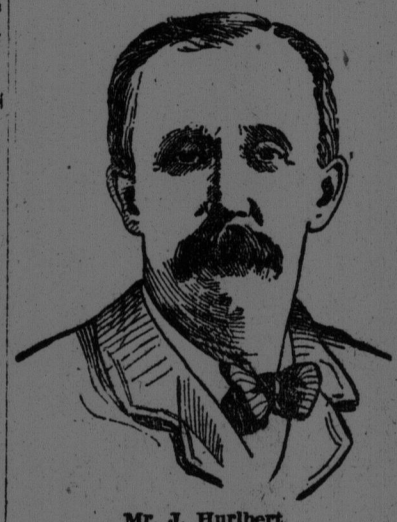

NELLIE GILL PLAYERS AT OPERA HOUSE OPEN WITH SUCCESS

Paid in Full is Well Presented and Well Received

The Nellie Gill Players opened a ten days' engagement at the Opera House last night with the presentation of the drama Paid in Full. They were greeted by a large audience, and were given a gratifying reception. Since the play was produced in St. John several years ago it has become one of the greatest successes of recent years, and has had a run of two years in the Astor Theatre, New York. The theme, although simple, is of gripping interest and gives rise to several intensely dramatic situations. 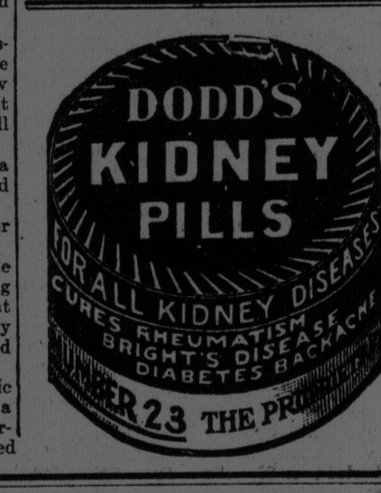

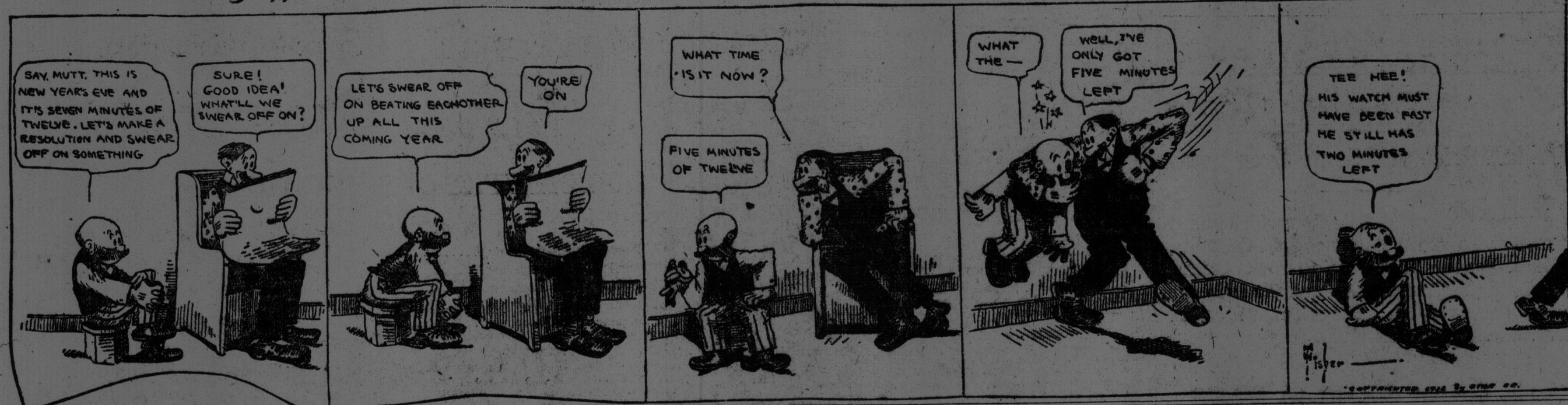

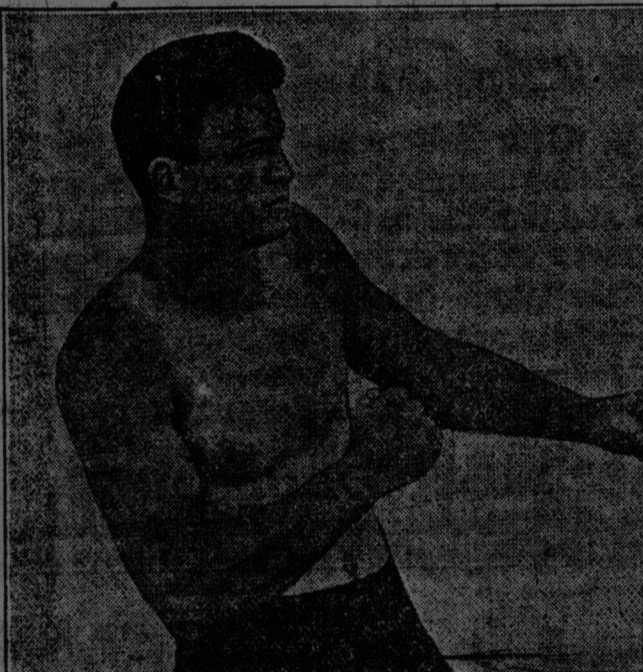

OTTAWA WANTED THE SINGLE TAX TWENTY YEARS AGO

Reasons For Lower Valuation of Buildings Than of Land

(Ottawa Journal).
Apart from the question of the common sense of municipalities being given local option in the matter of taxation, the Journal favors the principle of a lower valuation of buildings than of land for many reasons.

Mr. Pratt moved, seconded by ex-Mayor Frank McDougall—one of the most level-headed Scotchmen Ottawa has known—a resolution in favor of the straight single tax. It read:—
"That the present system of taxation discourage industry and capital, the principal elements that go to build up our country; that all improvements upon land and active capital should be exempt from taxation; that land values alone should be the basis of all taxation for municipal purposes; that the Ontario Legislature be petitioned by this Board of Trade to empower such or any municipality by law to exempt the whole or any percentage of improvements on land or the whole or any percentage of active capital from taxation."

Mr. Pratt accompanied this with a detailed analysis of what would be the effect in Ottawa, and showed that if all taxes here were abolished except on land, the ordinary tax rate of about two cents per dollar on all real estate and industry, would have to be replaced by a tax of five per cent on land; and that practically this would not work out as a hardship on anybody except the speculative holder of real estate, who would receive all building and industry from a depressing burden. The resolution was adopted by the board of trade.
