

Fredericton, March 14-(Special)-Lieut proposition which is being discussed by those keenly interested in the development of the city. It is urged on the grounds that there is a large area just beyond the limits in which there is a large population which really belongs to the city and which should be included. The change, they say, would enable these residents of the county to benefit by the city services which would be worth more to them than the additional taxes might be. This, it was said today, would probably be the only way in which some of the new sub-divisions could acquire modern improvements and there would be a demand from the owners of lots for these conveniences in a short time.

It is also urged that the additional population would help to make the city assume a more important position in the list of Canadian cities and that the extension of the city limits would also help the 1917 club to make a big step towards their ambition to have a population of 100,000 for St. John within five years. If this ideal is to be reached the limits will have to be extended anyway to accommodate them and it is argued that it might as well be done first as last.





### INCREASES FOR THE POST OFFICE CLERKS

Ottawa, March 13—In the neighborhood of 8,000 postoffice employes, or practically every one in city post offices are affected by the bill of Hon. L. P. Pelletier to amend the civil service act, which was this week given its second reading, and put through committee. According to the provisions of the bill, increases of salary of \$100 a year are granted until \$800 is reached and above that sum increases of \$50 a year till \$1,800 is reached. Chief clerks and office superintendents get annual increases of \$100 till \$2,200 and \$2,500 respectively are reached.

Hon. L. P. Pelletier says that it was found necessary to take this step in order to preserve the service, the department finding that they could not keep their men at the salaries which had been paid. The bill also provides that promotions in future will be made strictly on merit.


